Mountaineers Rip Through Baird Line For 20-0 Win; Open Conference Play This Week With Undefeated May Tigers

The Santa Anna Mountaineers run through the Baird Bears line and around the ends Friday night to beat them to the tune of 20-0 in the last of a series of non-conference games before conference play starts. Both teams had about the same average weight and had the same number of games experience.

The first quarter was marked by a number of fumbles on both teams. Santa Anna made two first downs to none for the visitors. The local boys penetrated the 20-yard line one time in the first quarter, but Baird failed to get to the 20-yard line until the final play of the game, when they were on the ten yard line.

The first play of the second period saw Billy Joe Parish go through the center of the Baird line and break into the clear for an untouched 60-yard run and the first score of the game. R. D. Hartman kicked the extra point, to make the half-time score 7-0. First downs in the second period were 3 for Santa to 4 for Baird.

Midway in the third period a number of the boys on the line figured in blocking a Baird punt and the Mountaineers recovered the ball on the 2-foot line. Chas. Scarborough crashed through the line for the score and Hartman converted. First downs for the third period were Santa Anna 3, Baird 2.

During the fourth period Dean Bass tossed a 28-yard pass to James Vercher that was good for an overall of 50 yards. After two attempted plays, and two fumbles, Scarborough again took the ball around end for 26 yards and the final score. Hartman failed to convert. First downs in the final period were Santa Anna 4, Baird 2. The last play of the game found Baird on the 10-yard line after a series of running and passing plays, while the coach had most of the reserves in the game.

Again it would be hard to pick out outstanding players. The entire squad played the game as one. However, Scarborough and Hartman did turn in exceptionally good games in the backfield and C. W. Stephenson showed that all-district guard line play.

Parish was injured slightly after a 22-yard gain. After being treated over the week end he is apparently well and will be ready to go against the May Tigers this week end. None of the other boys received any injuries last week.

Young Footballers Win Over Rochelle Last Week, 21-12

Ward School Coach Bill Adams took his young Mountaineers to Rochelle last Thursday night for their first game of the season. The local boys won by a score of 21-12, with all their scores coming in the first half.

The first score came when Aubrey Ray Goodwin plunged the line for 8 yards. He also plunged the line for the extra point. The second score was made by Dwane Cozart on a line plunge, good for 10 yards. Roy Henderson went around end for the extra point. James R. Allen intercepted a Rochelle pass in midfield and went all the way for the final touchdown, shortly before the first half ended. Henderson again went around end for the extra point.

Both the Rochelle scores came in the second half. During this time the coach was attempting to give all the young boys coming out for football a little practice. Most of the last half was played by the boys with little or no experience.

Thursday night, October 12, the Ward School will play the Early Ward School on the local field.

OPENS CONFERENCE SEASON

The Mountaineers put their unbeaten record on the line this week against the unblemished record of the May Tigers in their opening District 12-B Conference game, to be played on the local field Friday night at 8:00 p. m. May is standing at the head of the district list this week with 1000 per cent. They won over Gorman last week in their first conference game. Two weeks ago they trounced the Corbon eleven to the tune of 43-6.

Edward Lee, the backfield sparkplug for the May Tigers is claimed to have expert running ability and a Chambers lad is also a hard driving back. Their line and backfield also boast a good defense against passes.

The Tigers line averages 167 pounds, while their backfield averages 161 pounds. The Mountaineers line averages 161 pounds, while the backfield only averages 153 pounds. The Tigers have played two games this season, to three for the Mountaineers. They have the weight on the Mountaineers, but the Mountaineers have the game experience on them. It is expected to be a hard fought game, with both teams determined to win.

The Mountaineers starting line-up will be about the same as it has been for the three games played thus far, depending upon whether they are on the offense or defense at the beginning of the game.

