## Ex-Convict Wanted For Robbery Captured Here Mon.

Hilton Ward Walters, 22, wanted for armed robbery and car theft in Odessa, was captured in Santa Anna at 1:30 p. m. Monday by Highway Patrolmen H. G. Palmer and H. B. Holder, Jr. Walters has served one term in the state penitentiary at Huntsville.

The Patrolmen spotted the car while it was stopped at the traffic light at the intersection of Wallis Ave and First Street and thought it was one they had a pick-up order on. They stopped the car and Walters did not have a drivers license and claimed the car belonged to his mother in Carlsbad, New Mexico. He was taken to Earl Irick's Justice of the Peace office, where checks were made with the Odessa Police Department to verify the stolen car. Later in the afternoon, Walters was carried to Coleman, where he was lodged in jail and the Odessa Sheriff was to pick him up.

Walters was driving a 1950 Mercury with a New Mexico license plate. Some dope was found in the car, along with numerous other items. No gun was found.

## Injuries and Fumbles Mar Football Game Fri.

Melvin Pollock, regular starting right half back for the Santa Anna Mountaineers suffered a muscle injury in practice last week and was not allowed to play in the game against Richland Springs, other than for a few minutes right at the last of the game. Pollock is the regular Mountaineers' punter. Charles Scarbrough was also suffering from a charlie-horse, but played most of the game from the right half position. Normally Scarbrough is the tail back, but was replaced by Jimmy Lee Robinett for this game. Both boys are expected to be in fair condition for the game this week end with the Baird Bears.

The loss of the ball six times on fumbles hurt the final score, but the Mountaineers never lost their spirit, and all the boys played a fine game. The Mountaineer line was particularly outstanding, allowing the Coyotes to gain only 55 yards during the entire game on ground plays. The Mountaineers won by a 12-6 count.

Records of the game show Santa Anna 15 first downs to 3 for Richland Springs; Santa Anna 371 yards rushing, Richland Springs 55; yards lost rushing, Santa Anna 13, RS 32; Santa Anna attempted 4 passes, completed 2 for 35 yards, RS attempted one pass and completed it for 15 yards; the Mountaineers punted (or attempted to punt) 4 times for 47 yards, RS punted nine times for 288 yards; Santa Anna received 3 penalties for 15 yards and RS 2 for 20 yards; the locals lost the ball 6 times on fumbles and RS lost it once.

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## FIRST QUARTER

The Mountaineers kicked off to the RS 10 and they returned to their 27 and fumbled, with SA recovering. Two plays put the ball on the RS 11 and the Mountaineers fumbled with RS recovering. RS gained nine yards and lost 7 then kicked to their 49. In four plays the Mountaineers were on the RS 2-foot line and lost the ball on a fumble. RS kicked to the Mountaineers 44 and five plays had the ball back on the RS 6-inch line, where another fumble cost the locals the ball. RS kicked to their 43. The Mountaineers took the ball, gained 8 yards, lost 5 on a penalty, gained 17 yards on a jump pass, then gained 13 on the ground as the quarter ended.

## SECOND QUARTER

Mountaineers ball on the RS 11 yard line. Two plays put the ball on the RS 2 and Scarbrough crashed over for the first counter. Dean Bass's kick for the extra point was bad. The Mountaineers kicked to the RS 8 and they returned it to their 31 yard line. A five yard penalty set RS back on their 26, they gained 7 yards and a short kick gave the Mountaineers the ball in the RS 37 yard line. Two plays and the locals fumbled and RS recovered on their 30 yard line. After a gain of four yards RS kicked to the Mountaineers 39 yard line. Two plays and an attempted pass failed to gain and the locals kicked to their 32 yard line. RS gained 14 yards and lost 3 then kicked to their 31 yard line. The locals returned the kick to the RS 33. Two plays put the ball in the RS 41 yard line, the locals lost 4 yards, a penalty cost them 5 yards, then they gained 6 yards as the half ended.

Santa Anna kicked to the 20 and RS returned it to the Mountaineer 38. Two ground plays cost the Coyotes 13 yards and they kicked to their 38. SA gained 8 yards and fumbled with RS recovering on the Mountaineer 44. One play gained 3 yards, a penalty cost RS 15 yards, three plays made 3 yards and RS kicked to their 20. Robinett took the ball and returned to the Mountaineer 49, almost being in the clear, when he was hauled down. A loss of 3 yards and a gain of 13 in 6 plays caused the Mountaineers to kick to their 20. A RS pass was good for 15 yards and three plays netted only 4 yards and RS kicked to their 24 yard line. The Mountaineers returned to the 29 and the next play fumbled with RS recovering on their 29. Two plays netted no gain as the quarter ended.

It is an offset, one-half mile from the Jimmie Sand Field. Completion was 2,250 feet with rotary. Proposed depth is 2,250 feet with rotary.

Branch & Murray No. 23 J. C. Dibre, W. Hicks Survey 265, offset from Echo townsite, has been plugged with a gauge of 24 1/2 barrels of 42 gravity oil in 24 hours on pump. Production is from the open hole at 1,948-59 feet. The section was treated with Hydrafrac.

