City Buys Fogging Machine

The City of Santa Anna has purchased a DDT fogging machine and it is already in operation. The machine was purchased last week from a company in San Antonio and is known as the Todd of New York fogging machine.

Last Thursday afternoon the fogging machine was brought into Santa Anna for demonstration purposes. After the machine was demonstrated through the alleys and some of the streets, the city decided to buy the machine. The salesman was talked into leaving the machine here, to avoid a from 15 to 30 day delivery in getting a machine here, so that fogging could be started immediately.

The town was fairly well covered with fog on Saturday, and plans call for the city to be fogged at regular intervals and the outlying parts of the town are also to be fogged.

With over 70 cases of polio reported in San Angelo, it would seem that it is a good thing for Santa Anna to have a fogging machine. Everyone knows there is no known method of keeping polio from spreading. However, it is known that it is spread by filth and carried by flies and mosquitoes and other insects. The fogging machine will help prevent the spread of disease of this kind. A clean-up campaign should be in effect continually by every person in Santa Anna. The city could hardly come in and clean up your property for you. But if you are interested in the welfare of yourself and your town, you will clean up your premises and keep them that way.

The machine was purchased at a cost of \$1,695.00 delivered. The \$1.00 per month levy on the water meters will go to make up the cost of the machine.

Audit Of City Books Reported On Thurs. Night

The auditor that has been in the process of auditing the cities books for the past two weeks, turned his audit over to the city officials last Thursday night at a meeting of a number of the citizens of Santa Anna and the city commissioners.

The audit consisted of a 42 page report and showed that most of the bond money that was voted in December of 1947 had been spent. A large portion of the \$15,000 water bonds were spent on the five city wells that furnished a part of our water supply all last year. According to the report, it is hard to determine the exact amount of the cost of the wells. A portion of the money was spent for new pumps at the lakes and for pipe.

Copies of the report can be seen at the Chamber of Commerce office, the Bank, Parker Auto Supply and at the City Hall. If you are interested in this report, you are invited to visit one of these places and look the audit over.

The auditor made his report and stated that the city commissioners are going to have some tough sledding before them. He suggested that every citizen their help. The financial status of in Santa Anna get in behind the city commissioners and give them the city is in pretty bad shape and the commissioners are going to need a lot of help to keep the city going, was another statement of the auditor.

New Texas Highway Maps Ready

Austin, June 3.—The 1949 Texas Highway Map comes off the presses today ready for free distribution by the Texas Highway Department. Showing 31,000 miles of completed Texas highways, over 30,000 paved, the map is illustrated with drawings and 30 full color pictures.

A panel is devoted this year to travel attractions in Mexico on the Pan-American Highway, with particular attention given to prehistoric ruins. This highway, which dissects Texas, north to south, now runs to Tuxla almost in Central America, Texas will be the gateway state in future travel on this international road.

Complete mileage tables of comparative distances between Texas cities and between state capitols outside of Texas to border points in Texas are given. Mileages from Laredo, South to points on the Pan American Highway are included. A United States road map, showing major national highways, is on the back of the Texas map.

Governor Beauford Jester's message to Texas travelers prefaces the edition.

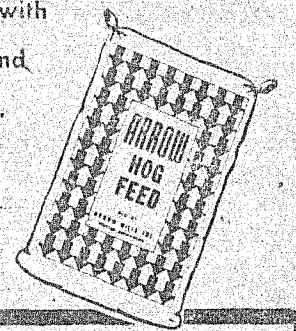

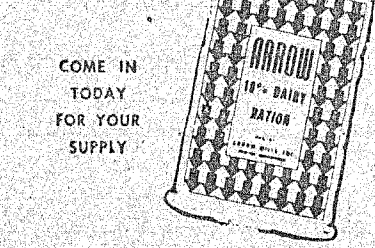

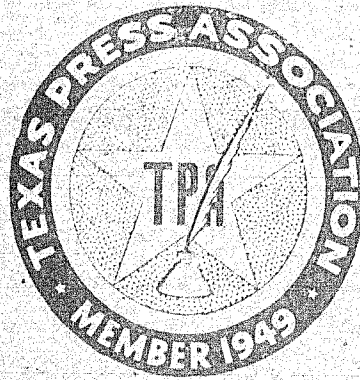

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Ordinance No. 159

An ordinance to regulate the rental of telegraph, telephone, electric and gas companies for the privilege of using their poles, wires, conduits, pipes, and fixtures and street easements, and alleys and other public ways within the City of Santa Anna, Texas, providing penalties for violation, and providing an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS:

Section 1: That, all persons, associations, organizations, and corporations using or maintaining any telegraph, telephone, electric light or other poles, gas pipe lines, pipes and other fixtures in any of the streets, highways, easements, alleys, parks or other places within the corporate limits of the City of Santa Anna, Texas shall on the 1st day of August of each and every year file with the City Secretary a sworn report showing the gross receipts from the business conducted by such persons, associations, organizations and corporations within the corporate limits of the said city for the preceding year ending June 30.

Section 2: The Board of Commissioners may when it may see fit have the books and records of the person, association, organization or corporation rendering the statement required in Section 1 of this Ordinance examined by a representative of the city to ascertain whether such statement is accurate, but nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed to prevent the city from ascertaining the facts by any other method.

Section 3: That upon the 1st day of August of each and every year, every person, association, organization or corporation occupying or using the streets, highways, easements, alleys, parks or other public places in the City of Santa Anna, Texas, with poles, pipes, and for other fixtures shall as a condition to such further occupancy pay to the city annually for such privileges a rental equal to two (2%) percent of the gross receipts reported by such person, association, organization or corporation from its business conducted in the corporate limits of the City of Santa Anna, Texas for the preceding year which sum shall be paid to the City of Santa Anna, Texas.