Santa Anna To Valera Highway Project Is Set Up

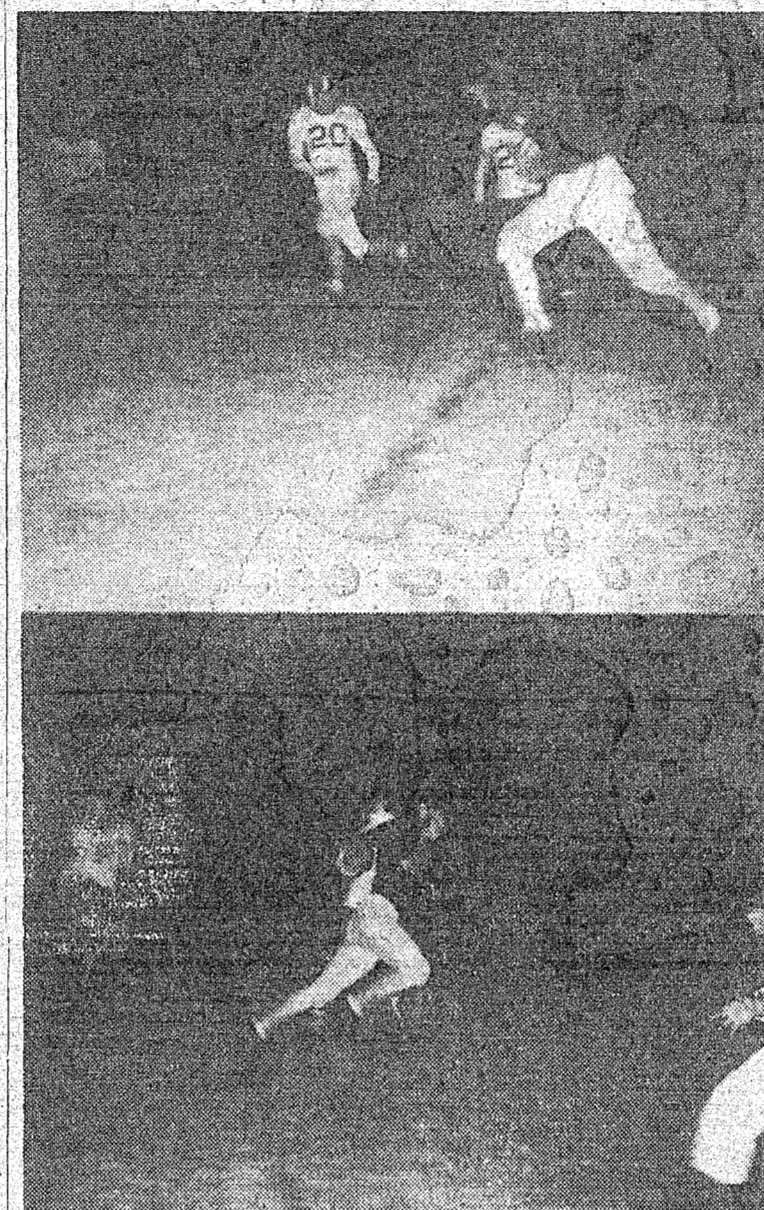
The Coleman County project on Highway 87, to provide a straight route from Santa Anna west to Valera has been set up as a federal aid highway system work project, announced Sunday by the State Highway Commission.

Authorized by the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1950, half of the money will come from the federal government and half from the state.

After the projects are submitted to the federal government for approval, engineering work will start, and bids will be taken.

Make It Yourself With Wool Contest Is Slated Soon

Entry blanks for the fourth annual "Make it yourself with wool" contest may be obtained from Mrs. Theo Griffin or Mrs. Henry Newman of Coleman, area chairmen in the event.

The contest is sponsored by the Women's Auxiliary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, and by the National Wool Growers, and is planned to interest young girls in sewing with wool and mohair fabrics.

The deadline for entry is Oct. 15, and entry blanks must be filled out and mailed before that date. The area contest will include the seven counties of Coleman, Brown, Mills, McCullough, Runnels, Concho and Callahan.

Prizes will include cash awards and many other items. A contestant may enter as many as four different classifications in the area contest: coat, dress, suit and original design. Only one of these garments, however, may be entered in the State and National contests. The garments must be made of 100% wool or of 50% mohair and must not be worn until after the state contest is held.