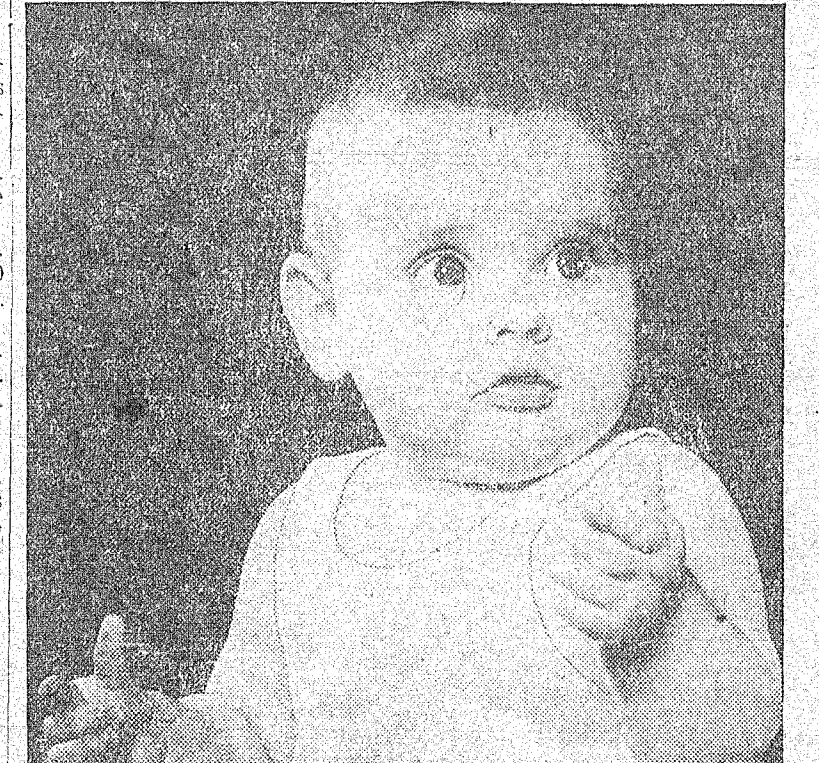

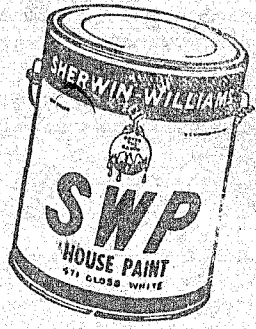

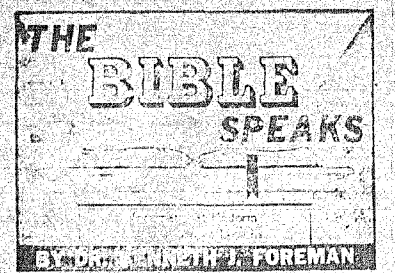

SO YOU don't believe in missions? That's a position not easy to defend, if you make any show at all of being a Christian. Can you be a business man and not believe in customers? Can you be successful and not want to expand your business? "Missions" is a name given to the growing edge of Christianity, a name for its expanding program. It is a name that stands for everything we believe in as Christians. It stands for the proposition that Christ is the answer to all the world's needs, not yours and mine alone. Christ died for the world, not for the western hemisphere or the democracies alone.

Greatest Missionary Religion

THERE ARE religions you cannot "crash," no matter what you do, unless you are born in them. For example, either you were born the child of a Parsee, or you can't ever be a Parsee.

Again, there are religions which you can join if you insist, but nobody is going to try to talk you into it. Take it or leave it. Hinduism is one such religion.

But there are three missionary religions, religions that set out to claim all the world for their territory; besides Christianity these are Buddhism and Mohammedanism.

Buddhism is 600 years older than Christianity, Mohammedanism some 600 years younger; but neither has spread into so many corners of the world as our religion has; neither has won anything like Christianity's number of converts.

Pessimists Are Always With Us

THE first Christians had not believed in missions, where would we be? Where were your ancestors when Christ was living on earth? If you are descended from any of the nations of Europe north of the Alps mountains, or from Africa, then at the time of Christ your ancestors were a barbarous lot. Using paint about as much as clothing, their favorite sports getting drunk and savage fighting, they had contributed nothing whatever to civilization.

Or, if you are descended from the peoples of western Asia or around the Mediterranean, then at the time of Christ they were civilized, but time was running out. The Roman Empire, which looked as if it might endure forever, was doomed, even though its final death-knell was still 200 years away. But decay had set in.

If you had been a church member in Antioch when Paul was the foreign missionary pastor sent out by that congrega-

"As for the nations around the Mediterranean, they are on the way out. Even if they take to Christianity, it will be only a shot in the arm. It won't save them from the crash."

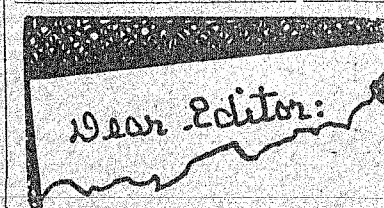

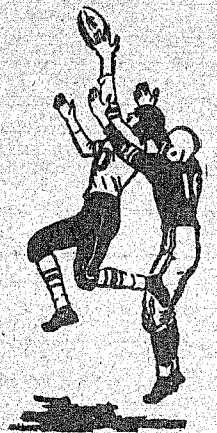

**Some Enlisted Men Eligible For Release**

Austin — Enlisted men of the Army reserve who were ordered to active duty involuntarily from the inactive or volunteer reserve and are now eligible for release under Defense Department policies are being offered an opportunity to voluntarily extend their period of service. Colonel C. M. Culp, Chief of the Texas Military District, said today.

Part of this program applies particularly to those who were inducted under the Selective Service Act of 1948 who were on active duty for a short time and released and assigned to the Organized Reserve for a five or six-year period. Many of these have been ordered back to active duty, however, the time spent in the service when inducted, plus the 17-month period they are now completing would not add up to the total required by the Act. By volunteering to stay on to complete a total of 33

months they will not be subject to active duty orders in the future.

Col. Culp stated the Army has also announced that enlisted reservists who were ordered to active service involuntarily from the inactive or volunteer reserve may now volunteer to stay on duty and complete a tour of 24 months. However, those volunteering for this additional duty will be available for worldwide assignment and cannot

later apply for release after completing 17 months or more of active duty.
