First Home Game To Be Played On Local Field Friday Night; Tie Last Week

The Santa Anna Mountaineers fought all the bad brakes in the book and a few others, Friday night at Richland Springs, to tie the Coyotes 6 to 6 in the second non-conference game of the season. Billy Joe Parish was also out of the line-up most of the game, due to an injured ankle.

The first quarter of the game was marked with a number of punts on both sides, with each team making one first down. During the second period the Mountaineers had trouble attempting a fourth down punt, and lost the ball on their own 12 yard line. However, they managed to hold the Coyotes to no gain on the ground. The Mountaineers were backed up against their own goal through three unsuccessful attempts of the Coyotes to score. Richland Springs finally managed to connect with a pass from C. W. Rowell to Alvin Locker for 12 yards and the only score they made during the game.

The coyotes were inside the Mountaineer 20-yard line for 20 plays before their score was finally made.

The Mountaineers kicked to the Coyotes to start the third period. Bobby Steward recovered a fumble on the Coyote 35-yard line, and 4 plays later R. D. Hartman carried the ball over from the 2-yard line. The try for extra point failed and this completed the scoring for the night.

During the final period, the Coyotes were threatening again. Billy Joe Parish intercepted a pass on the Mountaineer 2-yard line and carried the ball out to the Coyote 45, before being pulled down from behind by A. D. McNannary. The game ended with Richland Springs in possession of the ball.

This week the Mountaineers take on the Baird Bears on the local field. The game is scheduled to start at 8:00 p. m.

The Bears have played two games this season. One with Gorman two weeks ago ended in a 13-13 tie and last week they were mauled by the Rising Star Wildcats by a score of 52-7. The last time the Mountaineers played the Bears was two years ago, when the Mountaineers won by a close margin of 7-6. The Bears will be out to get revenge for this game.

A check of the weights of the starting line-ups reveals that there is only two pounds difference in the weight of the entire backfields and only ten pounds difference in the weight of the lines. Both teams have had the same number of game experi-

ences this year, so as far as we can determine, they are fairly evenly matched.

The field is in excellent condition, with a good sod in the new topping that was added during the spring. All the local boys are in good shape, except Parish, who may not be able to be in the line-up again this week. The Coach stated that he was getting along fine, but that he was not going to take any chances on playing him, unless he is well by game time.

Officials for the game are: Gus Snodgrass, I. L. Giger and Al Langford, all of the Brownwood Officials Association.

Mrs. Earl Hardy's Father Dies From Accident At Home

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church at Muleshoe at 4:00 p. m. on Thursday, September 21st, for Proctor David Taylor, who was killed in an accident Tuesday afternoon, when his body was caught on the belt of a feed grinder, at his home 4 miles west of Muleshoe.

Mr. Taylor, 67, was preceded in death by his wife two months ago. He is survived by four daughters, including Mrs. Earl Hardy of Santa Anna and also four sons: Those attending the services were Mr. and Mrs. Hardy and Reba and his mother, Mrs. Susie Hardy.

Lt. Joe B. Flores Dies In Japan Of Enemy Wounds

Mrs. May Flores of Bangs received a telegram on Thursday afternoon, September 21, from the War Department, that her son, Lt. Joe B. Flores was wounded on September 14.

She received a letter from him on Friday morning, mailed on September 13.

He wrote: "Have been wounded in right thigh by shell fragment. Am back in Tokyo Army Hospital in Japan. Am bed-ridden, but will be o. k. Have been very lucky to be still alive. Our Lord has protected me all the way." He also stated that he was wounded while attacking the enemy near Shindo or Taegu. He stated further that he may get to come back to the U. S. when he is able to travel, but doesn't know when that will be. He wrote at the close of the short letter that he did not have strength to write more. He was fighting with the First Cavalry Division, which had been joined by an Infantry Division.

Joe Bruton has many friends in Santa Anna, where he was speedily recovered.

Roy Richardson Leaves For New Mexico Bank Sat.

Roy A. Richardson, vice president of the Santa Anna National Bank has resigned to accept a position as cashier of the People's State Bank, Artesia, New Mexico, effective Oct. 1. Mr. and Mrs. Richardson plan to leave Santa Anna Saturday of this week, and he will assume his duties there on Monday.

Both Mr. Richardson and his wife are natives of Coleman County. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. M. A. Richardson of near Rockwood. Roy attended school in the early years of his life at the old Concho Peak School, where he went through the ninth grade. He attended the tenth grade at Rockwood and graduated from the Santa Anna High School in 1923. He attended three years at Southwestern University, terminating his schooling in 1930.

