Rites For C. M. Grady Held At Brownwood

Last rites for Caleb M. Grady, 95, were held in the Davis-Morris Chapel in Brownwood, on Friday, July 1, at 10:00 a. m. Mr. Grady died at his home there on Wednesday, June 29, at 1:30 p. m., after an illness of several months. His remains were laid to rest in the Greenleaf Cemetery, the original burial ground of the Grady family, near his wife who had preceded him in death on June 29, 1929.

Rev. H. H. Hargrove, pastor of the Coggin Ave. Baptist Church, officiated in the absence of his pastor, Rev. Harry Lee Spencer, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Born in Gradyville, Ky., on May 8, 1854, Mr. Grady came to Texas with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. P. C. Grady in 1870. They settled first in Grayson County, and two years later moved to Brown County, where members of the family continue to live.

Soon after moving to Brown county in 1872 he joined the Texas Rangers and served until 1874 under Capt. Jeff Malby. His first camp as a Ranger was on Home Creek, at the mouth of Horse Creek. He covered this area during his service and often stood guard on the east point of Santa Anna Mountains, and other high peaks, during the "blue northers" and blizzards known in Texas during that time.

On retiring from Ranger duty, he married Miss Elizabeth Hughes, of Brownwood, in 1877. Later he purchased a small track of land east of Santa Anna and built a log cabin, his first home. Here he farmed and raised his family, and after his retirement he moved back to Brownwood, where he spent his remaining years. At the time of his death he was commander emeritus of the Texas Ex-Ranger Association.

Pall bearers were his grandsons: Coleman Gay, of Austin; Raymond Scott, of Houston; Bert Scott, of Coleman; Verner Grady, of Lamesa and nephews: Dr. V. A. Kelley, of Waco; and R. D. Kelley, of Santa Anna.

Surviving are 6 daughters and 3 sons: Mrs. Frank E. Scott, and Mrs. Gertrude Roberson, of Brownwood; Mrs. R. C. Gay and Mrs. M. L. Walker, of Santa Anna; Mrs. J. L. Westerman, of Albuquerque, New Mexico; and Mrs. Mildred Ray of Fort Worth; Guy Grady of Williams; and J. E. and R. C. Grady of Port Arthur.

One son, Harry H. Grady, died in 1925, and was buried in the family plot.

Mr. Grady was the oldest of a family group noted for their longevity, and the ones who survive are: Edd Grady, 80, of Georgetown; V. L. Grady, 82, Santa Anna; Dick Grady, 83, of Brownwood; and W. G. Grady, 90, of Indian Creek. Their sister, Mrs. W. B. Kelley, of Santa Anna, who died on March 15, of this year, was 84.

There are 17 grandchildren and 17 great grandchildren also surviving.

Coleman Rodeo Starts Wednesday

Coleman, July 5—This city in Central West Texas plays host to one of the years top Rodeo Crowds when the 12th Annual Rodeo opens its gates Wednesday night, July 13 for a four day show. This year will feature the same rodeo stock as did the show last year which was furnished by Triangle Bell Ranch. Last year's show caused lots of favorable comment from rodeo fans from all over the state.

For four nights, July 13th, 14th, 15th, and 16th, the \$65,000.00 Coleman Rodeo Association Arena will be packed with an audience of thrill hungry rodeo fans who are assured of a top flight show. Five big rodeo events, the colorful Girls flag race which was originated in Coleman many years ago, specialty acts and a special matched roping between two top ropers will make up the program for the show and which will be unsurpassed in the entire Southwest.

Rex Beck of Talpa, Texas, and the roping champion of the Coleman Rodeo will rope against Sonny Edwards of Big Springs, in the matched roping contest which should bring roping fans from all over this section of the state. All men rate among the top ropers of the nation, both having participated many times and placed with the winners many times in the top rodeos of this country including Madison Square Garden where Beck placed last year. Each contestant will rope 3 calves each night and the total lapsed time deciding the winner.

Reserve seats for this Rodeo are now on sale at the Owl Drug Store in Coleman by Oplin Saunders and are priced at \$1.50 which includes admission taxes. Seats may be purchased for each night separately or for all four shows.

