Mountaineers Play Hosts To Blanket In Last Home Game; Lost To Rising Star

The Santa Anna Mountaineers will engage the Blanket High Tigers in the last home game of the season on the local field Friday night, November 4, at 7:30 p. m. The Mountaineers will have two other games after this week.

Blanket has had a bad season all this year, but as the season begins to draw to a close they seem to be getting stronger, and prospects are for a good game of ball here Friday night. The Mountaineers are favorites in this game and they are determined to hold the place in district they now hold.

The line-up for the Blanket Tigers has not been received here in time for the line-up to be published, but from what is known about the team, the Mountaineers will have a little edge on them in weight.

The Mountaineers lost to the firey Rising tar Wildcats last week by a 7-45 score. The Mountaineers were out-classed in this game, and it was Rising Stars game throughout. Buck Gibson, Wildcat ace halfback, scored four times and passed for another, while Criswell scored twice and Hill scored once. Craig Douglas, Mountaineer fullback, scored the only Santa Anna TD on a twenty yard run in the fourth period. Scott kicked the extra point.

After this week the Mountaineers have two day games. November 11 they play the Bangs Dragons in the afternoon on the Bangs field. This day is to be a Homecoming for all Bangs and you are assured this will be one of the top games of the season. The Mountaineers will play another afternoon game on Thanksgiving Day with the Gorman Panthers at Gorman. This will be the last game of the season.

At present the Mountaineers are tied up with Cross Plains for third place in District 11-B standing. The Mountaineers should retain this place, while Cross Plains has other games with May Rising Star and Blanket.

The Mountaineers starting line up will be about the same as it has been all season.

Pioneer Citizen Claimed By Death

Mrs. Mattie Eva Ford McIver, a pioneer resident of Coleman county, died in a Brownwood hospital, October 23, 1949 at 11:45 a. m.

Mattie Eva Ford was born at 1873, to Mr. and Mrs. George B. Ford. The Ford family came to Brownwood in 1886. Later her father was a pioneer teacher in the Santa Anna schools. Later the family settled at Trickham, where Mrs. McIver spent about 64 years of her life. She had been a member of the Methodist Church for 55 years and had been active in church and civic work up until about two years ago.

She served at the first postmaster at Democrat, Texas, and taught school before her marriage. She attended Daniel Baker College.

On December 13, 1895, she was married to B. W. McIver, a native of Jonesboro, North Carolina. To this union eight children were born, four girls and four boys. One daughter, Mary Zona, preceded her in death, several years ago.

Surviving are her husband, B. W. McIver of Trickham; children Bernice, Rankin and Grady McIver of Trickham; Arthur McIver of Carlsbad, New Mexico; Mrs. Ethel Johnson of Corpus Christi; Mrs. Irene Bobo and Mrs. Inez Miller of Coleman; four sisters, Mrs. Mollie Shields of Trickham; Miss Pearl Ford of Brownwood; Mrs. Etta Whitten of Lampasas; and Mrs. Ruby Haynes of near Trickham. 10 Amendments To Be Voted On In State Wide Election Tuesday

Austin, Oct. 31 (UP)—Voting Texans, who have carved 104 changes into the framework of their state constitution, will have opportunity Nov. 8 to pass on the merits of 10 more.

Each is a proposed constitutional amendment.

All were approved by the 51st Legislature.

Whether they become a part of the state's basic law or die on the ballot is up to the voters.

Normally, such an election brings out some 200,000 voters. That's about one ballot from every five qualified voters.

However, this year may see a heavier-than-average turnout.

There are several reasons.

Of the 10 proposals, at least two carry overtones of controversy. That helps get out the vote.

One amendment would increase pay of the legislators and provide for annual sessions of the lawmakers. The other amendment would repeal the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting.

In addition a member of the newly created State Board of Education will be elected from each of Texas' 21 Congressional districts.

That should bolster the local vote.

Finally, special elections will be held that day to fill four vacancies in the House of Representatives and one in the State Senate.

The order in which each of the 10 amendments selected by lot, will appear on the ballot and the manner in which they will be identified follows:

1—"For (or against) the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for civil service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

2—"For (or against) the cons-

ELECTRICITY AS A FIRE HAZARD

Electricity is one of the greatest inventions or discoveries that man has ever made. It lights his home, cooks his food, operates machinery in his plants, provides him with entertainment such as the radio and movies and provides numerous other benefits. However, when misused or abused, electricity can be one of our most deadly enemies. It stands third place in the list of fire causes in Dallas.

Never leave an electric iron plugged onto the electrical system unless someone is nearby. It may overheat and ignite the inflammable materials on the ironing board and cause a disastrous fire.

The constant kinking of electrical cords on electrical appli-

ances will break down the insulation and wire, and will cause short circuits. Whenever a cord shows signs of breakage, wear or deterioration, have it repaired or replaced immediately. It is bad practice to pull plugs from wall outlets or electrical appliances by the cord. Always grasp the plug itself when removing it from an outlet.

Avoid the use of long extension cords. They should never be placed under a rug or carpet, nor should they ever be run through a doorway where the door would bind or pinch them.

An electrical heater, like a gas heater, can ignite combustible materials through radiated heat or by such objects being placed too near them. Use judgement.

God Our Comfort

Lesson for November 6, 1949

AS THE ENGLISH language keeps on changing, words do not always keep on meaning what they once did. "Comfort" is one of these. When our Bible was translated into English in 1611, the translation most English-speaking people use, the word "comfort" had a bigger meaning than most people put into it nowadays. We think of it as meaning soothing, but it is a bigger idea than that. God is not merely a soothing God. We think of "comfort" as meaning to make comfortable, but it is a stouter word than that. God does not always make his people comfortable. The word means to strengthen, to steel against fear and despair, to put backbone into people.

