Registered Hereford Calf Given March of Dimes

Oil Activities IN COLEMAN COUNTY

Three wildcat locations were spotted last Wednesday in Coleman County.

Frank Williamson of Abilene will drill the No. 1 J. L. Wilkinson as a 1,995 foot rotary prospector three miles north of Coleman.

Location will be 1,110 feet from the west and 990 feet from the south lines or the northwest quarter of section 3, GH&H Sur.

Five miles northeast of Talpa, United North & South Development Co. has staked the No. 1 O. O. McWilliams as a 3,800 foot rotary test.

It will be 390 feet from the west and 1,800 feet from the north lines of J. V. Massey Survey 9.

McMurrey and Sheffied of Brady have announced they will drill the No. 1 J. W. Tabor as a wildcat project a half mile southwest of Santa Anna. Location is 150 feet from the north and west lines of Block 16, Wm. Doran Sur. 666.

Projected depth is 2,000 feet with rotary.

In the Santa Anna gas field, 6 miles northeast of Santa Anna, Great Expectations Corp. has completed the No. 1 Ida Reeves Hickman as a gas-oil well.

On potential the well gauged 30.74 barrels of 32 gravity oil in 24 hours flowing through 32.64 choke with 500 pounds pressure on casing and 437 pounds on tubing from the open hole at 2,250-98 feet. Operator treated with 5000 gallons of acid.

Gas-oil ratio was 45,000-1.

Location of the gas and oil producer is 2,810 feet from the north and 1,440 feet from the west lines of Holden Rhodes Survey 631.

The same operators have also spotted the No. 2 Ida Reeves Hickman as an offset in the same field.

This project will be 1,030 feet from the west and 1,280 feet from the south lines of H. Rhodes Survey 631. It has a permit depth of 2,500 feet with rotary rig.

Anzac Oil Corp. Louis Franklin, et al. No. 2 Walter Scarbrough M. Hunt Survey 274, wildcat, five miles southwest of Santa Anna, was drilling below 667 feet in shale early this week.

Projected depth is 1,900 feet with rotary rig.

C. U. Norton, et al., of Coleman are to drill the No. 1 Luther Holder, et ux, as a wildcat in Coleman County, approximately 4 miles northwest of Santa Anna. Location is 330 feet from the north and 990 feet from the east lines of the 200-acre lease in the eastern portion of Section 73, GH&H Survey.

Projected depth is 2,350 feet with rotary.

Glass-Hagan Drilling Co., et al. No. 1 Hayes Estate, Section 43, C. Raquet Survey, wildcat one mile west of Santa Anna, has been plugged and abandoned at 2,042 feet.

Richard King, Jr. et al. are to drill the No. 1 M. L. Stone as a wildcat in Coleman County three miles southwest of Glen Cove.

Location for the 3,800-foot rotary prospector is 950 feet from the south and 400 feet from the east lines of Section 757, D. McLean Survey.

Fred H. Stanton et al. of San Angelo are to drill the No. 1 Edward Rawlings as a wildcat five miles southeast of Rockwood, 6,810 feet from the north and 3,039 feet from the west lines of

James D. Knox Survey 36. Slatid depth is 2,400 feet with rotary.

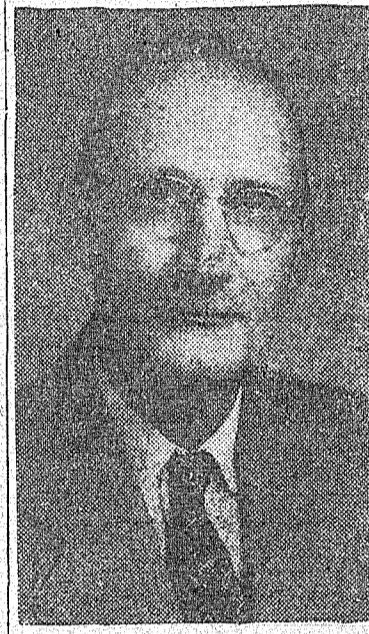
Visiting Preacher At North Side Baptist Church Sunday

The Great Teacher Lesson for January 28, 1951

WE HEAR a lot about a "better world." God pity the poor lot who think the world as it is, is all right! And may God stab awake those who are afraid to try to make this world better.