The program this year will open Wednesday afternoon with the traditional Rodeo parade at 5:30 led by Sam Cobb, Rodeo president. This parade each year is truly a spectacle to behold as it is always about two miles long and features West Texas Cowboys, Cowgirls and children by the score on their favorite mounts. This parade each afternoon with all its color puts the crowd in the proper spirits to enjoy this Rodeo in the evening.

It is not possible, in my opinion, to exaggerate the importance of the annual meeting of an REA co-op.

An REA co-op is not just another power company. It is a mutual self-help enterprise owned by the rural people it serves.

And the annual members meetings of supreme importance because it is one meeting each year when the rank-and-file owners are expected and required to exercise their control, to call for an accounting of their co-op business from the board and the managers, to discuss major policies, and to choose by secret ballot which of their fellow members they want to entrust with the direction of their co-op business during the year.

Lack of members attendance at an annual meeting is not a tribute to the board and management, nor is it a sign that the members are completely satisfied with the way their co-op affairs are being conducted. Rather, it is usually a sign of apathy, of lack of interest caused either by the failure of board and management to keep the members well informed about co-op affairs and co-op responsibilities or by a feeling that the cards are stacked against really democratic control at annual meetings. The best member attendance is generally found in the best managed co-ops.

No Co-op can be sure of permanent success of permanent success without enlisting the loyal, active grass roots support of an informed membership. It is the duty of the board and management to plan, publicize and conduct annual meetings in such a way that the members will enjoy them and have full opportunity to exercise their rights of control as owners of the co-op business.

Of course good attendance at the annual meetings will not assure intelligent member control. Only a well-informed membership can do that. Member education activities should therefore be carried on all through the year. But what happens at your annual meeting is of utmost importance to the health and welfare of your co-op.

Extension On Bond Drive Announced

Dallas. — Purchases of series E Savings Bonds through Saturday, July 16, will be credited to county and state quotas in the Opportunity Drive.

This announcement was made in Dallas by Nathan Adams, Chairman of the Treasury Department's Advisory Committee for Texas, who explained that although the promotional phrase of the drive ended June 30, the accounting period continues through July 16.

Adams said that Texas would substantially exceed its drive quota of \$36,950,000 if sales continue at their present rate.

He said that sales as of Saturday, June 25, were \$32,637,000, or 88.3 per cent of the quota. He also reported that 79 counties had already exceeded their individual quotas and that the others were expected to do so by the end of the accounting period.

