Santa Anna Oil News

The Great Expectation Oil Company on the E. M. Neill land, Well No. 2, J. M. Rine No. 629 survey, 1450 ft. from the S line and 2075 ft. from the E line of survey, located 5 1/2 miles east, north-east of the town of Santa Anna, was swabbing and they estimate 65 barrels of oil per day from pay zone, 2280 ft. to 2318 ft., after acidizing with 5000 gals. of acid.

The Cressen Oil Company, on the L. Weaver land, A. Gabel survey No. 271, 330 ft. from the S and 150 from the W line, on the 75 acres tract. It will be a 1900 ft. cable tool wildcat. They moved in and started drilling 5-15-50 with a standard rig.

The United North and South has moved a rig in on the Shield Ranch, sec. 3, of the G. H. & H. survey, 3 1/2 miles west of the town of Santa Anna. This is a farm-out from the Intercoast Petroleum Corp.

A drilling rig was moved in Tuesday for another townsite well. Shield, Quinlan and Light-foot are the operators. The first well will be drilled on the J. Y. Brannon land, in the center of block 31, K & G addition to the town of Santa Anna. The same operators have secured drilling permits to drill on the Vanderford land in block 30 and on the Kemp land, block 29. If these wells are good, the citizens of Santa Anna may look forward to many more wells in the city limits. All of the above mentioned are located directly south of the High School.

Cap Norton is drilling what appears to be 660 ft. west, an off set of the discovery well, at about 400 ft. This well is on the Copeland land, south of the town of Santa Anna.

Notice Of City Ordinance No. 164

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE DRILLING, COMPLETION AND OPERATIONS OF OIL AND GAS WELLS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLIC SAFETY IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

A SUMMARY OF SAID ORDINANCE BEING AS FOLLOWS, TO-WIT:

Section 3: It shall be unlawful to drill or commence a well without a permit and no permit shall be issued to drill unless the block contains at least 5 acres of land.

Section 4: No well shall be drilled within any street or alley.

Section 5: If application is made for a permit to drill on a drilling block, in which the applicant does not own or hold valid oil and gas lease or leases on all the acreage contained in such drilling block, such permit shall be issued only upon following conditions:

(a) If no contract or agreement is made with owners of other lots or tracts within the drilling block not owned by applicant nor under oil and gas lease to him, such owner or owners shall by written notice, elect to have the interest treated as a working interest or royalty interest, provided if no election is made within 30 days after issuance of permit, the same shall automatically be treated as a 1/8 royalty interest payable in proportion to the actual acreage in the block.

Section 6: If application made to drill on same block by more than one applicant permit shall be granted applicant having most acreage under lease or control.

Section 7: Applicant for permit must deposit with City Clerk \$200.00 cash as a fee to the City.

Section 8: Notice of application and date of hearing same to be published in local newspaper.

Section 13: Provides a penalty for violations of \$100.00 per day and each day of such violation considered a separate offense.

Section 15: This ordinance effective on and after its publication.

Ordinance No. 163

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A SEPARATE WATER METER FOR EACH HOUSE OR OTHER BUILDING OCCUPIED AND USED AS A DWELLING HOUSE OR PLACE OF BUSINESS FIXING A PENALTY AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS

Section 1: After the effective date of this ordinance each separate building or house separately used and occupied by a consumer of water in the City Limits of Santa Anna, Texas, must have a separate meter for each such house or building, provided that where a residence of other building is not in reach of a water main or service pipe owned by the City, arrangement may be made at the option of the City to secure water from another user of City water under such rules and for such charges as the City shall deem reasonable, but in any such event a minimum monthly charge shall be made by the City and paid by the person in whose name the water meter stands.

Section 2: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to make or permit to be made any connections with the main or service pipes of the city water work system or to turn on or use the water of said system without first obtaining a permit there for, from the City water department.

Section 3: This ordinance shall be cumulative and supplementary of other ordinance pertaining to furnishing of water by the City.

Section 4: The City shall discontinue water service to any person, firm or corporation failing and refusing after notice to comply with the terms of this ordinance.

Section 5: Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine in any sum not exceeding \$100.00.

Section 6: The fact that the City of Santa Anna is experiencing a water shortage and several houses are being served from one water meter without paying the property minimum charge therefore constitutes an emergency and the reading of this ordinance at three separate meetings be and the same is here suspended.

Passed and entered by unanimous vote of the Commissioners this the 4th day of May, 1950.

