Mountaineers Win Over Cross Plains Buffalos 19-18; Rest This Week

The Santa Anna Mountaineers will take a much needed rest this week, before engaging the Rising Star Wildcats on the night of October 23, at Rising Star. In the last six weeks the boys have engaged 6 teams, with 2 wins, 1 tie, and three losses. Rising Star is considered one of the top teams of the district.

Last Friday night the Mountaineers edged over the Cross Plains Buffalos by a score of 19-18, and the extra point being kicked by Billy Joe Scott being the only difference in the score.

The first score of the game came on a pass from Billy Joe Parish to Scott, which netted 78 yards for the Mountaineers. Later in the second quarter Cross Plains intercepted a Mountaineer pass on the Mountaineer 45, and two plays later Junior Grider plunged over from the 6 yard line for the first Buffalo tally. Shortly before the half ended Harold Strahan, Buffalo left halfback intercepted another Mountaineer pass and carried the ball 53 yards for the second Buffalo tally.

Mid-way in the third period Craig Douglas broke loose from the Cross Plains 20 and went over for the second Mountaineer tally. This time Scott was good for the extra point.

Early in the fourth period Hartman went over for the Mountaineers from the 1 yard line to put the Mountaineers out front 19-12. Shortly before the game ended the Buffalos crossed the double strip for the third time and failed on the extra point try making the game end 19-18 for the Mountaineers.

The Mountaineers were outweighed on the line by several per man. But never-the-less made continued gains through the Cross Plains line and good gains were made on airmals. Fumbles and pass interceptions were numerous for both sides.

Billy Joe Parish was the outstanding player of evening, with Hartman, Scott and Douglas being outstanding on the offense and the entire line was good on defense.

Information From Veterans Land Board, Giles

Austin, Bascom, Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Chairman of the newly created Veterans Land Board, said today that it was doubtful if any land purchases for Texas veterans would be completed before December 1.

"The first bonds will be offered for sale on October 26," stated the Commissioner, "and there is no reason to anticipate that money will be available for our actual use for at least another thirty days."

"The thousands of inquiries we have received," Giles continued, "and other necessary delays are making us later than we had anticipated. We ask veterans and land owners to bear with us until we have secured the money to complete transactions."

Giles also requests veterans considering making applications to "take cognizance of our regulations, and policies relative to mineral rights."

The statute creating the Veterans Land program prohibited purchases unless 50 percent of the mineral rights were conveyed with the land. The Board, which is composed of the Governor, the Attorney General and Commissioner Giles, ruled at its first meeting that a six-month priority would be given applications which included all mineral or not more than one-sixteenth outstanding royalty reservation made before June 6, 1949.

"We are not approving transactions in which the present owner is seeking to retain mineral interest at the present time," Giles added. "Applications which do not conform to this policy are delaying the program by requiring the attention which could be used toward completion of conforming applications."

It has been announced by Emzy Brown, president of the county organization.

Radios will be in readiness to bring workers the network address of J. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, which will be heard over the Texas Long Star Chain Station WEAP, Ft. Worth, KTXL San Angelo, will carry the program from 8:30 to 9:00 p. m. President Hammond will speak to some 10,000 workers assembled in approximately 200 Texas counties who will participate in the state-wide drive for members during Farm Bureau Organization Week. Coleman county's goal is 1200 members. The state goal is 70,000 members.

