Mountaineers Tounce Bangs 65-24 To Retain Second Place In District 12-B; To Engage Early There Friday Night

Cross Plains Wins Over Rising Star

The Santa Anna Mountaineers tounced the Bangs Dragons to the tune of 65-24 before a crowd of approximately 500 fans Friday night to retain their second place stand in District 12-B competition. This win gives the Mountaineers the undisputed second place in season and district football play this season.

Cross Plains edged out the Rising Star Wildcats Saturday afternoon by a 18-14 count, giving the Buffalos first place in district competition, and also season competition, with only the Blanket Tigers standing between them and the District 12-B title. They are expected to have little difficulty with the Blanket eleven.

Santa Anna spotted Bangs 6 points early in the opening minutes of the game, when they fumbled on the first play from scrimmage and Bangs recovered on the 1-yard line. Johnny Pierce the outstanding fullback for the Dragons, plunged the ball over on his first attempt. The try for extra point failed and the score stood 6-0 for Bangs. On the following kick-off the ball went out of bounds and Santa Anna took the ball on their own 20. Two attempts gained only two yards and then things broke loose. R. D. Hartman went around left end and sprinted 78 yards for the first Mountaineer tally. Later in the same period Hartman scored again as did Charles Scarborough and Billy Joe Parish. Hartman's second score was made on a 15 yard gopher; Scarborough returned a punt 57 yards and Parish scampered 21 yards for his first tally. Parish converted twice, making a first quarter score of 26-6 for the Mountaineers.

In the early minutes of the second period Parish went 14 yards for his second score; Jimmy Robbinet, a first year sophomore, scored on a 26 yard run; then in the waning minutes of the quarter Parish again broke loose for 57 yards and his final score of the game. Dean Bass and Parish converted once each. Midway in the quarter Pierce scored from the 12 yard line for the Dragons, making a half-time score of 46-12. First half first downs were none for Santa Anna and 2 for Bangs.

Bangs kicked to Santa Anna to start the third period and James Donald Vercher made the longest run of the evening by returning the ball 80 yards for his only score of the evening. Jimmy Robbinet converted. A few minutes later C. W. Stephenson intercepted a Bangs pass and raced 18 yards untouched for the TD. Stephenson is the right guard and this was a thrill that very seldom comes to a line-man. His score made the count for the

Mountaineers 59. Midway in the third period Scotty Burnett, left halfback for the Dragons, scored on a line plunge good for 8 yards, making the Bangs score 18 points. Early in the fourth period Burnett again scored from the 2 yard line after the play was set up on a 43 yard run by Pierce. Midway in the period Hartman again scampered 25 yards for the final tally of the game.

Santa Anna made only two first downs during the whole game. Both these were made on the drive when Hartman made the final score. Bangs made three first downs in the second half, making them a total of five. Santa Anna had the ball in their possession 13 times during the game and scored ten of these times.

GO TO EARLY FRIDAY

The next to the last test of the Mountaineers strength will come Friday night, when they go to Early for their annual clash with the Longhorns. Early and Santa Anna have each won one game since Santa Anna has been in this conference, and they have both been top notch games. Early has lost only two conference games this season, losing to the powerful Buffalos from Cross Plains and last week lost to the May Tigers 6-12. May made their winning score late in the fourth period of the game.

The game will be played in MacDonald Field, located just past the Early school on the Fort Worth highway. Game time is 7:30 p. m. Friday, November 17.

Games played by members of District 12-B last week end saw Cross Plains defeat the Rising Star Wildcats 18-14 in their annual Armistice Day clash; Santa Anna tounced the Bangs Dragons 65-24; May won their first victory on record over the Early Longhorns. Dr. Geo. W. Cox Re-elected As State Health Officer



Dr. George W. Cox, Austin, Texas, the Texas State Board of Health has elected Dr. George W. Cox of Austin to his eighth consecutive two-year term as state health officer.

The vote of the nine-member board was unanimous in favor of keeping Dr. Cox in the post he has held since 1936, the longest tenure in the 70-odd year history of the State Health Department.

Dr. O. B. Kiel of Wichita Falls, chairman of the board, called Dr. Cox "outstanding among the health officers in the nation."

The job he has done in his capacity is remarkable," Dr. Kiel said. "I speak for the whole board when I say Texas is fortunate to have such a man as Dr. Cox heading its public health activities."