He started his banking career in 1934 with the Santa Anna National Bank as assistant cashier, and held that position until he joined the Air Force in February, 1943. He served three years in Europe in the 8th and 9th Air Forces finance department, and was discharged January 1, 1946, with the rank of Master Sgt.

Richardson then returned to the Santa Anna National Bank as vice president and has held that position since.

The Artesia bank, newly established, is located in a steadily growing city, which is a trade center for rich irrigated farming and oil area.

He has been serving as the president of the local Lions Club since last July.

Supt. Green stated that this was the first time in his 17 years of teaching school that the school where he was had been broken into. He also stated he never leaves anything of much value in the building.

According to the Sheriff's Department the findings seemed to indicate that the ones entering the building might be the same ones that have been robbing school buildings all over this part of the country.

The school at Blanket has been entered several times lately, and was entered again Monday night. Reports indicate that only \$3.50 were taken.

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THE BIBLE SPEAKS By DR. KENNETH J. FOREMAN

SCRIPTURE: Matthew 5:1-20, 18:21-25; Acts 11:19-26; Romans 12:9-21; Philippians 1:27-30; 1 Thessalonians 5:15-22; James 1:22-27

Christian Living Lesson for October 1, 1950

READER, do you have your New Testament handy? Get it down and let us go over a few paragraphs of it together. What we are looking for is an answer to this question: Is there anything special, anything different, noticeable, about the Christian way of life?

Act on the Word

FIRST, look at James 1:22-27. "Be ye doers of the Word," he says, "not hearers only." Moffat's modern-English translation says: "Act on the Word instead of merely listening to it." At the end of this section James offers the only definition of rebellion given in the entire Bible. Note that it is altogether in terms of action, behavior, life both inward and outward.

"Act on the Word"—he means the Word of God, of course. In verse 21 he has already told us the Word is like a seed sown in our lives, a seed expected to give...

Now look at Phil. 1:27-30. If you have the King James version, which is over 300 years old, that word "conversation" in verse 27 will mislead you.

Life of Grace

NOW turn to the story of Barnabas in Acts 11:19-26. Barnabas was commissioned by the mother-church to inspect and report on the new congregation at Antioch. Were they Christians or not? Barnabas saw two things about those people, and he was glad: it was a congregation of believers, and he saw also the grace of God.

Christian living is a life of faith and a life of grace. It is a life lived with God, blessed by the grace of God. Now this is not automatic. It is not something that happens whether we wish it or not.

Observe what Barnabas told those new Christians at Antioch: "Remain faithful to the Lord with steadfast purpose" (v. 23, Revised Standard Version). The Christian life is one of devotion, a life of steady purpose, it is no drifting, sinking life, it sails by the Star of God.

A Day In The Life Of A Texas Senator

A day in the life of a Senator, especially one who has important committee assignments, starts early and ends late. As an example, take the following detailed, factual account of a typical day in the life of Senator Tom Connally of Texas.

The Senator's first stop was the Federal Power Commission, which was holding a hearing on the question of whether or not it should license the Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation District to build three dams on the Brazos in Hood and Palo Pinto Counties. The District maintains this is one of the FPC's business, because the Brazos is not navigable. This is how the Dallas News reported Connally's appearance.

Four commissioners sat dumbfounded as Connally hurled charges of "hunger for power" against them of following lead, or rather very liberal theories, about navigation that amounted to "pure pipe dreams."

"Nobody has ever had the idea that the river could be navigated above Waco. We have never considered doing it," said one of the commissioners in the course of the hearing which lasted an hour.

Connally then turned to the subject of the oil power companies that operate in the state. He said he had a bill in mind which would give the Federal Power Commission authority to build a dam on the Brazos River at Waco, Texas.

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Senator Connally left, too, and hurried to the Capital where the Foreign Relations Committee, of which he is chairman, was considering the President's appointment of former Mayor O'Dwyer of New York to be Ambassador to Mexico. Chairman Connally secured a committee vote of 8-6 in favor of the new Ambassador, whose wife is the former Sloan Simpson of Dallas, and invited him to attend the Pan American Friendship Festival in San Antonio.

The committee then voted to cite for contempt three witnesses who would not answer questions during the Tydings subcommittee's investigations of the charges of disloyalty in the State Department, and recommended Senate confirmation of the American delegates to the United Nations General Assembly.

Senator Connally had lunch with Senator Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin, ranking active Republican member of the Foreign Relations Committee, and with high officials of the State Department in order to discuss current problems of foreign policy, particularly regarding the Far East and the United Nations meetings in New York.

After lunch, he went to the State where a number of bills affecting Texas were under consideration.

