## Thoughts

OF A COUNTRY EDITOR

### YOU ARE URGED TO VOTE TUESDAY, NOV. 4

Tuesday, November 4, will be one of the most important days in recent history of the United States. On this day every qualified citizen of America is urged to go to the voting polls and cast your ballot for the leaders of your choice for the next four years. We do not intend to tell you who to vote for, BUT we are going to tell you who we are going to vote for and why.

We are supporting the straight Democratic ticket and when we go to the polls on next Tuesday, that is the way we will vote.

One question, it would seem to this writer, would answer a lot of questions as to who to vote for. The question: Would you, as a farmer, merchant, business-man, employee or what have you, exchange your position today for the position you held at the end of the last Republican administration? At the time this writer was rather young, but not too young to remember the hardships that were bestowed on the heads of households.

In the last few days, one so-called Democrat who is apparently going to vote a split-ticket, expressed his feelings that he would rather be living in times similar to what they were in the dark days of 1932 than what they are at present. Br-r-r-, brother, not this writer. Of course, the dollar was worth a dollar, if you had one, but there were very few dollars in circulation, jobs were very scarce and unemployment was well, from the number on relief rolls, it must have been at an all time high.

We do not insinuate that we favor all the platform of the Democratic Party. There are a number of proposals listed in the Democratic Platform this year that we do not approve of. However, there are a number of things the Republicans are doing that we do not approve of either.

Some seem to think that Governor Stevenson will follow directly in line with what the present administration is doing. That we do not believe. When Mr. Roosevelt died and Harry Truman stepped into the highest office in our land, he stated that he would carry on in the same manner that FDR had been doing. That lasted about as long as it took him to say it. We know that Mr. Stevenson has done his best to keep Mr. Truman out of his campaign and feel that he is doing the proper thing by trying to keep him out. ## Trickham Road To Be Completed Next Year

Next year will see the completion of the Farm to Market road to Trickham and extensions to other farm roads in the county as the result of a meeting of the Commissioners Court and District Engineer Robert Milligan last Thursday morning. The Trickham road will run through Trickham to an intersection near the Brown County line. The road will connect with the Farm Road running south from Bangs. The allotment for this road is 6.75 miles.

The county was allotted 18.5 miles with 4.25 miles going to extend the road south of Voss; 5 miles north from an intersection in Talpa; and 3.5 miles south from the San Angelo cut-off south of Coleman on the old Shield road.

## Rites In Ft. Worth For J. W. Collier, Jr.

Funeral services were scheduled to be held in Ft. Worth Thursday, October 30th, at 4 p. m., for J. W. (Jack) Collier, Jr., at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church of which he was a member.

He died at 2:15 a. m. on Tuesday of a heart attack at his Ft. Worth home. He had had two attacks previously, the first one in March. He had been in a hospital for six weeks before being moved home on Saturday.

He was born at Giddings, Texas, and was 52 years old at time of death. When three years old, he moved with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Collier, Sr., to this vicinity.

He attended Santa Anna schools and left from here to serve in the Navy in World War I. As a young man, he sang baritone in the Methodist Church Choir here, and was planning to attend Home Coming services here next Sunday.

He attended a pharmacy college in Atlanta, Ga., and worked in several drug stores in West Texas and Dallas before moving to Ft. Worth in 1930. Known as a successful businessman he owned a large chain of drug stores and served for a time as president of the Texas Pharmaceutical Society.

He served as director of the Trinity State Bank of Ft. Worth for several years. Besides being a Mason and Shriner, he belonged to several civic and service clubs.

He was married to Miss Norene Elizabeth Fox of Ft. Worth in 1942, who survives him.

Mr. Collier was the first of the eleven Collier children to die.

Besides the widow, there are 3 brothers and six sisters left to mourn his departure. They are L. C. and N. A. Collier, both of Ft. Worth; W. F. Collier of Houston, and S. H. Collier of Santa Anna. Mrs. Ella Stiles and Mrs. Blanche Grantham, both of Santa Anna; Mrs. Ed Hall of Albuquerque, N. Mexico; Mrs. W. A. Hall of Ft. Worth; Mrs. Joe Baker of El Campo, and Mrs. Price Rice of Hamilton.

