Good Rains Cover State On Monday

Reports indicate that 91 inch of water fell during the day Monday. The rain was hard and therefore caused lots of water to run. The new city lake gained about 4 inches of water, which amounts to quite a bit of water, considering the amount now in the lake. It is estimated that this four inches would have amounted to a foot or more when the lake was at its lowest stage.

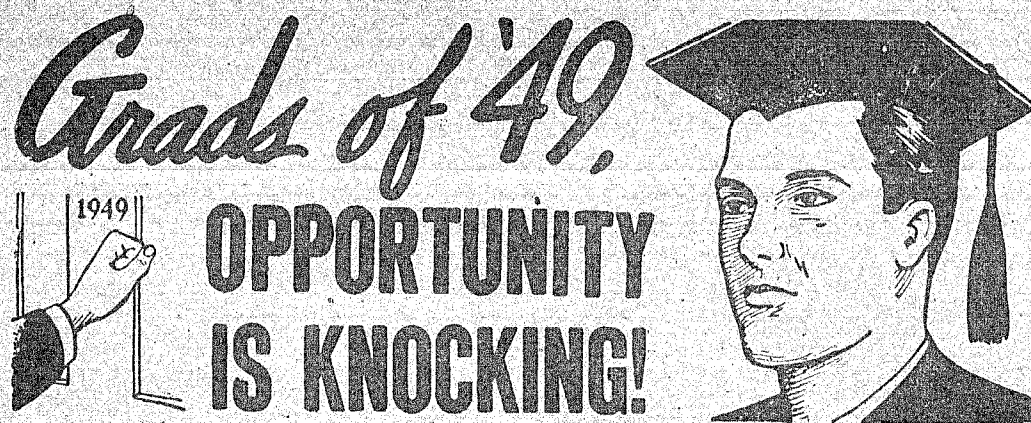
Mrs. Richardson's body was laid to rest beside that of her husband, in the Plainview Cemetery. Hosh Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

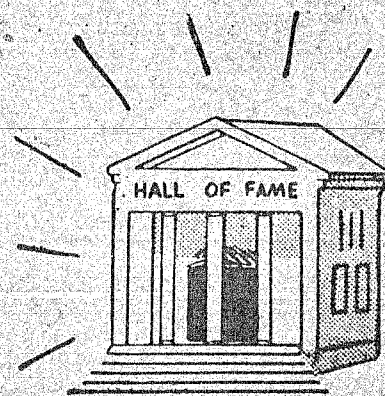

Sorry to report that Mr. R. S. Stearns is in the Abilene hospital, recuperating from a serious operation. The last report he is just doing fine.

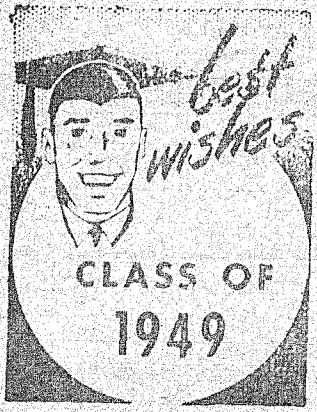

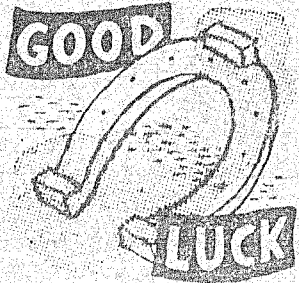

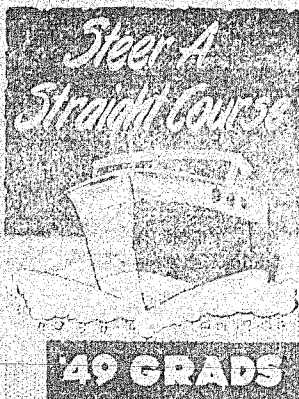

Subjects for the day were: "Bible Study in the Home," and "Making Every Day Mother's Day." Those who took part on the program were: Mmes. Marvin

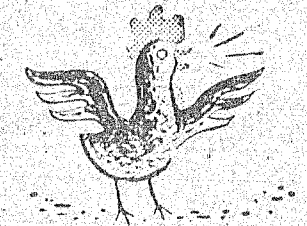

Whenever you see some one whose chief idea of being a "good Christian" is going around proclaiming the meanness of the world, cawing at everybody and everything.

AND BROKE IT, and gave it... Artists have tried in a single picture to express the meaning of Christianity. Some of the pictures are beautiful, but many of them miss an important truth.

At the heart of our religion is a Communion. Few if any Protestant churches allow any one even a minister, to give the Holy Communion to himself, by himself.
