After the plans are approved by the health department, bids on construction will be advertised for and work should get under way in 30 to 45 days.

With wagon sides removed, place panels of Masonite '4" tempered hardboard over the entire bed. Fasten it with



bolts or screws. Necessary openings may be made with a drill and keyhole saw. The wagon sides and ends may be lined. in the same way.







Under the Taft-Hartley law the President is given authority by the Congress to cope with national emergencies such as was presented in the steel dispute. He could appoint a fact-finding board, then follow with an injunction which would defer the strike for 80 additional days during which the mediation service already set up would go into action. He has, however, made use of the 80-day cooling off period provision on two prior occasions against John L. Lewis, and both times the disputes were settled during the 80-day period.


