### SCHOOL DAYS

During the opening days of school automobile drivers are warned from almost every source to be on the look out for young children, to be careful and not run one of them down. In our opinion, this is well and good. Automobile drivers should be careful at all times and take extra precautions not to run down a child.

But we think children should also be taught to be careful and that is a job for parents to see to. Right here in our own town we see lots of children taking chances that they should know better than to do. A lot of them run across streets, and whether they look or not, is hard to tell. A large number of children ride bicycles and they can be dangerous modes of conveyance. Children who are large enough to ride bicycles are large enough to learn to obey traffic rules and regulations.

Bicycles should not be ridden on sidewalks and they should always be ridden on the right hand side of the road, with the riders obeying all traffic rules, such as hand signals, etc. Children who walk to school should always walk on the left hand side of the road, or facing the traffic, or better yet, if there is a sidewalk, they should use it. They should always be taught not to run across a street, but take their time and always look good before attempting to cross a street.

All traffic accidents are preventable and if both the pedestrian and the auto driver are careful, they will be prevented.

## Funds Available To Improve Existing Water Supply

Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor, John H. Curry, of Coleman County announces that funds are now available through the Water Facilities Program to qualified applicants who wish to improve the existing water supply on their farms or to develop and install new facilities, and who are unable to obtain the necessary credit from other local established sources.

Farmers interested in obtaining this assistance should contact Mr. Curry, whose office is located on the second floor of the Coleman County Agriculture building, Coleman, Texas, and discuss with him their needs for development or improvement of domestic, livestock, or irrigation water supplies on the farm.

## Shivers Asks Drought Relief Without Delay

Austin — Governor Shivers has assured Washington officials that Texas personnel will be available to help in the drought relief program for Texas farmers and ranchers and at the same time he called on federal agencies to get the relief program underway without further delaying activities.

Almost two weeks ago, Governor Shivers requested President Truman to declare Texas a "drought area." Following a meeting of farmers, ranchers, bankers and state and federal officials in the governor's office, Shivers asked President Truman to aid Texas farmers and ranchers under U. S. Public Law 875 so that hay could be moved into Texas at reasonable prices and other necessary help given to drought-stricken areas. He told President Truman: "Many of the small farmers and ranchers are desperately in need of assistance."

Truman passed Governor Shivers' request over to Administrator Raymond M. Foley, of the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency. The Governor then commented that he hoped the Washington Administration would not play politics in an election year while Texas farmers and ranchers were in dire need.

Governor Shivers has repeatedly told Administrator Foley that Texas has no state funds appropriated for obtaining drought assistance such as securing out-of-state hay for basic herds.

Administrator Foley has insisted that the Federal government must have assurances from the Governor of Texas that "a reasonable amount" of state and/or local funds must be available for the hay program before the state could be declared a disaster area and federal aid extended. Governor Shivers has informed him that while the state did NOT have funds for this purpose, Texas could and would supply personnel if needed.

"If we had appropriated funds for drought relief we would not be requesting assistance from the Federal government," Shivers wired Foley.

"The state of Texas has done everything possible within the legal bounds of our State laws to obtain assistance for our drought-stricken farmers and ranchers," Shivers said. "It is now up to the Federal government."

## Car Inspections Due By Saturday

All automobiles and trailers registered in the State of Texas are due to have passed an official inspection not later than Saturday, September 6. Vehicles that have not passed this inspection will not be allowed to travel on Texas highways.

A survey taken in Santa Anna early this week showed 7 of 73 vehicles still did not have the safety inspection label on the windshield.

L. A. Welch, the only inspection station in Santa Anna, reports that he is still getting more cars than he can inspect, but that he will do his best to take care of all possible.

Reports from the state headquarters indicates no extension will be granted again, because during the months previous most inspection stations have not had enough to do to keep them busy. It seems, therefore, drivers who do not get their vehicles inspected are going to be subject to conviction by law if they continue to operate their vehicles on state highways.

