Santa Anna has been short of ing the hot weather months since that time water has had to be used on a very conservative basis. The present supply is decreasing very fast.

The bond issue will be presented in three questions: (1) the issuance of water revenue bonds in the amount of \$125,000, (2). the issuance of sewer revenue bonds in the amount of \$25,000, and (3) the issuance of tax bonds in the amount of \$50,000. Each question will be stated seperately on the ballot.

The water and sewer revenue bonds are to run for a period of 30 years, with interest the first eleven years being 21/2 percent, the next fifteen years will draw 3 percent interest and the last nine years.