Christian Worship Lesson for November 19, 1950

SOME one has said that if the Christian church did nothing else but offer a regular opportunity for public worship of God, she would have justified her place in the sun. This is a rather misleading truth, for if a church did nothing but worship it would not be doing its whole duty. Indeed, it would not be a true church. As our Scripture plainly shows, worship disconnected from life is not only good, it is sinful.

Why Worship?

WHAT is worship, and why do we worship at all? We might define it as a meeting with God, both conscious and desired. "He shines in all that's fair," and in truth we are in his presence all the time. But we are not conscious of him all the time. When we are conscious of him, then one of two things happen. Either we hastily shut our minds and run away from him in fear, which is sin. Or we linger, feeling it is good for us to be here. And then it is worship. Or again, we might call worship conversation between man and God. Every part of it is either our listening to God speak to us, or our speaking to God in some way.

Why worship? We worship because we love God. Otherwise it would be a bore, at best, or a kind of self-torture at worst. We worship because we need God. If Jesus needed both public worship and private prayer, so do we far more. We worship because we need to know God's will.

Why Worship Together?

PUBLIC and private worship cannot be substituted for each other. Readers of the Bible know how they were intertwined in the experiences of God's people, and how our Lord himself, who used to attend the synagogue services regularly, also sought God on the hills alone. A man who never meets with God alone in prayer will not know how to come to public worship in the true spirit; and a man who habitually stays away from church for no good reason is not a person whose private prayer-life is likely to be a healthy one.

We need to worship together with other Christians. We need this experience to strengthen our own prayer-life. We need it to keep us from selfishness in our prayers. Intense, earnest prayer, and full of faith too, may be seriously wrong if it is essentially selfish.

In corporate, public worship we are reminded that none of us stands alone; that God has many children. We need to worship together because it is one of the very few

things, perhaps the only one, that all human beings can do as one. No two of us are alike, yet we are alike in this one thing: We are all human beings in need of God. To worship together is to be reminded of this.

Why Worship As We Do?

IT OUGHT not to be surprising that men worship God in so many ways, for there are all sorts and conditions of men. But within the Protestant churches, our differences are not important. Essentially we have much the same "pattern" of worship. It will be helpful to you, the next time you are in church, to ask, at each part of the service: Why do we do this? What good does it do? Could it be left out without being missed?

As you visit other churches from time to time, take note of any differences, not in a spirit of criticism but considering whether you might learn from them. What do you and they have in common?

You will agree that there are hardly any parts of a typical Christian worship service which we could do without. We need the prayers, for in them we all pour out our hearts together before God. We need the hymns and psalms, because they express the beauty and the joy of our faith; most of them are prayers set to music. We need the Scripture reading, because in it we hear the Word of God. We need the sermon, because it applies the Word of God to our own lives and problems. We need the offering too. . . . why? But the offering is true worship only on one condition. Do you know what it is? After all, the real test of every part and variety of true worship is: Has this experience brought man and God closer together in spirit and in truth?

