## Governor Allan Shivers States Policies In Broadcast Over The State August 3

(Editors Note: Because the people of Texas are not too well acquainted with their new Governor, we are herewith printing the address he delivered to the state at his inauguration on August 3, 1949. While this is his first pronouncement as Governor, it is in the main, a restatement of this announced policy as Lt. Governor. The statement is copied from "The State Observer," a newspaper published at Austin, Texas.)

Ladies and gentlemen of Texas: It is a privilege to speak to you briefly tonight, and I am grateful to the station of the Texas Quality Network for that privilege.

My purpose is to report to you on the condition of the state government and to outline some of the decisions and issues before us. At the same time, you have a right to know how the Governor of Texas feels on these issues, and how he stands on some of the broader principles of government.

As you know I have now occupied the office of Governor for a little over three weeks, coming into to this office under unexpected and tragic circumstances upon the death of a great friend of yours and mine, Beauford H. Jester.

Although my tenure has been short and this is my first occasion as Governor for a public statement of policy, it is not the first time I have expressed myself to you on this subject. In 1947, I said:

In my inaugural remarks of 1947, and again in 1949, upon being inaugurated as Lieutenant Governor, I mentioned some of the things I want to express again at this time.

The preservation of local self-government unimpaired is a challenging constitutional duty. The energetic exercise of its powers by a revitalized state government is Destiny's call to us today. Lassitude and vacillation now would mean surrender to further federal encroachment on the diminishing area of state authority.

Two years later, in January of this year, I said:

"... A good government and a democratic government is a humane government. Certainly we must continue and even better the pattern in the great field of human relations."

Most assuredly this field includes public welfare—sufficient aid to our splendid elderly men and women, to the needy, blind and State eleemosynary institutions, the unfortunate ones in the And further: "... A humane government is one that affords its youngsters the opportunity of a free and complete education. A government whose populace is sufficiently educated need not fear the invitation of communism."

At the same time I went on record: for an expanded farm to market road program; a reformed prison system; for definite water and soil conservation programs; for improved public health services, and for the continuation and extension of our Good Neighbor Policy with Mexico. Later I had the opportunity to participate in the fulfillment, or at least the advancement of these projects in company with Governor Jester and the 51st Legislature.

Also in January 1949 I suggested seven definite steps to establish more business like methods in the conduct of state business, including: an annual budget; annual sessions of the Legislature; a restatement of the division of responsibility among the legislative, executive and judicial branches and among the federal, state and local governments; and candid recognition of the fact that a state, like a private business enterprise, must keep its desire to spend money in line with its ability and willingness to raise money.

On another recent occasion I said:

"As free men, we must make government our servant... For our own welfare and the welfare of our nation, we must not be wards of the government. If the time were ever to come when the great mass of population depended on the government for support, that would be the eve of dictatorship..."

I restate these ideas and proposals now to emphasize that they are fundamental to my conception of government. I believe in them six months ago and 2 years ago and I believe in them when I cast my first vote 20 years ago and I believe in them tonight.

Speaking more specifically of matter before us, I feel that there is none more important than the eleemosynary building and support problem that the 51st Legislature was not able to solve as its recently concluded regular session. It is a problem that the 51st must solve, and one that, I know it is determined to solve.

At the same time, there is need for additional facilities at the M. D. Anderson Cancer Hospital, at the new medical branch of the University of Texas, at the University of Texas dental school and at the Texas State University for Negroes.

This is how the 51st Legislature will be given another opportunity to make the proper provision for our State hospitals and other needy institutions:

(1) You will vote November 8 on a proposed constitutional amendment calling for an annual session of the Legislature. If you approve this change from the outmoded biennial arrangement—and I hope you will—then, by terms of that amendment, the 51st Legislature will be in session next January and in position to attack immediately this problem I have outlined.

(2) But if you do not approve the annual session amendment, then I shall be forced to call the Legislature into special session next January.

In my call for such a special session I will call attention to the closely related subjects of (1) eleemosynary and educational buildings and (2) eleemosynary operations.

It necessarily follows that I would have to submit, as a third subject, new taxes to provide funds for the first two.

It is my belief, based on my legislative experience, that such a call would automatically open up the full fields of appropriations and taxation and allow the Legislature to make whatever adjustments it deemed desirable and necessary, not only in the eleemosynary program but in all the other divisions of our government expenditures.