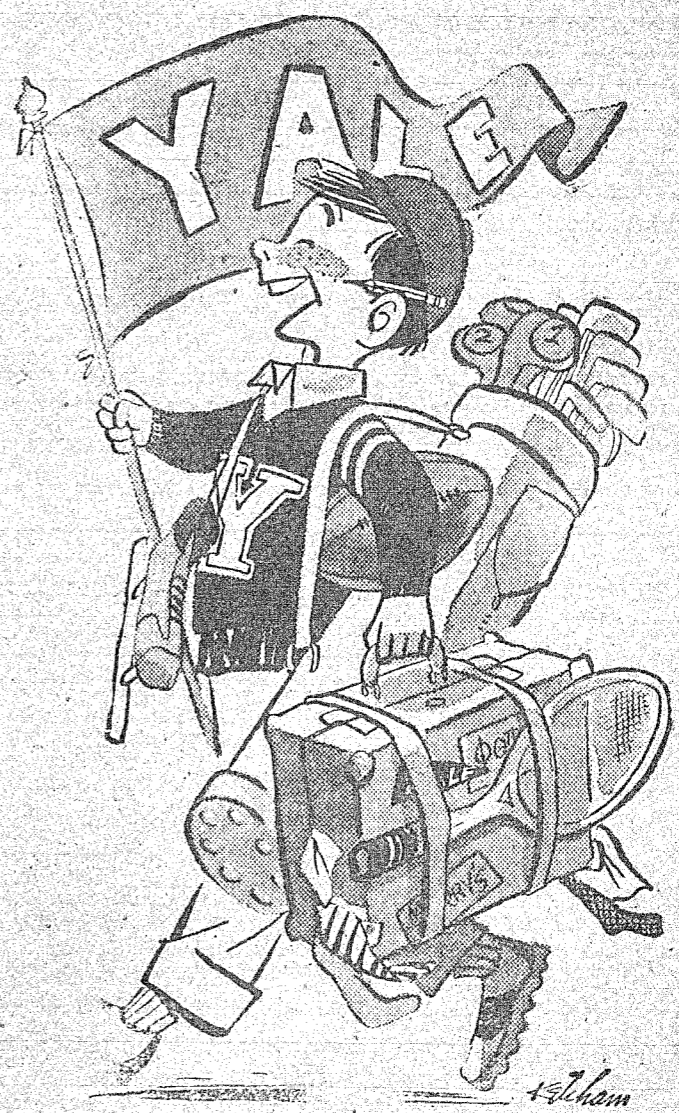

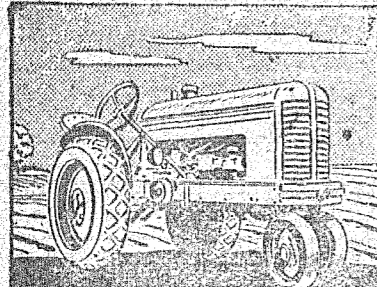

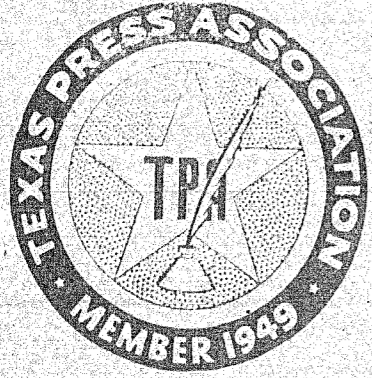

Giles Says Procedure For Acquiring Land Under Vet Program To Be Kept Simple

By BASCOM GILES Commissioner of the General Land Office and Chairman of the Veterans' Land Board

(Editor's Note: This is the concluding article of a series of three by Bascom Giles explaining the newly created Veterans' Land Program.)

In keeping with the terms of the legislation creating the Texas Veterans' Land Board, its administration and operating policies will be kept as simple as the problems of this huge program will permit.

The fact that approximately 13,000 veterans have already contacted this office for information on the working details of the plan indicates the commendable desire of veterans to own a farm or ranch home under the idea originally conceived by the author five years ago.

Paper work involving application to participate has been cut to the minimum. Each successive step has been shorn of all encumbering delays.

For example, proof of the applicant's eligibility can be established by submitting a certified copy of his honorable discharge plus substantiation that the applicant was a resident of Texas at the time he entered military service and is still a legal resident at the time of application for land program benefits. For those taking advantage of the 90 day priority offered those who have a service-connected disability sustained in combat, certification of such must accompany the application.

Each veteran will be limited to one purchase not exceeding \$7,500 cost to the Board. He will be required to pay not less than five per cent down and execute an on-or-before note for 40 years at three per cent interest for the balance.

Should a purchaser desire to acquire a tract of land costing NOT more than \$10,000 he will be re-

quired to pay the difference between \$7,500 and the purchase price plus the five per cent down payment on the \$7,500 loan.

He shall have served not less than 90 days on active duty in some branch of the armed service between September 16, 1940 and December 31, 1946, unless discharged sooner for service-connected disabilities. A certified copy of the applicant's honorable discharge will be required to be filed with application. In addition, a veteran who leases his land for oil or gas must apply one-half of all bonus and rentals to the retirement of his debt.

The veterans will NOT be required to live upon the property but he will NOT be permitted to dispose of it for a period of three years.

Payments of principle on note with interest will be made on a semi-annual basis. Each veteran will receive a contract of sale from the state and upon final payment he or she will be granted absolute title.

Failure to make payments when due, permits the Board to revoke the contract of purchase and to forfeit the land which can then be offered for resale to other veterans. A veteran may reinstate his land which has been forfeited, up to the announced date of resale by payment of a penalty and placing account in good standing.

The Board in its first meeting named Alvis Vandygriff as executive secretary.

Vandygriff, an attorney, who hails from Emis, Texas, has been serving as Chief Clerk of the General Land Office. He is a veteran of World War II having served as a Major in the Army Air Force. He was selected by the Board to direct the administrative machinery of the new program on the basis of his long experience in the Land Office where the offices and records of the program will be maintained.