Quite a number of nieces, nephews and other relatives also survive.

The sixty-seven year old church has seen more than 1000 members added to its rolls during its lifetime. The church now has 375 members and is in one of its most active years.

Last week the Mountaineers lost to the underdog, Eastland Mavericks, by a 41-27 score. It seems the Mountaineers usually have at least one game during a season that they are really off -- and this was bound to have been it. The local lads should have won by a large score from all predictions and from paper statistics, but these don't always work out. This game gave the Mountaineers a 1-2 record in conference play and a 3-3 record in season competition. Eastland, along with Dublin and DeLeon, are still leading the conference with no losses and three wins each.

### TO HOST RISING STAR

In conference play the Rising Star Wildcats have a 1-1-1 record after tying Bangs last week 0-0. In season competition the Wildcats have a 2-3-1 record, as compared to the Mountaineers 3-3 record. Rising Star lost their first game to Early 32-6; lost their first conference game to Eastland 47-0, and tied Bangs 0-0. The Mountaineers won over Early 19-8; won over Bangs 32-19; and lost to Eastland 41-27. According they will be rated about even, but if the Mountaineers will come out of their slump, they should win the game.

### WTCC Urges Defeat Of Both Proposed Amendments

Defeat of two proposed amendments to the Constitution of Texas to be voted upon November 4 was urged by the taxation and legislation committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at its convention in Wichita Falls last week.

Basic provisions of the two proposals are:

1. To empower the Legislature to enact laws to enable cities to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees, and provide suitable laws for administration of such insurance, and for payment of costs, charges premiums on insurance policies and the benefits to be paid under them. (House Joint Resolution No. 20).

2. To require that the Legislature create a State Medical Education Board, establish a Medical Foundation Fund and make adequate appropriations for that fund to provide grants, loans or scholarships to persons desiring to study medicine and to practice in rural areas in Texas, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term "rural areas" would be defined by law. (House Joint Resolution No. 38).

The WTCC committee is composed of men of many businesses and professions living in all parts of the 132 counties served by the organization.

Among reasons for opposing approval of the measure relating to Workman's Compensation for city, town and village employees were the following:

1. The Constitution already provides for passage of laws to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance for such employees. Such insurance is available from private insurance companies.

2. Language of the proposed amendment may be interpreted to make it mandatory upon cities to set up a workman's Compensation system, unlike a present law that makes such policy voluntary for counties and their employees.

3. It would further encroach upon the legal power and authority of cities, and is a step toward centralization of government.

4. It could bring about creation of an additional State Board that would be supported by further taxation.

Among reasons for opposing the proposal to create grants,

loans or scholarships to students who would agree to practice medicine in rural areas, were the following:

1. It would add another to the numerous boards and commissions of the state.

2. The Constitution now prohibits the State from appropriation of public funds for "private or individual purposes" or "giving or lending of the credit of the State in aid of, or to any person, or for pledging the credit of the State — for payment of liabilities, present or prospective, of any individual."

3. It is discriminatory in that its benefits would be limited to a single class or group.

4. Nothing is binding beyond the moral obligation of a person receiving its benefits to practice in a designated area, which would have to be defined by law.

5. All Medical schools of the state are overcrowded and have long waiting lists, and additional facilities for teaching medicine would have to be provided.

6. The term "medical" is not defined. It is left to the Legislature to determine whether the term would include dentists, veterinarians, nurses, technicians, chiropractors, and doctors of osteopathy as well as doctors of medicine.

7. There is no limit upon the amount of money the legislature may appropriate to operate the proposed Board and create the proposed fund.

8. This is a step in the direction of socialized medicine.

## Oil Activities IN COLEMAN COUNTY

The Bay Petroleum Corp., Abilene, No. 2 Dunman Unit, 3, Section 36, D. F. Roddan Survey, has been completed in the Morris Sand, making it a dual producer. Location is in the Dunman Field in the northern part of the county.

