Parallel Parking On Main Street

Effective Monday, of this week, parallel parking on main street in Santa Anna was mandatory. To this writer, the street looks considerably wider and it makes the town look better in general. When the drivers of the town learn to parallel park without much confusion it will, no doubt, be better for all of us.

Your editor has heard a number of different kinds of comment on the parking situation. Some blame the city commissioners for making a law that we must parallel park, and others seem to think that it is the city commissioners fault that vehicles not suppose to park on main street, have been allowed to do so. People, in general, seem to forget, or at least, don't care to remember whether an officer is on hand to make them do as the law states or not that they are still violating a law when they do as the law says they shall not do. To keep the parking situation as it should have been before parallel parking was put in, would have taken the full time of an extra city employee. The city has not been in financial condition to keep any more employees on the pay roll than absolutely necessary, and have therefore had to let people park as they would. The citizens of the town, combined with a number of out-of-town delivery trucks have been responsible that we are now parallel parking.

This writer has noticed that in crossing the street it seems a whole lot safer than before. The Streets have been marked off for parking and the crosswalks at the signal light have been painted. The signal light has been put back in operation this week, and all of these things combined will make our little city a lot safer place in which to live and transact business.

However, it seems to this writer that there should be a signal light put at the intersection of the Coleman & Brady highways. There has been two bad wrecks within a block of the intersection within the past few days, and had a signal light been working at this intersection, most likely both of these accidents would have been prevented. Since our one traffic light has been out of working condition a lot of the through traffic has not been slowing down to normal speed. If we had one at the Brady-Coleman intersection, it would help remind drivers to slow down as they come through town. The state requires that the speed limit in all towns, between city limits signs, be not over 30 miles per hour and the town can lower that speed if they want to. So far as this writer knows the speed limit in town is 30 miles per hour, and another traffic light in the west part of town would serve to remind drivers of that fact.

Election Set For July 30 For New School District

As a result of the Maximum Foundation School Law enacted by the last legislature Coleman County has a new school district. This new district is composed of Mayo, Plainview, Leedy, Line, and Santa Anna. This consolidation was done by the County Board of Trustees which were required by law to annex all dormant school districts to the nearest four year high school. The district will be known as the Santa Anna Independent School District because the rest of the districts have been dormant.

The law further provides that elections shall be held in such consolidated districts for the assumption of outstanding bonds, for the levying of taxes thereon, and for the levying of a local maintenance tax. This election has been set for July 30, 1949 and all qualified, property taxpaying voters of the new district shall be eligible to vote.

In order to meet the requirements set by the Gilmer-Aikin Law the Santa Anna School Board has set the tax rate at \$1.50 on State and County Valuations. This is quite a contrast to the amount the original Santa Anna District has been paying. It has been operating on a \$1.00 Tax rate and valuations a third higher than State & County. This new tax rate will mean a slight increase for the citizens of Mayo, Plainview, Leedy, and Line, Santa Anna taxpayers will pay about the same as in the past. The 1948 Valuation of the Santa Anna District was 1,475,370, and the new district on State and County Valuations is \$1,335,320.

The School Board members are anxious for you to give this new tax rate serious consideration and decide whether you want to levy the tax on State & County Valuations or maintain the valuations of the original Santa Anna School District.

The election will be held in the City Hall at Santa Anna.

Wreck Near Brady Hiway Intersection Sunday Night

Two Coleman cars were badly damaged in a wreck in front of the Bob Markland home just after dark Sunday night. The J. B. McCord car, a 1948 Chrysler convertible was parked in front of the Markland home and a 1948 Dodge, driven by Elwyn Smith of Coleman crashed into the McCord car.

Miss Marie Casey, of Coleman, was a passenger in the Smith car both were treated at the Sealy Hospital for minor injuries and released.

Smith said he was coming into Santa Anna and was blinded by an on-coming car, who would not dim his lights. He pulled off to the side of the road, but failed to see the McCord car in time to avoid hitting it.

