Vehicle Inspections Continue At Present

L. A. Welch reported this week he had inspected and issued 723 motor vehicle inspection stickers since the beginning date the first of the year. He estimated that some 5 per cent of the county vehicles were still to be inspected.

Welch stated they were to continue the inspection until notice from the State Department of Public Safety. He said he did not know when he would receive notice to discontinue the 1951-52 inspections.

Welch stated the Department of Public Safety had complimented Coleman County on the percentage of vehicle inspection the stations had performed in this county. Apparently a higher percentage of vehicles have been inspected in this county than any county in the 48-county area in this district.

Rites For O. A. Richardson at Abilene

Funeral services were held Monday, September 8th, at 4 p. m., in the First Presbyterian Church in Abilene for O. A. Richardson, 64, who died at 7 p. m., at his Little Lake home, on Saturday, unexpectedly of a heart attack. Rev. Leland Murphy, pastor of the church officiated.

Though he had been ill all summer, he had not quit working.

He had been employed by the West Texas Utilities Co. since 1926 as land agent. He served a 49 county district, buying land for right of way, transmission and distribution lines. He was also a well known West Texas rancher.

He was born July 23, 1888, at Monkstown in Fannin Co. He moved to Abilene in 1925. His first wife died in 1943. In 1945 he was married to Miss Minnie Belle McMinn, well known in this vicinity.

He is survived by the widow of Abilene, a son and a daughter, of his first marriage, and one grandchild also of Abilene.

A meeting will be held at the Coleman County State Bank Building in Coleman Friday, September 19, at 10:00 a. m. for the purpose of organizing a 10-county area into a rain-inducing program, similar to one just recently abandoned containing 27 Texas counties.

Coleman County is taking the lead in forming this organization. They will have representatives from the Dr. Irving F. Krick organization of Denver, Colorado, present.

W. T. Stewardson of Santa Anna, a former director of the old organization, is inviting officials from Farm Bureaus, farmers, ranchers, and all people who might be interested in increased rain fall to attend the meeting.

The long awaited drought breaking rain fell over Texas Tuesday afternoon and night and Wednesday morning. Reports from over the county indicate that from just over 2 inches to almost four inches fell in different sections of Coleman County. In Santa Anna 2.65 inches fell.

Apparently the rain was general over most of the state with most of the counties in West Texas getting some much needed rain.

The rain fell very slow for most of the several hours, with a few hard showers. So far as estimating the value of this nature, it would be hard to do in dollars and cents. It is a good start at helping the farmers and stockmen along toward some good fall grazing and if the drought is actually broken, it is a good start toward a bumper grain crop next year.

We can hope at least.

Narrow Town—Broad Outlook

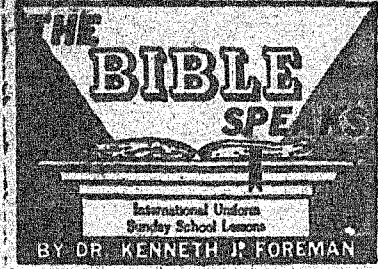

But the most valuable part of what he left us is still with us, imperishable: his legacy of religion.

Experience of God

ONE THING every one will think of: the Psalms. Bible students realize that the titles of the Psalms are not part of the original psalms, but represent later editors' beliefs as to the authors. However, scholars are agreed that David did write some Psalms and may in fact be called the father of the psalm-book. Now the chief importance of any Psalm is not that it is a hymn or has been the basis of other hymns (as most of them have); it is not simply that it is beautiful and unforgettable poetry. The main point is that it is a first-hand record of first-hand experience of God.

We do not always realize how much of our own religious experience grows out of the experience of others. We would lack much of our interest in God and knowledge of him if we had not been waked up, so to speak, by some one else first. Think of the millions of readers of the 23rd Psalm, for instance, from David's time to now—the millions who have been inspired and comforted by it. How much we owe to David!

Singing Faith

WE CHRISTIANS owe to David also that blending of beauty with religion which is a mark of our faith. Beauty apart from religion can drag men down and destroy them. Religion apart from beauty is usually a harsh and cold affair. There is a great deal of irreligious beauty and unbeautiful religion in the world, and neither of them does the world much good.

But for David religion and beauty flowed into each other, or rather beauty found its highest level in the service of God. It was not only in the words and music of the Psalms.