I am thankful that the Legislature in January will have the benefit of at least a preliminary report and plan from the new Board for State Hospitals and

## Patrolmen Capture Margaret Mitchell Drunk Driver After High Speed Chase

A 64-year-old Bangs area man was fined \$123.20 at Coleman yesterday and his driver's license was suspended for six months for drunk driving.

State Highway Patrolmen Aubrey Crockett and W. D. Lawler, Jr., of Brownwood said they chased the car driven by the man from the Brown county line to Santa Anna, and from there to near Rockwood, at speeds as high as 65 to 75 miles per hour and that several efforts were made to "catch" the patrol car, which was flashing its red light and holding its siren wide open.

The officer fired several shots in an effort to puncture a tire of the pursued vehicle.

"It was the worst case I have had in eight years in the High-Patrol," Crockett said.

The man, finally overtaken and arrested, was alone in the car. He had no liquor or no other contraband, and the officers couldn't understand why he took such chances. It was a "first-offense" case for him, the officers added.

Atlanta, Aug. 16.—(UP)—Margaret Mitchell, a shy Georgia woman whose Civil War history lessons at her father's knee inspired her to write "Gone With The Wind," died today.

Death came five days after she was struck down by a drinking taxicab driver's private car on Peachtree Street, in the heartland of the most vivid action of her fabulous novel about the South's "lost cause."

She died at 11 a. m., CST. Miss Mitchell, 46, and her husband, advertising executive John Marsh, were crossing the street en route to a movie the night of August 11, when she was injured.

## S. S. Manager To Be In Coleman Tuesday

Mr. Ralph T. Fisher, Manager of the Abilene Office of the Social Security Administration, will be in Coleman at the Department of Public Welfare at 1:00 p. m. on Tuesday, August 23. Any persons wishing assistance with retirement or death claims under the Social Security Act are invited to call to see Mr. Fisher at that time.

In a statement made today, Mr. Fisher urged all workers to check at intervals on their social security accounts. If this is done, each worker will be sure that he receives credit for all wages he earns. The Social Security Administration takes every precaution to insure the accuracy of the records, but faulty reporting by employers still gives some trouble. Most errors in reports are due to mistakes in the worker's name or account number, or the failure to show any number.

There is no charge for furnishing a statement of wages credited to the worker's social security account. Social Security offices stock a self-addressed postal card which can be used in making the request. Any person who wishes one of these postal cards should request it from the Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas.

Admited increasing signs of weariness and restlessness, the House devoted most of last week to debating and passing a new wage and hour bill. The one finally written was the result of a coalition of Republicans and Southern Democrats. It was probably about as good a product that could be obtained under the circumstances.

The new version lifts the present minimum from 40 cents per hour to 75 cents, but clarifies and limits the coverage. The latter change is particularly desirable because of the chaotic conditions resulting from the various interpretations of the present law which has placed many people under the Act who are in no wise engaged in interstate commerce.

The Federal Government has no constitutional authority to regulate wages and hours in interstate commerce.

dependent contracts for factories which make goods shipped in interstate commerce have been held to come under the Act. So have elevator operators in office buildings who serve passengers who engage in interstate commerce business.

Not long ago, workers on a local irrigation canal were held to be covered because the water applied to sugar cane, which in turn was refined and shipped in interstate commerce. Another example is the holding that employees of a purely local fertilizer concern are covered because the fertilizer is put on soil that raises produce which is ultimately shipped in interstate commerce.

Agriculture workers are exempted, and the House bill will go a long way - if finally enacted - toward clarifying the law and limiting coverage to businesses and services that are actually engaged in or very closely connected with interstate commerce.

The Senate Agriculture Committee approved a provision which will include mohair in the farm program, beginning next year. The House has already included mohair in its version of the new farm bill. Until a final bill is passed and the Secretary of Agriculture begins a program there will be no way of knowing at what price mohair will be supported. It could be anywhere between 40 and 60 cents, average.

### Texas State Dept. Of Health Letter

Austin, Texas.—The month of September brings a return of school days, and thousands of Texas boys and girls will be returning to the school rooms for the next nine months. Every one of these children according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer should be as free as possible from all physical defects that can be corrected, and protected against other diseases which frequently spread through classrooms.

A complete medical and dental pre-school check-up is of the utmost importance in getting the child ready for school. Eyes, ears, nose, throat, and teeth should be carefully examined, and all remediable defects corrected or placed under treatment such defects can lead to serious impairment of growth and progress academically, socially and emotionally.