Daily potential was 118 barrels of 40 gravity oil, flowing through a 16-64-inch choke with 100 pounds casing pressure and packer set on the tubing. Morris Sand production is from 20 perforations at 3,154-59 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 450-1.

From the Gardner Sand from 32 perforations at 3,515-23 feet, daily potential was 331 barrels of 40 gravity oil. Casing is set at 3,529 feet while the hole is bottomed at 3,530 feet.

In that same field, Bay Staked location for No. 7-1 T. J. Hudson, slated for 3,700 feet with rotary.

Site is on a 200.3 acre lease, 330 feet from the south and 750 feet from the west lines of Section 36, D. F. Roddan Survey. It is 93 feet southeast of No. 6.

In the Glen Cove Fry Field, one mile east of Glen Cove, The Blackwell Oil & Gas Co. No. 3 Whittington, Section 4, T&NO Survey, has been plugged at 3,474 feet.

O. F. Darling Tomac Drilling Co. (formerly Darling & Shield Oil & Gas Co.) No. 4 R. C. Smith Wade H. Bynum Survey two miles west of Santa Anna, has been completed for a daily gauge of 20 barrels of 38.8 gravity oil and two per cent water on pump from 40 perforations at 1,880-91 feet. Casing was set at 1,923 feet, total depth.

William L. Curtis, Dallas, staked No. 1-B T. E. McDonald as a 1,990-foot test three miles southwest of Santa Anna.

Location is 1,250 feet from the north and 1,200 feet from the most easterly west lines of Wade H. Bynum Survey 22. That puts it 220 feet southeast of Fortenberry & Richardson No. 1 McDonald, a dry hole.

Bay No. 1 Bennie Mays Smith, Section 3 San Augustine University Survey 519, wildcat one mile south of Goldsboro, is completing

as a gas well.

On last test it made between 100,000 and 200,000 cubic feet of gas per day from perforations in the Gardner at 3,798-3,808 feet.

M. C. Moore, et al, No. 1 Mabel C. Yarborough, et al, B. Ferguson Survey 743, two and one-half miles south of Coleman, pumped 18 barrels of oil in 24 hours from open hole at 922-31 feet.

Magnolia Petroleum Co. No. 1 Ed Ragsdale, Section 5, T&NO Survey, 1/2 mile northeast of Glen Cove, has been completed for a daily gauge of 56.5 barrels of 39.4 gravity oil and 2.3 per cent water.

Production was through 1/2 choke with packer on casing and 70 pounds on tubing from 20 perforations at 3,340-45 feet. Total depth was 3,671 feet, and casing was set at 3,425 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,689-1.

Four miles south of Santa Anna, Great Expectations Oil Corp., Fort Worth, No. 1 Mary A. Kirkpatrick was spotted as a wildcat.

Davis Drilling Co., Brownwood, No. 2 Mrs. Lela B. Bell Section 3, GH&H Survey, was completed in the Davis-Bell Fry Sand Field, two and one-half miles west of Santa Anna.

No. 2 Bell had a daily potential of 78.88 barrels of 42 gravity oil, flowing through a 12-64 inch

choke with 350 pounds casing and 135 pounds tubing pressures. It is producing oil from 26 perforations at 1,825-31 feet with the casing set at 1,860 feet. Having a gas-oil ratio of 400-1, the well is bottomed at 1,905 feet.

New location for the Dunman Field, located in the northern part of the county, is the Bay Petroleum Corp., Abilene, No. 8-1 T. J. Hunson.

Drill site is 1,110 feet from the south and 1,265 feet from the west lines of Section 36, D. F. Roddan Survey. Slated for 3,800 feet with rotary, it is on a 200.3 acre lease.

A wildcat has been plugged at 3,102 feet in the area four miles southwest of Coleman. It was Gary Wright No. 1 J. T. Blair Estate, Section 20, Block 1, GH&H Survey.

L. J. Maxwell & M. W. Freeman of Coleman No. 4 Fayette Coolcy, J. Riner Survey 242, located 16 miles south of Santa Anna, has been plugged at 1,115 feet.