Coleman County Farm-To-Market Road Designated

The following described roads have been designated as Farm-To-Market Roads subject to the availability of funds under the terms of Senate Bill No. 267 and subject to the condition that Coleman County will furnish all required right-of-way free of cost to the state.

From end F. M. 53 at Glen Cove Northwest, a distance of approximately 1.8 miles.

From end F. M. 566 South to road intersection at Voss, a distance of approximately 3.5 miles.

From U. S. 67 and 64 in Santa Anna Southeast to road intersection, a distance of approximately 5.7 miles.

Upon acceptance of the provisions of this Order by the proper officials of Coleman County the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with the preparation of plans for construction at an estimated cost of \$78,500 and when right-of-way and funds are available to proceed with construction and to assume for the roads maintenance upon completion of construction.

The funds for these roads will become available in September of this year, and the Commission is taking immediate action to the program roads in order to insure quick work as construction funds accrue.

S. S. Representative In Coleman Tuesday

Mr. Ralph T. Fisher, Manager of the Abilene Office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Department of Public Welfare at 1:00 p. m. on Tuesday, July 26. Any persons wishing assistance with retirement or death claims under the Social Security Act are invited to call to see Mr. Fisher at that time.

Mr. Fisher announced that the Abilene office issued 717 original social security cards during the month of June in addition, 283 duplicate cards were issued to persons who had lost their cards, or whose cards had become mutilated.

Most of the 717 new cards were issued to students preparing to take summer jobs. Any student, whether he works part-time or full-time, should have a social security account number card if he is working in commerce or industry. The card represents an insurance policy with the Government and should be shown to each new employer. Application blanks may be secured from the local Post Office. The completed application should be mailed to the Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas.

Persons who have lost their account number cards should make applications for duplicates. Blanks for this purpose are also furnished by the local Post Office.

Telephone Rates To Increase Aug 1.

Announcement appears elsewhere in this issue of the News of an increase in the rates of the Santa Anna Telephone Company. The local telephone exchange is one of the few remaining in the state who has not asked for increased rates since the war.

Mr. George M. Johnson, Manager of the telephone company states that the rates here have not been changed in over twenty years and that the increased cost of materials and labor have forced him to have to increase his rates.

The rates are below most towns of approximately the same size, according to the Southwestern States Telephone Company survey. The Santa Anna Telephone Company has over 500 telephones in service now and most towns with over 500 telephones have a rate of at least \$1.00 per month higher than the increased rates.

These rates have recently been approved by the present city commission.

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1949 Bids For Worst Polio Year

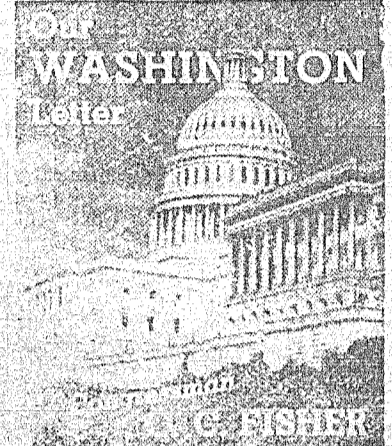
Austin, Texas. With the alarming total of 922 Texans having been attacked by the dread disease, poliomyelitis, 1949 bids fair to be the worst polio year the State has ever experienced, and health officials in every section of the State are exerting every effort to bring the disease under control.

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has reiterated his appeal for every citizen to cooperate in a continuous clean-up program, ridding their premises of all rubbish and trash piles, and any such filth as will afford breeding places for flies and other disease-spreading insects.

This polio situation will never be controlled without observance of stringent basic sanitation measures, the State Health Officer declared. The filth on your premises may cause the disease to attack your neighbor, and the same condition on his premises may cause polio in your home. This problem of controlling polio is one demanding the closest possible cooperation, and until a program of continuing clean-up is instituted and stringently enforced, we shall continue to face the menace of polio in every section of the State.

Dr. Cox emphasized to parents whose children are suffering from poliomyelitis, the comforting knowledge that about 60 per cent of all cases of recognized polio recover completely, and at least 25 to 30 per cent of all recognized cases recover with only minor disabling paralysis.