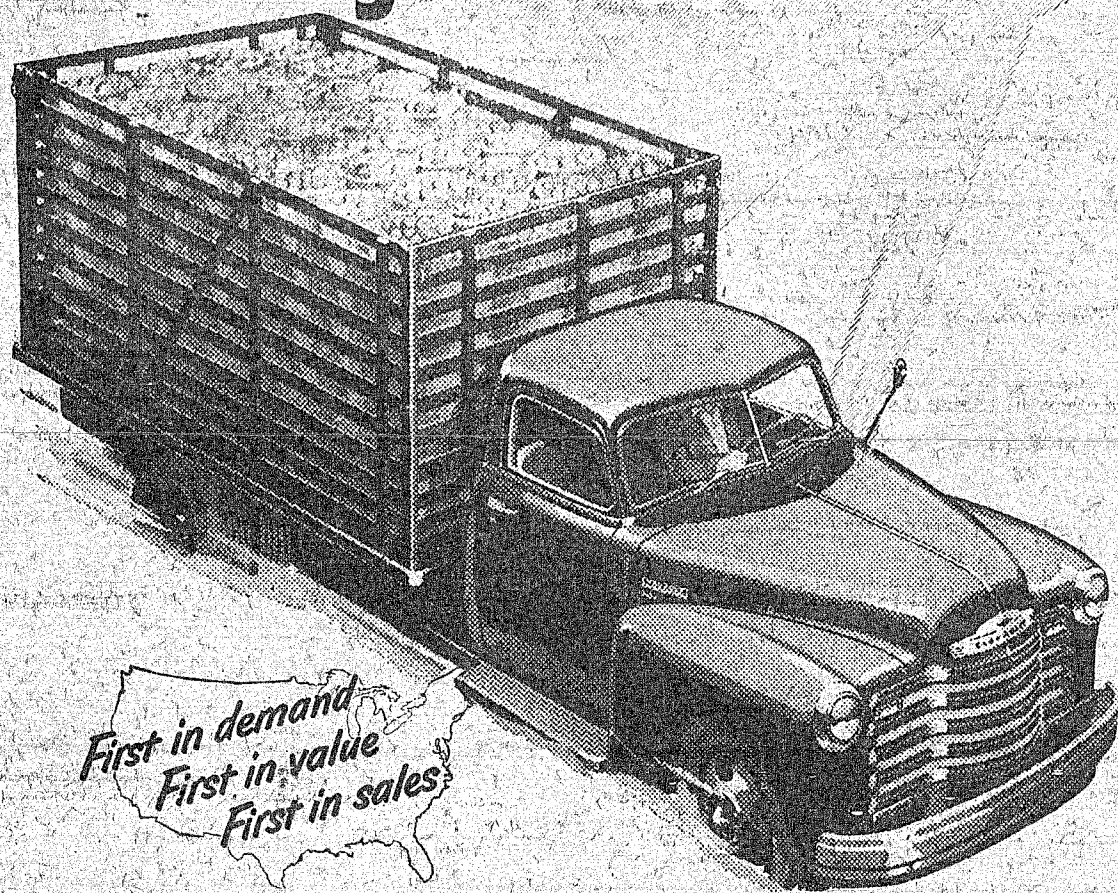

Accepting the appointment by Stewart and Krueger, Healer noted increasing incidence of infantile paralysis in Texas as a challenge to conduct a stronger campaign. By October 28, he said, Texas had 458 more cases of the disease than during the same period last year.

The object of the campaign, which is the National Foundation's only fund raising activity, is to enable Texas to take care of its own polio patients and pay its share of the national programs of research, epidemic aid and professional education of medical personnel. Healer asserted. He noted that in the past 3 years Texas has received \$257,000 more for patient care than it has sent in to the national organization, thus having no part in these programs.

A pre-campaign meeting for the counties named above will be held in Brownwood at 10 a. m. November 17 for planning purposes.

Healer is a Texan from Line-stone County. From 1900 to 1927 he resided in Lampasas County and since then in Comanche, Ballinger, and Brownwood. He has been vice-president of the Lion's Club and president of the Chamber of Commerce in Ballinger.

In Brownwood since 1941. Healer is engaged in business, ranching and property interests throughout this section. A son, Bryan, 12, had polio in 1948, and he has taken an active interest in the fight against this disease.

Savings Bonds To Play Major Role In National Defense

Dallas, Texas.—United States Savings Bonds must again play a major role in the defense of the country, Nathan Adams, state Savings Bonds chairman, said here today as he appointed Theodore E. Swigart, Houston oil man, as co-chairman of the Payroll Savings Committee for Texas. Mr. Adams said that Mr. Swigart, who is president of Shell Pipe Line Co., will actively head a Treasury drive during November and December to install and stimulate the Payroll Savings Plan in offices and plants throughout Texas. Chairman of the Payroll Savings Committee is Col. J. W. Evans, Houston cotton man.

"This is part of the National Preparedness program," Adams said. "We must make economic as well as military preparations in order for this country to meet whatever emergencies the future holds."

This Texas drive is part of a national campaign which will open on November 1. Every business concern will be asked to set up the Payroll Savings Plan, through which employees can buy Savings Bonds by having deductions made from their wages or salaries.

"When we were attacked in 1941 almost 18 months passed before we had an effective payroll savings program in effect, and we intend to avoid that kind of delay this time. The results of this drive will give us a springboard for quick mobilization for the sale of Savings Bonds should we again become involved in a global war."

Mr. Adams has directed the Savings Bonds program in Texas since the Treasury organized its old War Finance Committee in 1942. He pointed out that buying of Savings Bonds gives the public the best kind of opportunity to render patriotic service in time of emergency and also puts a curb on inflation and raising prices.

Col Evans and Mr. Swigart are now organizing a statewide Payroll Savings Committee, Adams said. The committee will be composed of important industrialists representing every section of the state. They and a permanent organization of about 3000 volunteers, representing every county, will conduct the drive in Texas.
