Stray Dogs To Be Disposed Of Now The City Council this week has

started the process of ridding the town of stray and unlicensed dogs. A dog pound has been milt in the city warehouse where stray dogs will be kept for a maxium of three days, before they are disposed of.

Dick Bass. City Manage states the dogs will be picked up and put in the pound and a record of the type dog will be kept in the office of the City Secretary. Owners of the dogs may claim them during the three day period, but in order for the ovner to get the dog he must have the dog vaccinated against rables, buy a city dog license and pay board on the dog for the time he stays in the pound. These requirements will be strictly adheared to .

Citizens are requested to cooperate with the city m getting rid of the stray dogs. It you see a dog running around loose in your neighborhood that does not have a collar with an up to date rables, vaccination and city dog license on you are asked to call the City Hall immediately As someone will be there to pick the dog up and put him in the
