Mrs. Buck Mitchell stressed the importance of a business center in every home and gave the five essentials of a good bed-

room. She suggested that every bedroom have at least one well equipped clothes closet, and that children should not have to share an adult's closet. Clothes closets should be well ventilated. It is well to leave the closet door open once or twice a week. The closet should be accessible but, inconspicuous. Whether planning a new closet, or remodeling an old one or just re-arranging, you should begin by taking an inventory.

Arranging your clothes closet and practical accessories were given by Mrs. John Pentecost. She suggested two heights may be used in rods for the best advantage for, if all shirts, blouses and other short items are hung on the same rod as evening dresses there is a lot of wasted space. A minimum of accessories is necessary for adequate storage.

Mrs. Marvin Whitley gave some interesting points on Choosing and Hanging Bedroom Pictures. In any room, pictures should be selected according to location, amount of wall space and the height of the ceiling. Many times too many pictures are used—so, if in doubt, take some down. It is smart to use dark frames against light walls and light frames against dark walls. Bright cords and tassels should be used. Pictures should be hung with good picture wire.

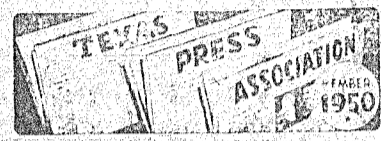

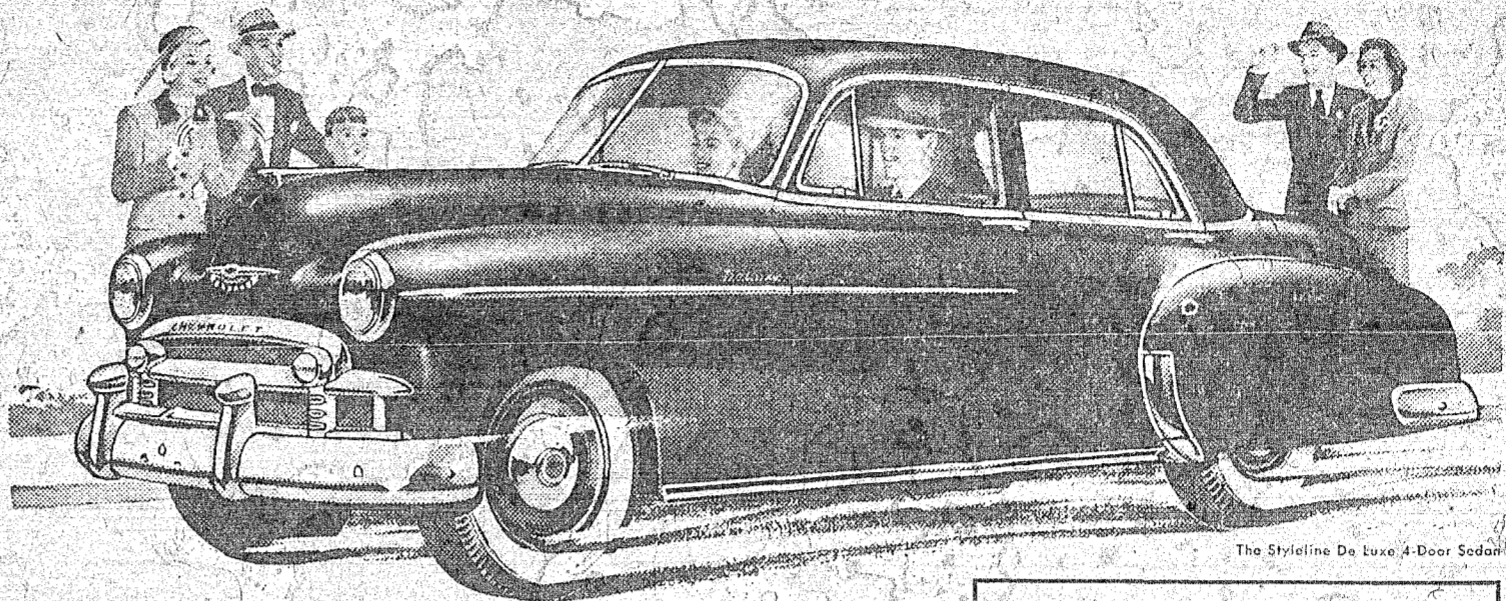

Has The Chickenpox Been Your Way?

AUSTIN, TEXAS.—Has chickenpox come your way? If it has, or if it does come your way in the future, the first thing you should do is to call your physician.

Chickenpox is a common, communicable disease caused by a virus. It occurs most frequently in the winter and spring months, but children, less than 15 years of age, are "the virus is present in the discharge from the mouth and nose, which contain a watery fluid."

Chickenpox is very contagious and is probably spread by direct contact with the patient. Chickenpox begins from 11 to 14 to 21 days after exposure with a feverishness and loss of appetite. Within about 24 hours, the skin breaks out in small raised, rose-pink spots which change into blisters. The blisters quickly become crusted with scabs which eventually fall off. The scabs are not contagious. Each crop completes its course from two to four days.

Scratching or picking at the blisters may cause serious disfiguring scars. The doctor will probably suggest a remedy to relieve the itching, which may be severe. Usually the child is not very ill and begins to feel better in from one to three days.

