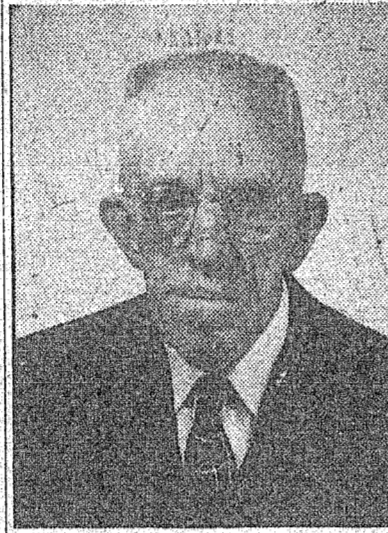
## \$165.00 Needed To Complete Band Uniforms

The Mountaineers handed a sound beating to the Wylie Bulldogs last Thursday night to the tune of 19-0 in the final game for the Bulldogs and the next to the final game for Santa Anna. Statistics show Santa Anna 17 first downs to 6 for Wylie; Santa Anna gained 245 yards run-

ning to 122 for Wylie; the Mountaineers attempted 9 passes, completed 4 for 65 yards and had one pass intercepted; Wylie attempted 21 passes, completed 4 for 54 yards and had one intercepted; Santa Anna lost the ball five times on fumbles and Wylie 2 times; Santa Anna punted 4 times for an average of 28.5 yards and Wylie punted 6 times for an average of 38.2 yards; Santa Anna received 8 penalties for 50 yards and Wylie 3 for 15 yards.

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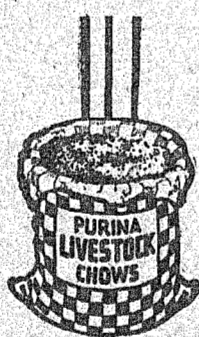

**AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE OPERATION OF ANY DEVICE, MACHINE, APPARATUS OR INSTRUMENT TO INTENSIFY OR AMPLIFY OR REPRODUCE THE HUMAN VOICE, MUSIC OR ANY OTHER SOUND ON ANY PUBLIC STREET OR IN ANY BUILDING WHEREBY THE SOUND THERE FROM IS CAST UPON THE PUBLIC STREETS IN THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS, AT ANY TIME ON SUNDAY AND ALL OTHER DAYS OF THE WEEK**

**AT ANY TIME BETWEEN THE HOURS OF 10:00 P. M. AND 10:00 A. M. TO PRESERVE THE QUIET AND GOOD ORDER OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS, AND TO PREVENT THE DISTURBANCE OF PERSONS OWNING, USING, OR OCCUPYING PROPERTY ADJACENT TO THE PUBLIC STREETS IN SAID CITY: PROVIDING CERTAIN EXCEPTIONS: PROVIDING PENALTIES: PROVIDING A SAVING CLAUSE AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.**

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, TEXAS**

**SECTION 1.**  
That it shall be unlawful, except as hereinafter provided, for any person, firm or corporation to use or operate, or cause to be used or operated, any mechanical or electrical device, machine, apparatus or instrument to intensify or to amplify or to reproduce the human voice, music, or any sound on any public street within the corporate limits of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, at any time on Sunday, and on all other days of the week at any time between the hours of 10:00 P. M. and 10:00 A. M.; **SAVE AND EXCEPT** that said mechanical or electrical device, machine, apparatus or instrument to intensify or amplify, or to reproduce the human voice and or music may be used during the hours hereinabove prohibited upon written permission being granted by the Board of Commissioners of City of Santa Anna, Texas, for the following purposes: football games, baseball and softball games, stock shows and rodeos, parades, and any type of show or entertainment sponsored by any civic organization.

**SECTION 2.**  
That it shall be unlawful, except as hereinafter provided, for any person, firm or corporation to use or operate, or cause to be used or operated, any mechanical or electrical device, machine,

apparatus or instrument to intensify or amplify or to reproduce the human voice, music, or to produce, intensify or amplify any other sound, in any building on any premises in the City of Santa Anna, Texas, at any time on Sunday and on all other days at any time between the hours of 10:00 P. M. and 10:00 A. M. whereby the sound therefrom is cast upon the public streets or where such device is maintained and operated for advertising purposes or for the purpose of attracting the attention of the passing public, or which is so placed and operated that the sounds coming therefrom can be heard to the annoyance or inconvenience or persons residing on neighboring premises; **SAVE AND EXCEPT** that said mechanical device, machine, apparatus or instrument to intensify or to amplify, or to reproduce the human voice and or music may be used during the hours hereinabove prohibited upon written permission being granted by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, for the following purposes: football games, baseball and softball games, stock shows and rodeos, parades, and any type of show or entertainment sponsored by any civic organization.

