Gulf Announces New Grade Gas

Houston, Texas, March 1, 1950.—An improved premium grade gasoline meeting the requirements of the latest high compression automobile motors is being made available at Gulf Oil outlets throughout Texas today, according to M. Farnsworth, Division General Manager.

Working closely with automotive engineers, Gulf's research staff has developed the new gasoline during the last three years, Mr. Farnsworth said.

Half page advertisements announcing the new anti-knock fuel will be carried during March and April in the leading daily newspapers and in several hundred weeklies and small dailies. The advertising campaign is by far the most extensive, involves the use of more newspapers and the expenditure of more money than any other Gulf sales promotion program released in Texas since World War II.

The campaign is indicative, according to Farnsworth, of two things: first, the determination of the country's leading petroleum products suppliers to provide fuels that will fully meet the requirements of the high compression motors developed since the war; and second, the keen competition for retail customer business that is becoming increasingly evident under the present supply and demand situation.

Gulf distributors throughout the state, and dealers in every area where Gulf products are sold, have been invited to supplement the overall Company program with localized promotions of their own.

Qualified voters of the City of Santa Anna will go to the polls Tuesday, March 14 to vote on the issuance of \$50,000 in tax bonds and \$150,000 in Revenue bearing bonds. The bond, if passed, will guarantee Santa Anna a permanent water supply from Lake Brownwood.

Santa Anna has been short of water since early in 1946. During the hot weather months since that time water has had to be used on a very conservative basis. The present supply is decreasing very fast.

The bond issue will be presented in three questions: (1) the issuance of water revenue bonds in the amount of \$125,000, (2) the issuance of sewer revenue bonds in the amount of \$25,000, and (3) the issuance of tax bonds in the amount of \$50,000. Each question will be stated separately on the ballot.

The water and sewer revenue bonds are to run for a period of 30 years, with interest the first eleven years being 2 1/2 percent, the next fifteen years will draw 3 percent interest and the last four years will draw interest at the rate of 3 1/2 percent. The tax bond is a 25 year bond and will draw interest at the rate of 2 1/2 percent for the first 10 years, 2 3/4 percent for the next six years and 3 percent for the last nine years.

The Santa Anna officials have made an agreement with the Brownwood Water District to purchase water at the rate of \$20.00 per million for the first fifty million and then \$10.00 per million for each million thereafter, on a yearly basis. This will assure Santa Anna a plentiful supply of water that can be sold to the consumer at a reasonable rate.

Mass Meeting Thursday Night
A mass meeting of all the citizens of Santa Anna who are interested in the bond questions has been called for Thursday night, March 9, at the High School Auditorium. The meeting will start at 7:30 and every one who does not understand all the questions stated, or who has any other questions they are not informed on, are especially urged to be present. The bonding company representative and the engineering firm representative will be present to see that everyone fully understands what is attempting to be accomplished.

Plans are to put in a new pump station near Lake Brownwood and pump the water to the local filtering plant. Here the water will be settled and treated before it is pumped into the city storage tanks. The water line will be an 8 inch pipe, and will be approximately 3 1/2 miles long.

Questions Answered
A few questions have been brought to the attention of your editor within the past week. A few of the questions have some food for thought connected with them, but as usual, some of them have come as a result of persons spreading rumors that actually have no background to them. Below we are going to present the questions as they have been asked us, and answer them in the manner recommended by Mayor F. Z. Payne.

Q. Will valuation on City Property be raised?

A. Yes. Valuation on City Property will be increased 50 percent in order to make an increase of approximately 25 percent in the city taxes. At present the city tax rate is \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. The city tax rate will be lowered to \$1.25 per \$100 valuation, thus making an increase in taxes of approximately 25 percent.

Q. How will Old Age Pensioners get the money to pay the tax raise?

A. Old Age Pensioners should make a request to the State Old Age Pension Board through the Old Age Pension representative that calls on you. She will make the application for you to get

your increase in taxes paid. The Old Age Pension Board will pay present taxes, but will not pay delinquent taxes.

Q. Will all property owners be made to pay the tax? A lot of them don't pay them now.

A. It is impossible to make a person pay his taxes. However, the city officials have the authority to sell property that has not had taxes paid on it, for the taxes against it. As stated, some are not paying their taxes now. The city has been in the process of having suit brought against property that has not had the taxes paid on it. If property owners do not pay the taxes due, plus interest, the property is sold at auction, in order to collect taxes due.

Q. What is the pay of the Mayor and Commissioners?

A. The Mayor receives \$17.50 per month. The Commissioners each receive \$12.50 per month.

Q. What portions of voted bond money is a mayor allowed under Texas Laws?

A. Absolutely None. There has been a rumor making the rounds that the Mayor is allowed a 3 percent commission on voted bond money. This rumor is absolutely false. There is no law in Texas or the United States that allows any city official any amount of voted bond money. If you will read your daily newspapers, you will find that a number of officials of cities, banking concerns and other public businesses are being sent to prison every day for taking money that does not belong to them. The same thing would happen in Santa Anna provided it was proved that one or all of the commissioners were taking money in this manner.