Featherston Farm & Ranch Top Corriedale Breeder

Editor's Note: The Santa Anna News is this week beginning a series of articles about the lives of our rural population. With the cooperation of the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, W. F. Barthes, we hope to carry at least one article a week featuring one of the farm families in this trade territory. This week we salute Mr. John

Featherston and his sister and partner, Miss Lou Featherston, of the Trickham community. Watch the paper each week for stories about our friends and neighbors in our rural sections.

About ten years ago, Mr. John Featherston and his sister, Miss Lou Featherston, decided to go into registered Corriedale sheep business. They started out with seven ewes. Since that time they have increased their number until now they have over 250 head of registered lambs and ewes. For the first six years the Featherstons ran some other breeds but for the last four years they have run only the finest Corriedale sheep. The Featherston Farm and Ranch is now one of the top three breeders in number of Registered Corriedale sheep in Texas.

Mr. Featherston has been attending a number of shows all over Texas looking for the kind of sheep he wants to carry. The Gatesville show last week produced just the ram he was looking for. The ram pictured above placed first at the Fort Worth Livestock Exposition, the Houston Exposition, the San Antonio show, the San Angelo show and the Gatesville Show. He was 2 years old in January. He was bred and raised by H. C. Nolke of Sheffield and San Angelo, Texas. Nolke has long been one of the top Corriedale breeders of Texas and is well known throughout the southwest.

The Featherstons live on the old Featherston Ranch, 12 miles south of Santa Anna. Both were born in the ranch home they now live in. During the course of years, Mr. Featherston has spent about 15 years working in oil fields and Miss Lou taught in a number of schools in central and west Texas. Ten years ago, they decided to go in partnership and purchase the old home place.

When we visited the ranch Saturday afternoon, Miss Lou had her working clothes on, and did not want to get in the picture. Mr. Featherston gives her the larger part of the credit for the progress they have made over the period of years. She is the bookkeeper and record keeper for all the 250 head they now run.

Both give freely of their time in the civic affairs of their community. Very seldom that some civic improvement is started but what they both are given important jobs to take care of. Miss Lou is now serving as the secretary-treasurer of the Trickham Cemetery Association, and has seen to it that the cemetery has been made one of the most beautiful in Central Texas. Mr. Featherston served on the Featherston School Board for several years and when it was consolidated with the Trickham school, he also served as a board member. He serves as the Precinct Chairman, has served with the AAA and other farm programs.

God Has a Plan

Lesson for May 28, 1950

GOD HANDS DOWN no blue-prints. He never yet has been willing to save any man the trouble of thinking. The Bible is God's guidebook, and in it is revealed God's will. But it is not a gene-book of such a sort that you can take it from the shelf and look up in it the answer to every one of your problems in detail. Nevertheless the Bible is a guide to the inflexible rule of faith and practice, as some churches express it.

God's will is shown there plainly enough so that we can know whether we are building on the "right foundation" or not.

Sins Into The Sea

NOW THE PLAN of God is so simple that it is, it can be so simply expressed, that one is almost tempted to say, "Oh, that!" as if it were something we knew already. Well, we do know it. But the thing is, we don't do it.

Part of God's plan for mankind, a very important part, in fact indispensable—something the Bible talks about from the beginning to end—is this: The forgiveness and the destruction of sins. (Micah 7:18-20.) Now everybody can see others' sins.

The Romans used to say that every man carries others' sins in a bag in front of him where he can see them very well, but his own sins he carries in a bag hanging down his back where he cannot see them.

We are all in favor of other people's forsaking their sins. But how about you? The world does need to confess its sin, but you need to confess your own. No sins walk by themselves; sins exist only in sinners. Sin does not commit itself. Sin is something a sinner does. We shall never get rid of sins by exhorting other people. We get rid of them by repenting in the presence of God and receiving his forgiveness.

It is always so easy to think: If we only had a good society we could have better people. That is backing into an idea the wrong way. The right idea is: If we have better people we shall be on the way to the good society.

If Not Peace, Then What?

WHEN ALSO I KNOW something about God's plan for society at large, the Bible does not leave us in the dark. One thing that Micah brings out is the ideal of peace. (Micah 4:1-5.)

So long as we are making war, preparing for and expecting war, doing or saying things that make war inevitable or even likely, we are out of line with the will of God. Conversely, whatever we do to foster peace is in line with the plan of God. War was bad enough in the days of Micah; it is incalculably worse today.

