

A little over 9,000 fet of the pipe line has been completed, with the laying of 1600 fect Tuesday. The working crews have been unable to work two days this week, due to the rainfall.

So far no word has been, reeived on the steel for the pump station, but the construction company is doing all they can do rush up the shipment. It is possible that the construction of the pump station will not get started before the middle of October. However, it is not expected to take very long to get the pump station completed after it is started.