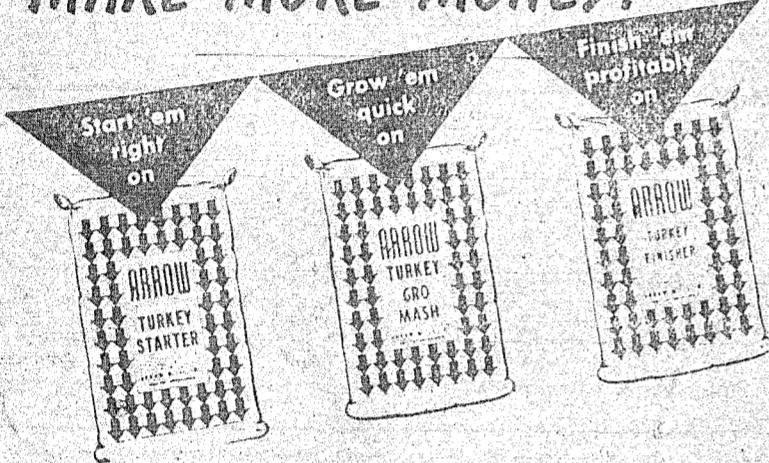

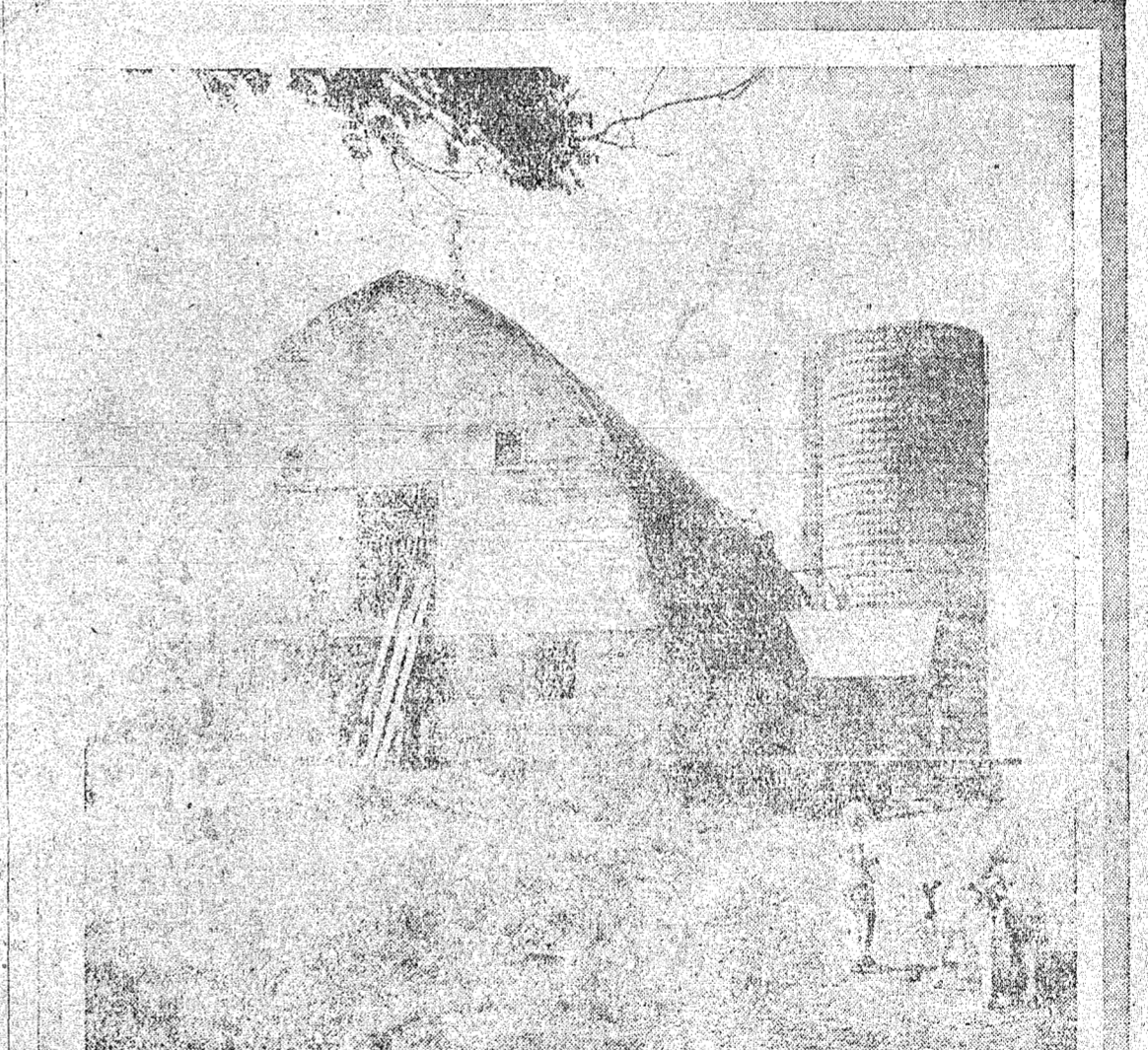

Ralph T. Fisher, Manager of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Department of Public Welfare in Coleman on Tuesday, October 25, 1949, at 1:00 p. m.

This is a regular service for local residents to give them an opportunity to file claims for social security benefits, obtain original or duplicate social security cards, or discuss any questions they might have in connection with the Federal old-age and survivors insurance plan.

off the market when market prices are below the support rate. there is a good possibility that the storage bins will "pay for themselves."