Lt. Joe B. Flores Arrives In U. S. Sat.

Mrs. May Flores of Bangs received a telephone call from her son, Lt. Joe B. Flores Saturday, September 30, shortly after one o'clock. Lt. Flores stated he had landed at San Francisco, California that morning and that he was feeling fairly good. He was able to get around in a wheelchair, but didn't know yet when he would be able to come home. He expected to be in the hospital there about 4 or 5 days and would then be transferred to another hospital for treatment before being released to come home.

Through a misunderstanding in a press wire last week, we stated that Lt. Flores had died of wounds received in action in the Korean War. We are certainly glad that it was a mistake and are very happy to correct it.

Lt. Flores is a graduate of West Point Military Academy in the class of 1946. He was wounded September 11 by shell fragment in the right thigh and was taken to a hospital in Japan. He was wounded while attacking the enemy on Hill 303, near Shindo. He was serving with the First Cavalry Division when he received the wound.

Lt. Flores is a graduate of the Santa Anna High School.

Do You Care About Our Iron Lung

The first few days after we made our first appeal to the citizens of and around Santa Anna, as to the disposition of the iron lung, we received a number of prompt replies about it. Since that first few days, very few have been received. We are wondering "Are You Interested in the Iron Lung?"

If the lung is kept stored in the local hospital, it will never do anyone any good. It is impractical to attempt to operate it here. If we donate it to the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis it will be put where it will help relieve human suffering.

The iron lung was purchased by donations from citizens of and near Santa Anna, and is stored in the Sealy Hospital, a high over ten years ago. Since that time it has never been used until recently when it was loaned to the Shannon Hospital in San Antonio. Last week it was authorized to be carried to the Abilene Hospital, where it was put into immediate use. It seems that there is an acute need for another iron lung in our area, and we are willing for ours to be used where it is needed.

There seems to be a number of persons who are wondering whether they made contributions to the purchase of the lung or not. Over 600 persons made contributions to it. We believe we would be safe in saying that if you were in the Santa Anna area in 1938 and 1939 that you made some kind of contribution to the purchase of the iron lung and that you have a voice in whether it should be given away or not. If room is permitted, we would be glad to publish all the names again, but under present circumstances, it is not possible for us to do so. We feel that each of you who have been here for the last 12 years have a say, and request that you make your statements as soon as possible.

IT IS a mistake to think that if one gives his life to Christ, then he cannot give his life to anything else. The astonishing truth is, when a person first gives himself to Christ, he finds that Christ gives back far more. Christians can be, and are, devoted scholars and business men and mothers and doctors and farmers. The more truly one is committed to Christ, the better he is likely to be at his job, whatever it is.

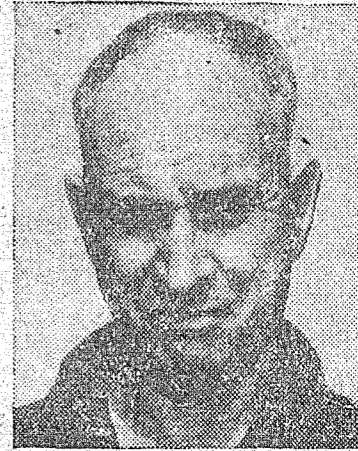

A Man Gives Himself

MOST people, however, do give themselves to something. Every man who amounts to something, gives himself in one way or another. There was a college student once who practiced nineteen hours a day on the piccolo, it was said. Naturally he couldn't stay in college at that rate, so they got rid of him. 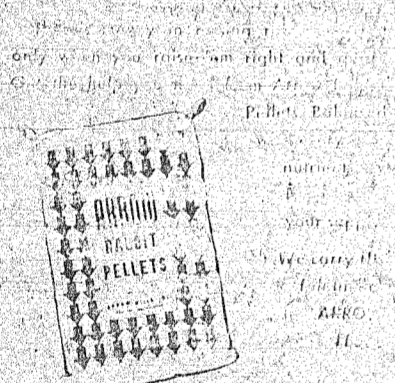
