## Officials And Weather Cause Mountaineers To Lose To DeLeon

Near freezing weather caused cold hands to fumble early in the opening minutes of the Santa Anna-DeLeon game and spotted the Bearcats 7 points, then a few minutes later DeLeon intercepted a pass that spotted them 7 more points, before the game was underway five minutes. DeLeon won 1 and I should say the officials won the game 41-20, on the local field before the smallest crowd to witness a game here in over four years.

This writer does not have the habit of accusing the game officials of having anything to do with the score, but this is one instance where I do accuse the officials of either not knowing what they were supposed to be doing or they were just plain against the Santa Anna boys, as most every one who saw the game will verify. On one occasion a DeLeon boy ran out of bounds, made about five yards while out of bounds, then ran back in bounds and gained 13 yards after the local boys thought he was supposed to stop, but the officials failed to call it, and one of them was running right beside him. On numerous occasions the Bearcats advanced the ball several yards after they were down, but it never seemed to make the officials any difference, they just gave the Bearcats the additional yardage and apparently thought nothing of it. Also the Bearcat backfield was "in motion" on a number of occasions, but this was never called either. Back field in motion and advancing the ball after it is down is supposed to be a five yard penalty from where the ball was down, not from the advancement after the ball was down.

This writer does not know the names of the officials and does not want to, but I do hope they never get to work for the Santa Anna Mountaineers again. We do not begrudge the local boys losing this game. We do not feel that it was their fault. The only hard thing about it is that it is made of record and drops us from our third place standing to fifth place.

This was the week end for upsets all over the country, so far as football is concerned. Brownwood was upset by Weatherford, Brady by Coleman, Bangs by Rising Star, Santa Anna by DeLeon, and we could go on and name a large number of other games over the state where upsets took place.

### HOSTS TO WYLIE

The Mountaineers will be hosts to the Wylie Bulldogs on the local field Friday night at 7:30 p. m. Wylie has not lost a game this season, and are standing at the top of the district ladder. Naturally Santa Anna will be the underdog in this affair, and the Mountaineers are not expected to win the game. However, after seeing the Bulldogs play at Cross Plains recently, we believe the Mountaineers will give them a good game and will score more than once against the Wylie eleven.

A good crowd will give the boys more of an incentive to do their best to win this game. And, after all, this might be another week end for upsets to mar the football records of the Wylie high school.

### LOSE TO DELEON

Herman Johnson, the 225 pound fullback for the DeLeon Bearcats scored all six of their TDs last Friday night. He scored twice in the first period, once in the second period, once in the third period and twice in the fourth period. The Bearcats made five extra points.

Santa Anna scored first in the second period when Melvin Pollock took the ball over from the 4-yard line. He also made the extra point. Early in the third period Charles Scarbrough broke loose on the Mountaineer 36-yard line and ran 64 yards for the

second TD. Pollock again made the extra point. Later in the same period Pollock again crashed through center for our last score. The extra point was missed, making the score at this point 20 for the Mountaineers, 21 for DeLeon. The quarter ended 27-20.

Fumbles on both teams were numerous and the Mountaineers had two passes intercepted. The Mountaineers attempted 15 passes and completed only two of them; DeLeon attempted three passes and completed one. First downs were even, eleven for each team.

In the other district games last week Rising Star hung a 46-13 defeat on Bangs and Wylie beat Clyde 28-13.

## Funeral Services For Wayland Reveile Held Here Friday Afternoon, Nov. 2

Funeral services were held at the Assembly of God Church Friday, Nov. 2, at 3:30 p. m. for Wayland Reveile, 15, a seventh grade student, who died at 2:30 a. m. Thursday of injuries received in an automobile accident Halloween night at about 11 p. m. Reveile died of head injuries, suffered when the English-made Anglia auto of John Constable's turned over on him, just inside the city limits on the Trickham Farm-to-Market road. The Rev. Jack Farren of Bangs officiated.

Reveile and Robert Wayne Hoyt were riding on the left side of the car when it turned over. In the car were Mack Baucom, 16, driver; John Constable, 17, car owner; George Baucom, 14, and Kenneth Henderson, 14, all except Constable students in the local ward school. Baucom lost control of the car, which caused it to turn over. Hoyt was also injured, but not seriously. The two boys were taken to the Santa Anna Hospital and Hoyt had recovered enough to be taken home Saturday afternoon. The other boys were not injured.

## Take Advantage Of Your Citizenship

# Vote Tuesday

Tuesday, November 13, has been set as the day to decide the fate of five proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas. It is the God given right of every citizen in the State of Texas to go to the polls and express your opinion on these amendments. Every qualified voter should exert this privilege.

Of the five proposals, only one can we endorse. The other four will eventually increase our State taxes and we do not favor any measure that will increase the already too heavy burden on the tax payers, especially when no more benefit can be derived from the measure.