While David did not build the Temple, he dreamed it, and before a stone was laid he could see in his mind's eye the fine carvings, the gold inlays, the cypress and the fir, the brilliantly woven hangings; all the gorgeous gleaming Temple that he never lived to see, was in his mind and heart. He it was who gathered singing men and singing women for the worship of God the Lord. Whatever beauty there is in our church buildings, in our hymns, in our services, we owe much of the original inspiration of it to David. "Where Cross the Crowded

Ways of Life

RELIGION that cannot be applied to daily living, religion that is a purely solitary affair, has never been typical of the best in Christianity. Christianity has something to say to the world, our word, our world, something to do in it. Christianity in retreat, in hiding, is not full Christianity.

Perhaps we owe more of this ideal to David than we realize. For when he came to the throne, the ark—sacred symbol of the presence of God—was in a little out-of-the-way place where few could know of it. David took that ark and brought it to the nation's capital. Shrine and city must be united.

So wherever today the church stands literally or figuratively at the crossroads of life, challenging, inviting, winning men, a constant reminder of God, we should be thankful to David, who set the symbol of his religion in the very center of his nation's principal city.

Faith Faces Forward

ONE MORE thing must be mentioned, which we owe at least in part to David. It is a characteristic of both Jewish and Christian faith: Hope.

Some religions are religions of regret. Their golden age is in the past; so they see it the

RIGHT OF WAY VARIES AT INTERSECTIONS

Misunderstanding of simple driving rules by numerous motorists is one factor which places Texas right at the top in number of traffic deaths. Possibly the most mystifying of all traffic rules to the average driver are those relating to "Right of Way" at an intersection.

In trying to understand the laws regulating intersecting traffic, it is best to start off with the premise that all streets are of equal dignity, legally speaking. Traffic signs and signals may vary this role somewhat, but when in doubt it is safest to assume that all drivers crossing your path have a claim to the right of way equal to your own. Obviously, however, in many cases one driver or the other will be legally entitled to the right of way. When it becomes necessary to determine right of way in a particular situation, the driver who reaches the intersection first, or who is going to get there first, is ordinarily favored.

But when two automobiles are an equal distance from the intersection, that one approaching from the other driver's right normally has the right of way.

Some intersections are known as "courtesy corners," having a stop sign or a flashing red signal facing each direction of approach. The first driver reaching the corner and coming to a complete stop will normally have the right of way over other vehicles not already in the intersection. However, don't depend too much on the other fellow's courtesy, and be sure to keep a "proper look-out" and your car under "proper control," as explained in a preceding column.

At intersections involving one through street and another street having a stop sign, a driver approaching the stop sign and coming to a full stop is ordinarily said to have the right of way over vehicles approaching on the through street but not already in the intersection.

However, this last rule must be qualified by saying that you should not proceed, cross or turn onto the through street until you can do so without interfering with oncoming traffic. In other words, if an approaching

world is either going around and around in meaningless circle or in hopeless decay.

But any one who will read the Psalms with a penetrating eye can see how bright the future is to the Psalmist's mind. Bright, because it belongs to God. If Paul can say that hope is one of the things that endure, along with faith and love, he was not the first to think it. David long ago sang his songs of hope, and for this legacy too we may be grateful.

THE SOIL SAVING ARGUMENT

For a great number of years, much time, effort and money have been expended on a vast educational and promotional program devoted to improving soil saving practices.

This program is gradually taking effect. Farmers in Texas, especially, are becoming increasingly more aware of the importance of saving our soil for future generations. But every major undertaking has its obstacles. And the soil conservation movement is no exception.

Four major reasons loom as to why the farmers are not applying all the beneficial practices recommended for their farms. They claim:

1. Mortgage debts and high operating and living costs make it necessary to borrow money to establish these practices.
2. Many rental agreements do not provide for sharing costs of soil conservation with owners of the land.
3. Many farmers do not expect to live on their farms very long. This group includes renters with short-term agreements and owners who expect to sell or retire so soon that they could not benefit from these practices.
4. If these soil saving practices were established, farmers would have to change their major farm enterprise.

car will arrive within the intersection before you are completely clear, wait just a little longer. The same rules apply to entering a highway from a side road containing a stop sign.

Many drivers violate the rules of right of way covering left-hand turns at intersections. When turning left, you should always be on the inside (or center) lane, displaying the proper hand signal. You must allow all cars coming from the opposite direction, already in the intersection, to pass through before completing your turn. Even when the intersection is cleared, do not proceed unless other oncoming traffic is far enough away to be able to see your signal and slow down to allow you to turn with safety to all concerned.