Defects of hearing and vision handicap a child in his class work, and often result in the impression that he is backward and unable to learn. Such defects can often be corrected, and the child is not only more progressive in his school work, but is a happier, better balanced individual as a result of being more socially acceptable. Dental defects should be corrected not only for cosmetic reasons, but because good teeth enable a child to chew his food properly and thus promote good digestion and bodily nourishment.

"In addition to correcting such defects as already exist, young children should be protected by immunization against disease when possible," Dr. Cox said. "Immunization is safe and dependable, and every child is entitled to this protection against disease."

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Singing, Shining

Lesson for August 21, 1949

EVERY ATOM of the universe, said Calvin, is filled with the glory of God. That is our thought for this week in the created universe we inhabit.

Mystery

THESE inspired scientists saw a high order science for man's use in part but also a value, a beauty and a splendor all its own, and it is one of the ways by which we see that God is true of nature's law and order.

Even today, with all that science has discovered, there is mystery in the most elemental facts of existence. What is light? What is life? What is energy? Where did it come from and what is the destiny of it all?

A common man who performs miracles of the spirit has not yet initiated the mystery of nature suggests the deeper mystery of nature's God.

Power

WE ARE beginning now to realize, even better than the Psalmists could, how much energy there is in nature. We have seen tragic evidence of the atom's power. Now we have also found that while energy cannot be destroyed, it cannot be created by us, though it constantly changes form.

As the water in a power station which has run through a turbine will not climb back up to turn the turbine again, so the whole universe (they tell us) is in the process of running down.

But how was the universe born, how was energy born, in the first place? How was the universe, so to speak, "set up"? Science does not profess to know, but religious answers by faith: In the beginning, God.

Beauty

THE writer of Psalm 104 was well aware that some parts of nature are useless to man; but he rejoiced in them none the less. Few of his neighbors had any use for whales, for example, but he takes delight in the whale (he calls him Leviathan) just playing in the ocean. St. Augustine, in the same mood, says somewhere about things like wasps and spiders that if we could forget that they bite, we would be greatly awed by their beauty and the perfection of their mechanism. Indeed, St. Augustine, in one of his prayers, calls God "Pulchritudo," Beauty. Just as God is The Truth and The Good, so he is The Beautiful.

Law

THE writers of these nature-Psalms (especially 19 and 65) were impressed by another fact about nature: its regularity. You can count on the sunrise, you always know which order the seasons will follow. Even things like earthquakes and tornadoes, which seem pretty unpredictable, follow laws of their own. Science has now shown this to be true on a cosmic scale. The stuff of which the farthest stars are made is just the same (only a lot hotter!) as the stuff in the rocks under your feet at this minute.

The laws that govern the fall of a leaf or the shape of a raindrop are the same laws that can be seen in the whirling of star-dust fifty million light years away.

The Creator of all is not erratic, eccentric or capricious. He is the

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ate people who are in our eleemosynary institutions. I do recommend that we provide the means for proper training of additional doctors and dentists whose services are sorely needed by the people of Texas. I do recommend that we make this type of education possible for the young men and women of Texas who have not had an opportunity to receive it with our present facilities.

By nature and by training, I am conservative in the spending of money. I want to see the State's money spent to its best advantage to the people of this State. I would not spend my own personal money. But I recognize the great and long existing need for these things. I want to see a thorough study made of needs and costs, and I want to see the necessary taxes levied to pay for those things we must have.

Referring again to my inaugural statement of 1949, I said that we must approach expenditures and consequent taxation with the understanding that the foundation of business should not be undermined by superlatives. That is an excess of spending and taxation beyond our sound economic capacity.

In recognition of changing business conditions, with the possibility before us of an economic recession, it is imperative that the taxation plan arising out of the eleemosynary emergency must not be allowed to expand and convert itself into a more liberal permanent policy.

Our spending policies are already liberal enough some will say too liberal. This is certainly not the time for further liberalization or for any additional expenditures except in those fields where the necessity is inescapable.

During my years of service in the Texas Legislature, when more money was needed, the tendency was always to increase existing levies on natural resources. I was a member of a special

committee that in 1941 wrote the tax bill under which Texas now receives most of its tax revenues.

As of tonight I can tell you these things about taxes in this State: First we are going to need some additional revenue, which means additional taxes.

Second, while the natural resources are already producing a considerable portion of our revenue, they can stand some additional tax burden.

But the time is rapidly approaching when these sources will have been fully exploited. Then, if the present rate of state spending continues and the demands for new state spending continues and the demands for new state services keep mounting, their additional sources of revenue must be found.

