## Mountaineers Host To Cross Plains This Week End

The Santa Anna Mountaineers bowed in defeat to the Early High Longhorns last Friday night before one of the largest crowds to turn out to see the games this year. The final score was 19-14 for the Longhorns, with the half-time score being 14-6 for the Mountaineers.

This, no doubt was the hardest fought football game that has been played on the Mountaineer Field in many years. Every play saw two of the most determined teams trying for victory. Both coaches, Otis Walls of Early and Dow McBride said this was the hardest fought game they had ever coached. Not one yard was given by either team.

Early scored in the first quarter after a 52 yard drive that ended with Don Davis driving over from the 8 yard line. Both the Mountaineer tallies came in the second period—the first TD being made by Hartman going over the goal line from the 3 yard line, climaxing a 30 yard drive. Scott kicked the extra point. After the kick-off Early attempted 3 running plays and kicked to the Mountaineers. The Mountaineers took the ball on the Early 35 yard line and on the first play Parish tossed a 22 yard pass to Freshman Charles Scarborough, who went the remaining 13 yards for the second tally. Scott again kicked the extra point. The half ended with Santa Anna leading 14-6.

The Mountaineers kicked to the Longhorns to open the third quarter. After a drive from their 32 yard line the Longhorns scored on a 28 yard pass from Suddeth to Chapman, who completed the pass standing in the end zone.

At the beginning of the 4th period the Mountaineers had the ball on the Longhorn 8 yard line. Two plays later a fumble was recovered by the Longhorns. They moved the ball out to the 20 where the Mountaineers recovered a fumble, only to fumble again on the next play. The Longhorns attempted two passes and Scott intercepted the second. On a pass play the Mountaineers moved to the Longhorn 10 to lose the ball on another fumble. The Longhorns carried the ball over for the last TD in the game in 7 plays, with Davis going over from the 8 yard line. On the kick-off Douglas took the ball on the 5 yard line and returned it to the Longhorn 47. A 15 yard penalty and a pass good for 25 yards put the Mountaineers back in scoring position for the third time in the 4th period. With the ball resting on the 8 yard line, the Mountaineers attempted their 4 downs and the ball went over on the 12 yard line. The game ended two plays later with the final score being Early High 19, the Mountaineers 14.

There were only five penalties in the game with the Mountaineers receiving one for being off-side and one for back-field in motion; the Longhorns received one for being off-side and two 15 yard penalties for unnecessary roughness. The Longhorns made 13 first downs and the Mountaineers made 7.

This week the Mountaineers play host to the Cross Plains Buffalos. At the start of the season the Buffalos were counted as being one of the top contenders for district crown, but in two conference tries they have been defeated one times. This will be the third conference game for both teams with both teams having the same record of one loss and one win.

The season record of the two teams are as follows: The Mountaineers tied Brownwood "B" 6-6, loss to Comanche 13-0, won over May 23-0, lost to Lakeview 21-7 and lost to Early 19-14. Cross Plains won over Aspermount 31-0, won over DeLeon 33-0, lost to Early 27-0 and won over Gorman 6-0. According to the record the Mountaineers should win this game by a nice margin.

## R. B. Archer Buried Sunday

The week of October 15 to 22 has been set aside by the mayor of the City of Santa Anna as National Guard Recruiting week. This has been done in cooperation with a National effort to enlist 400,000 new men in the National Guard. There is openings for about 50 men in the local National Guard unit, however only 15 men are urgently needed at the present time.

In World War II there was 40 men from the Santa Anna National Guard unit who went into active service and went on to serve in some of the major campaigns throughout the European Theater. Of the 40 men who left Santa Anna 33 of that number returned home. Only two were killed in action. The 36th Division went through some of the hardest fighting of any Division and casualties were high among untrained men. The record speaks for itself, in that a trained man has a much better chance for survival in a world conflict than an untrained man.