Stay in the inside lane until your left-hand turn is entirely completed, and only then move gradually over to the right-hand lane if you wish. When turning right, stay in the right-hand lane at all times. Do not swing wide into the center lane, as to do so is unnecessary, unlawful and dangerous.

Many detailed rules and suggestions for safe driving are included in the official "Texas Driving Handbook" which is available to any person requesting same from the Texas Department of Public Safety, Drivers License Division, Austin, Texas.

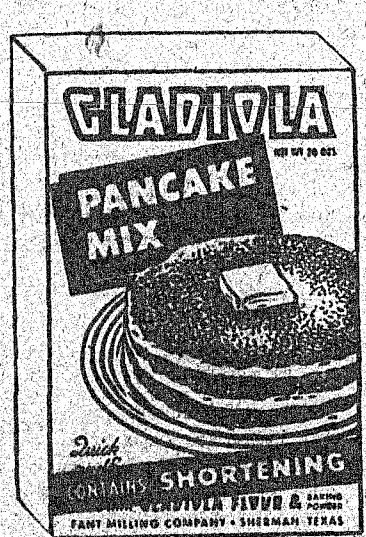

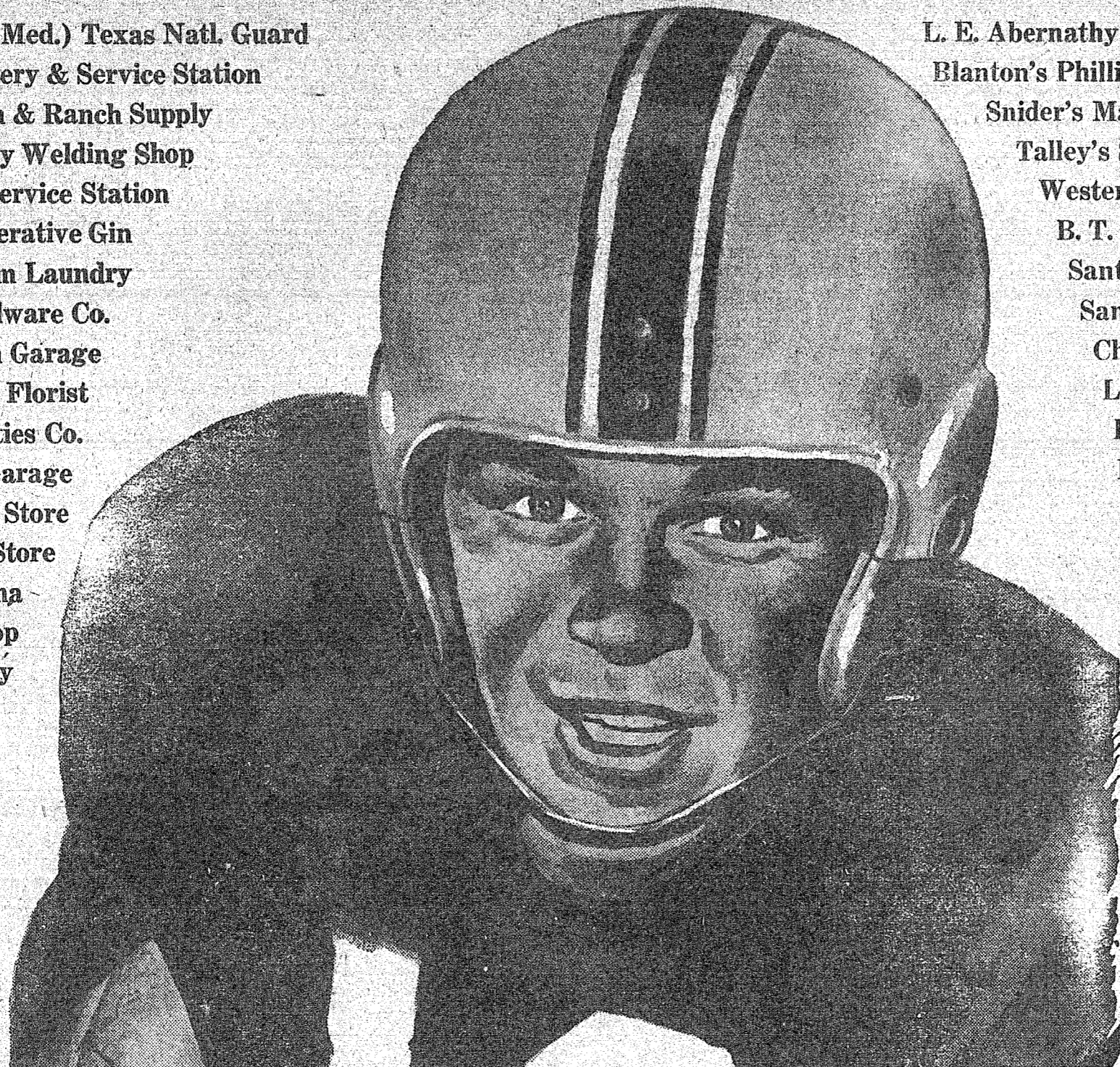

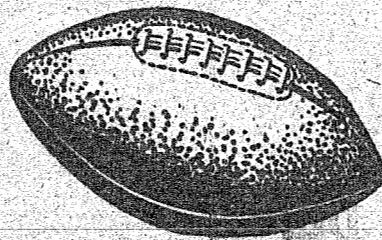

Communists Try To Infiltrate Boy Scouts

Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, Chief Scout Executive of the Boy Scouts of America, made the following statement after Senator Pat McCarran's Senate sub-committee on internal security disclosed that Communists made efforts to infiltrate the Boy Scouts:

"In consideration of the fact that the Boy Scouts of America is dedicated to the training of youth in those qualities of character and good citizenship that will contribute to the enrichment and strengthening of our democracy, it is not surprising that Soviet Communism would consider it as one of their greatest menaces to winning support for their totalitarian ideology and overthrowing our democratic government. Of course, we are familiar with their attempt in the 1930's to smash the Boy Scouts. Obviously, they got nowhere.

"Also, we do not doubt their desire to confuse and destroy this typically American organization, if they could, through infiltration. Here again, however, they have had little success, as is evidenced by our continued growth in numbers and dedication to training youth to strengthen the democratic way of life.

"In 1949 we launched a three year Crusade under the slogan, 'STRENGTHEN THE ARM OF LIBERTY.' We closed this campaign at the end of 1951 with not only great gains in our trained leadership, and hence in the quality of the program, but with a numerical increase of 723,013 boys and men, making our grand total membership at the end of the year 2,942,779.

