Emzy Browns Move To New Home



Health Department Advises Against Antihistamines

Austin, Texas—"The wide advertising of antihistamines for the prevention of colds should not persuade people to place too much confidence in these drugs as a treatment for colds," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer warns the citizens of Texas. "Those who decide to take any of the antihistamine pills should realize it is highly important for them to follow exactly the directions."

"Regardless of the effectiveness of these new products it remains most desirable to take the ordinary precautions against a cold—adequate sleep, clothing adapted to the weather, well balanced diet, moderate outdoor exercise and avoidance of unnecessary contacts with those already suffering from colds. Extra rest and the drinking of large amounts of fruit juice are still important aids to physical well being and cure if a cold occurs."

"Unfavorable reactions such as dizziness, drowsiness, and temporary loss of muscle control some times occur after taking this drug. Everyone is strongly advised against driving an automobile or working around machinery while taking the pills."

"Some readers of advertisements may get the idea that taking small doses of antihistamines every day will prevent colds. Such use of drugs should be discouraged. Antihistamines are still new and largely unproved drugs. Physicians have not yet determined what effect these products may have upon the human system if taken over a long period of time."

Veterans Should Advise VA Of Active Status

Veterans recalled to active military duty while they are receiving benefit payments from Veterans Administration can save themselves and the Government a lot of trouble by notifying VA immediately of their recall, VA said today.

These benefit payments include GI Bill or Public Law 16 subsistence allowances and compensation for service-connected disabilities.

The law does not permit a veteran to receive such VA payments once he gets back into uniform, VA explained.

VA added that if a veteran receives a payment covering any period after he has entered active duty, he should return it to the VA office which has his records. Otherwise, it will remain as an overpayment against him until disposed of.

The notification to VA of recall to active duty should include the veteran's "C" (Claims) number, his complete name and address, the amount of the VA payment, what it's for and the date he is to go back into service.

The veteran should send this notice to the VA office handling his records, VA explained.

Cotton Export Quotas Should Be Raised Soon

Washington, (Sp)—The cotton export quota should be raised by several hundred thousand bales, Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas told the Department of Agriculture this week.

Senator Johnson acted after the Munitions Board advised him that 700,000 bales should be enough to take care of military needs during fiscal 1951.

The Department of Agriculture had set up 1,500,000 bales for military use, an estimate which Senator Johnson called "guesswork" which resulted from the failure of the Munitions Board to state its needs.

It was prodded by Senator Johnson, who is chairman of the Senate Preparedness Committee, that brought the 700,000-bale estimate from Roscoe Seybold, acting chairman of the Munitions Board.

Senator Johnson immediately called on Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan to raise the export quota considerably above the present figure of 2,000,000 bales.

"While everybody wants to see that we have plenty of cotton on hand for military and domestic needs," Senator Johnson said, "we must also see that the cotton farmers are not put at the mercy of speculators by the hoarding of cotton which is not needed for this nation's requirements."

Prevent Rust In Radiators For Good Service From Auto

Prevention of rust and corrosion in automobile cooling systems is important for the continued good service of the car, E. L. Harrig, manager of the Chevrolet service and mechanical department, said.

"Judging from the limited use of corrosion inhibitors with water it is apparent that many motorists do not realize the seriousness of this problem," Harrig said. "In the winter, the standard anti-freeze products contain inhibitors which prevent corrosion. But the problem is even more serious in warm weather or in southern climates because of higher operating temperatures."

Oxygen from the air in the cooling system is the most serious cause of corrosion. Harrig cited other causes as presence of corrosive minerals salts in the water, exhaust-gas leakage into

the cooling system, use of un-neutralized acid or alkaline-cleaner solutions and the use of certain acid-containing stop-leak preparations.

Radiators should be flushed and cleaned before use of anti-freeze or corrosion-inhibitor solutions. In cold climates, the inhibitor in the anti-freeze solution is adequate and should not be mixed with other inhibitors. In spring, the system should be drained and flushed, and an inhibitor added for summer. However, if the permanent-type anti-freeze (ethylene glycol) is used, it may be left in the cooling system during the summer.

In warmer climates, the cooling system should be flushed and cleaned every spring and fall, and a fresh filling of a good corrosion inhibitor added.
