Mountaineers To Tangle With Bangs Dragons At Bangs, Nov. 11, At 2:00 P. M.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers will journey over to our neighboring city of Bangs for what is scheduled to be a very good football classic for Armistice Day and a Homecoming for Bangs.

On paper, the Mountaineers have the best team by several scores. However, this is a homecoming game for the Dragons and lots of Bangs residents, and former residents will be out there pushing the Dragons on. They have been making plans for several weeks to upset the Mountaineers on this one occasion, and the good ole football spirit has been running high in Bangs this week.

The two teams have engaged five of the same teams with scores being as follows: Bangs 7, Rising Star 38; Bangs 6, May 22; Bangs 7, Cross Plains 20; Bangs 34, Blanket 13; Bangs 18, Early High 41. Scores against the same teams for Santa Anna have been: Santa Anna 26, May 0; Santa Anna 14, Early High 19; Santa Anna 19, Cross Plains 18; Santa Anna 7, Rising Star 45; and Santa Anna 41, Blanket 7.

Bangs has scored a total of 72 points while the five opponents have scored a total of 134 points. With the same five teams Santa Anna has scored a total of 107 points, while the opponents scored only 89 points. Bangs has scored 62 points less than their opponents and Santa Anna has scored 18 points more than the opponents.

Bangs and Santa Anna have been arch rivals for a number of years. Even while Santa Anna was still in Class A football, Bangs had rather beat them than any team in their district. Now that we are in the same district and beat them last year also, they are out to win.

This will be a good game, and will be a good way to spend Armistice. Lets all go to Bangs and help the Mountaineers bring home this victory.

Last week the Mountaineers were hosts to the Blanket High Tigers, in the last home game of the season. The Mountaineers romped over the Tigers to the tune of 41-7, and the second string played as much as half of the game. The Tigers are a spirited bunch, never giving up even though the odds are all against them. They played a good hard game and gave the second string a good match.

Santa Anna kicked to the Tigers and they returned the ball to the 22 yard line. In four plays they had advanced to the Santa Anna 40 and made 2 first downs. Then the ball went over on downs and five plays later Craig Douglas broke into the open and ran 18 yards for the first Mountaineer counter. Two plays after the kick-off Douglas intercepted a Tiger pass on the 16 yard line and went over for the second counter. Billy J. Scott kicked both extra points and the score at the end of the first quarter was 14-0.

Early in the second quarter Douglas again broke loose and ran 52 yards for the third TD of the game. Scott kicked the extra point and Coach McBride sent in the entire second string. Late in the second quarter Staggs, Tiger half back, pushed over for the only Tiger score. Staggs also rushed the line for the extra point, making the half end at 21-7 for the Mountaineers.

In the third period the Tigers kicked to the Mountaineers and on the sixth play Harold Horton passed a pass from the 30 yard line to Charles Scarborough that was good for another score, with Scott again kicking the point. After the kick-off a Tiger fumble was recovered by the Mountaineers and three plays later R. D. Hartman broke into the open and galloped 40 yards for another score. Mackey failed to kick the extra point.

Midway in the fourth period Douglas again intercepted a Tiger pass and galloped 75 yards for the final tally of the game and Scott again converted, making

the final score 41-7 for the Mountaineers.

Rites Held For Mrs. D. C. Neal Saturday At Christian Church

Funeral services were conducted at the Christian Church Saturday morning, November 5, at 10:30, for Mrs. D. C. Neal, long-time resident of Coleman county. The pastor, Rev. E. H. Wylie, assisted by Rev. M. L. Womack, officiated. Mrs. Neal died Friday night, November 3, at her home north of Santa Anna. She had been in failing health for almost 18 months.

In the passing of Mrs. Neal, the family, the church and the community, has lost a true and valuable citizen. She was a devoted Christian woman, and did not restrict her services to her own church and denomination, but attended other churches and was always a welcome visitor and helper. Her presence was compared to a ray of sunshine in any place she visited and her earnest prayers and condolence were always being sought.

