Old Settler's Day With Ex-Texas Ranger Meeting

An Old Settler's Day is planned for Saturday, June 10, to be held in connection with the annual Ex-Texas Rangers Convention, to be held in Santa Anna Friday and Saturday, June 9 and 10. The meeting will be held in the Ranger Memorial building just east of the city of Santa Anna.

A basket lunch will be served at noon on Saturday and old settlers from all the surrounding areas is being invited to come and bring a basket lunch with them. A good program is being planned for the morning, beginning at 8:30 a. m. This affair is being sponsored jointly by the Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club. 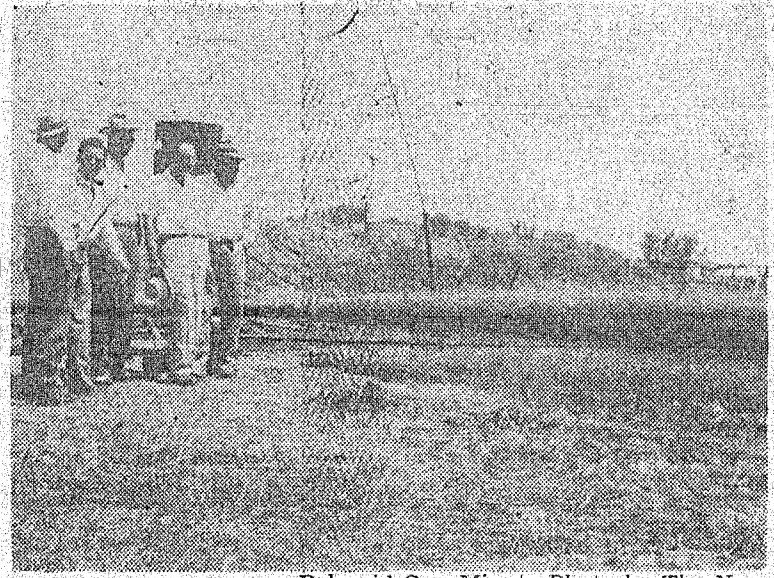

Ringworm Infections

AUSTIN.—It is a 50-50 bet that you have some sort of ringworm infection. Check to see. Chances are it will be in your scalp hair, on your groin, or on your feet—either on the soles or between the toes. If you don't find it, you're lucky, because while it isn't serious, its itching persistence is very annoying.

A fungus—the same one that causes food to mold—causes ringworm. It's one of the world's most common ailments, with authorities estimating that half of the world's population is affected. It is more common this time of the year than any other.

Animals get it too. As a matter of fact, cats, dogs, rabbits, mice, and fowls are frequently the source of infection in man. A child plays with an infected dog, the dog's hair brushes the child, and the child stands an excellent chance of ringworm infection.

The scales which are formed can cause new infection on the body, so an infected person has to be careful to keep it from spreading. Advanced cases exude a clear, runny fluid—it "weeps," as doctors say, and the fluid can cause breaking out on whatever part of the body it touches. Children are especially vulnerable to scalp ringworm. Epidemics are usually started in schools or institutions.

Swimming pools, locker rooms, and gyms are potent sources of infection. Everyone has heard of "athlete's foot." It is nothing more than a type of ringworm. So is the so-called "barber's itch."

Preventive measures call for avoiding persons and animals known to be infected. Swimming pools, gyms, locker rooms, and the like can do their part toward ringworm control by boiling towels, swimming suits and their other public facilities for 30 minutes. Foot baths are also worthwhile.

The best thing to do is to keep clean at all times. But if you happen to get ringworm, or if you have it now, it will be better for all concerned if you report to your family doctor immediately. He'll recommend medication designed to shorten the course and lessen the severity of the infection.

Miss Rhoda Pritchard, daughter of Mrs. M. A. Pritchard of Santa Anna, graduated from the Shannon School of Nursing in San Angelo Tuesday evening, May 30. Miss Pritchard has accepted a position with the Shannon Hospital, and will make her home in San Angelo.

Rhoda entered training in September, 1947, after graduating from the Santa Anna High School in May of that year.

