## Santa Anna Oil News

The F. C. Glass and Norton, Well No. 1, 530 ft. west of the discovery well in the Santa Anna townsite, took a 21 ft. saturated core out of the Breake Sand Monday night and the geologist estimated the well to be from 300 to 500 barrels of oil per day. The first core from 1779 ft. to 1789 ft., to 12 ft deeper, showed about 2 1/2 ft. of stray saturation in the center of the core. The second core, beginning at 1796 ft. had the best saturation of about 21 ft. This has already caused a very energetic lease play. The Greater Expectations Oil Co., on the Hickman land, 4 miles NE of the City of Santa Anna, was drilling Monday, at a round 1205 ft. in the blue shell. Brannon and Murray, on the Abernathy land, Wm. H. King Survey, 155 acre tract and 2 miles south-east of Coleman are drilling at around 375 ft. when this report was brought in Monday.

## Government Asks More Fox Hunting

WASHINGTON—The federal government today called for fox hunting to combat the spread of rabies in the South and Southwest.

The Fish and Wildlife Service reported foxes are becoming more numerous and are spreading rabies widely. Large-scale destruction of foxes combined with mass inoculation of dogs is "an effective method of controlling rabies," the FWS said.

Rabid foxes roam widely beyond the normal range of uninfected animals, infecting other foxes, dogs and farm animals, and thus increase the dangers of human infection.

## Good Rains Fall In Santa Anna Over Week-end

Rains amounting to 2.76 inches fell in Santa Anna Thursday night and Friday. Two inches fell Thursday night.

Hard wind and a little hail accompanied the Thursday night rains. Just what the damage to crops will be is hard to say. Some estimate that the damage is very light and others say it may be heavier than it looks. However, there was some damage to the crops and light damage was noticed in some of the business houses, and a number of homes were damaged by the wind blowing water into the houses.

Most everyone seems to think the good was enough to offset the damage though. Both our city lakes caught some water. Lake Sealy caught 23 inches and the Lake Santa Anna caught 15 inches of water. The farmers who were getting short on stock water caught their tanks full again, and lots of crops other than the small grains ready to be harvested, needed the water.

The Mayor, F. Z. Payne, said he thought we would have enough water now to last us until the pipe line from Lake Brownwood is completed. It all depends upon how long it takes to put the line down, and the amount of water used before the line is completed, but under present usage of the water there will be enough.

The contract to put in the water supply line from Lake Brownwood to our city pump station will be let Monday, June 5, after 2:00 p. m. Bids will be accepted on the project up to that time.

It seems that a number of bids will be given on the project. There are several bidders here each day looking the situation over and taking plans on the line. Between 25 and 30 bids are expected to be received by the time the bidding closes.

All bids will be opened at the City Hall, at a public meeting. Anyone who cares to be welcome to attend the opening of these bids. It is hard to say just how long it will take to award the contract, but it is expected that it will be awarded sometime Monday afternoon or evening. Whoever gets the contract is due to start to work on the project within ten days after the contract is awarded. It now seems that we will have water from Lake Brownwood not later than August first, and maybe sooner.

## Census Shows Santa Anna Has 1590 Population

District Census Supervisor Ralph Trollinger of San Angelo, released the official census count last week, but we failed to get it in time for it to be published in last week's issue of the paper.

The census count shows Santa Anna to have 1590 persons living within the city limits. The overall population of Coleman county is 15,402. It gives the city of Coleman 6,508, Noche, 252, and Talpa, 233.

According to the 1940 census Santa Anna has lost a total of 71 citizens and the county has lost a total of 5,169 citizens. Coleman has gained 454 citizens. This leaves the rural population at 6,319 for the entire county.

Reports were not given for Trickham, when Rockwood, Shield or Goudbusk, other than in the rural population figures.

## Dr. J. Ray Martin To Be In Santa Anna Tuesday, June 6

Dr. J. Ray Martin, of Coleman, will be at the Phillips Drug Store from 3:00 p. m. until 1:00 p. m. Tuesday, June 6, to vaccinate dogs against rabies.

The city has an ordinance stating that all dogs in the City Limits be vaccinated against rabies, before they are issued a license. All dogs in town are supposed to have a license.

Rabies is a sure death unless it is treated immediately after it is contacted. From reports over the state it seems that more and more animals are turning up with it each year. It is one disease that can be completely wiped out if everyone will cooperate and have their dogs vaccinated and dispose of animals that are suspected of having the disease.



