## Fall Fun Festival To Start Saturday, September 10th

### Santa Anna School To Open Monday Pre-registration On Friday & Saturday

Pre-registration for all the high school students will be held at the high school building on Friday and Saturday, September 2 and 3. Hours of registration will be from 9 o'clock to 12 noon and from 1 o'clock to 4 p. m. All students in the 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th grades are to register one of these days. There will be no certain periods of registration for each class.

Registration for the ward school will all be held on Monday September 5. Regular classes will begin on Tuesday, September 6 for both the ward school and the high school. The lunch room will also begin operation on Tuesday.

The lunch room will operate with the same prices that they operated on last year. They will charge 25 cents per meal, with milk being served with the meal. The lunch room is in charge of one of the new teachers this year, Mr. Bill Adams.

A general assembly will be held Monday morning at 9:00 a. m. in the high school auditorium. All student and parents of both schools will attend this general assembly. Here all the teachers will be introduced, announcements made, and students will be assigned to class rooms. After the assembly is over, the ward school students will go to the ward school where books will be issued and class announcements will be made. High school students will go to their home rooms from the general assembly.

A number of improvements have been completed on both the ward school and high school during the summer months. The ward school has been almost completely remodeled. They now have 12 complete modern class rooms and an auditorium. This will take care of all the ward school students. There has also been gravel walks put around the buildings and a new electric time clock has been installed. The school board has also authorized the purchase of new football equipment for the 7th and 8th grades. This will enable the ward school to have a football team and also will give them an opportunity to have some football knowledge when they get to high school.

At the high school new venetian blinds have been added to the Homemaking Department. New window shades have also been added to the auditorium and new chairs and tables have been added to the typing department, making this a very modern department.

### Luther McCreary Brings First Bale Of Cotton To S. A.

Luther McCreary, prominent young Santa Anna farmer, who resides on Route One, brought the first bale of cotton for the 1949 season to Santa Anna last week-end. The bale, 15 1/2 middling, weighed 574 pounds and was gathered from approximately 8 acres.

The bale was ginned by the Santa Anna Co-op Gin and was sold to the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce at 31 cents per pound at auction on Tuesday afternoon. Fifty-two Santa Anna merchants made up a premium of \$207.90 for Mr. McCreary. The premium money and the bale of cotton brought a total of \$284.94. The cotton was raised on the old Mobley farm, north of town. Mr. McCreary states that he has about 50 acres in cotton and is nothing happens to his crop he expects to average about one-half bale of cotton to the acre.

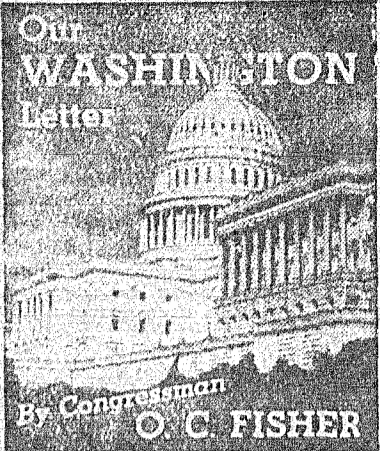

While the Senate is still struggling with a lot of legislation already acted on by the

House, the latter declared an informal recess last week to last until September 21st. It is a move to let the Senators catch up on pending bills. The jam in the Senate began early in the year when a whole month was consumed in the abortive attempt that was made to change the Senate's rules so the civil rights bill could be passed without a filibuster. And that alone filled a month.

Before recessing last week the House passed another Housing bill, only a far different one from the federalized housing measure previously passed in the session by both the House and Senate to which I was opposed. The new measure extends the federal mortgage guarantee program by which individuals may obtain loans with a guarantee by the Government that the loan will be paid. Actually this program pays its own way through the fees collected from borrowers which build up a fund from which losses are paid. This arrangement has been in effect several years and has worked very well, and at practically no cost to Uncle Sam. It encourages home ownership.

Of interest to our mohair producers is the present contract between the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers' Association, the Department of Agriculture and Ralph E. Burgess Services, Inc., of New York, whereby a very comprehensive research is being made

of present and potential users of mohair. The Government put up \$20,000 and the growers added \$10,000 to pay for the project. The work is now progressing.

There are four general phases of the undertaking, as follows: 1. A survey of present fiber products related to mohair. 2. Design, development, and production of experimental quantities of new yarns, fabrics and products made from mohair. 3. Obtaining trade and consumer reaction to experimental products, yarns and fabrics. 4. An economic analysis of market potentialities for mohair.

Last week the Advisory Committee of seven met with Mr. Burgess in Washington and received a progress report on what has been accomplished thus far. I attended the meeting and represented the growers. It was revealed that the first phase of the project is about 70% complete. Of the 100 firms that have been selected for the survey analysis, personal interviews have been conducted by staff members of 70 of them, with elaborate reports on each, together with samples and personality of new users of mohair to meet demands for desired fabrics.