## Football Practice Begins With 32 Boys Reporting

The Santa Anna Mountaineers began their fall practice season Monday of this week with a large group of boys reporting. Coach Behrens stated 32 boys had been issued uniforms and there was a possibility of some other boys coming out in the near future. Practice sessions have been held at night this week, but will most likely be changed to day time practice by next week.

Of the 32 boys reporting, 10 are freshmen; six are sophomores; seven are juniors and nine are seniors. Charles Scarborough, senior, is the only three-year letterman on the squad. However, there are five two-year lettermen, nine one-year lettermen and 17 no letters, which include the 10 freshmen reporting. Prospects are good for some of these freshmen to earn a letter this year. Due to the fact that the head coach and James Pollard, assistant coach, are both new here, a starting line-up and traveling squad may not be available until near the time for the first game, which is with Junction on Friday night, September 12.

All games in District 7-A will start at 8:00 p. m. until the second week in October and they will then start at 7:30 p. m. Something new for this district will be the addition of another official, making four for each game. All officials will be from recognized football associations, mostly from Brownwood, Abilene, San Angelo and Ft. Worth associations.

This is 27 students less than the amount registered at the beginning of school last year.

The city tax rate for 1952 was set at \$1.35 per one hundred dollars valuation at a meeting of the city council Tuesday night. The rate was based on city valuation amounting to \$1,489,470.

According to Dick Bass, City Manager, this rate will lack about \$2,000 being enough money to meet the proposed city budget, but some money will be able to be transferred from certain funds into funds to pay bonded indebtedness and thereby enabling the city to meet their obligations.

The rate was set to include all oil property in the city limits of Santa Anna and all other taxable property.

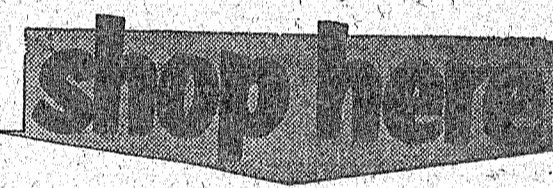

**Farmers Faced With Emergency Need For Credit**

As a result of serious drought conditions in many areas of Texas many farmers are faced with an emergency need for credit not available through local sources to buy feed for their livestock and seed and fertilizer for the planting of fall grain and pasture crops, according to L. J. Cappelman, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration of Dallas, who has received reports from every section of the State on conditions as they exist at this time. Mr. Cappelman has been told that if such assistance is not provided it will be necessary for farmers in these drought stricken areas to reduce sharply, or in many instances to liquidate entirely their livestock enterprises because of the lack of feed stuff and pasture grazing. In the interest of the farmers concerned, the agricultural economy of the areas affected and the welfare of the farming interest of Texas, the Farmers Home Administration is taking every reasonable step to prevent the liquidation of desirable productive livestock by drought stricken farmers.

Mr. Cappelman pointed out that in order to accomplish this purpose and to help farmers continue in business county offices of the Farmers Home Administration are in a position immediately to make disaster loans in any county in the State of Texas to qualified applicants in accordance with published instructions and revised policies outlined at a meeting of State Field Representatives in Dallas last week. At the meeting held here in Dallas, Mr. Cappelman received reports of serious crop losses through drought and that farmers and ranchmen are in urgent need of funds to buy feed, seed and other supplies to continue their operations for the remainder of this year. In many instances it was pointed out that these farmers will require emergency credit to put in their 1953 crops and funds are available through the local Farmers

**Home Administration County Office now for the purposes indicated. These funds are available at 3 percent interest for crop production needs, under the provisions of Public Law 38.**

