## New Water Rate Put Into Effect For April 1st Billing To Approve Bonds

### Nat'l Guard To Start Blood Bank

The Texas National Guard has undertaken to provide a "Fast Blood Bank" for the benefit of Texans in time of local and national disaster. With nearly 17,000 men assigned to 266 units located in 137 cities and towns throughout the state, it will be a project of such magnitude and usefulness as to excite the admiration of all citizens.

On several occasions individuals from various Guard units have generously donated their blood in emergencies but we believe that Texas is the first to enter into such a program on a state-wide basis. The goal is not to have special programs of limited scope, but to guarantee that enough blood and its products are available to serve life and health throughout the state.

It should be of great comfort to our citizens to know that a great back log of vital blood will be available in the event some huge disaster strikes the state.

If atom bombs suddenly struck some of our communities, we would immediately need thousands of pints of blood to treat the injured in the first two or three weeks alone. Such a mobilization of life-giving blood could save thousands of lives, which would otherwise be lost.

To meet peacetime as well as disaster needs, it sometimes is not realized how much blood is needed for the normal casualties of accident and disease. The demand is enormous and continual.

The procedure will be to have the blood of every man, woman and child in the state collected in a blood bank or hospital where blood can be typed and collected. Clinics, laboratories and individual physicians will be asked to cooperate. Where blood banks have been established collection may be made at any time. Where no banks exist "walking blood banks" will be developed by listing donors by type. The blood type will be noted on the individual's National Guard Immunization Register form.

Each Guardsman will be invited to sign the Texas National Guard Blood Bank Pledge Form. This form pledges the signer to answer any call from proper authority to make a donation of his blood in the cause of humanity, agreeing also not to accept any remuneration therefor.

The plan is voluntary, not compulsory. Nor is it commercial in any respect. If the recipient cares to make a contribution for the service it will go into the Unit Fund of the donor's unit. Such payment, if any, will be a donation to the Texas National Guard, not remuneration.

Units will report to the Adjutant General on the first of each month the percent of unit strength which has signed up. With the indorsement and support of all major commanders in the Guard, it is expected that this report will soon be unanimous.

The new water rate that has been determined for the City of Santa Anna has already been put into effect and water users will notice this when the April 1 billing is sent out. This rate had to be put into effect immediately in order for the bonds to be approved by the Attorney General of Texas.

The new rate calls for a minimum charge of \$2.50 per month. This will allow the water user to use 3,000 gallons of water for the minimum charge. After the first 3,000 gallons minimum, the next 3,000 gallons will be charged for at the rate of 40 cents per 1,000 gallons; the next 4,000 gallons will be charged at the rate of 30 cents per 1,000 gallons; the next 10,000 gallons will be charged at the rate of 25 cents per 1,000 gallons. All over 20,000 gallons of water used will be charged at the rate of 20 cents per 1,000 gallons. All rates are set up on a monthly basis, and meters will be read on the 15th of each month.

In order to more fully explain the water bill you will get on the first of each month, here is how your bill will be if you use only the minimum amount or less water per month: You will be charged the minimum water rent of \$2.50 plus the sewage charge, plus the \$1.00 per month sanitation charge. If you use over the minimum 3,000 gallons of water per month, your bill will be increased accordingly.

A City Ordinance requires that your water bill be paid by the 10th of the month. If the bill is not paid by the 10th, a 10 percent penalty will be added, and if not paid by the 20th of the month, water service will be cut off, and a \$1.00 charge will be made for cutting back on.

It may seem a little harsh to some to have to do this. But it must be done in order to have an ample supply of water. We assure you that the City Officials are letting you have water at the lowest rate possible and from the returns on the bonds issues last week, we feel that most everyone will be satisfied with the new rates.

