

Wallace. project is about 70% complete. Of the 100 firms that have been selected for the survey analysis, personal interviews have been conducted by staff members of 70 of them, with elaborate reports on each, together with samples and personality of new users of mohair to meet demands for desired fabrics.

By and large, the Committee was well pleased with the progress that is being made thus far. As the undertaking continues. we feel confident that much good can be accomplished in the way of finding out exactly what users are now being made and what new uses may be feasible in the future. The agreement includes labrotory tests for strength, durubility, ect., the appraisal of appearance and other characteristics of the experimental yarn and fabrics that will be included. Then there will be an evaluation of special problems likely to be encountered in the actual processing under commercial conditions of these yarns and fabrics The good to be accomplished remuins to be seen, but in any event, we are confident the subject will be throughly explored and the future outlook clarified. Additional progress reports will be made from time to time. The plea is to complete the project about a year from now.
