She is a graduate of the Training School "House Beautiful" of our Southern Baptist Theological Seminary of Louisville, Kentucky. She is W. M. U. Mr. Brusenhan states that the fire could have caused about \$7,000 damage in a very short time, if they had not got it put out promptly.

It would be a good idea to let this serve as a warning to the general public. There is lots of grass and weeds along the roads and in the pastures everywhere, and one match can cause a lot of damage in a very short time. Be careful, and be sure to extinguish all fires and matches.

City To Require Dogs To Have License Tags

At a meeting of the City Commissioners Monday night, June 20, it was decided to enforce City Ordinance No. 733, in Ordinance Book page 49, which states that all dogs in the city limits must be licensed. This includes dogs of any age.

All dogs must be vaccinated for rabies, hydrophobia, before a city license can be obtained. In order to obtain a city license for dogs, a receipt must be presented to the City Secretary signed by whomever administered the rabies serum and showing the date administered. August 1, 1949, is the deadline for getting the city dog license.

Beginning with the deadline date, dogs without the city license and rabies tags will be picked up and disposed of after the proper impounding time.

According to the commissioner, there is a large number of stray dogs wandering around in the city. There is so many dogs without license tags they have deemed it necessary that all dogs have the rabies vaccination and the city license tags or they must be disposed of.

Miss Jettie Kirkpatrick states that the new city tags will be here about the first of July, and as soon as they arrive, you can start putting the tags on your dogs.

Fire At Grocery Sunday Night

The motor to the walk-in meat box at the Cochran Grocery was discovered to be on fire at about 9:30 Sunday night, the discovery being made by Nightwatchman Baucum, who gave the alarm. The speedy work of the Fire Department, after cutting out a part of the front door for entrance, prevented what might have been great damage. After putting out the burning motor, they drew the smoke from the building with a suction fan, thus preventing damage to the stock of goods.

The grain harvest reached its peak this week, with all the grain buyers working almost day and night to keep the trucks unloaded and the grain shipped out. Arrow Mill, Inc., has for the last two weeks been taking the Government loan wheat, with Guthrie and Wise buying some wheat and lots of oats and Bob Garrett buying oats.

Arrow Mills, Inc. is the only buyer in the county that has been for wheat under the Government loan program. At the start of the season, it looked as though there was not going to be any very little storage for the farmers of this area for their wheat. However, Arrow Mills finally secured some storage space.

Mr. George Hipp states that they will take the wheat as long as they can store it. They have last week stated that he was getting wheat from all over the county and that yields were running from 12 to 18 bushels with an average test of from 52 to 53, with moisture being about 10.

This week is expected to just about complete the main part of the grain harvest. The grain had began slowing down some Wednesday and it is expected that by the end of the month very little will be left.

The Santa Fe Railroad has done a good job of keeping cars here for the buyers to use. The only time they have been out of cars was for a little while Tuesday afternoon. For the past several days the buyers have been shipping out from 12 to 15 cars loads a day. And accurate count as to the number of cars shipped this season is not available at this time.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

Proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III and the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature, specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect, ratified, and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (3600) to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature, and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller.

"Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session.

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4/5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered.

"Sec. 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

"Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in September, 1949, same being September 24, 1949, at which election all ballots shall be numbered.

"For the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members.

"AGENTS for the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members shall receive his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

"Sec. 5. The Governor of this State shall have the power to pardon for and commute and shall have same published promulgated by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19
Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people thereon.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 12, to read as follows:

"Section 12. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but no system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office hereinafter provided by Section 20 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand inhabitants."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State on any day in September, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon thereon the words "Civil Service" and "Yes" and "No" and the words "Civil Service" shall be printed in large type on the ballot.





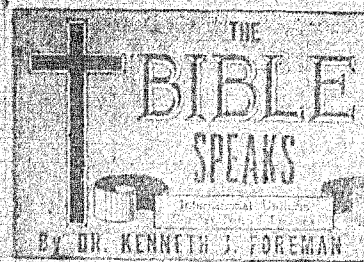

He Lives On

Lesson for June 26, 1949

WHAT IS JESUS, after all? A name in a book? A picture on the walls of churches? More than that! A historical character? Founder of a great religion? More than that! He is the one and only Person who can be everywhere. He would be important if he had only lived here so far from the scene he lives on. But where does he live and how? Dr. Foreman

Jesus lives on today in the life of prayer which we believe is still his. No matter what comes to the Christian, he can remember that One is praying for him who is stronger than all the world of evil.

"Greater is he that is for us than he that is against us," said John the Apostle.

In His Book

LUKE tells us that Jesus had to show some of his friends his own picture in the Old Testament. His portrait is not very plain there, but in the New Testament it is very plain indeed. The Bible leads us to Christ. He is its crowning figure. The Bible is so to speak a frame for his picture. Many a person in various regions of the world has become Christian just by reading about Christ in some stray copy of the New Testament. The reader begins by reading about Jesus—then he begins to come alive, and he meets Jesus face to face. Jesus lives on, wherever the Bible goes.