"As of January 1, 1952, we launched a Three Year Program under the slogan, 'FORWARD ON LIBERTY'S TEAM' predicated on dedication to Ameri-

can ideals and the training of boys in these ideals. Here again, this program to strengthen America through the proper training of youth has met with a splendid response and we will close the year with a membership well in excess of three million. These figures are cited to show how futile have been the efforts of Communists either to 'smash' or infiltrate Scouting.

"No man can serve the Boy Scouts of America as a leader of boys unless he has endorsement of at least three men outstanding in his own community and the institution in which the chartered Unit is to operate. In our selection we are most vigilant in making every possible assurance that men holding such positions of leadership are highest grade American citizens. Every Scouter must take a pledge of loyalty to God and country.

"We have knowledge of certain attempts by Communists to secure positions of leadership either in a Scout Unit, a Council or in the Professional ranks, but we believe the thoroughness of our system of analysis of each application has resulted in our refusing membership or weeding out such men.

"It should also be stated that the Boy Scouts of America have consistently refused to participate in any youth organization or congresses in which Communist organizations were a part, we have consistently operated on the basis that our sole interest is to develop American boys in those traits of character and good citizenship that will contribute to strengthening of our democracy."

Paris Man Killed Near Talpa Sunday

D. T. Stewart, 31, of Paris, Texas, was accidentally killed near Talpa Sunday when a tractor he was unloading from a truck overturned and crushed him beneath it.

Stewart was delivering the tractor to T. Knox Campbell, Talpa ranchman. Stewart back-

ed his truck up to an earthen incline slightly higher than the truck bed, and as he drove the tractor off the truck, the tractor overturned.

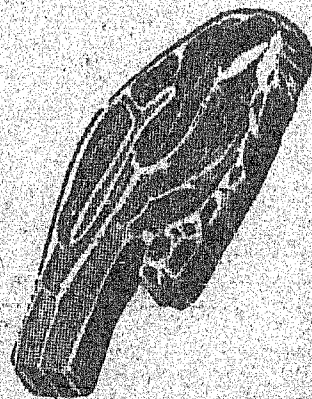