Greatest of Teachers EVERY Sunday school teacher should study the methods of Jesus to see what good teaching can be. He is and will always be THE Teacher.

His object was not to teach science or history. The only technique he taught was the most important of all—the technique of fine living. His object was to teach "what we are to believe concerning God, and what duties God requires of man."

In short, his subjects were Faith and Life, not separately but welded into one.

Down Where We Live HIS method was always simple. He did not use long words, he did not "put his hat on such a high shelf that only intellectual giraffes could reach it," as Billy Sunday expressed it. Common people heard him gladly, because he taught in the kind of language they used, he spoke of things that were familiar to them.

So the good teacher today never teaches over the heads of the class. This means he has to have a good imagination, has to make believe to himself that he is one of the class instead of the teacher. He has to remember how the world looked to him when he was a boy, he has to stay young in heart.

Jesus could surely have taught more profoundly than he did. Indeed, he said at the end of his days, "I have many things to say... but ye cannot bear them now." However true a thing might be, he would not say it if his hearers were not ready for it.

Truth in Pictures WHEN Jesus taught in pictures; we call them parables. The best-loved and remembered parts of his teaching are the stories he told. Every one of them was simple; they were about the kinds of people his listeners knew or had

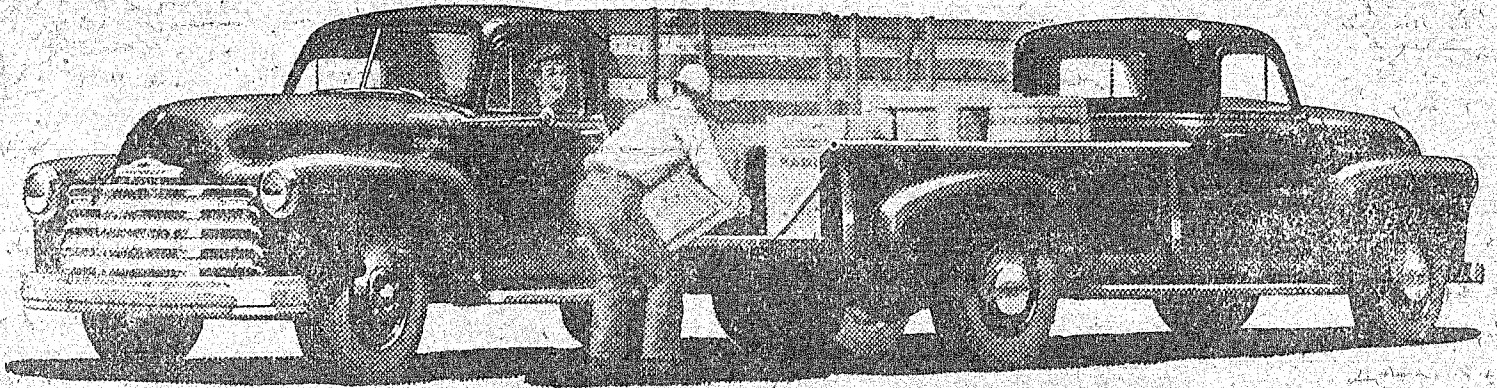

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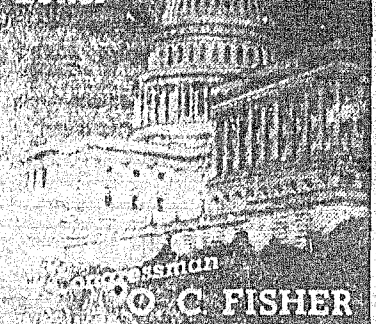

Our WASHINGTON Letter



MORE CONTRACT AIRFIELDS

will be opened to speed the cadet training program, according to the Pentagon. During the last war our district provided contract training at Ballinger, Brady, Coleman, Kerrville and Uvalde. The Army Air Force had facilities at San Angelo, Brownwood and Del Rio.

The Pentagon has told me that around 8 or 9 contract fields may be opened over the country soon with the particular fields being designated not by the Air Force but by the individual contractors who will bid for the privilege of training the cadets at so much per hour, etc., in accordance with AF specifications.

