### A. D. Hunter, Sr. Buried Here Thursday, July 12

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church Thursday, July 12, at 4:30 p. m. for Archie Dean Hunter, Sr., who died at his home in Santa Anna Wednesday afternoon from a heart attack. Hunter suffered two light attacks on Tuesday. He was 56 years, 1 month and 11 days old. He was a son of the late L. W. and Victoria James Hunter.

Mr. Hunter was born in Santa Anna May 30, 1895 and attended the Santa Anna schools, graduating in 1915. In 1916-17 he attended Texas A. & M. College, before entering the military service during World War I. After his discharge from the service he returned to Santa Anna and entered the grocery business with his brother, Lee, and has been associated with the firm since 1920. The store was established by their father in 1906 and has since 1920 been known as the Hunt & Bro. Grocery and Market.

On June 7, 1922 he was married to Miss Ora Mae Harper, daughter of another pioneer family of Santa Anna. To this union were born three sons and one daughter, all of whom survive.

Mr. Hunter was a member of the Methodist Church and the Masonic Lodge.

Woodruff of Brownwood; Mrs. Theo Kirkpatrick of Santa Anna; Mrs. Joe Roberston of Austin; two brothers, Roger Hunter of Austin, and Lee Hunter of Santa Anna, and one granddaughter, Elizabeth Mae Hunter, age 4 months, of Dallas.

