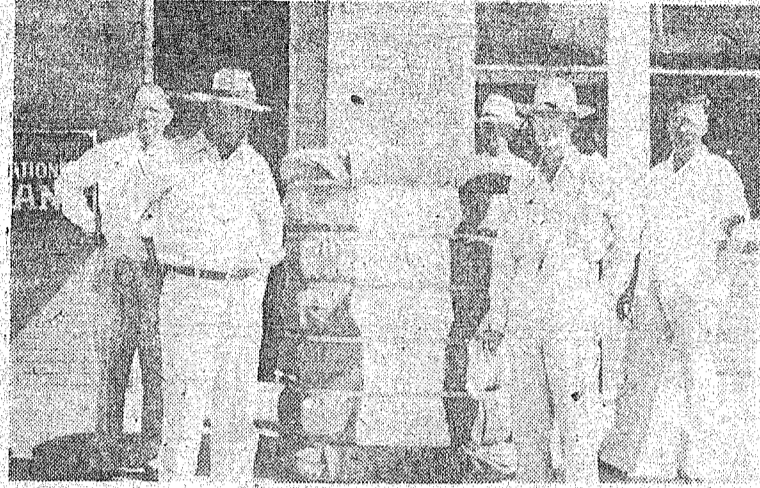

Additional Source Of Funds Available To Farmers

An additional source of funds for crop production purposes is available to farmers in a 9-county area in Southwest Central Texas where an extended drought has caused a virtual crop failure, Coleman County Supervisor, John H. Curry of the Farmers Home Administration has announced. His agency is to provide funds to farmers in counties who have suffered production losses on crops and livestock, for seed, fertilizer and materials for insect control, where needed, gas and oil for tractors, essential farm and home operating expenses, and repairs to machinery and other incident to production of a crop.

Counties included in the area are: Brown, Comanche, Coleman, Concho, McCulloch, Mills, Menard, Runnels and San Saba.

Before a loan may be made, the applicant must have suffered damage as a result of the prolonged dry weather and he cannot obtain the credit applied for from banks or other responsible local sources. Disaster loans will not be made for the purpose of refinancing existing debts, either secured or unsecured, or for the payment of cash rent.

Following a survey of the affected counties, L. J. Cappelman, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration, issued a statement in Dallas concerning the purpose of the loan program. Federal credit of this type will be available to family-type farmers who have sustained losses and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds required to carry on their farming operations and put in a crop in 1952.

Designation of the 9-county area followed recommendations submitted by local credit agencies through Cappelman's office. Designation is made by the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture, when justified.

Improved farming practices that are emphasized in the Farmers Home program are discussed and agreed upon between the County Supervisor and the applicant at the time loan application is prepared. Funds necessary to finance a crop program are available now, the Supervisor stated. His office is located in the second floor of the Coleman County Agriculture Building, in Coleman, Texas.

Funeral services were held at the Rockwood Baptist Church Monday, September 10, at 3 p. m. for James Campbell King, 85 years, 8 months and 20 days old, who died at his home in Rockwood at 1:30 a. m. Sunday, September 9.

Mr. King, born December 20, 1865 in Robertson County, Texas, was married to Luella Brusenhan September 11, 1892 at Mooresville, Falls County, Texas. To this union were born three sons and four daughters.

on-slaught of the Junction eleven in Brady Saturday night, 27-6. During the first quarter the Hornets looked fairly good, but began tiring early and Junction had charge of the game the other three quarters. With a new coach at Rochelle, a determination for his team to win, and a game experience on the Mountaineers this year, the Rochelle eleven is expected to be gunning for a win — the same as the local eleven is expected to be doing.

The Mountaineers opened the season last year with Rochelle and beat them 25-0. This year there are 32 boys coming out for football, but one of them will not be eligible to play because of transferring from one school to another. There are 10 returning letter men and 7 returning squad men. Our line will average 156 pounds and the backfield will average 148 pounds, which is not a heavy squad at all, but more of an average team.

Rochelle has 17 men from last year's team in their line-up, with 6 of them having lettered for 2 years or more. Their line averages 160 pounds and the backfield averages 145 pounds. They have a 200 pounder at left tackle that is fair and another 160 pound tackle that is good.

Both teams will make use of the Winged "T" and the straight "T" formations.

With the transferring of Santa Anna in District 7-A there was a change in the price of admission. This year the admission will be 75 cents for adults and 30 cents for students. Prices are set at the Executive District Meeting and the individual schools have nothing to do with the prices other than collecting them at the gate.

Two new projects have been staked in the Glen Cove area, both of which are projected to the regular spaced Jennings pay zone.

The first of these is a 3,809-foot rotary project as a 275-foot south of the Glen Cove townsite, and 185 feet from the east line of Section 11, T&NO

Survey. (That puts it approximately 900 feet southeast of the Luling Oil & Gas Co. No. 3 Well.)

for their No. 1 S. H. Hale as a 4,500-foot rotary project in the area 1,000 feet northeast of Glen Cove, and 175 feet from the

south and 538 feet from the east lines of Section-10, T&NO Sur.

