

"Don't take less than the sup port price for your cottonseed!" This is the advice of the Cole man County Production Adminstration Committee, reminding cotton growers that they can obtain a price-supporting loan of \$49.50 per ton on seed with a moisture content of 11 percent or storage available.

"Although lack of storage space and the possibility of excessive moisture content may appear as as stumbling blocks to some farmers who would like to take advantage of the loan, we believe that both problems can be overcome in most cases," says Ozro Eubank, committee chairman.

Isaiah charged the form of his message to suit the changing times, but the core of it was still the same. To King Ahez he had said. 'Don't be afraid of hostile alliances; trust in God. To King Hezekiah and others he said, in effect, Don't put all your hope in alliances; trust in God, Egypt will fail you, any alliance you form will melt away in

But God will not melt away. You can depend on him. Now in our time the situation is strikingly like what it was in Isaiah's day. People today are tempted to put their trust in what is big and imposing. Big nations, big armaments, big armies, big alliances.

Men once put their trust in the League of Nations, and it died (of cowardice and dishonesty, among other things). Millions put their trust in the Axis, and for awhile it looked as if the Axis powers would overspread the earth. But the Axis vanished under the blows of the Allies.

### Are All Alliances Bad?

HIS does not mean that no alliance is good, or that no treaty can be relied on, or that the United Nations (for instance) is bound to collapse. What Issiah is driving at is this: God has a Purpose to work out in this world, and the name of if it is selfish and unjust and it is Justice, Righteousness, Peace, Love.

Any nation or combination of nations, any pact or agreement or program, that goes against God's purpose is going against