### Warning Issued In Regard To Scarlet Fever By Health Dept.

The State Department of Health has just issued a warning in regard to scarlet fever, as the number of cases usually increases during the fall months. The majority of deaths from this disease occur from October through February.

Scarlet fever is a very contagious and serious disease. Grown people may contract it, but children under 15 years are especially apt to have it, if exposed. It is especially dangerous for children under 5 years, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, warns mothers to "not let your child-

ren take any chances with scarlet fever. Call the doctor as soon as the first symptoms appear."

If your child has contracted scarlet fever, the first signs you may notice are that he seems tired, restless and out of sorts.

Usually, there is a sore throat, chills, vomiting, or convulsions and fever. His skin is dry and hot. His tongue is furred, and under this white covering, it is red and swollen. In ordinary cases, these early signs are followed in a day or two by a rash. Little flat red points, close together, appear first on the neck and chest and soon the rash, very red in color, spreads over

most of the body.

The doctor is required by law to report the case to the local health officer. Do your part by following carefully the quarantine instructions which the health officer will give you, since a severe or fatal case of scarlet fever may develop from contact with some one who has only a light attack. Children who have had scarlet fever, or who have been exposed, must not return to school until permission is given by the health officer and physician.

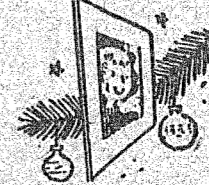

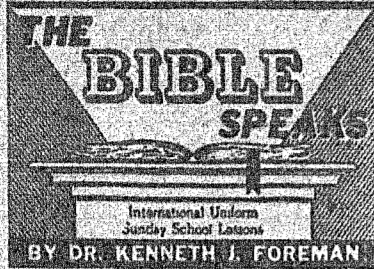

**Power for Need**

Lesson for November 2, 1952

THERE are various kinds of power, and this lesson is not about most of them. For example there is mechanical power, and atomic power, and electrical power. There is armed force exerted by a nation, and there are all the forces of nature. We are not concerned directly with any of these. We will think not of one particular kind of power, but of any kind which is personally controlled and used, the power that every one has. Practically all human beings exert some kind of power. It may be the power of influence; it may be based on money; it may be political or social; it may be power to command, such as is held by sea-captains and labor bosses and office managers. The reader is invited to reflect on his own situation and concentrate his mind on whatever power, be it ever so small, which he himself exercises or can exercise when he pleases. Very few persons are complete zeros.

**Purposes of Prayer**

Is it wrong, that is to say, un-Christian, to wish to be strong? Of course not. There is surely no virtue in weakness. To wish to be weak, or to be content with weakness, is no sign of a Christian. It depends on the motive behind the desire. Now power can be had, or wished for, for various reasons, bad and good. Some people like to be strong just to show off. A boy goes around bending his arm and showing the other boys what big muscles he has, just bragging. That may be all right for a boy (though the boaster is pretty sure to be thrown sponer or later). But when a grown man does the same thing he is just being childish. However, this is harmless compared with another common misuse of power; that is, using it to

build up more power. We can see it in politicians who hold on to important positions even though they could be more useful in private life and though a dozen other men could do their job quite well as they can. We can see it even in the church, where some men like to get on and stay on important committees because then they can "crack the whip" over their brethren. Worst and meanest of all mis-uses of power is using it to hurt and crush others. We can see examples of this on the national scale, all through history. It scales all the way down to the blackmailer, who uses some bit of scandal that he knows about to ruin the lives of perhaps much better men.

**Jesus and His Power**

Now Christians have always before them an example of tremendous power, gently and generously used. Readers of this column will be divided into two classes. Some will take the stories of Jesus' miracles, quite literally. Others will suppose that some of these stories may have been exaggerations of loyal memory. Let those who are skeptical about the miracle-stories give a thought to this: Even granting, for the sake of the argument, that every one of these miracle-stories is a "made-up" one; they surely would never have been invented about a weak man; and they never would have been told about a selfish one. The historians who are most full of doubts about Jesus agree and admit that he was a man of extraordinary power. And even if you thought (as this writer does not) that most of the tales of Jesus were wonder-tales and no more, the fact remains that these tales, every one of them, shows a Jesus who never uses power to show off, never uses it "just because," and seven times never uses it to hurt any one.