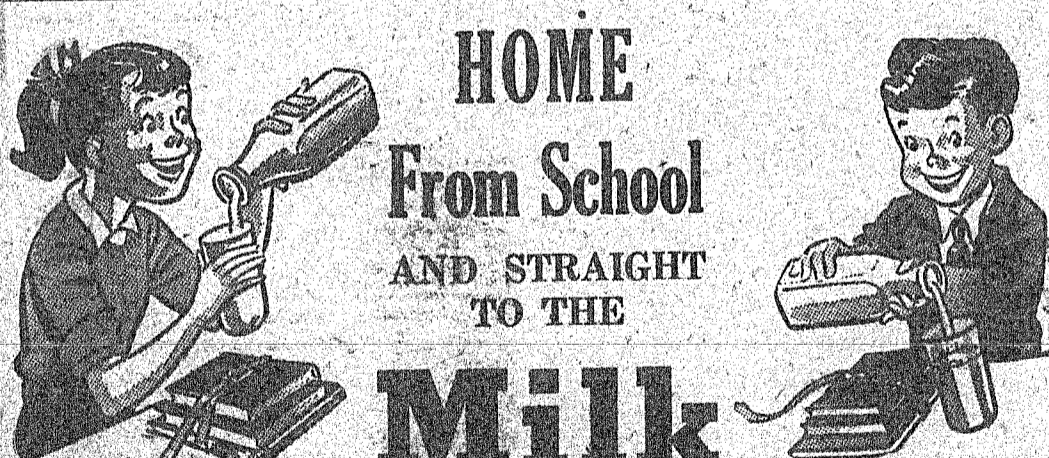
The purpose of the disaster loan program authorized by Public Law 38, said County Supervisor John H. Curry of Coleman is to provide a source of temporary or emergency credit to assist farmers in designated areas who have suffered serious production losses as a result of drought or other natural causes and who are unable to obtain from other established local sources the credit needed to continue their farming or ranching operations.

The Coleman county office of the Farmers Home Administration is located in the Agricultural building in Coleman and applicants may contact Supervisor Curry there for the purpose of discussing their needs. The Coleman county committee is composed of three farmers who certify to the eligibility of applicants for loans and otherwise assist the county supervisor in the administration of Public Law 38 and other phases of the county Farmers Administration program.

**Growth of a Soul**

Lesson for September 7, 1952

**AFTER A MAN IS DEAD,** and indeed while he is still alive, we ought to remember the best about him and forget the worst. That is how we want to be treated, ourselves. But human beings are so perverse that we often do just the opposite. We remember the worst, forget the best. This is so in the case of the great King David.

A novel was once written about him in which his life was pictured as a curve high in the middle, bending down sharply at both ends. After his great sins of adultery and murder, so the story went, he went on down and down hill to the end. This is not the picture we get from the Bible. In many ways his later days were sad; his fortunes declined, as we say. But his soul did not decline. The latter days of David show us how even a man who has sinned can rise again; how even an ageing man can grow in soul.

**Signs of Growth**

**NOT THAT** a man has to sin as David did in order to grow. In order to be healthy it is not necessary to be half-dead with ever first; yet even after a long stay in the sanitarium it is possible for a man to make his way to full health and strength.

Now David, though he fell, "did not blind his soul with clay." The experience struck down his pride; he realized with shame what he had done. Some men must wake bitterly to the fact of their own weakness before they can begin to take hold of God's strength. At any rate, we can see signs of growth in David's soul.

One of these signs is humility before God. Take the story of his flight from his capital, for example. He could have hardly been in a worse state. His loved son Absalom had become a rebel, his throne was in danger, his friends were turning against him, even his life was not safe. Another man might have committed suicide, or sat in his deserted palace bitterly awaiting the end. Another man might have returned Shimei's foul language, curse for curse.

But David moves through all this as a man who realizes he deserves his troubles, knows it is God who is bringing these hard things to pass, and bows humbly under whatever God sends. His kingdom was shrinking, but his soul was growing again.

**Is the Young Man Safe?**

**ANOTHER** plain sign of inward growth was David's attitude to his bad son Absalom. That young man had ceased to be a son, but the old man did not cease to be a father. The young man would have stopped at nothing, he would have killed his father without hesitating, in order to gain the kingdom for himself. But David was willing to lose the kingdom, if by so doing he could keep from losing his son.

General Joab, a professional killer, could see no point in David's generosity. He believed David should be a king first and a father afterwards. It was Joab who against David's strict orders finally killed Absalom.

But in death as in life, David loved that wild young man. No more tragic scene is found in history than David's lament, "Would God I had died for thee, A Absalom, my son, my son." It does not sound like a lament for a dead enemy, and it was not; it was a father's grief for his son. The grief came late; David should long before those days have remembered his duty as a father to Absalom. But late though it was, David's tears show that in him his soul still grew.