"Building materials and prefabricated bins are plentiful, and the Commodity Credit Corporation will lend farmers up to 85 percent of the actual cost of construction at 4 percent interest," says the committee.

CCC storage facility loans are negotiated through the county PMA office in Coleman, and are repayable over a period of five years.

The other problem—that of excessive moisture content—can largely be solved by the farmer himself, according to the chairman.

"If the growers will make every effort to gin only dry seed cotton and take proper care of their seed after ginning, the average moisture content can be considerably lowered," Mr. Eubank says. "It is quite possible that available statistics on moisture content have been somewhat distorted by the practice of mixing areas and wet seed dry seed and then drawing samples from carload lots of the mixture."

If these seed were separated into small wagon or truck lots, hauled back to the farm and stored in small quantities it would undoubtedly result in a much lower average moisture content than the present method of hauling and handling.

Only a moisture test and visual inspection of the cottonseed are required before a price support loan is made, the chairman explains. Proceeds of the loan are paid through sight draft drawn on CCC by the county committee through a local bank or other lending agency.

PMA Committee Stresses Cotton Seed Loan

"Don't take less than the support price for your cottonseed!" This is the advice of the Coleman County Production Administration Committee, reminding cotton growers that they can obtain a price-supporting loan of \$49.50 per ton on seed with a moisture content of 11 percent or less provided they have adequate storage available.

"Although lack of storage space and the possibility of excessive moisture content may appear as stumbling blocks to some farmers who would like to take advantage of the loan, we believe that both problems can be overcome in most cases," says Ozro Eubank, committee chairman.

The committee believes that if growers will acquire adequate storage so that seed can be held



11 Business Places Broken Into Sunday Night; Three In Santa Anna

Sunday night between 12 o'clock midnight and 5 a. m., eleven places of business were broken into in Santa Anna, Bangs and Brownwood. The Santa Anna Hardware Co., Phillips Drug and the Ladies Shop were the Santa Anna stores the burglars broke into.

J. W. Riley said \$48.83 was taken from the Phillips Drug. Neither of the other two stores could find anything missing. In all three cases here entry was made through the back doors by breaking panels from the doors, or by breaking glass from the doors.

In Bangs the U. S. Post Office was looted of \$20.70 and three registered letters. Other stores in Bangs entered were the Frozen Food Locker, Plegly Wigley, Jenkins Variety Store, Palmer-Young Drug Store, Victory Theater and the Farmers Supply, The Queen Theatre at Brownwood was entered between twelve and one o'clock and the stores here were entered at about 5 a. m.

Apparently four men were in the gang that looted the stores. The Santa Anna night watchmen jumped four men burglarizing the Santa Anna Hardware store, and fired one shot at them. They fled town before they could be captured.

Officers expressed the belief that this is the same ones who recently robbed the Santa Fe Station at Brady and Melvin and a drug store, hardware store and the post office at Paint Rock.

Narcotics, money and clothes seemed to be the main items the burglars were after. Narcotics and the robbing of post offices come under Federal offenses and the FBI men are working on the robberies.

Literature We Like

HOW TO STUDY AND HOW TO READ A BOOK

Knowing how to study and read a book intelligently is very important in our school work. One should read a book with a system. First, when choosing a book for up-to-date information, notice the title. The title is a good clue when looking for specific information. Next, check the copyright date. If the copyright date is reasonably up-to-date that book will probably have the information one is seeking. Be sure and notice if the author is well known and has a reputation as a writer of good books. Next, notice the publisher. He should be well known and he should publish interesting and educational books.

After one has chosen the book one wants, look in the table of contents for the topic needed. The table of contents gives a brief summary and caption headings.

Then go through the book rapidly to get acquainted. Always use charts and diagrams when they are given and note the bibliography. The dark key words

are useful and important. The index and footnotes are very helpful in finding further information.

The preface is a very important part of the book. Usually the author states his opinion and scope of information. The first chapter is used as an introduction and the last chapter as a fitting finish.

To summarize the information. One finds that to read a book intelligently we must read with a system. Reading intelligently presents ideas and attitudes not only enjoyment.

In studying, first, figure out how much time you have and then figure out what you have to do in that allotted time.

In studying your book, there are four steps in reading. They are: 1. Skimming 2. Rapid reading 3. Careful reading and 4. Re-reading.

Next, make a list of things you know and a list of things you do not know about about your subject.

Next, apply the method of reading explained previously, to your book.

