### Study in Values

Lesson for November 14, 1954

IS IT a sin to be rich? The Bible does not say so. A poor man may be better or worse than a rich man. It is not the property of a man that is most important;

it is his personality. The Bible does warn us about the dangers of wealth; and since in our time (as back yonder too) nearly everybody thinks it. would be wonder-

ful to be rich and that money is the Dr. Foreman answere to most problems, the Bible's warnings are almost the only ones we can ever hear.

When Money Comes First There is one special danger that runs through all the others: the danger of putting money first. We say "What is So-and-so worth?" when we ought to say "How much money does he have?" A worthless rascal may be very rich. The United States has found it necessary to deport men who could buy you out, dear reader, and me too. If we put money first, we measure men by a crooked yardstick. Then if we think of money as the most desirable thing in life-or property of any sort, not money alonewe shall cut corners to get it. If it were true that money is the principal thing, then we would lie and steal to get it—just as many persons do. Think of the lies told every day in the business world, recall the wealthy men who have been convicted of evading their taxes. Once think of money as Value Number One, and you will begin excusing all the sins, provided a man has a

big enough pile. Fancy Front

You could have an interesting time collecting the lies that are connected in one way or another with money. Proverbs points out that some rich men pretend to be poor and some poor men pretend to be rich. That sounds

funny but it's a fact. On every street in the more exclusive residential sections of cities there. live families who are trying to give the impression of being better off than they are. The house is bigger than they can afford. they really keep themselves in debt pretending not to be in debt! And then there are the rich who pretend to be poor. These are not you. all Texas millionaires trying to look like cow-hands. When the church (for instance) takes its every-member canvass and approaches some one who is known to be wealthy though not generous and who may have just bought an expensive car, how familiar is the response; "I'd be glad to increase my pledge but I can't

Treasure and Trouble

Pastors of wealthy congregations, lawyers and doctors too, can tell you they know people who would be able to shed their troubles, or most of them, if they just could lose their money. The reader can verify this by reading any newspaper for a few weeks and checking up on head-lined tales of people in trouble. Not always, but often, the trouble started either because the person involved had too much money, or because he wanted money too much. oAlcoholism, for instance: who are the alcoholics you know? Are most of them busy people in moderate circumstances, or are they people with more time and money on their hands than they know quite what, to do with? Or take the divorce stories. At the time this column is being written the story is being headlined of a nationally notorious divorce. Readers are led, to believe that neither the marriage nor the divorce would have taken place if the young man had been, say, a school teacher or a plasterer. His millions were bait—as any one could have guessed.





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

PATENTS AND COPYRIGTH'S EXPLAINED

Alert observers frequently notare patented, whereas other seemingly 'similar items are copyrighted. The question accordingly arises as to what constitutes the differences between a patent and a copyright.

Patents are granted to inventors on new and useful articles of manufacture, compositions of matter, methods and processes, ornamental designs of articles of manufacture and certain types of plants.

Copyrights are granted to authers, composers or artists on works such as books (which includes not only bound volumes, but also pamphlets, leaflets and even single sheets), periodicals, speeches, plays, musical compositions, phonograph records, works of art, including sculptured works, maps, phonographs tending the Le Tournedu lecture and motion pictures.