House Joint Resolution No. 37, which provides for investment of the Permanent University Fund in securities other than bonds or guaranteed by government units and agencies, is the only amendment we can endorse.

The most controversial of all amendments is House Joint Resolution No. 6, which would increase the Old-Age assistance from \$35 millions to \$42 millions. There is one clause in the amendment that makes it so controversial. It would apparently eliminate all requirements as to citizenship and residence in the State of Texas. We feel that our old folks are entitled to more money than they are getting at the present time, but we do not think this amendment will get them the money. We believe that in the course of a few months time, the money our old folks are now getting would be decreased rather than increased. When our legislature sees fit to offer an amendment that will increase the benefits to the old folks, we will favor it, even though it will increase our taxes, but not the one now in question.

The other proposals were explained recently in this newspaper, and for reasons stated then, we do not favor them. House Joint Resolution No. 22, authorizing the legislature to provide a state-wide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of counties should be defeated. It seems to us that they should be under Social Security, the same as the rest of us, and that we should not have to pay an additional tax for their retirement.

## Public Schools Will Be Closed Monday

Supt. R. K. Green announced this week that the Santa Anna School Board had authorized a holiday Monday, November 12, for the Public Schools. This holiday is in observance of Armistice Day. He also stated that the schools would observe Thursday and Friday, Nov. 22 and 23 for Thanksgiving.

House Joint Resolution No. 2, designed to increase from \$25 millions to \$100 millions the amount of bonds that may be issued for the Veteran's Land Fund making Texas veterans of service since 1945 eligible for loans, gives authority to the legislature to pay interest and principal on bonds out of the general revenue fund of the state if necessary, is a bill designed to help the veterans purchase lands over the state. In our opinion it will increase taxes in the future and also most of the land that is for sale now is too high, and the veteran would be purchasing land that will not make him the proper returns when this inflation is over. It may be possible at a later date that this would be a good bill.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 3, proposed to raise the tax rate ceiling for rural fire prevention districts from three cents to 50 cents per \$100 valuation might be a worthwhile bill in districts where more fire prevention equipment is needed. But we do not feel that this is the case in our Central Texas area. This bill could be passed and then it would be left up to the county or district to also pass the bill, but according to studies made, most of the state has enough fire fighting equipment to well care for rural peoples needs, if the fire departments are notified in time, and the departments are trained in fighting rural fires.

We do not ask you to vote as we are. All we ask of you is for you to study the bills thoroughly and go to the polls and vote the way you think would be the best for all concerned — but go vote.

## Public Schools Plan Observance Of Educational Week

Plans are going forward for National Education Week, Nov. 11-17, which will be observed in Santa Anna through the cooperation of the organizations of the community and the schools, with programs beginning Tuesday and continuing through the week. Over the nation various activities will point up the value of education, its functions in the preservation of the American way of life, and the fact that an individual, youth and adult, is ever, all his life, involved in a continuous educative process.

The general theme of National Education Week is "Unite for Freedom." Beginning with Sunday, Nov. 11, when the theme will be "Our Faith in God". Other topics will be "Schools and Defense", "Education for the Long Pull", "Teaching the Fundamentals", "Urgent School Needs", and "Home-School-Community".

The Lions Club in its Tuesday meeting will hear a group from the Program Club of the high school; Wednesday, the same program will be presented at an assembly of the high school students.

The Thursday program at the high school assembly is designed to present the theme "School-Home-Community". Invitations are going out to each and every club organization of the community to be represented on the program. Supt. R. K. Green will have charge of the assembly, which will begin at 12:45 p. m.

Thursday has also been designated as School Visitation Day. All citizens of the community are invited to visit the schools and to be present for the assembly program. Those visiting the schools are invited to visit classes in operation and to acquaint themselves with the work being done by the schools.

# Oil Activities IN COLEMAN COUNTY

J. H. Blackwell of Coleman, spotted a wildcat, four miles southwest of Coleman. It will be his No. 2 L. S. West.

Location will be 3,375 feet from the south and 2,380 feet from the east lines of John H. Barkley Survey 701.

Projected depth is 2,900 feet with rotary.

Anzac Oil Corp., et al, No. 1-L, H. Neff Unit is to be a Coleman Junction North Field location, five miles southeast of Coleman.

It will be 330 feet from the south and 148 feet from the west lines of Block 10, D. A. Murdock Survey 738. It is projected to 2,300 feet with rotary.

Kenneth Rich, et al, Midland,

will drill No. 1 W. E. Ferguson as a wildcat six miles southeast of Santa Anna.

Location for the 1,260-foot cable tool test is 239 feet from the north and 2,356 feet from the west lines of Block 3, Pleasant Young Survey.

The same operators' No. 2 P. H. Pettway will be in the same area, 400 feet from the east and 465 feet from the south lines of Block 3, same survey. It is also projected to 1,260 feet.