Florence Ella Mae Shelton was born to Mr. and Mrs. George Shelton on July 20, 1871, at Aspenhill, Tennessee. She was married to D. C. Neal July 23, 1890, in Tennessee. To this union seven children were born, three of whom preceded her in death.

Mr. and Mrs. Neal came to Texas in 1892. They lived in Navarro county for three years, Ellis county one year and have lived in Coleman county 54 years. Mrs. Neal joined the First Christian Church at Chatfield, Texas, 56 years ago and has been a member of the Santa Anna Christian Church 54 years.

She is survived by the husband, three sons: David George Neal, of Santa Anna; Raymond Neal, of Tennessee; and James Woodrow Neal of Anahvae, Texas; one daughter: Mrs. Stella Florence Casey of Falfurrias, three brothers: Phillip Shelton of Athens, Alabama; Raymond and William Shelton of Padaski, Tenn. Also surviving are 14 grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren.

Mary Kate Oakes, Roy Edgar Neal and Alice Lamora Brannan preceded her in death.

L. E. Paige, County Pioneer, Buried Sat. At Trickham

Funeral services for L. E. Paige, 91, who died in a Brownwood Hospital Thursday were held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Trickham Community Church with the Rev. L. P. Jennings, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene, officiating.

L. E. Paige was a colorful Coleman County pioneer as his personal career almost parallels the historical rise and fall of Trickham, one time thriving town and also the largest in Coleman County.

Paige was the postmaster in Trickham and operated a store in Trickham since 1882. Perhaps one of the most trusting men in Coleman County.

Mr. Paige retired about three years ago.

Mr. Paige was born in Angellina County in 1858 and came to Coleman County soon after his marriage to Miss Mollie Stacy in 1882. He was a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. After the death of his first wife in 1923, Mr. Paige married Mrs. Phobe Williams of Trickham in 1926.

Survivors include the widow, a son, W. D. Paige of Ink, Ark.; two daughters, Mrs. Lewis Burner of Trickham and Mrs. Viola Paige Mays of Coleman; eight grandchildren and thirteen great grandchildren.

The home of Mr. D. C. Neal and David was the gathering place for some 44 famers, with 20 tractors and several pick-ups. These men met here to carry on a community tradition and to help the Neals who have been handicapped for a period of over a year by the sickness and death of Mrs. D. C. Neal.

These men broke 117 acres of land and put 63 acres on it in wheat and oats, gathered 14 acres of feed and stacked it, gathered corn and plowed the garden spot.

Thirteen women of the community gathered at the home during the morning and gave the house and premises a thorough cleaning and fixed lunch for the men working in the field. At the noon hour a barbecue lunch was furnished by the Santa Anna Piggly Wiggly store.

Gasoline for the tractors was furnished by Calvin Campbell of the Gulf Oil Corporation and O. A. Etheredge of the Texas Co. During the 54 years that the Neals have lived in Coleman county, Mrs. Neal had always gone to help in a home where there was sickness, or where someone might be needed for any other reason. VA Announces Order Of Paying NSLI Dividends

Washington, Nov. 4.—(UP)—The Veterans Administration today announced the order of paying off the \$2,800,000,000 insurance dividend which will give a fair shake to both GI's and the high brass.

The last three digits of the veteran's service serial number will determine the order of payment the VA said. The checks will begin going out in January. The full service number has no significance. It is only the last three digits.

Applications for the National Service Life Insurance dividend will be separated into 10 processing units by the veteran's last serial digit — from zero to 9.

For instance a veteran whose serial number is 35496000 will be included in the first mailing of the checks because all of the last three digits of his serial number are three zeros.

Now disregard everything but last three digits of his serial number since it is those digits on which the VA bases its system.

Take 000. That, as said, will be in the first mailing. Mailed simultaneously with checks from this group will be those with serial numbers ending 001, 002, 003, 004, 005, 006, 007, 008 and 009.

because they represent each of the other 10 processing groups. The V A has a voucher, or check writing machine for each of the ten groups — from zero to 9. They are expected to handle 20,000 each day.

Thus, 20,000 cards will be taken from each of the 10 groups each day and checks written for the applicant.