In His People

CHURCHES may argue among themselves about what Jesus meant by this or that. But there cannot be any argument about one thing. When Jesus left his friends behind, he gave them orders to go out into the world about him. "Make disciples of all nations... Ye shall be my witnesses." A shut-mouthed Christian isn't much of a Christian. A shut-mouthed church is a poor sort of church. (Is it really a church at all?) We do not believe that Jesus expected his followers all to become preachers.

Indeed, we should remember that all the first Christians were laymen. But they got results. One hundred twenty people grew to be three thousand, five thousand, in a few weeks.

What is the reason that 120 Christians today don't win 3,000 converts? One reason is that you would probably find those 120 Christians complaining that their church is "vacant," they don't have a pastor. The early Christians might have thought that very funny. How can a church be vacant with 120 people in it? Christ lives in his church.

Into All the World

CHRISTIANITY is the only religion that can stand transplanting into any climate. There is no other religion that can number its people from the Arctic to the equator, and from east to west around the world. But this is not an accident. It would not have happened by itself. Jesus himself in Galilee walked wherever he went, and in all his grown-up life he did not walk farther from his birthplace than you could drive in an afternoon.

But he walks on every shore. Where ship and camel and plane carry the missionary, there goes Christ, where the

airwaves carry his message, there is he. Wherever Christians go, Christ goes in them and with them.

He lives everywhere today where Christians live, he walks on Christians' feet. Beside the four Gospels in print there is the Gospel according to You. Does Jesus live in and through you?

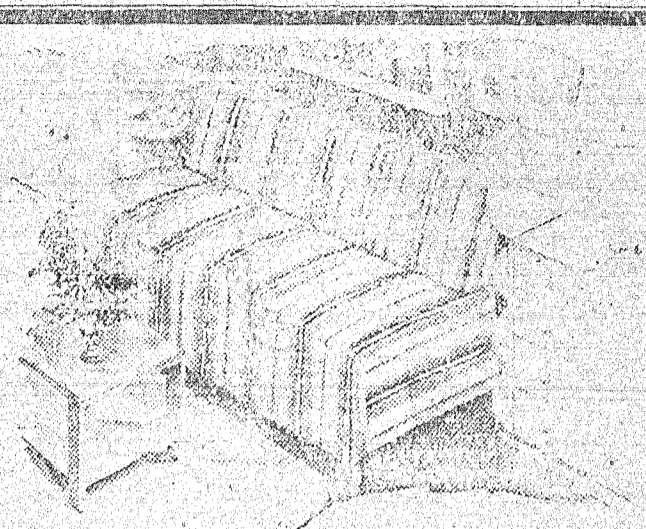

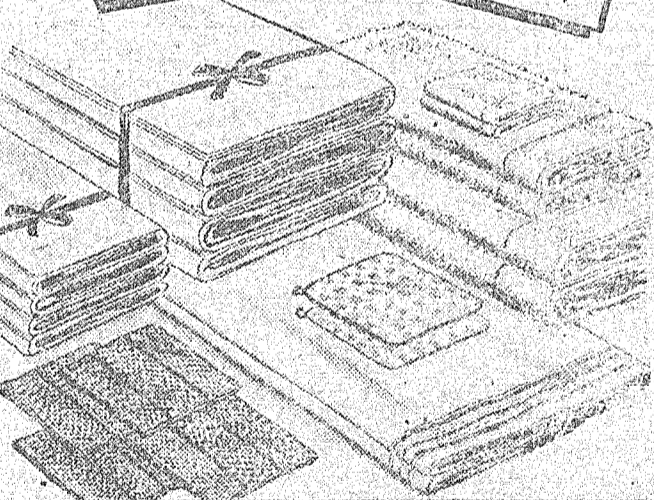
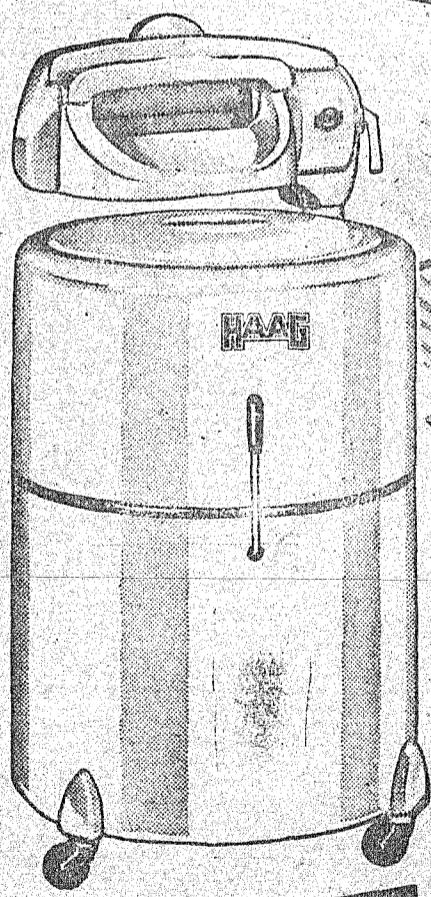