War always was the effect and cause of hate, it always brought suffering and death, war seldom settled anything. But this is the atomic age. Dean Rusk of the U.S. state department has said that in all present-day discussions we have to remember one solemn fact: The human race now has in its hands the means of its own total destruction.

Any war nowadays is a war against the whole human race, for any large-scale war with atomic weapons may well make the entire globe uninhabitable by man. A voice for war is a voice for universal death.

Christ The King

SINLESS MAN in a warless world: such is God's plan. Is this possible? Only on one condition; that Christ shall be king. (Micah 5:2-4.) This has two meanings, one far-off, and one near; one complete and one partial. The far-off, completed meaning (which may be nearer than we think) is that after the history of this planet is over and done with, in the "new heavens and the new earth" the final destiny of God's people is to live under the Lord Christ as leader and king.

The nearer, here - and - now meaning of Christ's kingship is

Now that your birds are getting outside, give them the best possible range care. If possible, avoid using last year's range. Change it to prevent disease. Provide plenty of shade, and move feeders and waterers once each day. And keep range clean.

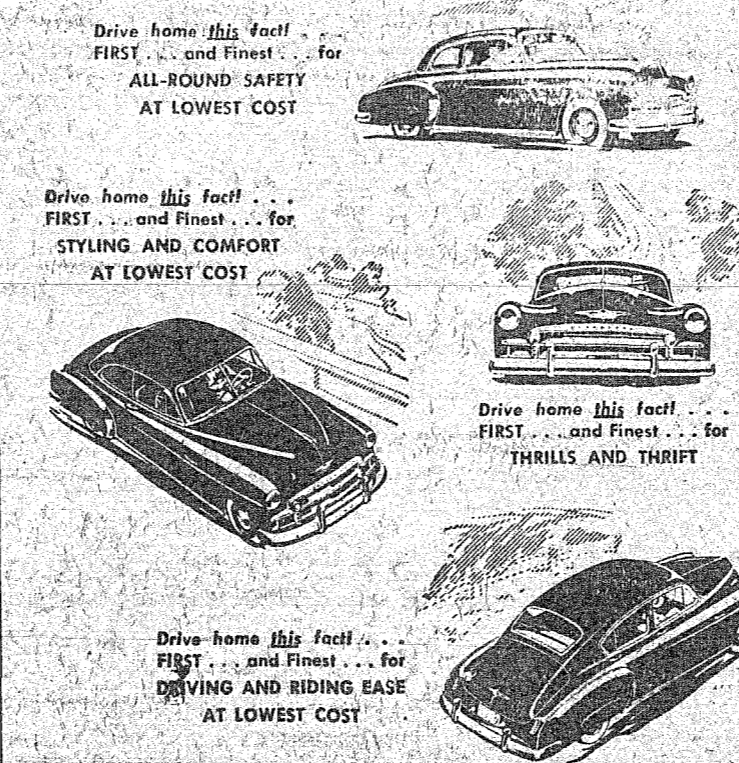

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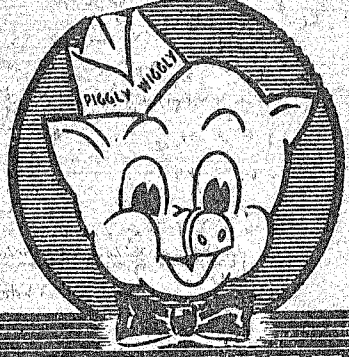
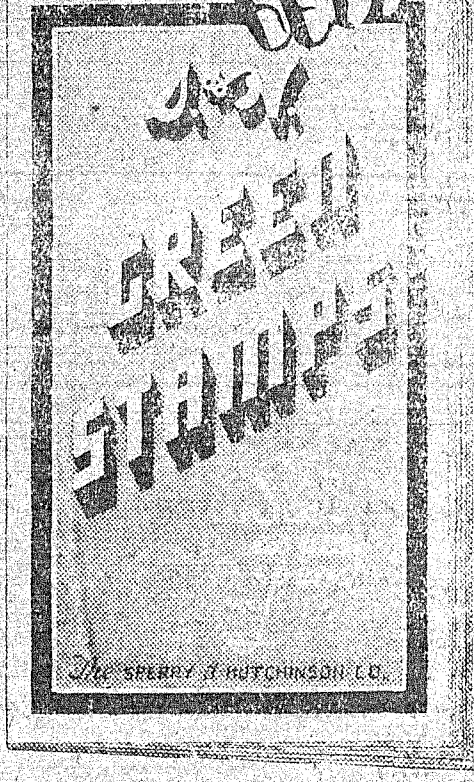
