North Side Baptist Church Organized In Santa Anna

At the close of a week's revival recently, the North Side Baptist Church was organized. Rev. C. L. Carroll, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Itasca, conducted the services of the revival and was later called to pastor the church.

The church organized with twenty-three charter members. Mrs. Payne Henderson was elected Church Clerk, and Mrs. Roy West was elected Treasurer. Rev. H. A. Reeves, and a number of people from the Kickapoo Church, near Bronte, assisted in the organization.

Rev. Carroll was called as a full time pastor and has now accepted the call and will move on the field within the next few days.

Bro. Carroll is Chairman of the Executive Mission Board of the Baptist Missionary of Texas.

The new church voted to affiliate with the Fairland Baptist Association; the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas; and the North American Baptist Association.

Most of those going into this new church were former members of the Pilgrim Rest Baptist Church (Watts Creek), six miles north of Santa Anna. This church, which is inactive at the present, has always worked with the Fairland Baptist Association and the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas.

For an indefinite time the services of the new church will be held in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, located at North 5th St., and Avenue B.

Ira Gallaway Is Named County Judge Saturday

The Coleman County Commissioners' court Saturday appointed Ira Gallaway to serve out the unexpired term of County Judge Leman Brown, who died Tuesday while serving his fourth term in office.

The appointment was effective Saturday.

Gallaway, former administrative assistant to Congressman Homer Thronberry of Austin, was nominated to the position of county judge of Coleman County in the July Democratic Primary and would have taken office Jan. 1, 1951, when Judge Brown's term expired.

An honor graduate of the University of Texas, Gallaway is married and has three children. He is a Coleman County native of the Glen Cove community.

Death Claims Coach Paul Tyson, Saturday

Paul Tyson, 64, one of the most famous coaches in Texas football history, died in a Brownwood hospital at 7:30 p. m. Saturday.

He collapsed with cerebral hemorrhage that morning, while attending a faculty meeting at Daniel Baker College, where he was athletic director, and head football coach.

Funeral services were held in Brownwood Monday morning, and burial was in Waco.

Mr. Tyson was starting his 38 year as a football coach. He was head coach of Waco High School for a number of years and during the 1920's his team won 4 State Championships. He was known in the sports field all over the nation. He returned in 1941, from active duty in Waco, to become a counselor.

He was born October 25, 1885, at Hope, Ark., and came as a boy with his parents to Santa Anna. His father, Marion Tyson, was a widely known business man of Santa Anna for many years.

The deceased had never married.

He is survived by one sister, Mrs. Amboline Tyson Mahaffey, of Sterling City, Texas; two brothers, Everett Tyson, Los Angeles, Calif., and Carlston Tyson of San Francisco, Calif.; also one-half brother and four half sisters, all of California.

Mrs. A. Preston Bailey, of Santa Anna, and Clovis Tyson of Coleman, are cousins of the deceased.

C. E. Eubank Buried From Baptist Church Monday Afternoon

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church Monday, Sept. 11, at 3:00 p. m. for Charles Everett Eubank, 75, who died at his home in Santa Anna on Saturday, at nine a. m., following an illness of several weeks.

521 Students Enrolled In Local Schools

Reports from Supt. R. K. Green indicate that 521 students are enrolled in the local schools as follows: Seniors, 31; Juniors, 27; Sophomores, 43; Freshmen, 53; Eighth grade, 44; Seventh grade, 57; Sixth grade, 43; Fifth grade, 36; Fourth grade, 40; Third grade, 40; Second grade, 53; and First grade, 44.

Last year enrollment in the high school was 147 students and the ward school enrollment was 352. Both schools show a slight increase in enrollment.

According to Mr. Green, the number of teachers a school is entitled to is based in the average daily attendance from the year before. This year our school system would have another teacher, had only one-half of the enrollment year attended school one-half day more than they did. This extra teacher is badly needed in the ward school system, too.

Last year an average of over 30 students a day were absent from their classes. Parents are requested to see that their children are in school every day possible. Everyone realizes that all students cannot have a perfect attendance record, but it is not considered 30 students a day need to be out of school.

Grocery Store Robbery Solved

The burglary of the Ashmore grocery store on Sept. 2 has been solved with the apprehension of three youngsters, one of whom is 15 and the other two 11 years old.

When the store was broken into, about \$10 in nickels and dimes was taken, along with a quantity of soda pop.

The juveniles have been released into the custody of their parents, according to the sheriff's office.