**No Cheap Sacrifice**

**ONE OTHER** sign of soul-growth comes to the surface; a single sentence from David on the day when he bought the land where the temple was to be built. The owner Ornan (Araunah) would have given the land free, but David insisted on paying the full value. "I will not offer burnt offerings unto the Lord my God which cost me nothing," he said.

No one would have blamed

him for taking advantage of the owner, cutting the price a little. When David was a younger man he might have done it; but not now. No one else would know it, perhaps; but God would know it.

It was a sign that David was no longer the half-grown soul he had once been. For a man never really grows up till he does what he does, not because of fear, or ambition, or reputation, nor for any reason but because he knows how God is going to look at it.



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**"RULES OF THE ROAD" EXPLAINED**

With the death-laden Labor Day week end just past and the usual series of football week ends coming up, the thoughts of many Texans are turning toward traffic safety. There can be no doubt but that a better acquaintance among drivers with the "rules of the road" and other traffic safety regulations could greatly reduce the death toll of our highways.

To obtain correct and authoritative information about driving is a simple matter. A letter or postcard to the Department of Public Safety, Driver's License Division, Austin, Texas, will bring an official publication, the "Texas Driving Handbook", to anyone who requests it.

Aside from considerations of personal safety, proper driving habits and observance of traffic laws will help prevent financial loss. This is true in spite of the fact that most people now carry liability insurance as a protection under the Texas "Drivers Responsibility Act." Jury verdicts in personal injury cases tend to go higher and higher, and the likelihood of suffering an adverse judgment for an amount in excess of the limits of your liability policy is ever present.

Fault, or liability, is determined by applying the law to the particular facts of an accident. In Texas the law is in several forms — the statutes as enacted by the Legislature, the ordinances of each city and town, and the court decisions in cases similar to the one to be decided.

A negligent or intentional act is necessary in order to impose legal liability for damages. Where both parties to an accident are negligent, the court will very likely say that both are at fault, and that each must pay for his own damages.

Two of the most legal rules pertaining to accidents are those having to do with "proper look-out" and "proper control." Driving in a lawful manner and complying with all ordinary traffic rules is not always sufficient. In addition, the driver is expected by law to be alert to all that is happening around him.

**IMPORTANCE OF LEGUMES**

Now is the time to make plans for those fall legume plantings. It doesn't take a student of the soil to know that legumes properly fertilized and inoculated have excellent effects on the soil. Every farmer knows legumes are important in improving soil structure and condition.

Texas A & M agronomists depict the best soil structure as being crumbly or granular to allow for deep penetration by roots and water. Proper air circulation between the small particles of soil is also necessary.

Some Texas soil is so packed and tight that very little water or air can penetrate it. Deep rooted legumes such as sweet clover and alfalfa on these "tight" soils can help to improve this fault. Legumes which add good organic matter and nitrogen to the soil content, but which do not necessarily open sub-soils are vetch, winter peas, annual yellow sweet clover and crimson clover.

Another farming "bug-a-boo" is the type of land which has a heavy, dense sub-soil at a comparatively shallow depth. These sub-soils restrict the movement of plant roots and hinder circulation of water and air. Good remedies for this condition are deep rooted legumes or grasses which will punch holes in the sub-soil and aid the water-air-root conditions.

When plowed under the soil as

and the driver has not been alert — has failed to keep a proper look-out — he may be charged with "improper look-out" as a traffic violation and also held liable in damages to the other driver. The courts call a "proper look-out" such a look-out as a reasonably prudent driver would have kept under the same circumstances.

Of equal importance is the rule of "proper control." This rule means pretty much what those words imply — that the driver should have his car under such degree of control as to be ready for any emergencies as might arise. It may be breached even though no violation of ordinary traffic laws is involved.

For instance, a driver may be complying with the legal speed limit but still be driving at a rate of speed which is unsafe under existing circumstances.