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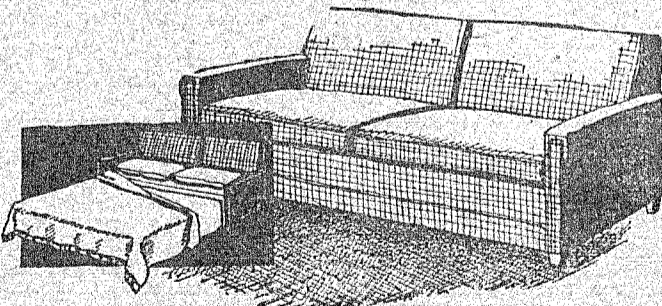


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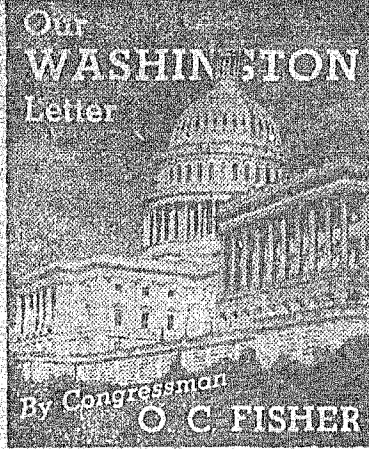

So far as Congress itself was concerned, only two things happened last week. The House passed a previously-approved Senate Housing bill and the Senate balked on the Administration's drive for repeal of the Taft Hartley labor law.

On the Housing front, the House did what the Senate had already done and okayed a bill calling for the building of nearly one million houses, and authorized a take of \$400,000,000 annually from the federal treasury to help pay the rent bills of those occupying the new structures with an estimated total running

beyond \$16 billion. In addition, there will be administration costs throughout the future.

The crucial vote on the housing measure came on an amendment to leave the slum clearance provisions in the bill but to cut out to the provision for the building of the new houses. On that I voted for the amendment to strike the housing section out. It was a close vote, with the housing advocates prevailing by a vote of 209-204.

And it was a highly important vote. Some of the advocates of federalized housing admit that it means something new in America—a form of socialism which we have never experimented with before on a comparable basis. It sets down a precedent and a broad policy for a major government activity in the future. It means that perhaps throughout the future Uncle Sam will be helping pay the rent bills each month for millions of Americans. All agree that the one million housing units will be wholly inadequate if the Government is to furnish houses for all the low-income people. It will mean several million additional ones will have to be built in the future, if this new policy is to be carried out.

Texas voting to strike federalized housing out of the bill were: Bentsen, Burleson, Fisher, Gossett, Lucas, Mahon, Pickett, Poage, Regan, Teague, Thomas, Wilson, and Worley - 13.

Voting for Federalized housing were: Beckworth, Combs, Lyle, Patman, Thompson and Thornberry - 6.

The new housing program marks a departure from methods of government aid, even in WPA days. In depression days it was insisted that those who got government checks could at least do some sort of work raking leaves, ect., where other types of work was not available. But in order to qualify for government payments on rent bills under the new housing law, the tenants will not even have to rake leaves or mow their own lawns. They will only have to show they are making a limited amount.

The Senate upheld most of the Taft-Hartley law and refused to yield to the demands to repeal the provision against injunctions obtainable at the instance of the President to delay strikes where the national health and safety are involved.

This action brought forth a broadside from both the AFL and CIO leaders, both demanding that the government be allowed no injunctive authority whatever to stop or delay any kind of strikes under any conditions. They both said that if the new bill is to retain the right of the government to use injunctions,

then they would demand that the president veto the measure. They then went on to say they would declare political war on every one of us who refused to vote to repeal the Taft-Hartley law, and undertake in that way to change the complexion of the Congress and better the chance to get what they want.

On the labor front, old John L. Lewis is still holding the spotlight around Washington. They say if a long coal strike is averted it will be a miracle. Some CIO leaders who are very unhappy because Congress did not repeal the Taft - Hartley law, are threatening a series of major strikes. Some think they would like to see this in order that they could then blame it all on the Taft-Hartley law. The director of CIO organization, Allen S. Haywood, said in Columbus the other day, "there may be some giant strikes". He said the CIO demand "shorter workdays, shorter work weeks, higher wages, better houses, better hospitals, better pensions."

A rather unique strike has been going on in Washington since June 1. Five thousand carpenters struck for an increase in hourly wages. They now receive \$2.40 an hour and they are striking for \$2.50.