## Santa Anna Oil News

The Westates Petroleum Corp., Coleman, wildcat on the Mae Flores, Jonahan Scott No. 665, block 1, 330 ft. from the north and east lines, struck shallow gas at 762 ft. early Sunday morning and caught fire. The rig burned to the ground and one man was hurt. The well was estimated to make around 2 million feet of gas and was carrying water at the time and cleaned itself early Tuesday morning. This same gas was encountered by the Amereda Petroleum Co., along with some oil on a well approximately 1/2 mile west. A new rig was reported to be moving in Tuesday with a view of continuing drilling in the well.

The Ross Smith on the Kingsbery land, topped the Caddo at 1881 ft. They are now drilling at 1943 ft. in black lime. The top of the Marble Falls can be expected in the well at 2175. ft.

The Forest Blackstock and Pete Jackson on the Westbrook land, acidized their well with 25 thousand gallons of acid in an open hole from 2345 ft. to 2465 ft. Though no test has been made at this time, about 300 barrels of pipe line oil is in the slush pit. Acid water is being cleaned out of the hole and it is expected that the well will start producing shortly.

The Lone Star on the Lucas land, acidized their well in two stages with 5,000 gallons each on Sunday. The well started flowing spent acid water at 6:40 p. m. and in four minutes time, was making natural gas. From latest reports this will be an excellent gas well.

The Ownby Drilling Co. on the Copeland land, 1/2 mile due south of the Santa Anna High School building, is drilling at approximately 1120 ft., Tuesday morning. This well is located on the old Brannon land.

The Moutray-Moore-H. O. Norris well No. 1, elevation 1609 1/2 ft., commenced 1-6-50, was completed 1-28-50 at total depth of 2411 ft. Initial production 32 barrels of oil per day. This well has been producing satisfactorily up to date.

The J. Ralph Steward on the Taylor Motor Co. well No. 7, a 297 acre tract 11 miles south of Santa Anna, 1208 ft. from the north and 2,000 ft. from the east line of section 224, E. Vatos survey, completed at 1105 ft. with 15 barrels of oil initial production.

The J. Ralph Steward-Taylor Motor Co. well No. 8, 1700 ft. from the east line and 1208 ft. from the north line, total depth 1096 ft., initial production, 25 barrels of oil per day.

The Guy Mabee Drilling Co.—Leona Tompson well No. 1, T. & N. O. R. R. Survey, Section 69, an 80 acre tract, 330 ft. from the west line and 330 ft. from the north line, 2 1/2 miles north of Talpa, Elevation 1942, total depth 3397 ft. Initial production 140 barrels of oil per day.

The following notice of intent to drill has been filed with the Railroad Commission.

For the convenience of ones who cannot get to town at other times, his office is remaining open on Saturday afternoon.

# THE BIBLE SPEAKS

## World-Wide Church

Lesson for March 26, 1956

**G**OD WORKS his purposes out in ways that not even the wisest of his servants can foresee. A beautiful example of this is the way Paul went to Rome. Long before he saw that city, he wanted to preach there. All roads led to Rome, as they do to all world capitals, and people went there from everywhere.

### World Horizon

When Paul writes to his "pen-friends" at Rome (15:22-29) of a projected trip to Jerusalem and Spain, taking in Rome on the way, he was laying out a trip to the east and west ends of civilization, the jumping-off places. His plan was as ambitious as if a modern evangelist would write to some church in India: "I aim to visit Iceland and Japan, and call on you on the way out."

**Bond Voyage**  
**P**AUL EXPECTED to go to Rome a free man, his ticket (so to speak) reading on through Spain. Actually that was the end of his run. He went there under military guard, prisoner under sentence. The story is all there in Acts, how first he was jailed for protection from a blood-hungry mob, then kept in jail on general principles which is to say, the governor kept hoping he would pay well for an acquittal, and finally appealed to Rome, the highest court of the empire. Appeals were expensive and slow, then as now.

But Paul must have come to look at his imprisonment, false as it was, as a heaven-sent opportunity to make that journey to Rome. It was a gilt-edged accident insurance. Free, he might never escape the plotters and reach Rome alive. Chained, the efficient Roman army would see that he arrived—and he did.