Even though legal speed limits are expressed in terms of a certain number of miles per hour, conditions may arise which prevent the driver from maintaining "proper control" of his automobile at that speed. On a rainy day on a slick street or highway, or in heavy traffic, the reasonably prudent driver will know that he should reduce his speed considerably below the legal maximum.

a green manure crop, legumes increase the organic matter of the land. This matter helps hold the small soil particles together and improves the granular quality of the soil structure. High organic matter in the soil almost assures the best type of air circulation and absorption of water which is so essential to plant life.

The farmer who is unsure of the qualities of his soil can get professional help and advice. Soil samples taken from fields where legumes are to be grown should be sent to the Soils Laboratory, College Station, Texas, for analysis. This analysis will determine what kind and the amounts of fertilizers needed to make legume growing more successful in the various soil-type areas of Texas.

**Dr. Cox Asks For Less Federal Aid**

State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox has called for "less concern about so-called federal domination" of the state's business and "more positive action" to prevent it.

In a written statement to the Dallas Times-Herald, the veteran of 18 years of fighting the battle for public health said his position on the propriety of receiving federal money was clear:

"I want my state to maintain its prestige, dignity, authority,

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and ownership of the state public health program," he said.

A previous statement to the effect that he didn't see anything wrong with accepting federal funds "except that we don't get enough of it" had been widely circulated by the Associated Press. The Dallas Times-Herald editorialized on that view.

"Federal domination must inevitably develop as long as the state's public health money continues to supplement the federal public health money. The reverse should exist," he wrote, "with federal money supplementing that provided by the state."

"It is no less than like a stock company or corporation — the chap who owns the majority of stock will no doubt want to direct the operation. My position is that I want my state to maintain its prestige, dignity, authority, and ownership of the state public health program."

Dr. Cox has already made known his intention to wage a vigorous campaign for a \$50 per capita legislative appropriation when the legislature convenes. The department is now operating on about \$20 per capita, far beneath the national average of

\$62 per capita.

He said that is the reason he has been obliged to accept federal funds to keep the state's public health standards up to par. But it is a situation which can be corrected, he believes.

"If the legislature agrees to appropriate \$50 per capita to operate on, then we'll be in a better position to use federal funds for supplementing the state's program.

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
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## Farm Bureau To Meet In Cisco Monday, Sept. 8

County Farm Bureau leaders from this area will gather in Cisco on Monday, September 8 for a sub-district meeting. This is one of 24 such sessions being conducted throughout the State by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation. It has been announced by J. Walter Hammond of Tye, Texas, president of the organization. In attendance will be President Hammond and Leon Lane, Texas Farm Bureau State Field Representative. B. J. Gist of Abilene, state director for this district, will preside. The all-day meeting will be held in the Victor Hotel at Cisco beginning at 10:00 a. m.

In announcing the sub-district meetings President Hammond emphasized the importance of county leaders meeting with state officers and staff members to discuss current issues and policies vital to farm and ranch people. Mr. Hammond will discuss the organization's program of work this year and the responsibilities of local leaders. Mr. Lane will present the enrollment plan which has been developed by the State organization and recommended to counties for use in their annual membership enrollment drive scheduled for the week of October 10-17.

The sub-district meetings have been planned to discuss four major things, Hammond said. (1) State and National issues pertaining to agriculture; (2) to have expression from local leaders; (3) how to raise money to finance state government; (4) plans for enrolling 75,000 members in 1952.

The committeemen will take office September 2, 1952 and will be responsible for the county administration of the Agricultural Conservation Program, price support activities, Federal Crop Insurance and other activities which may be assigned.

In the coming year, they will arrange for the training of community committeemen, direct the farm-by-farm contacts

which community committeemen will make, and have responsibility for approval of conservation practices carried out on Coleman County farms.

Ozro Eubank, the chairman, owns and operates a farm at Santa Anna, Texas. He has been cooperating in the ACP programs for several years.

The vice-chairman's farm is located at Voss, Texas, where he is an active member of that community. He also is carrying out soil and water conservation practices on his farm.

Vernon Bullard, member, has his farm at Burkett, Texas. Mr. Bullard has carried out the following practices so far in 1952: terracing, two diversions, and a stockwater tank.