Miami Operating Co., Inc. No. 1 T. J. Allen, Section 64, Block 1, GH&H Survey, wildcat two miles south of Valera, was drilling below 2,103 feet at last report.

Contract depth is 4,000 feet with rotary.

The same operator has plugged and abandoned No. 1 D. A. Parker, Section 26, Block 2, T&NO Survey, wildcat two miles southwest of Novice. Total depth was 3,830 feet.

L. H. Moon No. 1 L. W. Bozeman, J. H. Grimes Survey 710, wildcat five miles northwest of Coleman, has been plugged and abandoned at 2,910 feet.

W. J. Murray & J. L. Collins & Co. No. 1 Ed Hamon, Jr., wildcat 10 miles west of Coleman, has been abandoned at 3,437 feet.

Two and one-half miles west of Santa Anna, Davis & Calvin, et al, semi-wildcat in Block 6, J. Scott Survey 665, has been abandoned at 1,845 feet.

A wildcat location has been staked nine miles south of Santa Anna.

It is to be the Sloan Wells of Santa Anna No. 1 Pettway, slated for 1,250 feet with rotary. Drill site is 180 feet from the south and 200 feet from the west lines of the 2000-acre lease in S. D. Harper Survey.

Plugged at 2,334 feet was the C. U. Norton No. 1, E. L. Wilder, et al, D. A. Murdoch Survey 730, one and one-half miles east of Coleman.

C. O. Davis No. 1 Alfred Herring, Dugold McLean Survey 737, four and one-half miles northeast of Talpa, has been plugged at 3,650 feet.

An offset to the discovery well in the Glen Cove area has been completed.

The new producer is Bishop Oil Co. No. 1 W. H. Davis, Section 11, T&NO Survey, west offset to the discovery well in the new Glen Cove Jennings Sand Field. No. 1 Davis had a daily potential of 150 barrels of 42 gravity oil, flowing through 12-64 choke with 600 pounds on casing and 100 pounds on tubing. It is producing from 38 perforations at 3,351-67 feet. Operator set casing

at 3,371 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 650-1.

A new wildcat location has been staked seven miles north-east of Santa Anna.

It will be Horace E. White of Brownwood No. 3 Roseoe W. Hirsch, et al. Slated for 1,600 feet with cable tools. It will be 1,360 feet from the west lines of Section 25, H. Crocheron Survey 656.

One and one-half miles east of Fisk, Naomi S. Gregg of Houston No. 1 Shirley O. Throgmorton has been spotted as a wildcat.

Drill site is 440 feet from the south and east lines of a 208.3-acre lease in Colecan CSL Survey 92, A-746. Permit depth is 2,500 feet with cable tools.

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Churches Unite
Lesson for September 14, 1951

MORE THAN 200 different denominations of the Christian church exist in the United States alone. Several of these claim to be the one and only "true" church, but even those that do not make this claim are sufficiently pleased with themselves to stay on as separate denominations. Some Christians find this division of Christendom a scandal and a sin. Others find it the glory of Protestant Christianity that it has freedom and room for so many varieties of Christian faith. Has the Bible anything to say about this?

The Mother of All Churches

You will not find such words as "denomination" in the New Testament. Such words as Episcopalian, Lutheran, Baptist (referring to a church), Presbyterian, Mennonite, Roman Catholic, or other modern tags, are not to be found in the Scriptures.

All the same, our lesson passages give us some important suggestions. Luke tells how horrified the disciples were at discovering some one not of their own organization, doing good work in Jesus' name. They would have stopped him; but Jesus said, "He that is not against us is for us."

That is a good way to think about other Christian churches. The story in Acts 11 tells how churches in the earliest times helped one another in various ways. II Cor. 9 shows how the good example of one church can be a challenge to others to do still better.

As that Jerusalem meeting handed down a decision affecting many congregations and persons, so now the findings and decisions of great bodies of churches have a weight and an importance far beyond what might be said by single congregations. That council was the mother of all councils as the New Testament church was the mother of all churches.

All Christians Are Brothers

IN HIS first letter to that problematic church of Corinth, their first pastor Paul urges the different parties in the church to remember above all that they are Christ's people rather than any one's else. The name of Christ is far more important than any of our denominational labels.

In his letter to the Philippians Paul says an even more striking thing. "I know that some are preaching Christ out of jealousy, to annoy me . . . but what does it matter? The fact remains that Christ is being preached, whether sincerely or not, and that fact makes me very happy."

It manifests our oneness in Jesus Christ as divine Lord and Savior; his is the mandate we obey and his the power on which we rely. Our hope is in him. In him we see the solution of the world's ills. The council itself is a demonstration of his power to unite his followers in joyous cooperation."