I will enlarge upon that observation with a final quotation from my inaugural address of 1947:

May we also be blessed with the wisdom and courage to admit the money cost of responsive government. Let us admit—we cannot deny—that a love for appropriations at springtime requires us honestly to approach taxation in wintertime with equal fervor and ardor. If we can be just and equitable in our taxation...

I say then, that the 51st Legislature must raise no more than is immediately needed to discharge its remaining obligations to our eleemosynary and educational institutions.

The 51st will have been long remembered as the Legislature that authorized a sweeping primary reform program... made almost revolutionary revisions for the improvement of the public school system... set up a continuing \$30,000,000 supplement to the rural road program... pioneered in the field of juvenile delinquency control with its Youth Development Council... proved that Texas can handle its own "civil rights" program by passing an anti-lynching law and submitting to you the question of

poll tax repeal... set up a separate board for state hospitals and special schools, for purpose of obtaining closer and more efficient supervision of our eleemosynary institutions... activated the Veterans' Land Board... passed a number of water and soil conservation measures... approved board expansion of the State Parks system, which is operated for the direct recreational benefit of Texas citizens and visitors... and provided more liberally than ever before higher education, including medical training.

These and other achievements will stand as memorials to a hard-working and conscientious Legislature. It is my ambition and my intention, during the months ahead, to go forward with this 51st Legislature and the people of Texas to the ultimate solution of our remaining problems and the fulfillment of our continuing responsibilities.

I am a young man, interested in my State. I want the good will and the assistance of all who are listening to me now, to help me make a good governor. You don't like to pay taxes—neither do I. But I recognize that government must be responsive to the needs of the people it serves. To have these things that will make Texas a greater State, I am willing to pay my share, as long as it is efficiently and wisely spent.

I believe you will join me in this thought, and to that end I ask your prayers, your counsel and support.

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Coleman Welcomes First Trans-Texas Air Flight Tuesday; Regular Service

Coleman, Aug. 16.—The Air Age came to Coleman today and was hailed by a crowd of 2,000 who turned out to meet two Trans-Texas Airways flights which arrived almost simultaneously shortly before 11 a. m., each plane loaded to its capacity with passengers and bringing the first airmail to this Coleman county city.

Mayor R. E. Murphey, in ceremonies at the airport following arrival of the two flights, proclaimed the inauguration of air service to Coleman as an event comparable in importance to the arrival of Santa Fe rail service in a past decade.

R. Earl McKaughan, president, and James V. Allred, general counsel, from Houston, headed the delegation of Trans-Texas officials and personnel blazing the air trail to the improved Coleman Municipal Airport.

Their flight No. 21 through Brownwood touched ground first, bringing the initial airmail to this city. Thousands of letters with a special cachet commemorative of the inauguration of air service to Coleman were on the initial flights.

Flight 22, from the west, came down almost at the same time. It, too, carried a capacity passenger load. Both planes were also loaded to capacity when they departed after the initial flights to Coleman.

Light P-51 fighter planes of the Texas Air National Guard saluted Coleman, flying from San Marcos; a giant B-36 came over at a high altitude to thrill the air inaugural crowd and flights from Goodfellow Field, San Angelo, were additional aerial features of the occasion.

Coleman has extended the paved runways of its airport, installed a beacon, lights and other equipment meeting CAA specifications for air line service. Floyd Shelton of Coleman served as master of ceremonies for the Coleman part of the airport ceremonies; Stanton B. Danilow, Houston, traffic manager for Trans-Texas, introduced Trans-Texas airways personnel and officials.

Following the greetings at the airport, the visitors were honored at a luncheon by the Coleman Kiwanis Club. Mayor Murphey was presented with a variety of gifts ranging from a pair of cowboy boots from Fort Worth to flowers and a Dallas honorary citizenship.

The Coleman Democrat-Voice published a special edition to mark the occasion, with features and pictures and a Page One banner line, "Air Age Comes to Coleman."

Mrs. Zella Knox, of Coleman, had the honor of being the first passenger of the air lines to land at the airport. The Lone Star Turkey Farm had the honor of making the first air freight shipment. The first incoming cargo was flowers for Mrs. F. Z. Payne, wife of the mayor of Santa Anna, from Zapatene Florists of Fort Worth. Ted McCaughan, as a representative of the Santa Anna National Bank, was one of the first passengers going from Coleman to San Angelo. Santa Anna was also represented by Mr. Jack Woodward, postmaster.
