## Big Parade To Open Christmas Season

### Mountaineers End Season In Second Place; Trounce Gorman 47-0

The Santa Anna Mountaineers trounced the Gorman Panthers 47-0 in their final game of the season last Thursday afternoon on the local field. This gives the Mountaineers a tie for second place in District 12-B with the Rising Star Wildcats, and they beat the Wildcats 24-14 in mid-season.

Santa Anna made 13 first downs & Gorman 8. Most all the Mountaineer attack was on the ground, while the Panthers netted most of their yardage on short jump passes, throwing 31 passes and completing 18 of them for a total of 115 yards.

R. D. Hartman and Billy Joe Parish made all the touchdowns for the Mountaineers, with Hart-

man making two and Parish accounting for the other five. Scores by quarters were: first 13-0; second 26-0; third, 40-0; and fourth, 47-0.

The Panthers moved into Mountaineers territory only two times during the entire game. Both times were in the first period. The first time came after a series of short passes had clicked and the Panthers worked down to the Mountaineers 35 yard line. Charles Scarborough broke up this threat by intercepting a long pass on the 15 yard line and running it out to the 37 before being brought down. Later, in the same period, after another series of short passes had clicked, the Panthers worked their way down

to the Mountaineer 40 yard line as the quarter ended. In the opening minutes of the second quarter they lost back to the 50 yard line and never crossed it again.

### AROUND THE DISTRICT

In the only other conference game in District 12-B, the Rising Star Wildcats defeated the Longhorns from Early 13-8. These two games completed the season for all members of the district except the Cross Plains Buffalos, who will tangle with the Eden Bulldogs at Brownwood Friday night of this week for Bi-District honors.

Even though Santa Anna ended the season in second place, they have the best scoring record of any of the teams in the district. In district competition, the Mountaineers scored a total of 221 points, while Rising Star scored 199 points and Cross Plains scored 188 points. In the

## Santa Claus Will Be In Santa Anna Dec. 9th



**PREVUE OF LOCAL SANTA CLAUS PARADE**—Santa will come riding in a bright-colored sleigh drawn by four big-antlered reindeer in Santa Anna at 10:00 a. m. Saturday, December 9. Here he waves to children thronging the street in another parade like the one you'll see. These sleigh animals are Donner and Blitzen, "Prancer and Dancer," and they're coming straight from the Arctic Circle near Kotzebue, Alaska, to Texas to gladden the hearts of all children.

Sleigh bells will tinkle, reindeer with big antlers will prance and pant, their ankles popping in rhythm with the bells, when Santa Claus comes to Santa Anna Saturday, December 9, at ten a. m. for a big parade sponsored by the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce.

This will be the second in a series of Christmas programs planned for the entertainment of young and old for the Christmas Season. Plan to be in Santa Anna as often as possible during the holiday season. These entertainments are planned for you by the Santa Anna Merchants and the Chamber of Commerce.

Many who never saw a reindeer in their lives will be on hand. They'll see Dancer and Prancer, Donner and Blitzen—in person, very much alive, and fresh from the frozen Arctic Circle, brought straight to Texas for the benefit of both children and grown-ups.

Grady Carothers, Goldthwaite ranchman, returned last week from the Arctic Circle after rounding up Santa's sleigh team. When they come to Santa Anna for the big parade it will be quite a show and all FREE.

The four reindeer will come wearing red leather harness with bright trimmings, and the children can tell which is Dancer,

which is Blitzen, which is Prancer, for each will have his name spelled out on his bright harness.

Santa's sleigh will be a colorful vehicle, too. It will be bright red and silver with green trim with the words "Merry Christmas" spelled out in the decorations.

The white-whiskered friend of all children will have candy and other goodies for all the children and wants each of them to tell him what they want for Christmas.

No expense has been spared by Santa's helpers to make this visit the most enjoyable occasion of this or any other year.

Take these four reindeer. They have been whisked thousands of miles from the far north in Alaska. Grady Carothers has made three trips to Alaska in as many years to help Santa Claus, but it took him two years of trying before he could arrange to bring out reindeer, in the first place.

He had to travel by bus, boat, rail, airplane and dogsled to reach the cold Arctic coast, where the reindeer herds feed on reindeer moss in the snow. Carothers had to sleep out on the snow after he lassoed the reindeer. All around them were howling wolves, trying to slip up and kill the tethered deer. This year's trip alone required seven weeks.