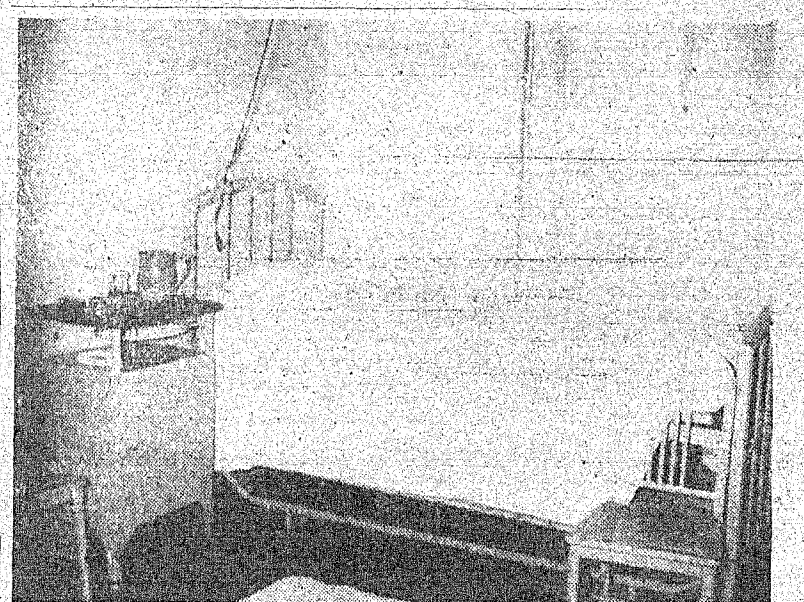

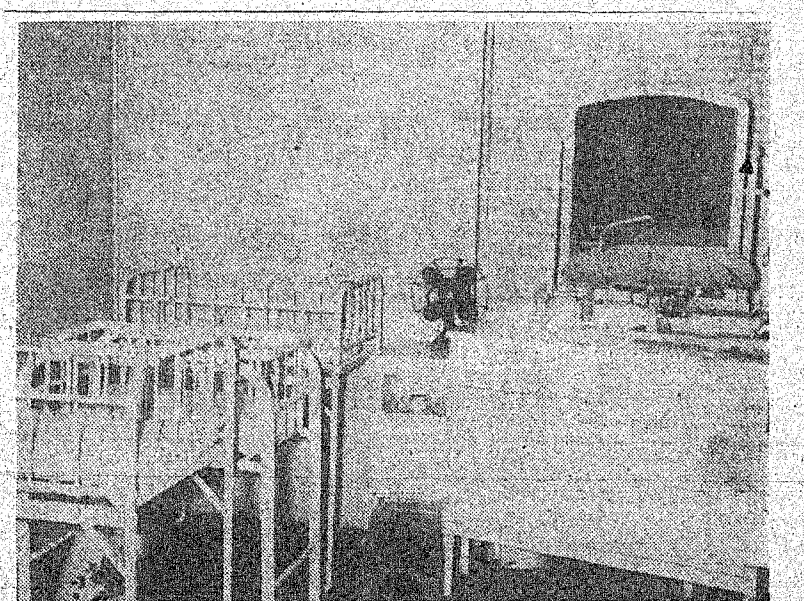

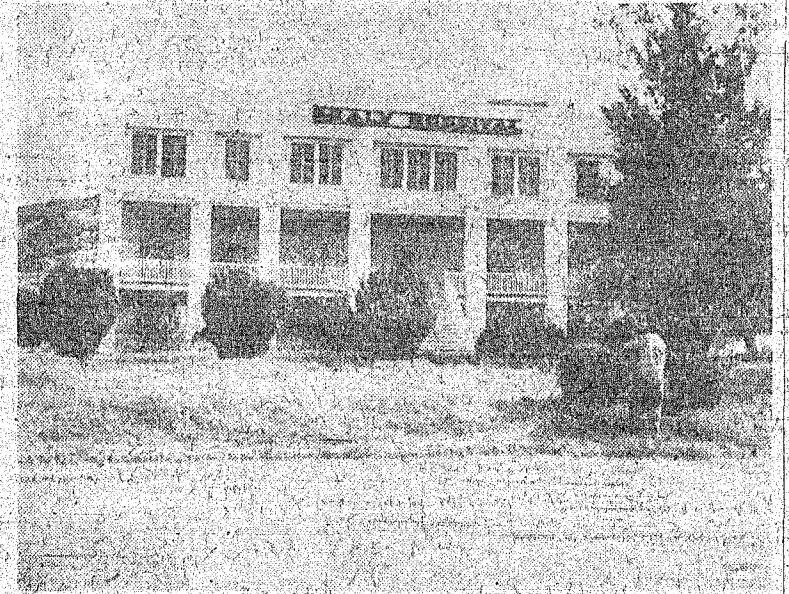

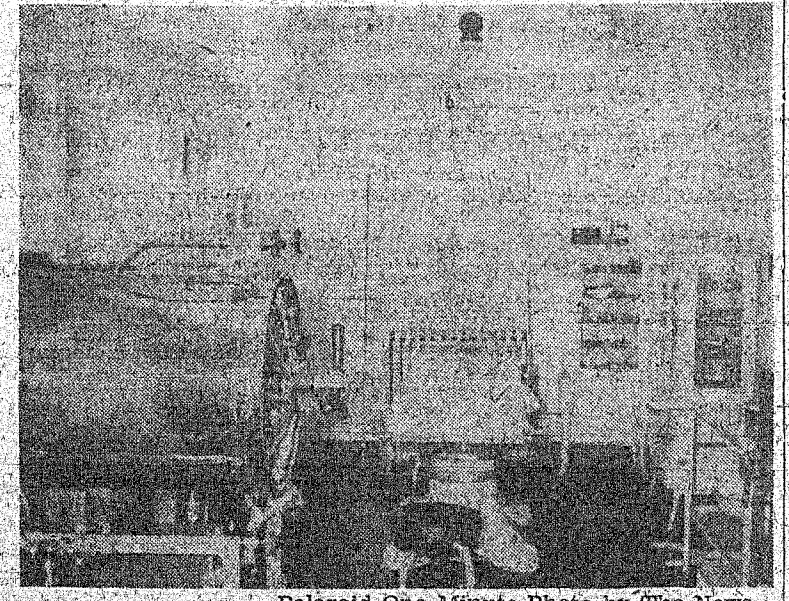

Dear Sirs:  
Will you please put me on your mailing list and mail me a bill for one year, and would like for you to publish the enclosed letter.

I just do not know how to express my gratitude or appreciation to the citizens of the Rockwood Cemetery caretakers.

Many years ago my grandfather, Daniel Epps, with a little handful of others, pioneered in southern Coleman County and McCulloch County. He spent many years there. My father established at Rockwood, but we wandered, and none of our family stayed at Rockwood after maturity.

Last week I wandered back for a much enjoyed visit to the old home town area. While there my wife mentioned the derivative of this letter. Where was Grandpa Epps buried? **New Insecticide For Farm Use**

Recently a new insecticide highly poisonous not only for insects but also for man and animals has become available commercially said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. It is known under the trade name of "Parathion" and has proven quite effective for certain agricultural uses.