Go and Vote

So far as this writer knows there is very little opposition concerning the bond issues. All of us know that we must have water to survive. Without an ample supply of water, a town will soon vanish. We have seen what an ample supply of water can do for a town. Our neighboring town on the east has plenty of good water, furnished from Lake Brownwood. During the past few years their population has almost doubled. They have lots of beautiful homes and most of their yards are beautiful to go with them. Industrial people, who are going over the country looking for places to put industries look into the water supply before considering moving into a place.

If we are going to survive and intend to progress along with time, we must have plenty of water. This is our one good chance to get all the water we can use, and get it where we can have cheap water.

NEW WATER RATES

In order for the city to be capable of paying the bond issues off, the city officials has set new water rate that will be put in effect after the water line is completed. The new rate will be: A minimum charge of \$2.50 will be assessed against each water meter. This will allow the water user 3,000 gallons of water. The next 3,000 gallons of water will be charged for at the rate of 40 cents per 1,000 gallons. The next 4,000 gallons will be charged for at the rate of 30 cents per 1,000 gallons. The next 10,000 gallons will be charged for at the rate of 25 cents per 1,000 gallons. All over this amount will be charged for at the rate of 20 cents per 1,000 gallons.

We urge all qualified voters to make an effort to get to the polls on Tuesday and vote FOR on all three questions. We all should know that the ones that are against the proposals will go and vote. We urge to you not to think that the questions will pass without your vote.

Rev. M. L. Womack Crowned "Grand Old Man of Santa Anna" Friday night

Rev. M. L. Womack, long-time pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Santa Anna was given the distinction of being the "Grand Old Man of Santa Anna" at services held at the High School Auditorium Friday night. Rev. W. E. Smith, pastor of the First Methodist Church, was master of ceremonies.

Rev. Womack has served in the ministry for 47 years. His first 12 years in the ministry he served in the Methodist Church. He and Mrs. Womack were married October 5, 1905, soon after graduating from school at Smart, Tennessee. They were married at Lexington, Missouri. One son, Ernest Lee, deceased, was born to the Womacks in 1910.

Rev. Womack became a member of the Presbytery in 1897. His first church was Smart, Tennessee, where he pastored while attending school. His first regular pastorage was Mountain Grove, Missouri, starting in 1905. He was ordained by Bishop Sheppard at Lawrence, Kansas, in 1913.

In 1917 a Presbyterian Church at Lone Elm, Kansas, asked him to be guest speaker, with prospects of calling him there. He accepted and was called. Here he remained for about 15 years.

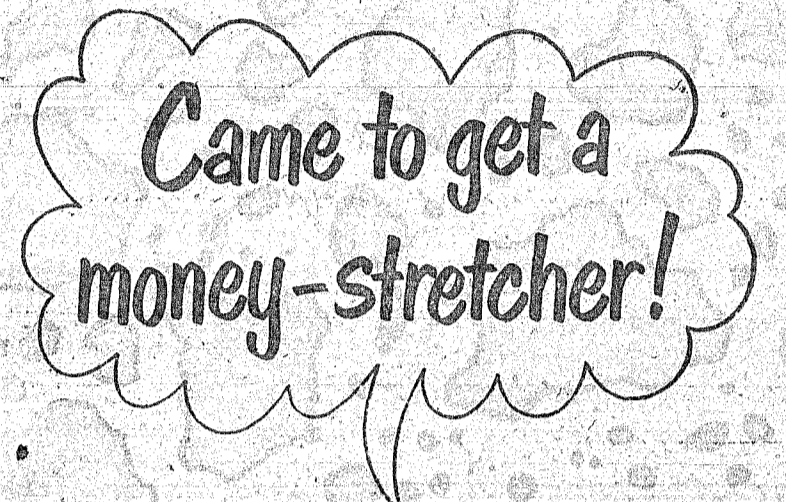
A very interesting program was arranged, also several songs, prayers, stories, Scripture readings, and a poem. An offering of \$14.00 was taken.