**Power for Need**

**TEXAS POLL TAB REQUIREMENTS OUTLINED**

During the past few months, citizens all over the United States have been exhorted by printed, radio or movie advertisements to be sure to "Register" in order to be eligible to vote in the November 4 election. To many Texans these ads have been confusing, some of them wondering whether the new Election Code passed by the last session of the Legislature may have contained some requirement regarding registration.

This confusing situation has arisen because in a large number of states registration has replaced the poll tax. National get-out-the-vote campaigns were planned with the requirements of the "registration states" in mind, and campaign advertisements circulated in "poll tax states" along with the others.

Registration is not required by the Texas Election Code. Unless you fall within specified statutory exceptions, you must still have a poll tax receipt in order to vote. In some but not all cases persons exempt from payment of the poll tax must obtain exemption certificates from their County Tax Collector.

Under Texas law a poll tax is not just a license to vote, even though it is a requirement of voting. It is a tax which the statutes say shall be collected from every person between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, who resides in this state on the first day of January preceding the levy of the tax.

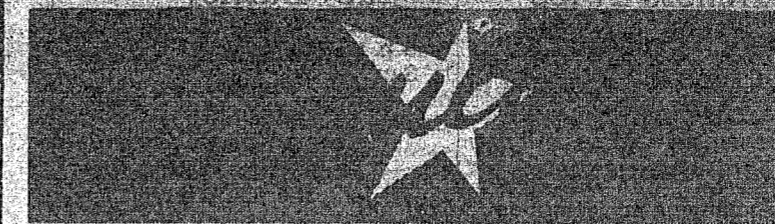
Indians are not taxed, nor persons insane, blind, deaf or dumb. Those who have lost a hand or foot, those permanently disabled, and all disabled veterans of foreign wars (where such disability is forty per cent, or more) are exempted from the payment of a poll tax.

Those who are exempt from the payment of a polltax, and who reside in a city of ten thousand inhabitants or more, must secure a certificate from the Tax Collector of their County of residence before the first day of February of the year when such taxpayers shall become entitled to said exemption.

This exemption is good for one year. A new exemption must be secured for each year. Certificates of exemption are issued without cost to the person entitled to receive the same.

Those who reside in cities of less than ten thousand inhabitants are not required to secure this certificate of exemption before voting. These may take proof of their exemption at the time of voting to the presiding judge of the election where they are qualified by residence to vote.

**ORDERLY COTTON MARKETING**

A marketing problem may develop in Texas this fall which should attract the attention of every crop producer.

The commodity to watch, primarily, is cotton but all crops can be similarly affected when unexpected surpluses develop. At present, there is no big surplus in cotton, but here is the situation:

Cotton prices declined slightly following the United States Department of Agriculture's production report in early October. The report showed an increase of 524,000 bales above the previously expected total.

Growers of cotton immediately expressed the fear that this decline would continue if the true facts of the cotton situation were not clearly understood.

There should be no alarm at all about this modest increase in 1952 prospects. This added production will be needed. The higher figure is still well below the 1952 production goal and is just about the same as the expected domestic and export demand for cotton during the marketing year.

Since this is the case, the farmer would do well to hold a part of his cotton for this year in anticipation of a good market a few months from now. Every grower knows prices drop when

the market is flooded too quickly.

### Get Car Checked Before Winter Sets In

Austin — This is the time for a thorough car check-up. There are at least three good reasons why every car should be checked before cold weather comes, according to the Texas Division Three-A service experts. For one thing, you'll avoid the headaches that come with winter breakdowns, if your car is able to withstand cold-weather driving. For another, your car will be safer to drive if brakes, lights and tires are all in good condition. And still another important reason for a winter check-up is that your pocket-book will notice the difference. When the carburetor is properly adjusted, timing is right, and the motor hums along at