Because of its extremely high toxicity it would be desirable if its use could be restricted to a few individuals who make a business of applying it and educate themselves so as to insure

the maximum of safety. In Texas and a number of other states, however, there are no laws making such restricted use possible. Therefore, a brief statement of warning is being offered.

"Parathion in the pure state is a brownish liquid with a high boiling point and a peculiar odor. It mixes but slightly with water, but is completely soluble in alcohol, acetone and certain other similar solvents. Under factory conditions it is usually mixed with a powder such as talc or bentonite as a carrier and appears on the market as a powder which has absorption through the skin. The latter may be indirect absorption such as from contaminated clothing.

use of precautionary measures so as to prevent contact. The user should seriously study and observe these precautions. The user should also be alert for symptoms of poisoning so that a physician may be in attendance without delay should he be needed. Atropine, a potent medicine, has been mentioned as an antidote. It should be borne in mind that this is another poison about as dangerous, if improperly used, as is parathion. It should only be used under competent medical direction.

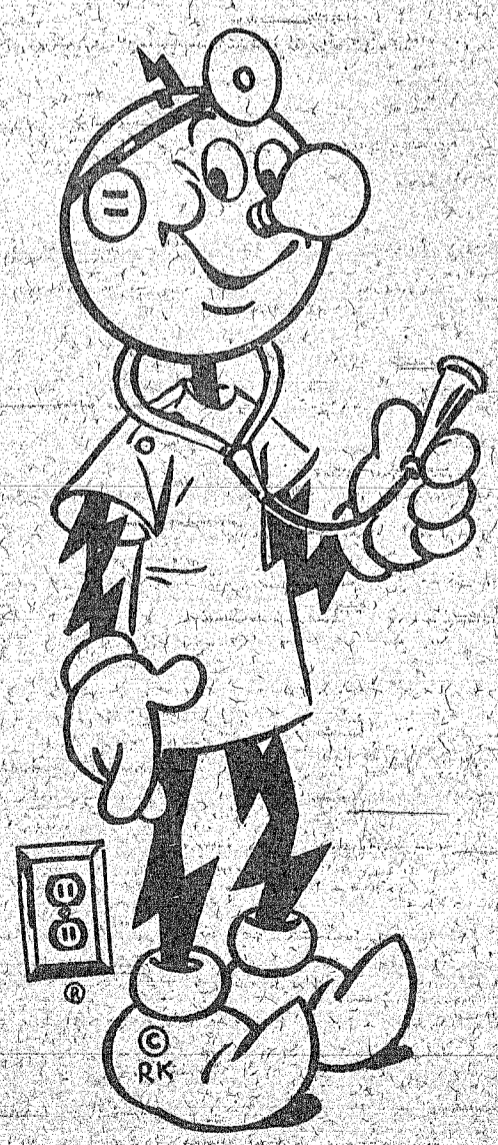

## Buffalo Hunt Told By Plains Old Time Hunter

The following story, told to Mr. Ben Moore of O'Donnell by Mr. Frank M. Sherrod of Tahoka, recently appeared in The Lynn County News, published at Tahoka, Texas. Moore collects data about the history of Texas, and has published one book about it. He has been here to attend the Annual Ex-Texas Ranger's convention, and expresses his desire to attend again, but will not be able to attend this year.

Here is the story as Frank Sherrod related it:

"I am now past ninety-four years of age, so it goes without saying that very few, possibly none remain who were real buffalo hunters. I experienced a good many thrills before becoming old enough to engage in the business of killing buffalo.

"During the 'early' seventies there was but one store, one blacksmith shop, and a saloon in Brownwood, Tex., our home. The woods were full of bear, panthers, turkeys, and other game. But above all, we were in constant fear of Indians.

"In the year of 1873 a fight took place out near the present town of Bangs between Texas Rangers and a band of Comanches. The post oaks out there were well riddled with bullets and flint spikes, which in later years were often found in logs as we burned them in our fireplaces. Following this fight the Rangers picked up one Indian with about forty bullet holes in his body. I have a most vivid recollection of the Rangers as they returned, riding along the one street, each with an Indian dragged along with a rope tied to the horse's tail, seemingly as unconcerned as though they were bringing in so many bears. The reason for their being so angry was that the Indians had slipped into camp and had stolen a num-

ber of horses, and several saddles as well. This was about the worst insult possible in the eyes of a Texas Ranger.