**SECTION 3.**  
Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction for violation thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed ONE HUNDRED (\$100.00) DOLLARS, and each and every act and each day of continuance thereof shall constitute a distinct and separate offense.

**SECTION 4.**  
In the event any section or part of section or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, such invalidity shall not effect the valid portions thereof, which shall be enforceable regardless of such holding.

**SECTION 5.**  
WHEREAS, on account of the urgent need for the protection of the health of the residents of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, and in order to protect and maintain the peaceful enjoyment of the home by the residents of Santa Anna, Texas, and

WHEREAS, the existing ordinances are not adequate to regulate same, there is created an urgency and an emergency for the immediate preservation of the public health and the peaceful enjoyment of the home, requires that this ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

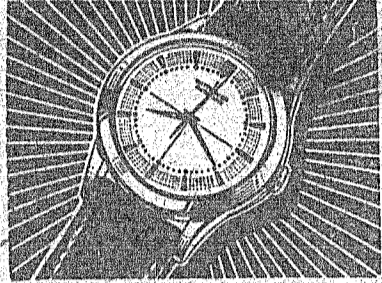
Officers to serve the coming year were mostly re-elected.

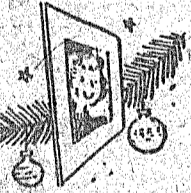

**Social Security Representative In Coleman Tuesday**

A representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration will be at the Department of Public Welfare office in Coleman at 1:00 p. m. on Tuesday, November 25. This announcement was made today by Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene office, who invited persons to call at that time who need assistance in connection with retirement claims or death claims under the Social Security Act.

Fisher called attention to a recent change in the law that will make it possible for certain persons over the age of 75 to have their retirement payments refigured. Any worker who is 75 years of age or over, who has filed a claim for his retirement payments before April 1952, and who has continued to work in 1951 and 1952, should recheck with the social security office. Some of these workers have previously been told that no refiguring of their amounts was possible, but there is a special provision in the 1952 amendments that changes this.

Persons who are 75 years of age or over may now receive their old-age and survivors insurance payments whether or not they have retired. Any such persons who have not checked up on their rights should do so as soon as possible. Even if the worker is still on his regular full-time job, he can still draw his regular monthly social security benefits.

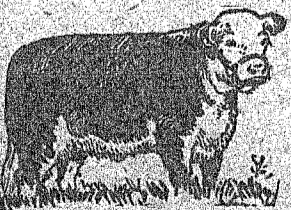

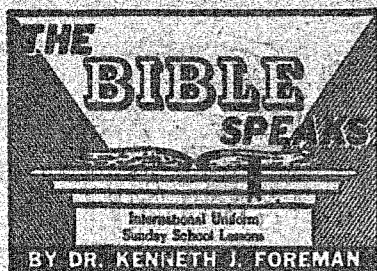

Thanking God

Lesson for November 23, 1953

IT IS hard to imagine Jesus observing exactly one day in the year, no more, as a Thanksgiving day. This is not to say that the idea of a Thanksgiving Day is a bad one.

Mistakes About Thanking There are at least three mistakes which are commonly made with reference to Thanksgiving day. We Christian people make the mistake of limiting our thoughts of gratitude to one day.

Another sort of mistake, made by a great many, even of those who are called Christians, is to use the day for purposes that have nothing at all to do with it.

Retail stores use the day to usher in the Christmas season. In fact, not so many years ago the commercial interests of the country were successful in pushing the day back a whole week just in order to have a longer season in which to sell "Christmas" merchandise.

But the purpose of the day is not to make money or to win football games or to get stuffed with turkey.

Grace Before Shakespeare

A third mistake is to be thankful for only one kind of thing; namely, material blessings such as food, security, good crops and good business. Now our Lord was grateful for such things. More than once we

read of his taking bread and giving thanks for it. But as he knew that man does not live by bread alone, so man should not give thanks for bread alone.