The City Commissioners awarded the contract to lay 46,200 feet of cast iron, asbestos lined, pipe from Lake Brownwood to the Santa Anna filtering plant to Frank Butcher and Company of San Antonio Monday afternoon at 4:30 p. m. The contract called for construction to start by the latter part of this week, and for the project to be completed in 90 calendar days. Mr. Butcher submitted a bid of \$117,233 for the complete project. A total of 26 bids were submitted.

Mr. H. H. Flurry, a representative of the San Antonio company, will move to Santa Anna this week, and will be superintendent in charge of construction. It is expected that the machinery will begin arriving here Thursday of this week.

Mayor F. Z. Payne stated that when Mr. Butcher puts up the proper bond, the \$50,000 tax bond voted in connection with the \$150,000 water revenue bond, will be cancelled. He also stated that the 50 percent increase in valuation would be maintained, but that the tax rate would be reduced from \$1.50 to \$1.00 and everyone's taxes would remain the same as they were last year, excepting those the board of equalization saw fit to raise their taxes before the 50 percent increase was added.

It is expected that the completed project will cost about \$125,000. This will include payment to the consulting engineers, and any additional costs that will arise during the process of getting the project completed. About \$10,000 of the money was used to pay off the old water revenue bond that was due to be paid off in about 4 more years.

The recent rains have put enough water in the city lakes to assure the city of an ample supply of water until the project can be completed. Thus the City of Santa Anna will soon become known as the little city in West Texas with a plentiful supply of good water.

The Commissioners have thought all along that it might be possible to get the water line and pump station completed within the range of the water revenue bond, but thought it best not to take any chances and vote the \$50,000 tax bond to assure enough money to complete the project. The tax bonds have never been sold and it looks now like they will be cancelled out within the next few days. This will enable the city to vote another tax bond some time in the future, when the need arises.

The money left over from the revenue bond will be used to extend water mains and sewer lines. Some of it will be used to put larger mains in some sections of town where the mains are too small to take care of the needs now.

The water wells that were drilled during the drought of 1948 are now being abandoned. The commissioners feel that they have served their purpose and they have a chance to trade some of the motors and pumps for materials to extend some much needed sewer lines. The pipe line from the wells to the lake was taken up last week and a contract has been let to remove the tubing and pumps from the wells. The lease on the land where the wells are located expires in July, and the commissioners are going to let it drop at that time. The pipe will be used where needed here in town.

500 Barrel Discovery On Copeland Land Comes In Sun.

Joe Glenn Copeland has plenty reason to be wearing a big smile. Sunday afternoon a 500 barrel oil well was drilled in on his farm located just south of the city limits of Santa Anna.

The well was drilled by F. D. Glass, Jr., of Austin for Glass, C. U. Norton of Coleman and C. O. Hagen of Edinburg. This is the second well drilled on the Copeland place, with the first well

producing over 8,000,000 cubic feet of gas for a time, but now looks like it will produce about 200 barrels of oil per day. A third well on the Copeland land is expected to reach the Breneke Sand by Wednesday night. It was spudded in Saturday at noon and was drilling below 1200 feet Monday afternoon.

Sunday night the discovery well flowed 220 barrels in a 10

hour test, through the 5-inch casing. The tubing was run Monday afternoon and a Railroad Commission test was expected to be completed Tuesday. Indications are that the well will produce over 500 barrels per day. Total depth of the well is 1816 feet.

The third well on the Copeland land is being drilled by F. D. Glass, Jr., and C. U. Norton.

It is expected that by the end of this week at least eight other wells will be drilled-in or started. At least 15 are expected to be started within the next week or two.

A well located 1,100 feet north of the Copeland well, known as the Shield, Lightfoot and Quintlan No. 1, located on the J. Y. Brannon-Clem Ball property was expected to be drilled in Tuesday

Repentance

Lesson for June 14, 1950

ZEPHANIAH seldom has been any reader's favorite prophet. His pictures of doom are enough to send shudders down any one's spine. It is as if he were describing Judgment day. But the main point of Zephaniah is plain and practical. Repent! For the sake of your own soul and the nation, that is the first necessity of all. Repentance is not merely regretting something one has done. Anybody can do that—and go right on committing the same sin. Furthermore, a man's regret for something he has done may be for a wrong reason.