"My first long-drawn-out buffalo hunt occurred in the late fall of 1874, when I left home with my older brother, Noah, Mr. Hardester and son, Price, and Tom Starky. The first night out, we camped at Santa Anna Mountain. Next morning, while eating breakfast, we saw seven buffalo quite a distance away. Noah and I grabbed our rifles and commenced stalking them. Since they were traveling at a rather fast pace, Noah soon turned back toward camp. But this being my first experience, I kept right after them. Finally, I squatted and fired into the little bunch. Luck was with me. At the crack of my gun, one of them fell mortally wounded.

"We then hitched up our oxen and started in a northwesterly direction into the section near the present town of Snyder, where J. Wright Moor, king of all buffalo hunters, settled two years later. There we struck what was known as the Syndicate Trail and followed it out to the Tahoka Lake section of the Plains, where we made camp and remained for two weeks. At that early date Tahoka Lake was a very well known landmark.

"Buffalo sometimes drank from this alkali lake, but a good spring at the northwest and another at the southwest part of the lake were their principal watering places. Deep trails were made by buffalo leading to Tahoka, Cedar and other large alkali lakes on the Plains which are readily noticed by old-timers to this day. We found a large number of buffalo in the Tahoka Lake region and killed many before moving over to some springs several miles southwest of our earlier camp. After killing a good number we decided to move down along the headwaters of the Colorado River. After getting our new camp well established, we began reconnoitering for game.

"This location was somewhere within the triangle which touches Lamesa, Gail and O'Donnell, where several branches of the Colorado rise, each of which contains watering holes to this day. In that section are many bleak red hills which stand out in a greatly eroded area, upon one of which I took my stand and was soon rewarded by having a large herd begin passing within rifle range. I soon decided that I was a pretty good shot for within an hour's time I had downed 27 of the shaggy beasts.

"In the meantime snow was falling in such great profusion that it became difficult to move with safety among the steep, narrow canyons. This herd appeared to be very hungry. I saw a number fall into snow-filled canyons, disappearing entirely from sight.

"We dried some meat, salting down a great amount each day following a kill. About 65,000 pounds was hauled back to Brownwood at the end of this hunt. I killed 165 buffalo in this trip myself, but the humps and hindquarters were the principal portions saved. It is not likely that any wagon tracks other than our own had been made about Tahoka Lake before we were there in 1874.

"While drying meat just before leaving for Brownwood, Rangers killed four Indians near our camp, two of which proved to be 'White' Indians (renegade white men). They had stolen a bunch of horses in the settlements and were passing near when overtaken by the Rangers. In the skirmish an Indian girl was captured—a very unusual occurrence on the frontier. They brought her into camp and gave her to us. We tied her to a wagon wheel and shortly after their departure we turned her loose. I have seen a lot of wild-life but I do believe that this girl could have put a coyote to shame for speed. She really split the wind as far as we could see her, heading up the Colorado. I have never doubted that she easily returned to her band. Indians seldom become lost."

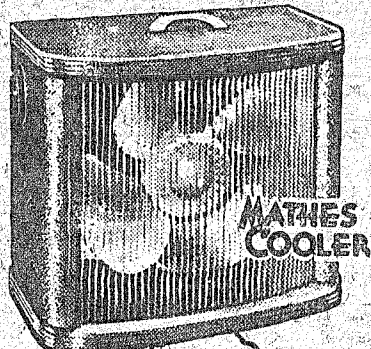

### S. S. Representative In Coleman Tuesday

Mr. Ralph T. Fisher, Manager of the Abilene office of Social Security Administration, will be at the office of the Department of Public Welfare in Coleman at 1:00 p. m. on Tuesday, July 24.

Persons wishing assistance with retirement claims of death claims under the Social Security Act, or needing information about their social security accounts, should call at that time for necessary help and information.

Mr. Fisher called attention to the fact that the wife of a retired worker may receive social security benefits before she is age 65 provided she has in her care a child entitled to benefits based on her husband's social security account. The wife's benefit is one-half of the amount of her husband's benefit.

"Children" include adopted and step-children. For a step child to qualify, the wage earner must have been married to the child's mother three years before the day on which the appli-

cation is filed. Also, the wife must be living with her husband.