In other words, the Pentagon will not decide where a particular contract training field will be located, that will be determined by the contractor who will choose the best site possible in order to meet AF specifications and make a profit. The contract bidding will be competitive.

Specifications and details of the program may be obtained

from the Contract Relations Section, Procurement Division, Air Material Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio.

HOWARD KINGSBERY, OF SANTA ANNA, State PMA Committeeman, has been in Washington for several days in the interest of the peanut industry, mesquite eradication, experiments and other matters of interest to our area. He reports that a mesquite-killing chemical solution has been concocted at the Spur Experiment Station that is very successful though not so well suited in South Texas.

The mixture is sprayed from an airplane. The plan is to use it over a belt in the central Texas area this Spring. It will cost a total of about \$350 an acre to use it and re-treatment will probably be necessary a few years later in order to complete the kill and take care of sprouts.

If this experiment proves out it will mean a lot to southwest Texas where mesquite has become one big headache to farmers and ranchmen over a wide area. The problem is to be able to kill it at a cost that the owner can afford.

STATIONED AT FT. BELVOIR, the Army Engineer training base near Washington, is Cpl. Carl R. Sherrets of San Saba. A reservist, having served four years during the recent war, Sherrets was recalled to duty several months ago. He had to give up a rather lucrative bulldozer brush eradication business at San Saba to go back to work for Uncle Sam.

Atomic Radiation Test Devised By Dept. Of Army

ANSTIN, TEXAS — Development of the first simple and inexpensive device to measure the extent of exposure of individuals to atomic radiation capable of mass production to meet both military and possible civil defense needs is announced by the Department of the Army.

Designated by the Army Signal Corps as a self-developing photographic dosimeter, the device is small and light, may be hung around one's neck like a soldier's "dog-tag", yet will measure very slight to fatal doses of radioactivity.

A reading can be obtained from the dosimeter one minute after exposure, without recourse to a photographic laboratory or the use of supplementary equipment.

The dosimeter was developed under the sponsorship of the Signal Corps Engineering Laboratories, Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, by the Polaroid Corporation, Cambridge, Mass. It employs principles discovered by Dr. Edwin H. Land, President of Polaroid, and used in the Land camera.

Because it works on a photographic principle, the dosimeter's sensitivity can be changed simply by altering the type of photographic emulsion used.

The dosimeter consists of a small metal case containing a flat paper package. The package, or plaque, in turn contains photographically sensitized film and a pod of developing solution. The film has graduated scales on its outer edges and an unexposed center part. Exposure to gamma radiation causes the center strip to turn light—the greater the exposure, the whiter the strip. By comparing the center strip with

the graded scale on the edges, a good measure of the dosage of radiation received by the dosimeter's user can be made. Shielding in the case blocks out alpha and beta radiation, since gamma rays are the ones to be reckoned with in an atomic explosion.

When an individual suspects that he has been exposed to dangerous radiation, he merely pulls a tab from the case. The tab is attached to the film plaque, which is removed. As the plaque passes through a narrow slit in the case, it breaks the pod containing the photographic developing fluids, and spreads the chemicals over the test strip and scale inside the plaque. The user waits approximately one minute, breaks open the plaque, examines the test strip and scale, and learns the extent of his exposure.

The Signal Corps said the cases can be made for less than a dollar and can be used repeatedly. The film plaques will cost about five cents, and new ones can be inserted in the cases after each exposure.

Steps are being taken to initiate pilot production of the device for military use. Large quantities will not be available for at least six months.

"No sooner had our little boy Darwin Lee, age 3½ at the time he was stricken, entered Parkland hospital that we were given the very definite assurance that he would have 24-hour nursing care, constant vigilance of the wonderful doctors there, the iron lung, the oxygen tent, entavenous feeding, suction machine, and immediate surgery if needed.

"He did need these things and countless other things too numerous to put in a letter. All these things are provided for by the polio foundation (National Foundation for Infantile Para-

lysis) for all creeds and colors alike, for polio plays no favorites, believe me I know.

"Our little boy was sixty-nine days in the hospital with bulbar polio in the worst possible way to live. Never, can enough praise for thanks be given them. And certainly not too many dimes, dollars, quarters given to this ever-increasing march against polio."
