### In Education • 1876-1951 Our first state college — Texas A. and M. is now in its seventy-fifth year



Governor Richard Coke, first Democrat to hold the Governor's office in Texas after Reconstruction days, was more responsible than any other man for the founding of the A. and M. College of Texas. A well-educated (William & Mary) strong-willed man of vision, he pushed through the Legislature the acts which established the college as a going concern, and served as chairman of the college's first board of directors. In his speech dedicating the new institution, on opening day, October 4, 1876, Richard Coke laid the foundation stone for the educational philosophy on which A. and M. has grown. "The aim and mission of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas," he said, "is, while preparing the young men of Texas for the high duties of American citizenship, at the same time to train their intelligence in the methods and appliances of science, and their hands to the skill which shall utilize them in the everyday pursuits of life... It has been the constant aim of the board to bring down to the lowest possible figure the cost of an education which shall be at the same time thorough, liberal and practical." 
