



WE HEAR a lot about a "better world." God pity the poor lout who thinks the world as it is, ds all right! And may God stab awake those who are afraid to try to make

this world better. If you want to see a group of people who are not afraid, and are really working at this, go ા**ં .** your nearest Sunday sehool. There you will find teachers of religion., They may be doing a good job or

Dr. Forem: a poor one but anyhow they trying. And when one of the teachers succeeds, even a little. what they are all trying to do. world has already been ma. little better.

Greatest of Teachers EVERY Sunday/school teach any other sort, for that is should study the methods of Jesus to see what good teaching can be. He is and will always be THE Teacher.

His object was not to teach science or history. The only technique he taught was the most important of all—the technique of fine living. His object was to teach "what we are to believe, concerning, God, and what duties God requires of

In short, his subjects were Faith and Life, not separately but welded

#### Down Where We Live

**H**is method was always simple. He did not use long words, he did not 'put his hay on such a high shelf that only intellectual giraffes could reach it," as Billy Sunday expressed it. Common people heard him gladly, because he taught in the kind of language they used, he spoke of things that were familiar to them:

So the good teacher today never teaches over the heads of the class. This means he has to have a good imagination, has to make believe to himself that he is one of the class instead of the teacher. He has to remember how the world looked to him when he was a boy, he has to stay young in

Jesus could surely have taught more profoundly than he did. Indeed, he said at the end of his days, 'I have many things to say .. but ye cannot bear them now." However true a thing might be, he would not say it if his hearers. were not ready for it.

The good teacher, will always use illustrations. But the best ones will come right out of the experience of the pupils. Jesus never quoted from a book his hearers had not read. He never used illustrations that only a Ph.D. could understand. Furthermore, he never tried to teach two things at once.

A teacher, looking over a Sunday school lesson, may find it full of suggestive ideas; but it is generally better to pick out one truth and illustrate it in several ways, as Jesus did when speaking of the Kingdom of God, than it is to try to bring out everything that could be brought out, and so confusing the class.

Making Them Think

OW some teachers, trying to be simple, succeed only in being dull. The good teacher must keep the class awake, otherwise no one can learn anything. There is a good motto which might be borrowed by all Sunday school teachers: "Nothing that is not interesting; not everything that is interesting; nothing merely because it is Interesting.'

Jesus gained attention and interest in various ways. One was the "cryptic" nature of his teaching; that is, it was often puzzling. There was often something that sent listeners away thinking: Now what did he mean by that?

Confucius once remarked: "I give my pupil one corner of an idea. If he cannot get the other three corners for himself, I do not want him for my pupil." So Jesus often gave out one corner of a truth and let his hearers (and ourselves!) wrestle out the other three.





Because it works on a photographic principle, the dosimeter's sensitivity can be changed simoly by altering the type of pho-

The dosimeter consists of a mall metal case containing a flat paper package. The package, or plaque, in turn contains photographically sensitized film and pod of developing solution. The ilm has graduated scales on its outer edges and an unexposed center part. Exposure to gamma radiation causes the center strip to turn light—the greater the exposure, the whiter the strip. By comparing the center strip with

good measure of the doseage of News office. radiation received by the dosimeter's user can be made. Shielding in the case blocks out alpha and beta radiation, since gamma rays are the ones to be reckoned

When an individual suspects hat he has been exposed to dangerous radiation, he merely pulls a tab from the case. The tab is attached to the film plaque, which is removed. As the plaque passes through a narrow slit-*i*n the case, it breaks the pod containing the photographic developing fluids, and spreads the chemicals over the the test strip and scale inside the plaque. The user waits approximately one minute, breaks open the plaque, examines the test strip and scale, and learns the extent of his ex-

The Signal Corps said the cases an be made for less than a dolor and can be used repeatedly: The film plaques will cost about five cents, and new ones can be nserted in the cases after each exposur**e**.

Steps are being taken to initiate pilot production of the device for military use. Large quanities will not be available for at least six months.