The benefit of a wife under 65 terminates if her marriage to the wage earner is ended by divorce, or when the child arrives at age 18, marries or dies. At the time the claim is filed the wife must submit proof of marriage.

### Public Is Urged To Insist On Sanitation In Eating Places

Austin — The Texas State Department of Health cannot maintain daily inspection of all eating places and the public is urged by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to insist on the sanitation of the establishment where they eat. If the public is careless in this respect the incentive to maintain clean food service will be lessened and operators will only maintain the level the public is willing to accept. He urged that the public patronize "eating establishments which measure up to a high standard of cleanliness."

The State Health Department is making every effort to improve sanitation of eating places. Dr. Cox said, and there is "no excuse for cafe owners not taking advantage of the food handlers schools which are being offered all over the state." He added that there are laws, rules and regulations which require the use of approved equipment and methods in such establishments.

"The public should be aware of these sanitary rules and regulations and insist that restaurateurs observe them. Patrons should realize that tables and counters will be many times cleaner than the kitchen and other places out of sight," he warned.

He urged milk appraisal by the patrons also. Texas law requires that a milk bottle cap state the grade of milk, and whether it is raw or pasteurized. "Insist on having the milk served in its original container, with a covered cap and a legal label," Dr. Cox advised.

"Obviously," he said, "the best in sanitation can be had only by close co-operation between the public and the investigators of

the State Health Department."

But if you live in the typical American town or country community, you not only cannot help knowing everybody more or less, but you want to know them, you need to know them.

SOME communities cease to be communities and become exclusive clubs; no strangers can break in. A lady in a very old county in a long settled state, said of her next-door neighbors: "That family came here sixty years ago; they don't really belong here."

Now a true community ought to include every one in it, and it isn't a real community until it does. Jesus' parable of the sheep and the goats suggests this.

The trouble with the "goats" was that they just never saw the down-and-out members of the community at all. Your own neighborhood has in it, perhaps, some lonely people, unfortunate people, some human left-overs. What is the community doing for them?

**The Church and Its Own**

ONE practical thing that Christians can do for their communities is to see to it that no Christian suffers want. However much we may disagree with the Mormons, there is one feature of the Mormon church which the rest of us might take to heart: in all the depression of 20 years ago, there never was a Mormon on relief.

Probably in most small communities the separate congregations are not large enough to do this kind of thing effectively; but surely in a community where there are as many as three or four different denominations, they might all plan together so that whenever any Christian got into a strait, the rest of the Christians would stand by to help him.

There will always be a need for general organizations such as the Red Cross or the Grange and the Community Chest; but if Christians always stood by Christians, the rest of the community would at least have less to worry about.

**Draft Law Extended To July 1, 1955**

Austin — The draft law, scheduled for expiration July 9, has been extended in amended form to July 1, 1955. Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director, reminded Texas people today.

General Wakefield noted the following important changes in the Selective Service act:

1. Men inducted will serve for 24 months as compared to 21 under the old law. Males must register at the age of 18, as formerly.
2. Men are liable for induction at age 18½ instead of 19. No man below 19 can be inducted so long as a board has eligible older men.
3. Physical and mental standards for service have been lowered, with the result that some men now classified IV-F will be found suitable for I-A.
4. The present strength of the armed forces, approximately 3½ million, can be raised to 5 million men.
5. Except for cases of extreme hardship, a man may not be deferred for dependency on the basis of a wife alone.
6. Men now or hereafter de-

ferred on educational, occupational, farming, or dependency grounds may remain liable for service until age 35. Men not deferred are liable only to 26th birthday.

7. Conscientious objectors to military service shall be ordered by local boards, subject to regulations prescribed by the President, to perform civilian work in the national interest for 24 months.

8. Men entering the service by way of a draft board are obligated to serve six years in the reserves after discharge.

9. High school students will be deferred until graduated, until they attain age 20, or until they fail school work.

10. Some college students may be deferred on the basis of class standing during last completed school year or on the basis of a government-sponsored test. The local board is not bound to defer on the basis of this information, but can defer on consideration of it. Some other college students may be deferred on a less competitive basis.

11. No inducted man may be assigned overseas until he has had four months training.

12. All enlistments in the armed forces, reserve and regular,

which expire after July 9, may be extended by the President for one year. No person shall have his enlistment extended a second time.