Each year a reindeer sheds those huge antlers—and promptly

grows a new set. They grow at the rate of half an inch a day, and in 90 days a reindeer will have grown himself a brand-new set of horns. Up in the Arctic the reindeer use those antlers for snow plows, to push drifts out of their way.

It's natural, Carothers says, for a reindeer to breathe with his mouth open and tongue lolled out, like a dog, when he's pulling a sleigh. The antlered natives of the Far North have been equipped by nature for life in the Arctic. Hair protects the ends of their noses, between their hooves and all parts of their bodies.

Eskimos help Carothers round up and train the wild reindeer to work in harness hitched to a sled. Sometimes they're teamed up with sled dogs at first, until they get use to the harness. Then they're allowed to pull a sled by themselves, and finally they learn to draw Santa's bright sleigh.

Then they're ready for the big Santa Claus parade.

The Chamber of Commerce invites all children of this area to come to town for the big Santa Claus Parade Saturday, December 9, at 10:00 a. m.

Carothers has been at the North Pole helping Santa Claus, and has now returned to Texas to be on hand for the big show.

### Contract To Be Let Soon On Road To Trickham

Mr. Earl Hardy, Commissioner of Precinct 2, states that he expects the contract on the Farm to Market road going toward Trickham to be let sometime in January, 1951. The paving will amount to 5.5 miles.

During the past two years the commissioners of Precinct 1 and 3 have given Mr. Hardy a part of their yearly allotment in order that he could get a better contract for the paving in this part of the county. When a paving contract is going to be offered the more miles in the contract the cheaper the contractor will take the job for. The commissioners realize this and work together each year in order to get a larger amount of paving for less money.

For the year 1951 Mr. Hardy was allotted 2 1/2 miles of Farm to Market road. He, in turn, gave this allotment to Precincts 1 and 3 in order that they might increase their mileage and get a better paving contract.

Precinct 2 has almost 13 miles of Farm to Market roads now. There is about 3 miles going south from the Liberty store, 5.2 miles going north between the mountains, and 5.5 miles to be put under construction in the near future, going toward Trickham.

We feel that Mr. Hardy has done the wise thing in giving his small allotment of 2 1/2 miles to the other commissioners. For 2 years they gave him a part of their allotment, and he is only returning the favor. During the course of several years, a lot more paving can be accomplished by the commissioners working together in this manner.

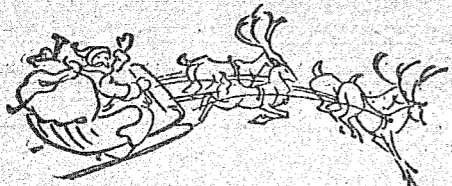

God Wants You WITH all due respects to the arrangers of these lessons, the lesson for last week and this one seem to be in the reverse order from what is logical. It is very doubtful whether any one ever understood stewardship of money who did not understand stewardship of life first. Now in almost any church you may hear people singing, "Were the whole realm of nature mine, That were a present far too small; Love so amazing, so divine, Demands my soul, my life, my all."

Very good; wonderful. Surely these are a devoted brotherhood! But wait, what is this coming down the aisle? A man with a collection plate! Now we shall see. . . There's a man putting in a quarter, and there's a prosperous-looking lady laying out a five dollar bill. (She bought a \$50 cat last week.) But who is putting in his soul, his life, his all? Oh well, they didn't mean what they sang. But isn't it more than half hypocritical to sing one way and "give" another? The whole realm of nature is not yours to give; but you do have a life; and God wants it. More than he wants what we have, he wants what we are. God created you; God redeemed you; as Paul says, "You are not your own; you were bought with a price."

Not for Preachers Only A COMMON mistake is to think that a Christian has a choice between being a preacher and not being one. If he decides to give his life to God then he will be a preacher; otherwise he keeps his life for himself. This is absurd, when you think about it. God has the first claim on every man's life. To be a Christian is to recognize this claim. He has not a bit more claim on the preacher or the missionary than he has on the grocer or the farmer's wife. Stewardship of life means recognizing God's right, it means living

Gift Without the Giver is Bare JUST put together four sentences from the four sections of the Scripture for this week, and you have the whole business of stewardship of life in a nutshell: "Having gifts, let us use them." "First they gave themselves to the Lord." "Honor such men." "My God will supply every need of yours." No one ever used for God in the service of man any gift which God did not more than repay. The gift without the giver is bare — and so is the giver. But giver and gift, devoted in love to God and man, are rich indeed.