Governor Allen Shivers, reporting to the people of Texas on work of the special session of the Legislature which ended last week, declared that the purpose for which the session was called

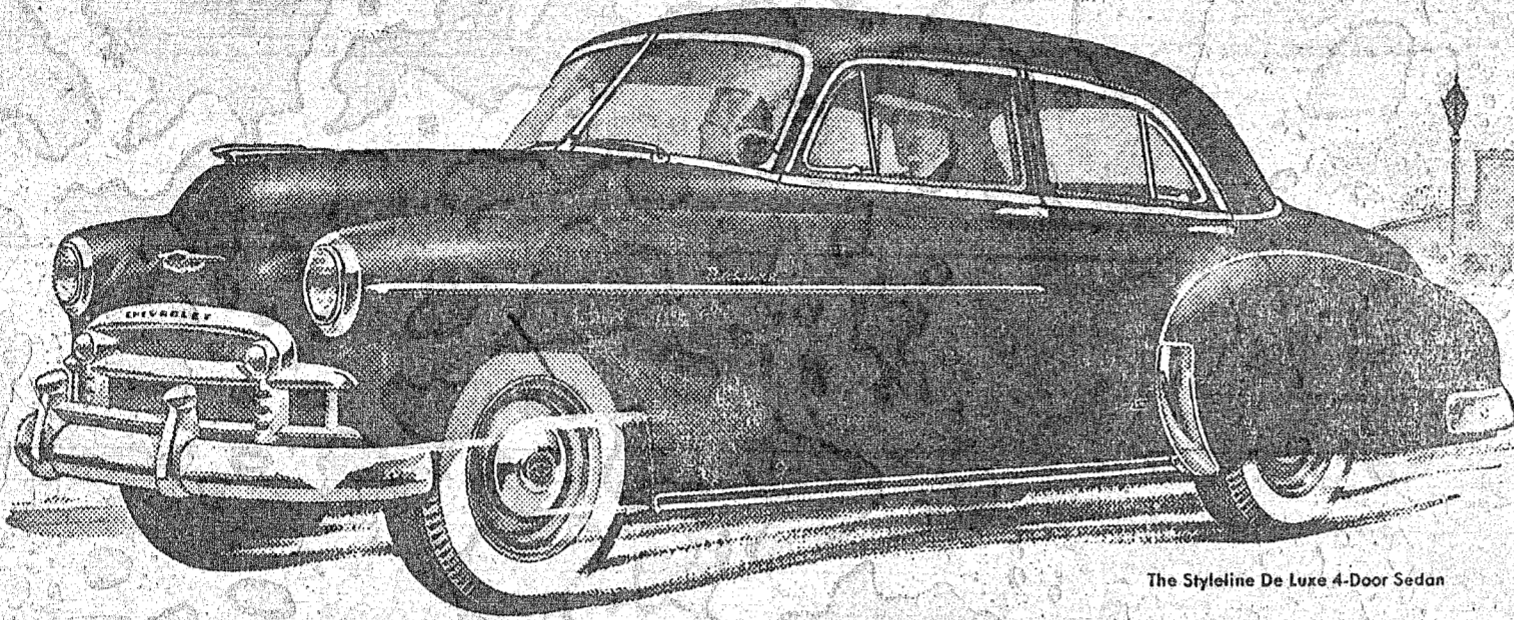

"Thus the 51st Legislature, already distinguished as a Legislature that has attempted to give Texas one of the finest school systems in the United States; that was the first Legislature to provide for a system of rural roads, and a Legislature that made a long step toward the control of juvenile delinquency, has now crowned its record with this humanitarian legislation of enduring merit and continuing benefits."

Money to finance the program will be raised through an increase of one cent per package in the cigarette tax and in slightly increased levies on beer, wine, whiskey, natural resources, public utilities, insurance companies and other items included in a tax bill passed in 1941.

The purpose for which the lawmakers were summoned was carried out in the first 24 days of the session, the Governor said. The remainder of the 30-day session was devoted to passage of other emergency legislation.

"These additional acts mean," Gov. Shivers pointed out, "that from now on, we will be protected by more stringent and comprehensive laws against sex crimes; that telephone service will be easier to secure in the rural areas of the state; that the search for a cure for cancer will be accelerated at the M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston; that our battle against federal control of our tidelands will continue unabated, and that the legal status of many newly created or consolidated public school districts over the state has been established."

The Governor declared that the session's record provides "conclusive proof" that business methods will work in government.

"The success of this session is a tribute to the business approach to governmental problems," he said.

He explained that the accomplishments were made possible, first, by vision; "a grasp of the problem and a conception of the solution;" second, by orderly planning, participated in by a wide segment of the state's population; and, third, by the co-operative action of the Legislature, the administration, the State Hospital Board and all the individuals, groups and organizations that had interested themselves in the program.

Governor Shivers said this formula was submitted to the people of Texas "as a sound basis for present and future operation of our state government."

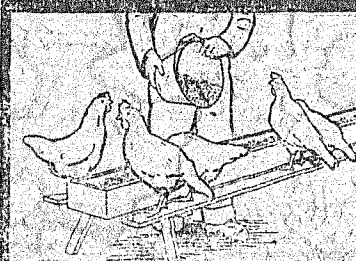
