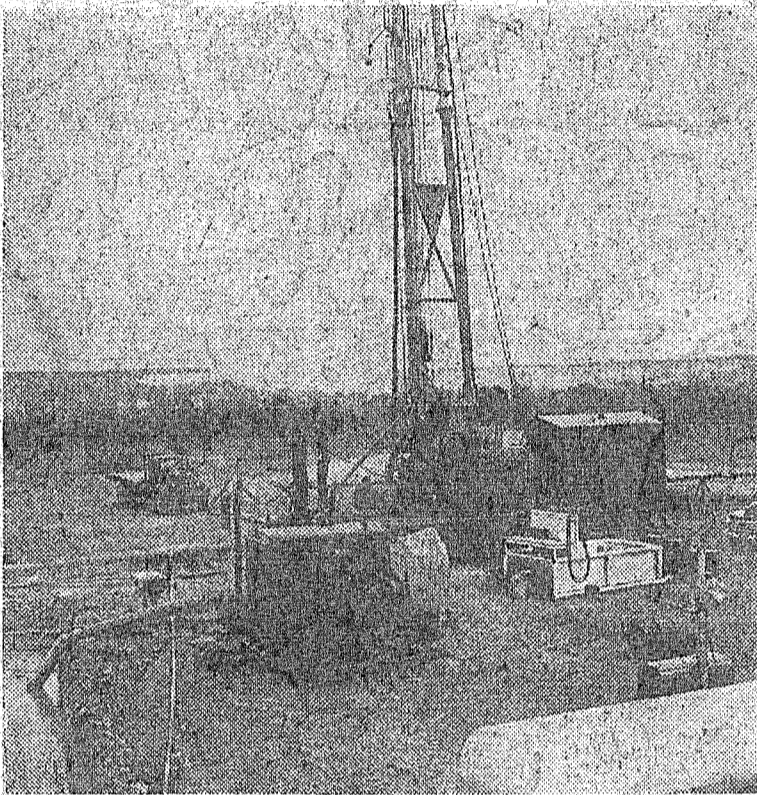

The Fred Pool - Copeland Well No. 1



The Fred Pool-Copeland No. 1, located 330 feet south of the City Limits and 330 feet west of Jefferson Street, on the Glen Copeland land, was drilled into the Brinike Sand Saturday morning at 1782 feet. A core was taken to 1800 feet, and a good saturation was shown for the 18 feet. Drilling was stopped to set pipe and the well is expected to be completed the latter part of this week.

In the picture you can get a good idea as to the location of the well. The Santa Anna Mountains can be seen in the background. This well has caused considerable interest to be shown with the leasing of land and royalty purchases. The well is located due south of the Santa Anna High School property.

The Ross Smith-Elgean Shield on the Kingsberry land hit the top of the Marble Falls at 2185 feet, and were drilling Sunday night at 2205 feet with considerably more than 1/4 million feet of gas per day.

Reserve Officers Being Considered For Active Duty

Air Force Reserve and National Guard Officers on inactive duty will be considered for recall to three years active duty if they meet any one of the following requirements:

If under thirty years of age as of July 1st and with a college degree.

Prior service officers with less than three years of active duty must have an efficiency rating of excellent or better for the last twelve months they were on active duty.

Prior service officers with more than three years active duty must have an average efficiency rating of forty or more if of company grade, or forty-three or more if of field grade, for the last three years they were on active duty.

Rated pilots who meet any of these requirements who desire a recall on flying status must be currently proficient in flying or have the ability to become so quickly. Pilots without flying training during the last two years must meet a Flying Evaluation Board.

Interested Air Force Reserves and National Guard Officers who meet these requirements should contact Headquarters Twelfth Air Force, Brooks Air Force Base, Texas and request application forms.

Firemen Complete Training School Monday Night

Monday night the Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department completed a 7-night training course, under the direction of L. O. Bynum, of Texas A & M Extension Service. This is a short course teaching firemen new and modern methods of fire fighting.

Through the Extension Service of A & M, this course is being carried to the firemen, instead of them going to the college for the course, as has been the custom in the past.

Of the 24 members of the Santa Anna Fire Department, and average attendance for the entire course was 16. Fire Chief C. W. Stephenson is proud of the results of the short course and the attendance of the firemen.

Bynum is considered as one of the best fire fighting instructors in the state, and he teaches in a manner that all the firemen will understand just what he is attempting to put over.

During the course the firemen studied Causes or Origins of Fires, Hose Laying and Hook-up, Theory of Pump Operation, Pump Hook-up from Hydrant to Truck, Organized Drills and Training of Firemen.



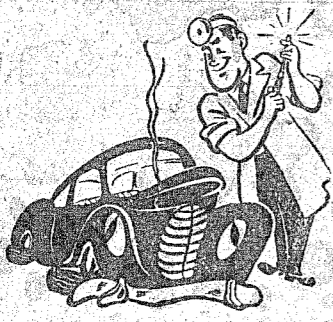

From where I sit, it's not the American way to regulate your life by a horn—any more than it's right to criticize my caring for a temperate glass of beer now and then. Think what you wish, say what you wish, but don't ask your neighbor to do exactly as you do!

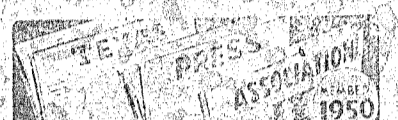

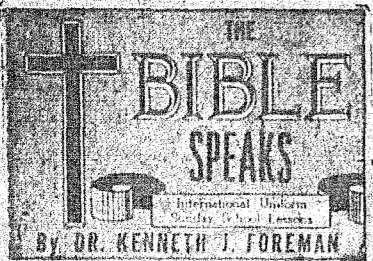

Trial and Triumph

Lesson for April 2, 1950

IF YOU HAD BEEN on the top of the city wall on that first Palm Sunday, watching the crowds pouring into Jerusalem, and some one had told you that all the shouting was for Jesus of Nazareth, you would certainly have thought that his success was assured. Here, surely, was a Man who had triumphed!

