

supply of water until the project can be completed. Thus, the City of Santa Anna will soon become known as the little city in West Texas with a plentiful supply of good water.

The Commissioners bave thought all along that it might be possible to get the water line land bump station completed within the range of the water revenue bond, but thought it best not to take any chances and vote the \$50,000 tax bond to assure enough money to complete the project. The tax bonds have never been sold and it looks now like they will be cancelled out within the next few days. This will enable the city to vote another tax bond some time in the future, when the need arises: The money left over from the revenue bond will be used to extend water mains and sewer lines. Some of it will be used to put larger mains in some sections of town where the mains are too small to take care of the needs now.