Warning—Chickenpox is an entirely different disease from

smallpox. Smallpox, a person has not been vaccinated and smallpox is highly contagious and for chickenpox you can have the early symptoms, but you should not mistake smallpox for chickenpox. A physician should be called if you have a rash which starts on the face and spreads to other parts of the body. At the first sign of the appearance of chickenpox, call your physician so that an early and positive diagnosis can be made.

If the disease has been diagnosed as chickenpox, you should be kept away from children, less than 15 years of age, and other members of the family and other contacts. The virus is present in the discharge from the mouth and nose, which contain a watery fluid.

Careful reading of the story too often brings out the fact that the boys had been visiting a night-spot or two before the crash. Survivors will tell the police they couldn't have been drunk, they had only had a few beers. Well, you don't have to be drunk to let a car get out from your control. This writer personally has observed a driver who had had exactly one beer run a car right off the pavement in broad sunlight.

Gets Monotonous, Doesn't It?

A SEX CRIME is committed by a middle-aged man who stabs tears over it afterward and can hardly remember anything about it. "I never would have done it if I had been sober," he says. . . . A girl is found murdered in a men's rooming-house, a nice girl too. Nobody was drunk—they had only been taking a few drinks. . . . A 27-year-old woman was shot and killed during an argument with her sister-in-law. The shooting, it was claimed, was accidental. They had been having some friendly beers in a near-by tavern "for a couple of hours" before the shooting. . . . After they got home, there was an argument. One woman got her husband's revolver out to scare the other woman, and the first thing she knew she was being arrested for murder. Her husband told the police that when, sober, his wife was "deathly scared" of guns.

Beer, the brewers' ads tell us, is the friendly drink, it is the drink of moderation. Beer, belongs. If, does, indeed, but where? Possibly, that unfortunate killer would not have believed what the ads told her.

The Truth About Liquor

WELL, this could be strung out to the length of several columns, without half trying. The above items are not from some chamber of horrors conducted by the W.C.T.U., not from a sermon by some Anti-Saloon league preacher, but gathered from newspaper items from a few days' papers in a city which certainly is not prejudiced against liquor.

The truth about liquor can never be learned from the advertising pages, it can be better learned from the news columns. IT IS NOT TRUE that if liquor were totally abolished from the earth, all the troubles of mankind would vanish. Man has too much meanness in him. A sober scoundrel is one of the worst. But it is true that liquor lends itself all too easily to all sorts of troubles, all sorts of sins. When Amos thunders against the evils of his time, drunkenness in one of the sins prominent on his list. Remember that in Amos' time there was no whisky, no brandy, no distilled liquors, only

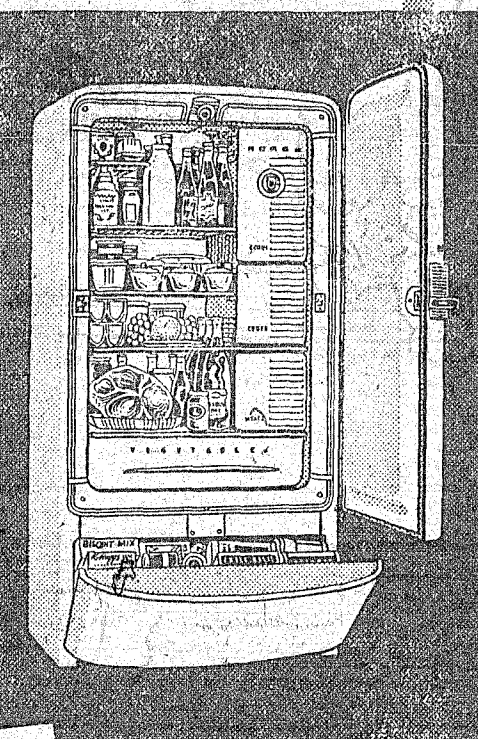

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Our WASHINGTON Letter

Thousands of visitors thronged the streets of Washington last week during the annual Cherry Blossom Festival which coincided with Easter this year. The corridors of the capitol were crowded with parties of school children and other sight-seers from nearby states who took advantage of the holiday to visit Washington. It is too bad that Texas is so far away that our school children cannot readily visit their nation's capitol to view the many historic sights that should be a part of every youngster's education.

The House is in the midst of its annual ten day Easter recess which enables members to visit

constituents at home or catch up on back work. The Senate is back in session after a four day layoff in an effort to catch up with the House since its rules of procedure make progress somewhat slower than in the lower chamber.

MOHAIR

Last year the Department of Agriculture and the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association undertook a project to promote the use of mohair. The Department furnished \$20,000 and \$10,000 was raised by contributions from members of the Association to hire a private contractor to carry out the research and service work of the project.

The contractor has conducted extensive interviews among manufacturers, wholesalers and retailers to determine the changes in style, technological processes, and alternative raw materials which has resulted in the decrease demand for mohair. Textile engineering laboratories are being employed to develop fabrics made of mohair combined with other fibers such as cotton and synthetic staples. Prospective uses of mohair are being investigated for such products as knitting yarns, furniture coverings, clothing, draperies, carpets, auto seat upholstery, and many others.
