## Santa Anna Lions Celebrate 25th Anniversary Tuesday Night At Gym

The Santa Anna Lions Club celebrated their 25th Anniversary, with a Ladies Night program, at the High School Gymnasium, Tuesday night. Present were 153 members and guests.

Principal speaker for the evening was R. E. Price, governor of District 2A, of San Antonio, who substituted for Herbert C. Petry, Jr., of Carrizo Springs, First Vice-president of Lions International. Petry was absent because of illness.

## Let's Clean Up New Crop Of Flies

AUSTIN.—"Go in and out the window" is a line from a children's game which thousands of little youngsters have played for years. It may be used to describe something else, too, for FLIES like to go in and out windows. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer reports that fly infestation will be heavy this year. So now is the time to kill those early flies—before they have a chance to produce thousands more during the summer.

These pests love to buzz around in uncovered garbage pails, stables, old privies, and in homes around uncovered food. Do you have a metal garbage pail with a tight-fitting lid? Are screens on your windows and doors in good repair? Waste should be removed from stables often, for horse manure is one of the chief breeding places for flies. Children can help to keep flies out of the house by keeping screen doors closed, and swatting the flies that enter the house.

Flies carry germs on their fast-moving wings, in their tube-like mouths, and on their furry legs and feet. What are some of the diseases they spread? Typhoid fever, dysentery, and tuberculosis are spread by these insects who feed on germ-laden filth.

Clean-up campaigns, screening, and spraying with insecticides are the best methods for getting rid of flies. Special care should be used in the use of DDT, or other insecticides, directions should be followed carefully. Let's clean up on the new crop of flies to protect the health of our families.

## Deposits At Bank Show Decrease

In the report of the condition of the Santa Anna National Bank, published this week, in response to a call by the Comptroller of the Currency, the bank shows a decrease of \$10,029.16 since the first of 1950. The bank also shows a decrease in Loans and Discounts of \$15,079.66, and a decrease on overdrafts of \$1,333.13.

Capital stock of the Bank is \$50,000.00, with surplus being \$90,000.00. The total resources of the Bank amount to \$1,331,273.17.

Dr. W. F. Benson took over the operation of the Sealy Hospital Monday of this week. Dr. Benson comes to Santa Anna from the Medical Arts Clinic at Brownwood. He plans to move to Santa Anna this week.

The Sealy Hospital will be operated as an open staff hospital. Doctors of the community and surrounding area will be welcomed here with both surgical and medical patients. Other doctors from Brownwood will also be on call to the Santa Anna Hospital. Patients here will receive the same service they would get in the Brownwood hospital.

The present operation of the hospital will use 15 beds, with the capacity to be increased if and when necessary.

The hospital is well equipped and the staff will be able to do all types of work in X-ray, laboratory, diathermy and electrocardiograph services, with equipment being operated by qualified personnel. The hospital also contains an "iron lung," that was put there through the efforts of Santa Anna business men about 12 years ago.

Dr. Benson graduated from Gainesville High School in 1935, took per-medical study in Texas A. & M. in 1936-37. He received his BS degree from North Texas State College at Denton and received his M. D. from the University of Tennessee at Memphis after which he interned at Jefferson Davis Hospital, Houston. He did postgraduate work in pediatrics at Baylor University, in tumors at the University of Texas Medical School and special work in Surgery at the University of Chicago.

Dr. Benson served as a Navy surgeon from 1943-46 with the amphibious forces in the South Pacific, including service in the Iwo Jima and Okinawa invasions. Afterward he was a base medical officer at Camp Wallace near Houston, and went to Brady four years ago on the staff of the Brady Medical and Surgical Hospital. He went to Brownwood recently after having served as president of the Medical Society for Kimble, Menard, Mason and McCullough counties. He is a member of the American Academy of General Practitioners, is married, and has a five-year old son, Bill.

The hospital is now in the process of being painted and being made as modern as possible. Plans are to beautify the outside of the hospital and it will be painted inside and out, with light pastel colors being used in the rooms and hallways.

**Tragedy to Truth**

Lesson for May 7, 1950

**G**OOD PREACHERS are not all of one kind. In listening to some of them, you have the impression that what the man says would be just as true if the man said it; that he is uttering a universal truth that might as well have been written in the sky; he is a voice, only a voice. In listening to other good preachers you have the impression that no other man could have said this as well as he; what he says is distilled from his own experience; he is not only a voice, he is a heart, and you hear the man's heart beat all through his words. Now Hosea was this kind of prophet. You might say that his experience was the text of all his sermons.

**And so They Were Married**

**T**HE STORY of Hosea is in chapters 1-3. (Experts in Old Testament study have never quite agreed as to the meaning of the story. However, the interpretation which is offered here is the one now held by the majority of scholars.) It is the story of Hosea's marriage to a girl named Gomer. If it was a normal marriage, he loved her with all his heart, and his hope for the future were as bright as any young bridegroom's could be. In time they had a little boy named Jezreel.

Then came the second child, a girl named Lo-Ruhamah. In Hebrew that name means "No Mercy." What a name for a little girl! But is it possible that Hosea named her for her mother—not for her mother's name but for her mother's character? At all events, things were not well in that home; indeed, it soon ceased to be a home. For when the third child was born, Hosea gave the boy the dreadful name of Lo-Ami, No-Child-of-Mine.

There was no use in pretending any more. The home had collapsed; happiness had fled. No experience a man can have is more bitter than this, to know that the one great love of his life has been given to the wrong woman. But Gomer vanished leaving Hosea, as such a woman would, to care for the three fatherless children.

**Home Again**

**H**OW MANY MONTHS of years later it is not known, but one day, in the slave market, Hosea saw a woman for sale. The price was low (as slaves went in those days); evidently few buyers were expected. A half-price slave would not attract attention from most men, but Hosea looked twice. Yes, it was his Gomer! Where she had been, who had abused her, made her a slave, how many times she had been sold and resold, no one knows. But there she was. Hosea might easily have stood and laughed bitterly in her bedraggled face. It serves her right, he might have thought. The way of the transgressor is hard, she made her bed and now she can lie in it. Justice has been done, I am avenged. And with a parting curse, he might have gone his way.

Somehow beneath all the shame and disillusionment, beneath the bitterness and the pain, still the old love was burning bright. Paying the small price asked, he took Gomer home again. Love had conquered evil.

Long before Christianity, Hosea did that rarely Christian thing, he did good to one who had done him harm. Gomer was unloving, unlovable; yet he loved her in spite of all.

**Sermons From the Heart**

**T**HIS BITTER EXPERIENCE God turned into a blessing, for Hosea and for his nation and for us. In our study next week we shall see more of what God taught Hosea through these experiences.

But the first thing Hosea learned was that the experience was a lesson, God's lesson. He could even look back on the tragedy of his marriage and see that God was leading him all along, from the very first. God knew what sort of woman