Suppose an adulterer is sorry for the publicity he got when the newspapers caught up with him? Suppose a lazy farmer is sorry at harvest time that he didn't work harder during the summer? That sort of thing is not repentance at all.

Also, repentance is not just repentance in general. It is one thing to say, "O God, I am a sinner." It is quite another thing, and a harder one, to kneel and say to God: "You know well what a liar I have been."

Repentance is not real unless it is honest, and it is not honest till the repenter looks squarely at his own sins, knows them for real sins and is willing to call them by the ugly names they deserve.

Repentance As The Bible Sees It

THE BIBLE MEANING of repentance is something radical, something life-changing. As the prophets and our Lord set it before us, it means a total change of inner attitude and viewpoint. It does not mean so much stopping something you are doing as it means enjoying something altogether different from what you used to enjoy.

For example, you never truly repent of pride until you are really humble on the inside. You never have fully repented of selfishness so long as your deepest desires come from looking after your own interests. Repentance means a total change of inner attitude and viewpoint. It does not mean so much stopping something you are doing as it means enjoying something altogether different from what you used to enjoy.

The question is: Are you content to be what you are, as you are, or do you sincerely want to be a better, indeed a different person? For that, the grace of God is necessary. For repentance means nothing short of being made over.

Are you aware that by yourself you are doomed to be yourself, your worst self? What is needed is not that you shall make yourself over, what is needed is that you shall pray God to make you over. His grace is not forced on the unwilling. The change may not come all at once, not overnight. Yet surely, and it may be swiftly.

There have been persons whose lives have changed in a single night, in a single moment. There are others whose life transformation has come slowly. But wherever real repentance is, there the Spirit of God has been at work.

Why Repentance Is Needed

ZEPHANIAH POINTS UP the same two reasons for repentance that we find all through the Bible. One reason is the judgment of God; the other is the promise of God. These are two sides of the same thing.

Man does not live in his own universe. He lives in a universe which he could not have created—in a sense he is a guest of it. It is a universe God created in love, and rules in love. Work and live "against the grain" of God's law of love, and you are headed for destruction.

To repent means that you come out new, in the image of God. Not to repent means that you are a breaker of God's laws because you do not like his laws. To repent means that (in the language of the ancient Psalmist) you love the law of God.

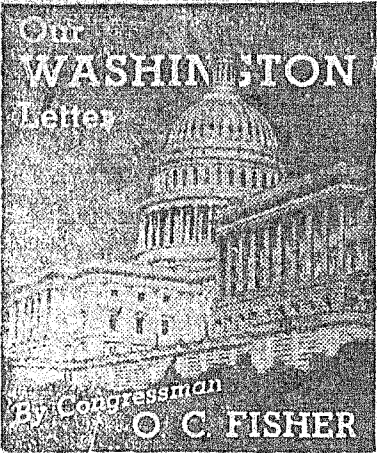
Smith-Doxey Cotton Class Program

"Farmers will follow the same procedures as they did last year in signing up for this program," Matejowsky said.
Under it, he continued, they receive without cost cotton classing and market news from U. S. Department of Agriculture. Any group of farmers organized to promote the improvement of cotton is eligible for these services.
Matejowsky urges all cotton farmers interested in Smith-Doxey benefits to organize community groups immediately and submit applications.

Secretary of Commerce Sawyer started quite an argument in Washington last week when he

fired two prominent employees—reportedly because of loyalty checks. A Senate Committee had threatened a full scale investigation of possible Communist infiltration in the Commerce Department unless these two suspects were released. The Secretary promptly ordered them out. The two involved are Michael J. Lee, Chief of the Department's Far Eastern Division, and William Remington, another Commerce employee. The latter was under attack last year after having been named by Elizabeth Bentley, an ex-Communist, who corroborated Whittaker Chambers in exposing Alger Hiss and other government workers when testifying before congressional committees.