By and large, the Committee was well pleased with the progress that is being made thus far. As the undertaking continues, we feel confident that much good can be accomplished in the way of finding out exactly what users are now being made and what new uses may be feasible in the future. The agreement includes laboratory tests for strength, durability, etc., the appraisal of appearance and other characteristics of the experimental yarn and fabrics that will be included. Then there will be an evaluation of special problems likely to be encountered in the actual processing under commercial conditions of these yarns and fabrics. The good to be accomplished remains to be seen, but in any event, we are confident the subject will be thoroughly explored and the future outlook clarified. Additional progress reports will be made from time to time. The plan is to complete the project about a year from now.

During the brief recess I plan to return to the district where I will remain for two or three

weeks. The limited time will not permit me to visit over the district. This I hope to do after the session adjourns following the recess. I plan to spend most of the time during the recess in Kimble County, during which time there will be a few goats shorn and a few other things done on the place I have near Junction. And it's a good place for a little rest. During this time, however, my office in Washington will remain open and prompt attention will be given to all the mail that comes to me during my absence.

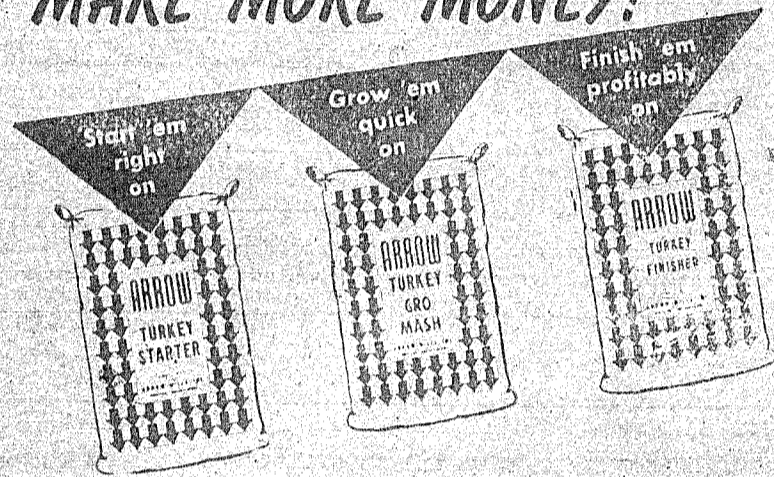

As this bit of news goes to press our Vacation School is still in progress, so a more detailed account of it will be given later.

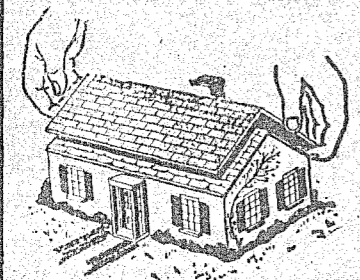

Man's Inhumanity In Texas Consistent

Austin, August 26. — Man's inhumanity toward man is pretty consistent in Texas according to the Texas Crime Report released today by Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety. The report which covers the State's crime picture for the first six months of the year shows, however, that man's regard for his neighbor's property is on the wane.

According to the report which is compiled by the Safety Department's Bureau of Identification and Records, the number of crimes against persons remains about even with that of the same period for 1948. These offenses include murder and homicide, rape and aggravated assault cases, Crimes against property such as burglary, theft and auto theft shows an over-all increase of 13% over last year.

**Texas State Dept. Of Health Letter**

Austin, Texas. — The Texas State Department of Health during the first seven months of this year has record of the examination of 2709 animal heads for rabies and of this number almost one fourth were found positive, said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Rabies is transmitted to man through a bite or having a cut exposed to the saliva of a rabid animal. If a person is bitten, the offending animal should be trapped, if possible, for a period of at least ten days. If the animal is in the infective stage he will die within this time. This does not mean that he may not be in the noninfective or incubative stage and develop rabies later. All dogs bitten by a rabid animal should be confined six months. If it is necessary to kill the animal, this should be done in such a manner that the brain is not destroyed.

When sending a head to the State Laboratory it should be put in a container, sealed and packed in ice to prevent decomposition.

Dr. Cox said that rabies is a hard disease to eradicate, but that it could be done if all owners would have their dogs vaccinated each year and eliminate all stray dogs. If you have a dog, get him vaccinated the same as you have your children immunized against diphtheria and smallpox.

Rabies is commonly supposed to be a disease of warm weather, but it is more prevalent during the spring and fall because the dogs congregate and move about more, therefore the chance of exposure is greater during this time. It is true that more dogs are killed during the summer months, but the percentage of rabies is low.