**Questioning God**

Lesson for June 3, 1950

**H**ABAKKUK has been called the prophet who dared to ask God questions. If he had not asked these questions he would not have had his answers, so we ought to be thankful for him. If he had merely "blended in" without (so to speak) taking back to God, he himself might never have become a prophet and we might have missed the truth which he was enabled to see. If there had been morning papers in those days, Habakkuk would seldom have read anything good in them. As for local news, it was all scandal. Murders, judges dispensing influence in the courts, good people having a very hard time of it. Abroad, things looked dark. The giant nation of Babylon was on the march westward, and it did not look as if the nation of Judah had what it would take to stop an invasion.

Habakkuk, a deeply sensitive man, could not brush it all off. He could not say, "Oh well, what can you expect?" or "I see the boys are at it again." He could not think of what was going on around him as if it were all a story, a murder-mystery to be enjoyed in an easy chair. He could not say "It is fate" and let it go at that.

He was desperate in his mind about it all. "Under mine eyes out-rage and injury go on," he said (1:3, Moffatt's translation). He dared to ask the question, Why? Why does God permit such things?

**God's Terrible Answer**

**G**OD HAD AN ANSWER for Habakkuk, but it did not satisfy him at first; indeed it disturbed him deeply, for the answer looked worse than the original problem. The essence of it was this: "Habakkuk, God had indeed seen the wicked ways of the nation of Judah, and was going to punish the whole country by defeat in war. He was bringing up against them the Babylonians (Chaldeans), an aggressive, fighting, ruthless nation. Sinner or sinner Babylon and Judah would clash and then—Smash!"

**The Prophet Still Asks Questions**

**H**ABAKKUK'S NEW wave well was what the Babylonians would do, and that they had been doing. But could it be true that God would actually make use of a wicked nation like Babylon's? God was "holier" even than to behold evil? How then could a good God use the cruel violence of godless armies, even for a righteous purpose?

The Babylonians were not God's people—they did not worship him or know him. How could God use his enemies to punish his own people? Does God justify the means by the end? Does God do evil that good may come?

Habakkuk, in short, was troubled by exactly the same kind of questions that have always arisen when men who believe in a righteous God ponder the meaning of the power of evil.

**Faith Comes Through**

**H**ABAKKUK never did get a complete, logical answer to his doubts. What he did get was something more valuable. It was a two-fold answer. First, **WAIT AND SEE.** (2:1-3) The crushing of Judah by Babylon would not be the last chapter of history. God was yet to settle his account with Babylon, and "God does settle all his accounts in October."

The other part of the answer is: **THE JUST SHALL LIVE BY FAITH.** The meaning here (2:4) is that there are two kinds of life, two types of character, two sorts of men. One is the man of pride and unfaith, the other is the man of faith. Unfaith kills, faith makes alive. Unfaith trembles and falls, faith endures.

So it is with men and nations. At that time you might have thought, Babylon will survive, Judah has no chance. But in the light of history, we know it was Babylon that perished, Judah that endured. Godlessness may have terrible power,

The baccalaureate sermon Sunday at 11 a. m. was delivered by Canon Curtis, W. V. Junker, di-


rector of student work at St. Albans College Chapel in Dallas.

Notice Of City Ordinance No. 164

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE DRILLING, COMPLETION AND OPERATIONS OF OIL AND GAS WELLS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLIC SAFETY IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

A SUMMARY OF SAID ORDINANCE BEING AS FOLLOWS, TO-WIT:

Section 3: It shall be unlawful to drill or commence a well without a permit and no permit shall be issued to drill unless the block contains at least .5 acres of land.

Section 4: No well shall be drilled within any street or alley.

Section 5: If application is made for a permit to drill on a drilling block, in which the applicant does not own or hold valid a oil and gas lease or leases on all the acreage contained in such drilling block, such permit shall be issued only upon following conditions:

(a) If no contract or agreement is made with owners of other lots or tracts within the drilling block not owned by applicant nor under oil and gas lease to him, such owner or owners shall by written notice, elect to have the interest treated as a working interest or royalty interest, provided if no election is made within 30 days after issuance of permit, the same shall automatically be treated as a 1/8 royalty in-

terest payable in proportion to the actual acreage in the block.

Section 6: If application made to drill on same block by more than one applicant permit shall be granted applicant having most acreage under lease or control.

Section 7: Applicant for permit must deposit with City Clerk \$200.00 cash as a fee to the City.

Section 8: Notice of application and date of hearing same to be published in local newspaper.

Section 13: Provides a penalty for violations of \$100.00 per day and each day of such violation considered a separate offense.

Section 15: This ordinance effective on and after its publication.

Passed and approved this the 22nd day of May, 1950.