top efficiency, there's a substantial saving in fuel bills, even in cold weather. There's adequate proof that the average car owner spends far too much on operating costs, largely because of faulty mechanical adjustments and poor driving habits. Here are just a few of the points to have checked before winter: cooling system — be sure the radiator is filled with antifreeze; check the hose connections. And while you're at it, be sure to have your heater gone over. Test and adjust brakes. Change oil to winter oil; check oil filter and crankcase ventilator filter. Have carburetor and timing adjusted for greatest efficiency, at the same time checking up on your automatic choke and throttle adjustments. Rotate the tires and inspect the side-

walls for possible damage. The entire electrical system should be carefully inspected; it's surprising how fast your battery can deteriorate if there's a bad connection or two. Adjust the focus of the headlights. There's more darkness in winter months and you'll be using your lights more. Finally, a motor tune-up will give you greater operating efficiency and more happy motoring miles, say the Texas Division AAA service experts.

### Rayburn Predicts Democrats Will Win In Texas

House Speaker Sam Rayburn, chairman of the Stevenson-Sparkman Committee, predicted this week that Adlai Stevenson and John L. Sparkman, Democratic nominees for President and Vice-President, will win a solid victory in Texas in next Tuesday's election. "All indications point to the greatest vote in Texas history," Mr. Rayburn said. "That is good for our side. There are simply more Democrats than non-Democrats in Texas. So, if the true Democrats go to the polls — and they are so aroused they will go — Texas will remain Democratic." Mr. Rayburn has been highly critical of misrepresentations in which he says the so-called Democrats for Eisenhower have engaged in the campaign. He predicted that the majority of the people in Texas will administer a stinging rebuke to them in Tuesday's election. "Texans remember how things were in 1932 after 12 years of Republican rule," he declared. "Texans know how things are with them today after 20 years of progressive Democratic leadership. Texans don't want to go back — Texans want to go forward. They will continue to go forward with the Democratic party."

**RUSSELL IS THE GEORGIA SENATOR FOR WHOM GOVERNOR SHIVERS AND TEXAS DELEGATION VOTED UNANIMOUSLY ON ALL BALLOTS AT DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION IN CHICAGO**

Senator Dick Russell of Georgia, the man the Texas Delegation headed by Gov. 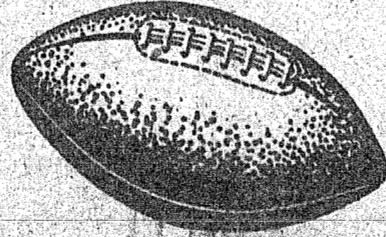

Way To Avoid Waste Of Life In Accidents Is To Prevent Them

Austin — "The only way to avoid the useless waste of life due to traffic accidents is to prevent the accident," reads a warning issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"It is not a question of who is right and who is wrong after the accident has occurred," he said, "and automobile accidents never happen merely because of 'bad luck' — there is a definite cause for everyone of them, although it is not possible to determine the precise origin of every mishap."

Leaders of the safety movement agree that the most funda-

mental approach to the solution of our national accident problem lies in the education and training of the individual. Safety education includes the training of individuals to avoid accidents to themselves and to prevent accidents to others. It involves the acquisition of a certain fund of information, the ability to apply this information to concrete situations, and the building up of habits which will make the application of knowledge to situation automatic.

"The dangerous curves and intersections on the highways of this state are distinctly marked, and automobile drivers can assist greatly in the reduction of deaths from automobile accidents by carefully observing these warning signs.

"Many accidents could be avoided if motorists would drive below the legal speed limits when tired, sleepy, in rainy weather, or when ice conditions exist. One should adhere closely to the law regarding the dimming of lights for approaching cars. It is an old saying, but true, that those who drink should not drive.

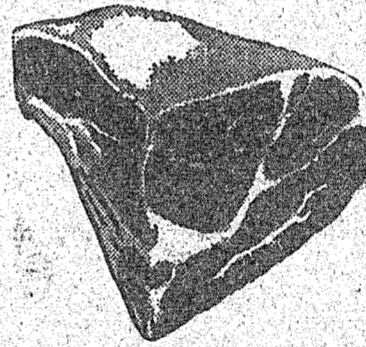
