Mountaineers To Host Rising Star Eleven On Local Field At 7:30 Friday Nite

The Santa Anna Mountaineers are being put through some very hard and fast work-outs this week in an effort to get them ready for the engagement with the Rising Star Wildcats Friday night at 7:30 on the local field. Both the Mountaineers and the Wildcats rested over the past week, and both are expected to pull a few tricks out of the bag in the running for the district championship. They were defeated two weeks ago by the Cross Plains Buffaloes, for their only defeat of the season. We are sure the local boys can come out on top of this game if they have the determination to win. We feel that it would do the boys good if everyone would give them a pat on the back, and tell them you are expecting them to win this game. If they know that everyone is backing them, it will give them more of an incentive to win.

Santa Anna has played only two conference games this season, upsetting the May Tigers to the tune of 32-6, then going down before the onslaught of the Buffaloes. Rising Star has won three conference games this season from the three weakest teams in the district, Blanket, Bangs and Gorman. They have scored a total of 138 points against these three opponents, while not yielding any points to the opponents.

There is no need in saying our boys can win without putting up a good fight. But we think all the boys will be in excellent condition by game time, and should be able to down the Wildcats.

The Cross Plains Buffaloes run over the Early High Longhorns to the tune of 33-7 and May won over the Blanket eleven by a 34-21 score in the only conference games last week. 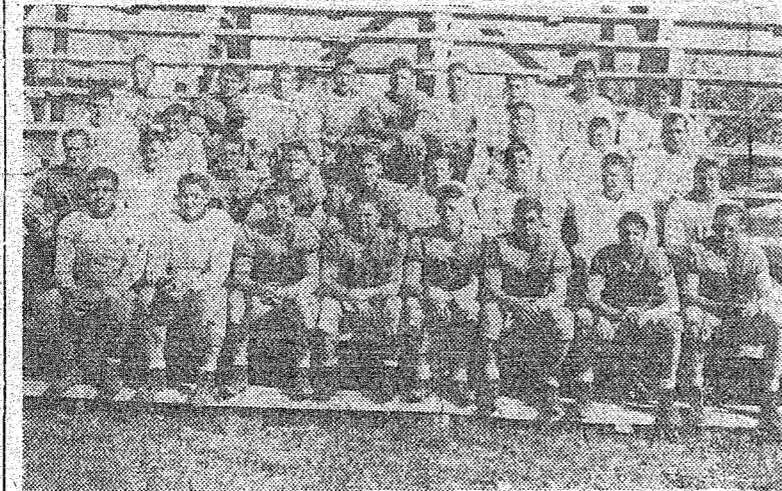

IT IS MORE than a question of what you read and see and hear. An even more serious question is: What do you think about? Good reading, even the Bible, was never meant to be a substitute for thought. One of the great books of ancient times was "Consolations of Philosophy," written by a man in jail without a book in his cell. But the fine books he had read were in his head and heart, and when he became a political prisoner, alone and poor and friendless, his mind was still a garden. 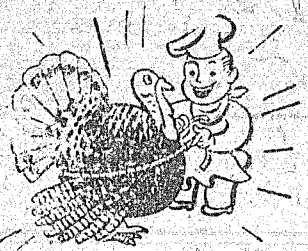

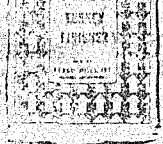

Overseas Xmas Parcel Shipping Instructions

In order to save time, trouble and the likelihood of the boys in service not receiving Christmas packages on time, certain regulations should be observed in wrapping, addressing and handling parcels out below:
 Shipments should be made this month if possible.
 To reach soldiers in Korea parcels should not be made later than November 1st, dead lines November 15th.
 Boxes should be without metal or solid strong fiberboard, be lighter when used, should be wrapped in heavy paper for rough handling.
 Four separate pieces of strong cord should surround the package, tied together at each corner.
 Preferably flaps should be sealed with gummed or Scotch tape, and when sealed, the usual 4th class label permitting inspection should be used.
 Weight limits, both regular and

air, 70 pounds, with some New York APOs being limited to 50 pounds.
 Combined length and girth, not over 100 inches.
 Cushioning material should entirely surround contents inside container.
 Do not send matches, lighter fluids or other inflammables.
 Cigarettes and tobacco may be sent to European APOs.
 Address should be typed or printed in ink, plainly, and should show:
 Name,
 Rank,
 Serial number,
 Branch of service or name of Ship,
 APO or Navy FPO, and
 Port City.
 Place a slip inside package showing the complete address used on the outside, including list of contents and your return address.
 The failure to observe these necessary rules may prevent your soldier from being cheered by the glimpse of home you have so thoughtfully sought to bring him.
 Further details as to rates to the different stations may be obtained at your Post Office.