In using a library, know all about the library and card catalogue. Other sources of information about one's subject is not described in full in the library, visit people who are informed about one's subject and get first-hand information.

If we all practice the sound principles of how to study, there would never be any failing grades or complaining pupils.

Lesson for October 30, 1949

IT HURTS Isaiah's patriotism, and his religion too, to see how fast his country was going down hill. Most of the troubles Isaiah saw are with us today. Wealthy women spending more and more on themselves; leaders who are irresponsible, self-seeking and incompetent; poverty unprevented and uncared-for; drunkenness high and low. Isaiah, and other prophets as well, saw in the sin and drunkenness of the times the sign and symbol of national decay. To the careless, the selfish and the wild, to those who were "leaders" but were leading in the wrong direction, Isaiah kept saying, in many different ways, Choose the best!

The Prophets' Successors THERE WAS A TIME when the church put most of her preaching emphasis on individual religion: Get right with God! was the cry. The church of today has not by any means given up her emphasis on personal religion, but we are learning from the prophets what social righteousness means. The church in our time is the logical and actual successor to the prophet's work.

The church is doing more than ever to awaken the conscience of society, in fact the church itself has a duty to be the conscience of society. One of the problems about which our nation needs to be waked up is one that Isaiah and Jeremiah faced, only we have it in a more desperate form. We call it alcoholism; they call it by a uglier, more suitable word, drunkenness. Even in those days drinking was a problem; it cut down the national health, wealth and wisdom. Nowadays it is worse because of two factors. One is the higher percentage of alcohol in beverages such as whiskey, unknown in those days. The other factor is advertising.

Where Drunkards Start AGAINST ALL THIS the church must keep saying and persuading people, Choose the Best! But it does comparatively little good to say this to the confirmed alcoholic. It makes more sense to say it to young people. For the sad feature of alcoholism is that it begins in the high schools.

The Yale School of Alcohol Studies has collected evidence indicating that two-thirds of all alcoholics begin drinking habits in the early high school years. A recent Gallup poll shows the greatest percentage of drinkers to be in the age group 21 to 29. Today, it is estimated, there are four million alcohol addicts or excessive drinkers who are in more or less constant trouble with their families and employers. Drunkenness costs industry in America no less than one billion dollars a year, and has a lot to do with the breakup of homes and with crime generally.

Allied Youth SOMETHING is being done to stop this, which you should know about. There is a movement known as Allied Youth, a national educational organization working in high schools all over the country. Its work is positive, not negative. It is not trying to pass laws or to bring back prohibition. What it does try to do—and it is succeeding remarkably well in many places—is to give young people a way of life that will enable them to meet social pressure for drinking without loss of "face." Every Allied Youth post in a school has three aims: 1. To meet the social and recreational needs of young people.

Every New Year's Eve, for instance, when millions of Americans are getting sickly drunk, more than 6,000 young people gather in Detroit for the biggest dry party in America, sponsored by Allied Youth. 2. To establish within the school a fellowship of young people who do not think it is necessary to drink to be smart. Such a group

Dallas, Texas, An old Texas institution and farmer's standby Farm and Ranch magazine, has completed an expansion program which gives it 300,000 circulation in Texas, according to an announcement this week by Frank A. Briggs, long-time Editor of the publication.

Published since 1881, Farm and Ranch, beginning with the January 1950 issue, will unite with Southern Agriculturist, a farm publication printed in Nashville, Tennessee since 1869. The combination of subscribers to Southern Agriculturist with those of Farm and Ranch will give this new publication more circulation than any magazine going to Texas readers, and almost as much as any two magazine.

Editorial offices will be maintained in Dallas as usual, Editor Briggs reported. The new name of the publication will be Farm and Ranch with Southern Agriculturist. A special Western Edition will be published each month for Texas and Oklahoma readers. Over 75,000 readers in Oklahoma will receive the magazine and 900,000 in other Southern States, Mr. Briggs said. The new united publication will go to 14 Southern States, Mr. Briggs said. The new united publication will go to 12 Southern States all told and to over one and one-quarter million subscribers.

In the past Farm and Ranch went out to only the Southwestern states, Briggs pointed out.

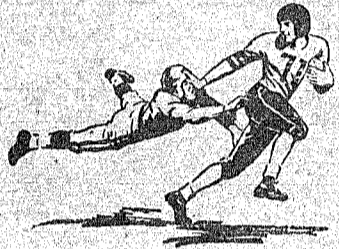