"Fear Not, O Worm!" AT THE TIME of the prophecies we study this week, the Israelites had been kicked around a good deal. They had felt the conqueror's boots, they were discouraged, as all good people are when somehow it seems to be letting evil forces triumph. Their little world had split wide apart, their little nation had been blown to the winds.

To those people, torn by terrors and bowed down by wretchedness, people who were in serious danger of developing a once-for-all "inferiority complex," people who were about to lose all their backbone, the great prophet brings his messages: "Comfort ye my people, saith your God."

The whole idea is in this one sentence (Is. 41:11): "Fear not, O worm Jacob! I am your helper, saith the Lord."

God does not induce his people in foolish pride. Beside the Almighty are mere worms, insects. Nevertheless, worm though he may be, the man who trusts in God will not be afraid. He will not trust in his own powers, he will trust in luck, he will trust in God.

A worm by itself is nothing; but with God on his side, the weakest of men can say with Paul, "If God be for us, who can be against us?" God's men do not get their courage up by flexing their muscles or admiring themselves. They grow in courage as they grow in the knowledge of God.

Goodness And Power

ANY ONE who saw "Edward, My Son" will remember the tragedy of that family. A boy's character went slowly to pieces, because his father was determined that nothing should be too good for him. To gain his purpose the father ran rough-shod over everyone who stood in his way, and eventually ruined the lives of all around him, including his son's and his own. The mother, on the other hand, could see, as the father could not, what his indulgence was doing to the boy, making him a weakling and a rat. But she was too weak to stand up against her husband, and her life too was ruined. That story is a kind of parable.

The prophet reveals a God who is both powerful and good; but suppose God were only good but not powerful, or only powerful but not good? Then the world would be in a mess, as that boy Edward was in a mess.

But these three are all in the same God. A God who is power only, might do as Edward's father did, destroy his children without even intending to do so. A God who is goodness only, might want to do right by his world yet not be able to do so, like Edward's mother. A God who knew what was right but neither wanted nor was able to do much about it, would not be a God at all.

God Is Not Weary

SUPPOSE GOD were indeed powerful, good and wise, and yet grew tired from time to time? Suppose all God's good qualities came and went, unpredictably, like the wind on a spring day?

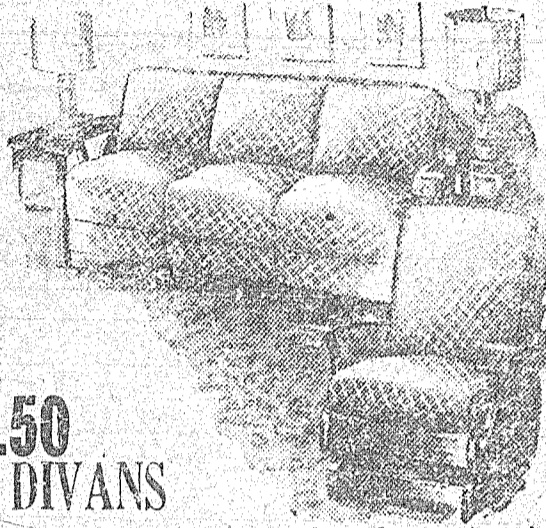

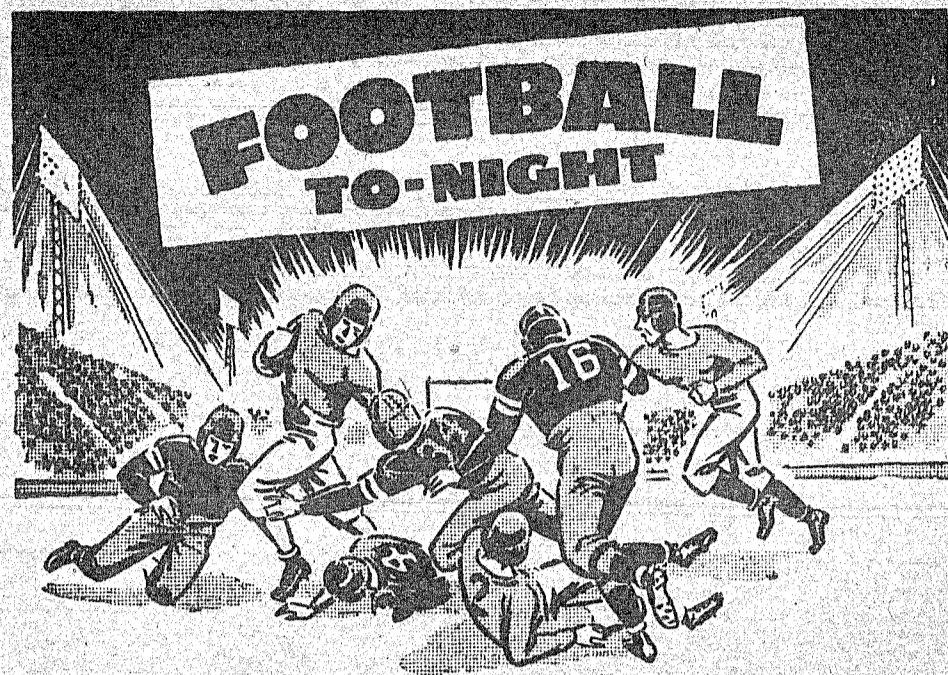