What amounts to the second mailing would be checks for veterans with serial numbers ending in the last three digits of 010, 011, 012, ect. These also would go out at about the same time.

LONG AGO riding in his slow chariot through the southern sands, a puzzled reader with Isaiah 53 in his hand, asked the question...

What we do say is that while these words might have described some one the prophet knew, might have described the whole nation of Israel, might even have described himself...

The Scarlet Thread

ISAIAH 53 has been in the center of the church's thinking about Christ from the beginning. It may be said to run like a scarlet thread through the New Testament.

What would otherwise be simply a horrible tragedy, perhaps, the greatest tragedy of history, the perfect case of complete injustice, the final evidence that there is no God, in the light of Isaiah 53 becomes a center of glory.

Instead of being ashamed of the cross on which Jesus died, the church sings, "In the cross of Christ I glory." "Love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all."

We believe that Christ suffered not for his own sin for others' sake, suffering, not forced but willingly undergone, suffering not as mere pain, but that others might be saved, suffering on behalf of others and for love of them—this is the key to the riddle of existence. This is the key to the heart of God.

Not Christ Alone

IF CHRIST'S MEN had refused to follow where he led, if all Christians had been willing to let him carry, alone, the burden of the world's sin and grief, there never would have been any Christianity...

No missionary ever would have left home and comforts and country; no mother would have laid down her life for her children; the unselfish service of those who have cared for the sick and the orphaned would never have been done; indeed, had no one ever been willing to suffer for the benefit of others, one wonders whether the world could have even held together this long.

Christ died that the world might live, yes; but others also had to die to make his death avail. He died for Africa, that Africans might live; but Africans died till men like Livingstone and Schwelzer and many a less famous man and woman also went out and lived there in loneliness, and died in pain.

Christ died for the little children of the poor, but until the Salvation Army and others like them went down into the slums and suffered there with and for them, those poor little people died without so much as dreaming that God might love them.

Christ died for all the lepers in the world; but until a Father Damien, and others no less Christ-like, went among the outcast lepers and became outcasts themselves for the love of Christ, those lepers died in the dark.

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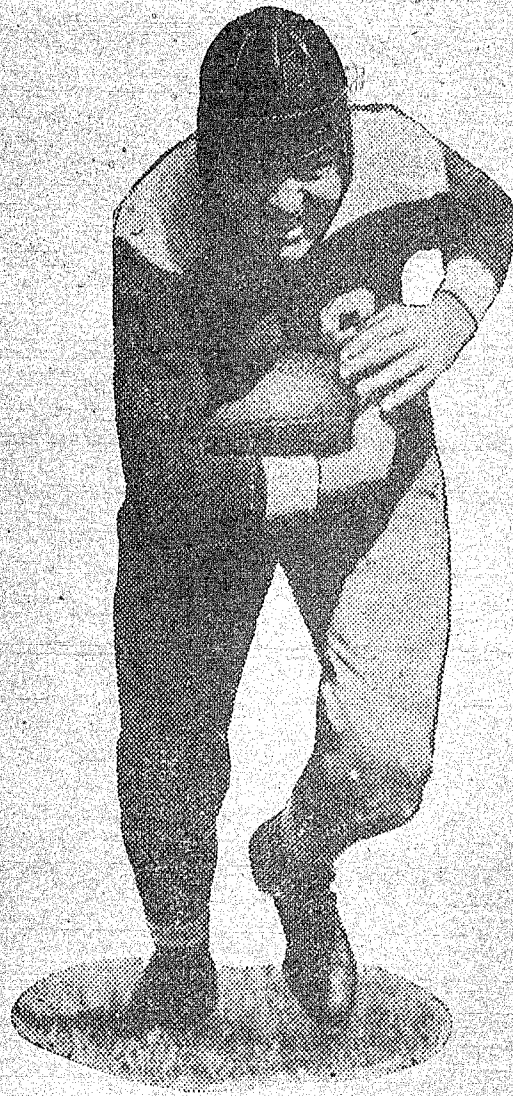