Section 4: That upon receipt of the above rental by the city, the City Secretary shall deliver to the person, association, organization, or corporation paying the same a receipt for such rental, which said receipt shall authorize such person, association, organization or corporation to use and occupy the streets, highways, easements, alleys, parks and other public ways of the City in carrying on its business for twelve (12) months from August 1st of each year.

Section 5: That the rental for

the privilege of using the streets, alleys, highways, easements, and public places of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, provided for in this ordinance is not charged as a tax, but is made for the privilege now enjoyed and to be enjoyed by such persons, associations, organizations, and corporations of using the streets, easements, alleys, and other public ways of the city in the conduct of their respective businesses; and such charges are additional to all ad valorem and franchise taxes and to all taxes of every nature whatsoever against the persons, associations, organizations or corporations mentioned herein.

Section 6: That nothing herein is intended to relieve any person, association, organization, or corporation of any condition, restriction or requirement, imposed by any law or ordinance of the said City of Santa Anna, Texas.

Section 7: That this ordinance does not grant a franchise to any utility or person, association, organization or corporation to use the streets, easements, alleys, and other public ways and shall never be so construed by the courts or otherwise, and the city reserves the right to cancel the privileges granted hereunder and refund the unearned rentals paid to the city.

Section 8: That the City of Santa Anna hereby reserves the right to put into effect at any time other restrictions and regulations as to the erection and maintenance of poles, wires, pipes and other appurtenances in the streets, easements, alleys and other public ways of the City and from time to time to require such poles, pipes, wires and other property equipment and fixtures as it may deem

proper to be removed and to require wires to be run in conduits on such terms as the city may deem proper.

Section 9: That every person, association, organization, and corporation who shall operate any business without the payment of the rentals provided for herein shall be subject to a penalty of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for each and every day that such person, association, organization, or corporation shall conduct such business using and occupying the streets, easements, alleys, or other public ways of the City of Santa Anna without the payment of the said rentals which said sum may be recovered by the City of Santa Anna in a court of competent jurisdiction by a suit filed therein.

Section 10: That every person, association, organization, and corporation and the local manager or agent of every such person, organization or corporation failing or refusing to make the report required by Section 1 of this Ordinance, or failing or refusing to allow the examination provided for in Section 2 herein shall upon conviction in the Corporation Court of the City of Santa Anna, Texas be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars and every day's failure or refusal, as mentioned in this Section, shall be deemed a separate offense.

Section 11: The city fire marshal, building inspector, electrical inspector, city's police officers, and such other persons designated by the city, shall have power and it shall be their duty to examine and inspect from time to time all telegraph, telephone, electric light or other poles, gas pipe lines, pipes and other fixtures in the public

places within the city for the purpose of seeing that all of same are in a safe and suitable condition and whenever any such item is found to be unsafe or unsuitable for the purpose for which it is used, the person using, possessing or maintaining same shall be notified and required to place same in a safe and suitable condition.

Section 12: If any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or held unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this ordinance as a whole or any part or provisions thereof other than the part so decided to be invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 13: That the fact that telegraph, telephone, electric and gas companies have been occupying and using the streets, easements, alleys and other public ways of the City of Santa Anna, Texas for many years without the payment of rent for such use creates an emergency, and this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage, approval and publication as

required by law. Passed and approved this 30th day of May, 1949.

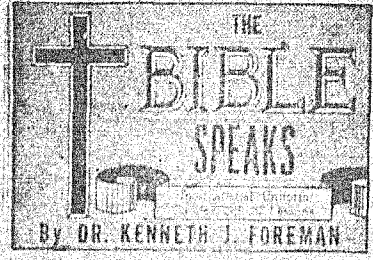

Why Jesus Died

Lesson for June 12, 1949

THREE FACTS of Jesus' death were Bible. They are told in the four Gospels, and the drama is there for all to see, and only the hard of heart can read it without tears.

There is a question that has troubled many minds: "Why did Jesus die?" The first thought that comes to mind is, "He died for our sins." They all know it, and they all know it was so. But the question is, "Why did he die?"

No Other End
THERE WAS, of course, "historical reasons" why Jesus was killed. If we read the words "murdered" or "lynched" it would be nearer the truth. Jesus' death, from one point of view, was both a tragedy and a crime, and the Gospel stories show this. Jesus died because Pilate was a spineless man.

Jesus died because the priests of Jerusalem saw that if this man won, they would lose, and they would commit murder rather than be defeated. Jesus died because the Pharisees had closed minds and would not listen to truth if they did not think of it first.

He died because Judas was a traitor, because his friends were cowards and even the best of them dared to show their faces only after he was dead. He died because the Jewish people had their minds set on one sort of Messiah, and when Jesus turned out to be quite another sort, they would have none of him. Being altogether the sort of person he was, in that kind of world, at that particular time and place, you could say, as Jesus himself did, that the Son of Man "had to" die. (Luke 24:26) No other end was possible. There was to help for it, except to turn coward and hide, and if he had been capable of that, he would not have been the Christ we know at all.

The Plan of God
THEN WAS Jesus simply a victim of circumstances? Was he no better than a fly caught in fate's dark web? Far from it. The Christian church has always believed, even before these stories of the crucifixion were ever written, that the death of Christ was in the plan of God. In fact, it is at the heart of God's plan for mankind.

It is by the death of Christ that God reconciles man and brings men back to himself. The Christian church believes and teaches that Christ died for us, that is, for you and for me. We believe that this was not simply Jesus' own idea, something God had not thought of till Jesus suggested it.

We believe that this was the intention of God "from before the foundation of the world." The God who is over all, works through all things, even very evil things, to make his love known.