Training in the Heavy Tank Co., 142nd Infantry is thorough and complete. The boys receive two hours training each week, and then they have numerous other training manuals at their command, where they may learn almost anything they want to. There is also a large number of specialist schools all over the United States where members of the National Guard are sent for special training. At a number of these schools a member of the National Guard may continue his education in his chosen field of work, and at the same time receive regular pay for his studies.

"Get in the Guard" is a slogan that you will hear for the next week. During this time the local National Guard Co. is sponsoring a contest among its members to see who can enlist the most men in the Guard. The man who enlists the largest number will be presented with a new 16 gauge pump shotgun. Possibly other prizes will also be given.

If you are between the ages of 17 and 35 and in good health and are interested in joining the Texas National Guard you are requested to see Capt. Jesse K. Barton or M/Sgt. Virgil (Hippo) Fulton at the National Guard Armory in Santa Anna any time during the day, or you are invited to attend any of their training drills, which are held each Wednesday night from 8:00 to 10:00 p. m.

Recent pay raises for members of the armed services, make the pay of the National Guard interesting to persons within the age limits. A member of the National Guard receives a full days pay for the two hour drill each week. At the present rate of pay, an enlisted man in the Guard receives a basic pay of from \$2.66 to \$5.63 per drill night. National Guard members are paid each three months, and even at the recruit rate of pay, a member would have a nice sum of money coming on pay day.

God and Nations

Lesson for October 14, 1949

WHEN the Spanish fleet was about to invade England, back in Queen Elizabeth's time, nothing the English had could stop them. But when the Armada arrived, that vast fleet had been blown to bits by a storm, and the English had mopped up what was left. How do you account for that? The English always said God was with them. When the Nazis had overthrown France in 1940, it would have been simple for them to invade England. There was next to nothing to stop them. But Hitler delayed from summer till fall... and by that time the British were able to mount an invincible defence. How do you account for that? Over and over again in history the unexpected, the unexpected, the "maraculous" has happened. Some call it chance; but others call it God.

God In History

BUT GOD does not always or usually operate in spectacular ways. God works in history as he works in nature, out of sight, visible to the eye of faith but seldom if ever otherwise. History, from the Christian point of view, is the working-out of the purposes of God.

The pattern is not entirely clear to us, because we cannot see enough of it at once. But looking back through history, we can see signs that God has been there. This is the message of the prophets of Israel, especially of the great Isaiah.

In a troubled era, when everything seemed to be in most complete confusion, Isaiah gave out some clear and plain truths from God, and helped men then and now read the pattern of God's design.

The Life Of A Nation

ONE TRUTH is that justice is a nation's life and sin is a nation's death. God being the God of justice, his purpose is to set justice in the earth. God plays no favorites among nations. Any nation that lives by God's laws, lives; the nation that defies God has signed its own death warrant. There are no peoples who can "get by" with what they please, if what they please is not the will of God. There are people now who do not believe that. They would say, Look at Russia! In Isaiah's time there were those who would say to Isaiah: You must be wrong—look at Assyria! There is a nation that does not know God, and yet grows every year stronger and stronger.

God's Ax

ISAIAH has a startling answer to that objection. (Chap. 10.) Assyria is a tool in God's hand, no more. He admits that Assyria has no standard but force, she worships only sheer Power. But there are other nations, wicked ones, which God intends to punish; one of these is the nation of Israel!

Assyria was destined to destroy Israel once and for all, and to damage Judah so severely she never would recover. All this, Isaiah says, is in God's plan.

God does not punish an evil nation with legions of angels; he punishes it with invasions and defeats in war. Assyria was an ax in the hand of God, cutting down the rotting trees of selfish and unjust nations.

Return To God!

PEOPLE in Isaiah's time were putting their trust, just as we do nowadays, in alliances, pacts, international combinations of all kinds. Isaiah warns ominously that this will not do, by itself. Not that all alliances are bad; in chapter 19 he actually pictures Assyria, Egypt and Israel as brothers-in-arms.

But he does not hold out any political scheme or combination as the best hope of a nation. Return to God! is the prophet's call. So in our time, whether it be a general Mac-