As the Senate went into session, the Senator and his committee and dinner alone in the Senate chamber and returned to the floor to put on hand for consideration of the bill authorizing federal aid to a school of districts where the school is substantially closed because of federal prohibition. A number of Texas bills, such as Grand Prairie, Orange and others, are affected.

This bill passed without a record vote, and Senator Connally left home at 9:30, finding a working day that had lasted a little more than twelve hours. He had begun with the Brazos River project, a current problem, and ended with over-burdened Texas school districts.

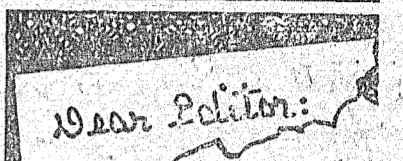

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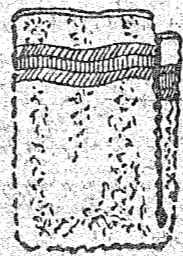

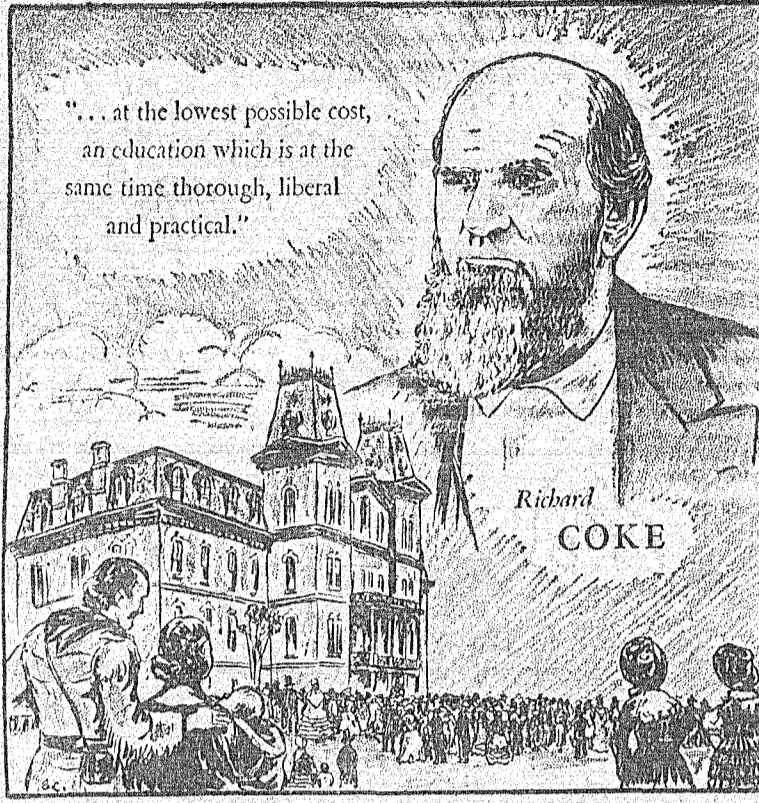

applied to cotton in 1951. Due to the 9 1/2 million bale estimate for this year, which is lower than had been expected, it is likely that the Secretary will, in his announcement, tell the farmers that there will be no marketing quotas applied in 1951, and that there will be relaxed acreage controls, if any, imposed.

In fact, the talk in recent days down in the Department has favored an additional five million acres next year more than the 21,000,000 acres that had been scheduled. In that case it is indicated there will be little, if any, need for acreage controls. In any event, the Secretary is expected to make a statement on the subject in the near future.

It has been estimated that the Government will receive \$1.5 billion in 1956 from the purpose of dealing with the subject of taxes on cotton profits. As a member of the Armed Services Committee, I, along with

Representative Clemente of New York and Representative Hardy of Virginia, have been designated by Chairman Carl Vinson to go to Europe during the recess period on official business, pertaining to the Committee's work. We are to go on a regularly scheduled MAT (Military Air Transport) plane from Westover Field in Massachusetts to Frankfurt. The Army has a daily schedule of transport planes flying that route each day.

We will spend a little time in Frankfurt, Berlin, Munich, and will probably go into the Ruhr Valley while we are there. In addition, if conditions permit, we plan to go to Vienna, where we have military installations at present, and to France, the Scandinavian countries, Yugoslavia, Italy, Greece, and Turkey. With the world situation as it now is, we are called upon to spend billions to bolster the military preparedness of the friendly countries who compose the Atlantic Pact group. It is, of course,

important that we keep ourselves as well informed as possible on what the situation is and just how successful the program is working out. There are, of course, matters pertaining to our occupation forces in Germany in which our Committee is particularly interested and about which we are from time to time called upon to legislate.

In my absence, my office in Washington will be kept open and my office staff will give prompt attention to all mail that is received. While I am overseas, I plan to send weekly reports back concerning conditions as we find them.