Mrs. Bentley, it will be recalled, was one of the underground couriers a few years back, having delivered secret documents from Communist workers in the government to Soviet agents. She reported that one of her sources of information in that job was Remington. However, he was eventually "cleared" of these charges by the Loyalty Board and was reinstated in his government position. More recently, however, new witnesses have shown up and stated that Remington attended meetings of a CP cell with them in 1936 and 1937 when he worked for the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Some witnesses claimed that one Betty Todd, a former TVA employee, held Communist meetings in her home which were attended by Remington. The other day the Un-American Activities Committee subpoenaed Betty Todd to find out if this was true, but when she appeared before the Committee, she refused to answer questions on the grounds that by doing so she would incriminate herself. The upshot of this refusal to testify was that Betty Todd, an Associate Director of the Columbia Broadcasting System, was promptly fired from her job, and this along with other evidence apparently prompted Secretary Sawyer to give Remington the gate.

The second Commerce employee to be discharged, Michael J. Lee, has refused to quit a law suit may be filed to determine the Secretary's right to fire him. It is interesting to recall a bit of Lee's background. His real name is Leiberman, and he has for some time been Chief of the Commerce Department's Far Eastern Division. In that capacity he had authority to act on export licenses and has been an important figure in dealing with foreign policies. He was born in Manchuria, was reared by a Chinese Communist family, and came to this country about 1935 under the Chinese quota for white persons.

He was denied naturalization papers three times and in 1943 Henry Wallace, then Secretary of Commerce, placed Lee in charge of the Far Eastern Division desk in the Commerce De-

partment. This gave him the opportunity to act on export licenses. It will be recalled that last year, China's Nationalist Military Mission to this country brought from the Cities Service Company, and paid for in American dollars, a large quantity of aviation gasoline. When they called on Lee for an export license, he demanded details regarding ships, planes, and other uses to be made of the gasoline. The effect of this delay was to keep the Chinese generals waiting for months until he obtained considerable data of a military nature which he could then have turned over to the Communists. After doing all that, he denied the export license.

Speaking of Communist infiltration in government, the recently published book "Seeds of Treason" has been acclaimed very widely in Washington as a fairly reliable report on the Alger Hiss-Whittaker Chambers connections and the manner in which the Communists infiltrated and obtained power and influence in the government during the depression years.

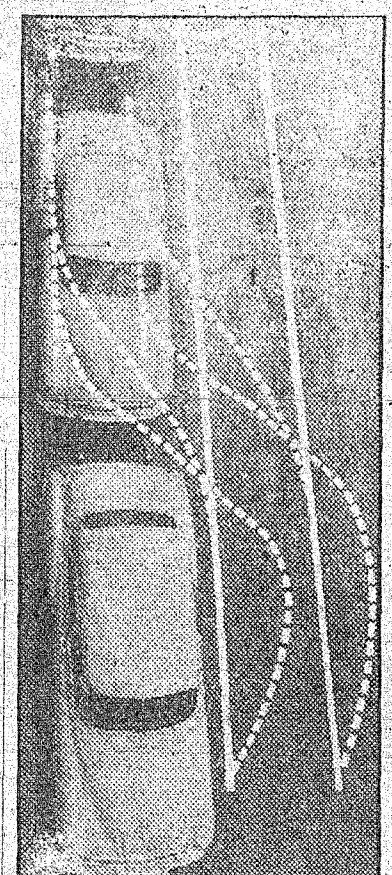

There were 120 or more containers of flowers, representing all that could be expected to be in bloom in this area, at this time of year.



There were a number of tables set for various types of service, with all appointments, properly arranged with beautiful and appropriate flowers, adding decoration.

One unique container, and its history drew much interest and comment. This was a bread tray made of wood, such as our ancestors used to own. Mrs. C. L. Eeds, whose people have owned the tray for 85 years, filled it with cacti blooms. When Sam Houston Williams, uncle of Mrs. Eeds, was mustered out of the Confederate Army at the close of the Civil War, this was the only pay which he received. He walked all the way from Galveston to Bell County, carrying the tray, which is still in splendid condition.