The Echo area gained a new producer with the completion of Brannon & Murray No. 24 J. C. Dibrell, Joseph W. Hicks Survey 265.

Daily potential was 33.36 barrels of 42 gravity oil. It is pumping from an open hole at 1,945-63 feet.

H. A. Birdwell of Coleman, No. 1 Ethel A. Switzer is to be drilled as an offset project in the Northwest Santa Anna Breneke Sand Field.

Drillsite is two miles northwest of Santa Anna, 150 feet from the south and west lines of a 33-acre tract and being approximately 650 feet from the north and 3,800 feet from the west lines of Jonathan Scott Survey 665. Proposed depth is 1,950 feet with rotary.

Plugged at 4,034 feet was Haynes B. Ownby Drilling Co. No. 1 J. P. McCord, J. H. Gibson Survey 19, wildcat three miles northwest of Glen Cove.

The Glen Cove area gained a new producer with the completion of W. C. Woolf & N. H. Wheelless Co. No. 1 E. G. Simpkins, Sec. 40, T&NO Survey.

It is located near the northwest side of the Glen Cove townsite. The well gauged 114 barrels of 44 gravity oil in four hours for a calculated daily potential of 684 barrels. Completion was on a 1/2 choke with 275 pounds on casing and 145 pounds on tubing with production from 70 perforations at 3,370-84 feet. Casing was set at 3,386 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 500-1.

One-half mile north of Glen Cove the same firm's No. 1 L. P. Whittington, Section 5, T&NO, is drilling below 1,500 feet.

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**A People Delivered**  
Lesson for November 11, 1951

ONE of the strange truths about God—strange when we are not used to it—is that he can never be seen directly. No man has seen him nor can see him, the Bible tells us (1 Tim. 6:16). God cannot be photographed or televised. The disc has never been made that will record his voice; it will not be heard on any telephone. Then how do people know God? By the eye of faith, the ear of faith. The Bible suggests that it is God himself who opens men's eyes to his presence, opens their ears to his voice.

**God in History**  
It is so when we speak of "God in history." The historian can tell us what happened; but why does it happen? The last, the final, the all-inclusive Why? is religion's question; and religion's answer, faith's answer, is always: God.

Take, for example, the well known story of the Exodus, when the Children of Israel got out of Egypt where they had been slaves for about as long as the Negroes were slaves in America before 1863. All historians agree: (1) that Israelites were in Egypt; and (2) that they got out.

But the history books do not read like the Bible. In the "Cambridge Ancient History" or in any history of the ancient Middle East, you can read the account of the Exodus with the miracles left out.

Furthermore, the historians never bring God into their tale. All they can tell us is what you could have caught with a moving picture camera or a recording machine. But God cannot be caught that way. The story of the Exodus, in the Bible, has another slant. The Hebrew folk never said "We escaped" or "It was a lucky break" or "Moses took us out." They always said, "God brought us out."

If you had been there when they crossed the Red Sea (the original Hebrew in Exodus does not use the expression "Red Sea" in this story, and it may have been one of the Bitter Lakes or even an arm of the Mediterranean—it makes no difference), armed with your camera and sound-recording devices, you could have caught the roaring of the wind and after long hours of the hurricane you would have seen the water level going back and back till finally solid ground appeared. But when your pictures were developed you would not have seen God.

**God in Our History**  
It would not do us much good, indeed, it would only make us jealous or bitter, if we thought that God had a hand in the history of Israel, but took no interest in the history of other peoples. Many centuries after the Exodus, the prophet Amos said

that God not only brought the Israelites out of Egypt, but he also brought the Philistines out of Crete (Caphor) and the Syrians out of Kir.

Still later on in the Bible God's hand is said to be leading the great conqueror Cyrus of Persia (Isaiah 45:1-4), even though Cyrus knew nothing of it. God was there, but the eye of faith was not. God is always there; and sometimes the eye of faith is there to see him.

In the history of England two of the most famous events are the defeat of the Spanish Armada, and the retreat from Dunkirk. In each case the English people were to all appearances helpless, just as the Hebrews were helpless at the Red Sea; in both cases, as at the Exodus, "the weather came to their rescue." A great wind swept the Spanish navy to destruction; and a great cloud-cover kept the Nazi airforce pent in until the British army had escaped from Dunkirk.

The weather, say historians. God, say voices of faith. Are not both right?

**Side of the Free**  
Is God on the side of the little nation?

Not always. But taking history as a whole, Christian people have reason to believe as the people of the Bible did: that God hates oppression and violence, and his "hand is against" nations that live by such means. On this Armistice Sunday it is well to remember that. If our cause is just it is not because we never lost a war.

Our cause is just if and only if it is the cause of human freedom. We have no assurance that God will stand by us otherwise.