Only about 1 per cent of polio victims develop the deadly bulbar type, which affects the nerves at the base, or "hub" of the brain, Dr. Cox said. Most patients suffering from bulbar polio die within a very short time. But it is a comforting thought that 92 per cent of polio patients never develop bulbar polio and make a partial, or in many cases, complete recovery and are restored to health.

make loans for the expansion and improvement of rural telephone service under the same terms and conditions which REA has employed for many years in making loans for rural electrification. It is not a bill for government ownership or operation of telephone facilities. On the contrary, it provides that funds shall be made available on identical terms to private corporations, giving persons now operating telephone facilities a clear preference over all other types of applicants, and preserves to the utmost the authority of the State regulatory bodies over rates, service, and service areas.

The Committee hearings disclosed that only 43% of American farms now have telephones. In Texas the percentage is only 17.6% as of 1945, according to the U. S. Census of Agriculture.

Under this proposal, sponsored by Rep. Bob Poage of Waco, the money for loans would be handed exactly as REA loans are now made. The money is borrowed by the Government at a low rate of interest and then re-loaned to the rural telephone applicants. The program will therefore not cost the taxpayers anything, and will be administered by the present REA set-up.

That is not God's way. He pleads with us through his inspired page: Be not as mules—be men!

Facing Up to Yourself

The short good Bible word for being wrong with God is Sin. The very first step toward being right with God is to see yourself as you are. No one ever went to a doctor all the way until he suspected he was sick. No one ever went to school of his own accord and thought he knew everything. And no one will come to God who thinks he is as good as he needs to be. When life goes hard on us, when everything about our life seems twisted and rotten, we make all sorts of excuses for ourselves, we lay the blame on our parents or our friends or the social and economic system in which we live. But all these have a share in causing our troubles, but we have to look at ourselves in the mirror of truth.

This comes first: recognizing our own wrongness, not just weakness but wrongness. When we reach the point where we can say with the Psalmist, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me," then we are on the right road.

"Hide Thy Face"

There are two things we never hear about in the Bible. One is that God never forgave anyone who did not repent, and the other is that he refused to forgive any one who did repent. But repentance is not merely regretting that a wrong was done; still less regretting being caught. Repentance, the kind the Bible describes (as in these Psalms for example), means a complete change of attitude, it means coming over on God's side and seeing things the way he sees it, seeing life the way he sees it.

God's forgiveness is not of the grudging, remembering, reminding kind. But condoning and forgiving are still a world apart. Condoning means saying in effect, It is all right, it makes no difference, you can go on sinning for all I care.

Some human "forgiveness" may be like that, but not God's. His forgiveness is based on real repentance, and the aim of it is to save the sinner from his sin.

Plenteous in Mercy

The Psalmists saw clearly what kind of God we have. He is not like the holder of a mortgage waiting till the first time some payment is deferred gives him a chance to

polimen, power dispatchers, and substation operators will be directed by two-way radio. According to an announcement by W. O. Wallace, district manager, the West Texas Utilities Company has received authority from the Federal Communications Commission covering the operation of a two-way, high frequency, FM radio system. The FCC license was issued on the basis of "public welfare." The new system will materially help the WTU Co. in its efforts to maintain and provide uninterrupted electric service," said Mr. Wallace.

The system is authorized a 250-watt central station, which is located in the Northwest section of Ballinger near the Abilene highway. The antenna extends 8 feet above a 135-foot antenna tower; total height being 193 feet.

This central station, which has been assigned call letters KKA467 and which according to FCC regulations will operate on assigned frequency of 37,700 kc with a maximum variance of .01% from assigned frequency allowed, cannot be heard on standard radio receivers. Only receivers designed to use this frequency will be able to pick up signals from this station.

A dispatcher located in the WTU CO.'s district distribution office at Ballinger district office operates the central station by remote control. The dispatcher maintains two-way communications with the operators of mobile units which are being installed in service and line trucks.