Four pairs of axes were on him night and day. No plotters could stick him with a dagger or shove him overboard. So, after some hair-breadth escapes to be sure, he was delivered safe and sound in the very city of which he had been dreaming all these years.

### The Church at the Hub of the World

**T**HERE IS NOTHING at all in the New Testament to indicate that the church at Rome was considered by Paul or any one else, as "The Church of the Mother Church." There is no claim that it was founded by St. Paul, still less by St. Peter.

It grew, as other churches grew, by infiltration. Christians who moved to the big city would get together, and there the church would be. Yet, of course, the Roman church was important.

It was important because it was at the hub of the civilized world. Paul did not seem to mind it in the least, that he could work only inside his prison, or "confined to quarters."

Writing from his jail cell to the Philippians, he mentions converts from the army and from the imperial slaves. ("Caesar's household" in Phil. 4:22 does not refer to the Emperor's family, but to the retinue of palace slaves.) We know from the letter to Philemon that Paul converted at least one "Jalbird" named Onesimus.

### The True Church is a Marching Church

**P**AUL KNEW that a soul is a soul, sitting in the emperor's chair or waiting at the emperor's table. God is no respecter of persons. But he also knew that these Christian soldiers would not always stay in Rome; that even Christian slaves would be sold down the river; that the restless feet which brought their owners to Rome would take them away again. Great cities are like that. Putting down Christianity in Rome was not like putting a single seed into a sheltered corner of the garden. It was like scattering a handful of it so the breeze, to be carried far and wide, Paul's vision is still the vision of the church

Flowers, San Marcus, president of the Texas Society for Crippled Children, points out that no other agencies in the state duplicate the work of the Texas Society or its county affiliates. And that there is not one phase of the humanitarian work that can be neglected. There are now 125 counties with local societies carrying out specific projects for handicapped children. Post Cards Available To Check On Social S. No one likes to lose money, and yet when a worker fails to show his employer his social security card he may lose thousands of dollars, stated Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security field office. "You see, the reporting by the employer of the worker's correct name and number, exactly as shown on his card, is the key to the worker's wage account in the records of the Social Security Administration," Fisher said.

The importance of this wage account is apparent when a worker realizes that the benefits he can expect when he stops work at 65 or later, or the benefits that might be paid his family in case he dies, are based on the wages to his credit in his social security account. When the account is incomplete, it may mean a difference in the amount of the benefit or it may mean that no benefits can be paid.

Many workers make it a point to check their social security accounts periodically, and the Social Security Administration recommends that this be done at least every four years. A special post card form is available which any worker may use to request a statement of his account. The representative from Abilene social security office who will be in Coleman on Tuesday, March 28, at 1:00 p. m. at the Department of Public Welfare office, will be glad to furnish these post cards

to anyone who wishes one, as well as answer any inquiries about the insurance program.

## Need For Health Education Great

AUSTIN—The more than 2,000 cases of syphilis and 3,000 cases of gonorrhea reported throughout the State since the first of the year signifies the pressing need for continuing public education in matters of venereal disease, State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox believes.

Cox appealed for state-wide participation in making "Better Health for Texas" a year-long program. A "Better Health For Texans Week" was officially designated by Governor Shivers last December.

Cox said the response of the public, the press, radio, motion picture theatres, television, and other agencies and individuals during the campaign was excellent.

But, he said, "the continued success in reducing the incidence of VD requires the full support of all the public."

The veteran of more than 13 years as State Health Officer said his department was continuing an "intensified" campaign against venereal infections through all media of mass education—newspapers, radio, feature releases, and talks to luncheon clubs and civic organizations.

"We've even gone into television to carry our VD warning to

the people," Cox asserted. He said his division of public health education had recently produced a color film and a motion picture trailer which were available for loan to television stations through local health agencies.

He said and organization desiring informational pamphlets, posters, and prepared speeches on the subject of venereal diseases could get them by writing to the State Department of Health in Austin.
