The last three digits of the vean's service serial number will determine the order of payment the VA said. The checks will begin going out in January. The full service number has no significance. It is only the last three digits.

Applications for the National Service Life Insurance dividend will be seperated into 10 processing units by the veteran's last serial digit — from zero to 9.

For instance a veteran whose serial number is 35496000 will be included in the first mailing of the checks because all of the last three digist of hies serial number are three zeros.

Now disregard everything but last three digits of his serial number since it is those digits on which the VA bases its sys-
