

First Thanksgiving Proclamation

A

"By the President of the United States of America. "A proclamation.

"Whereas, it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favor,-and,

"Whereas both Houses of Congress have by their joint committee requested me to 'recommend to the people of the United States a day of Public Thanksgiving and Prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness.'

"Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th day of November next, to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficient Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be,-that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a Nation; for the signal and manifold mercies and favorable interpositions of His providence, which we experienced in the course and conclusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty, which we have since enjoyed-for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enabled to establish Constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one now, lately instituted-for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and in general for all the great and various favors which He hath pleased to confer upon us.

"And, also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations, and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions, to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually, to render our national government a blessing to all the people by constantly being a government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed, to protect and guide all Sovereigns and Nations (especially such as have shown kindness to us) and to bless them with good government, peace and concord. To promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us, and generally to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best.





Don't wait until you get that new dress made or until Aunt Fanny's visit is over, or until next Saturday. It may not be cancer, but it may BE cancer and only early cancer is curable.


Another thing to remember is this. Your own physician has at his disposal every known means of fighting cancer. Anyone who advertises himself as able to cure or arrest advanced cancer is stating falsely and is not allowed membership in the American Medical Association. Mrs. Emily G. Perkins of Eastland, State Chairman for Cancer Control, of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs told this story at Brady last April.

A physician practicing across the Rio Grande in Mexico advertised himself widely as able to cure any case of cancer, publishing a pamphlet containing affidavits from several dozen Texas people praising his treatment and affirming themselves cured or greatly improved. A repre-sentative of the State Health Officer of Texas was sent to interview every one of these patients, but was unable to see them, for a very good reason. Not one of those people was alive. Everyone of them had died — of CANCER from two weeks to six months after they swore they were cured of cancer by this man.

Why go long distances pursuing some elusive hope of a magical cure? If you suspect you have cancer, go to your home physician; if you have not he will respect your judgment in coming; if you have, he can treat you or send you to the most reputable doctor for the most effective treatment.

A campaign is now being carried on throughout the nation for the control of cancer, aided by many philanthroic organizations and named one of the main objectives of the National Federation of Women's clubs. It is through the Health Committee of the Self Culture Club of Santa Anna that this specal reaches you, our neighbors and friends. 



The old china fruit stand was full of every kind of fruit in the stores here.

After dinner we played dominoes and had music. Mama played the guitar and plano. What a change in fifty yearspow there are just we two alone.