But before the week was out you would have seen this same Jesus on trial for his life, and not a voice raised in his defense. The same day that he had triumphed in Jerusalem, he was on trial for his life in the Jerusalem Temple. He was on trial for his life on Friday morning, "Crucifixion Day."

Flowery Beds or Bloody Seas?

There is a popular notion floating around to the effect that God gives good people an easy time. It is not always just that way. But when a man who has been good for things he has, or has tried to be, runs into trouble, he asks right away, "Why must this happen to me?" The truth of the matter is better expressed in the lines of an old hymn:

"Must I be carried to the skies On flowery beds of ease, Whilst others fought to win the prize, Or sailed through bloody seas?"

Jesus was incomparably the best who ever lived; yet his moments of popularity were short, and he was finally tortured and killed by the leaders of church and state, amid the jeering approval of masses of the people.

He himself said that any follower of his must be willing to take up his own cross. In this world, you will have tribulation, he said to his disciples.

All Tyrants Hate the Church

THE MORE GENUINELY Christian the church is, the more it is likely to run into opposition. There are several reasons for this. First, the church stands for God and the morality and justice of the world, and even the churches that go with the world are persecuted by it. But why? Is the world so "godless" that it hates the church? Or is the church so "godless" that it hates the world? The answer is in every spirit that breathes that would go forward in peace, righteousness, and love. The church and the world do not hate each other because of the Christian faith; indeed they despise it as a weakness.

But the church, when it is a true church, stands up for humanity even when it has to stand against profits; and the man for whom profit is the first law of life never understands the attitude of the church. Then the church (when it is a real one) always stands for the people against the tyrant, whoever and wherever he may be, even when he is in some church himself.

And consequently all tyrants hate the church. The Roman emperors hated it and persecuted it till they found they could use it (which, by the way, was a bad day for the church). Mohammed, a tyrant of sorts, hated the Christian church and would have totally destroyed it if he could.

Victory—When?

"IF WE SUFFER with him we shall also reign with him," said St. Paul. But when and how? The end of the church's struggles could come in either of two ways. One way would be for the church to give up struggling against the world. Let the church become a club for the sociable, let the church raise no voice of protest against injustice in society, against untruth, violence and greed; let the church give in to the world, in short, and she will have no further trouble from the world.

But in that case she would be dead. Another way in for the church finally to overcome the

State Job Openings Announced

Competitive examinations for positions with the Texas Employment Commission and the State Department of Public Welfare will be given on May 6 by the Merit System Council. Chas. S. Gardiner, director, announced in a statement released March 25.

Stenographers are needed in every part of the state, Gardiner declared. Clerk-Typists, Field Workers, Interviewers, and Clerks are needed primarily in the smaller cities and towns throughout the state.

Key Punch Operators and Tabulating Machine Operators are needed to work in Austin.

Qualifications for these positions vary from high school graduation to college graduation. Appropriate experience may be substituted for education in many cases. The positions of Key Punch Operator and Tabulating Machine Operator require training in the use of these machines.

Gardiner stated that these examinations present to people an opportunity for employment with the state under the most favorable conditions. Work under the merit rule, he pointed out, leads to permanent employment, with good salary, promotional possibilities, liberal vacation and sick leave, and retirement benefits.

Gardiner said that official application blanks can be obtained from the local office of the Texas Employment Commission or the State Department of Public Welfare, or by writing the Merit System Council, 1000 San Antonio Street, Austin, Texas. Applications must be postmarked before midnight, April 15.

Home Economist Organizes Garden Committee In Co.

Pre-historic Remains Of Elephant Studied

Denton, Texas. Remains of a pre-historic elephant, believed buried by a glacier 20,000 years ago, are being uncovered by North Texas State College geographers near Denton.

Students working under direction of Dr. Walter Hansen of the geography department have already uncovered a five-foot tusk and a large pelvic bone.

The bones were first discovered by workmen digging in a gravel pit southwest of Denton.

Social Security Benefits Do Not Increase With Tax

Many inquiries have been received from beneficiaries wanting to know if the 50% increase in social security taxes automatically increases their benefit, according to Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the local Social Security Administration office. "The increase in these taxes effective January 1, 1950, has no bearing on the present benefit payments," he says.

"Only an Act of Congress can raise the benefit schedule," Fisher stated. "A bill which passed the House of Representatives last year and is now pending before the Senate proposes many changes. If and when Congress completes any action raising benefit rates according to the present wording of the bill, those now receiving monthly payments would receive increases automatically."

locally. It probably would not even be necessary to call at our office. Fisher pointed out further that what the thirty-five million workers covered by the system and almost three million beneficiaries want to know is how much monthly benefits will be raised. Under the Bill passed by the House of Representatives, retired workers would receive benefits averaging more than 50% above the present scale.

Another change proposed is to

permit an individual receiving benefits to earn as much as \$50 in wages a month without losing his benefit for that month. At present he is permitted to earn up to \$14.99 a month.

The original Social Security Law provided for taxes on wages to be raised every three years until a maximum of 3% each for the employer and employee was reached, but this was deferred by Congress each year until 1950. The present tax increase is de-

signed to help build a reserve sufficient to take care of the ever-growing number of persons over age 65 and the survivors of deceased workers. The rate is scheduled to go up again to 2% on January 1, 1952.