Some well-known writer once commented on our custom of saying "Grace before meat"—the old expression for what is now often called "asking the blessing" at the table. Has God no other blessings for us?

When a person sits down with a great play (say by Shakespeare) in his hand, why not a "Grace before Shakespeare?" How many of us have a little prayer of thanksgiving before reading a book of poetry or going out to look up at the starry sky on a clear night, or before opening a letter from an old friend or before going to the hospital or the dentist?

Blessings of the Spirit

Jesus' prayer of thanksgiving, which our lesson Scripture records, however, is on a higher plane still. The particular blessing for which he thanks the Lord of heaven and earth is in the first place a spiritual one, and in the second place it is not something that came to him but to some one else.

Can we say that many of our prayers are on this high level? Many of us never get beyond the "Gimme" stage. And even among those who do rise to the level of real thanksgiving, it is rare enough to find those who are grateful not only for their own blessings but for those received by others; and how seldom does God hear any note of praise for blessings of the spirit!

This is a high plane, to be reached only by high souls, those who have been intimate enough with Christ to absorb his spirit and attitude. Stupid people, who do not have very good minds, cannot be expected to appreciate blessings of the mind; and people with small and wizened souls cannot feel blessings of the spirit.

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SELECTION OF JURY PANELS EXPLAINED

To many people, the call for jury service always seems to come at the wrong time. Just when plans for that hunting trip are complete, an inventory or other business problem is demanding special attention, or the best Jersey comes down with a serious ailment, a jury summons is sure to arrive.

In spite of the regularity with which such unhappy coincidences occur to some individuals, no gremlin is watching to see when you can least afford to be away from home and business.

Being chosen for jury service at any particular time is largely a matter of chance.

Under Texas laws jury panels for District Courts are selected by one of two methods — the Jury Wheel or the Jury Commission. The jury wheel is a hollow metal wheel or container, so

shaped up this year: COTTON — A below normal crop was harvested. It was at least 1,100,000 bales below what could have been expected. Figuring each bale worth \$200, then we lost some \$220 million worth to the drouth.

LIVESTOCK — Counting livestock and livestock products such as poultry and eggs, milk products, etc., into this group, our sales receipts were at least 12 per cent below an average year.

GRAIN SORGHUMS — Texas marketed some 71 million bushels of grain sorghums in 1951 as compared with an estimate of only 38 million bushels this year. Counting the very minimum worth of a bushel at \$1, losses in grain sorghums amount to about \$33 million.

PASTURE DAMAGE — A conservative estimate of the value of grazing losses, alone, on Texas' 100 million acres of pasture land would total \$66 million this year. And since it will take from 3 to 5 years to replace this grass loss, then we stand to lose at least this much money, if not more, for the next few years even if it began raining today.

The outlook for wheat in the Texas Panhandle is especially grim. Investigators report that less acreage has been seeded for next year's crop and the stands of wheat already up are in very bad condition.

"The country is ripe for dust storms which would be worse than those of the middle '30s", one observer commented. "A few hard freezes and thaws without rain to hold the sod down would really start the earth to moving."

But the rest is up to the weather. We can only pray for rain.

erected that it will freely revolve on its axle. In counties using a jury wheel, a list of all qualified jurors is prepared from the official tax lists in August of each year. Taking part in the ceremony are the County Tax Assessor, the District Clerk, the County Sheriff, and the County Clerk. Each prospective juror's name is written on a card of uniform size and placed in the metal container.

Three persons must be present when the wheel is unlocked and the names drawn therefrom — the Sheriff (or one of his deputies), the District Clerk (or one of his deputies), and the District Judge. Upon completion of currently required jury lists, all names are returned to the container, which is again double locked.

Using the county tax assessment roll, these men follow the Judge's instructions as to the number of jurors to be selected for various weeks of the court term. The lists of names prepared by them are sealed in separate envelopes and delivered to

the Judge. He, in turn, turns them over to the District Clerk or one of his deputies in open court, who immediately files the envelopes away in a safe place in the Clerk's Office.

Although ordinary inconveniences are not usually sufficient to gain an excuse from jury service, emergency or hardship is a different matter. If you face such extreme circumstances in your business or personal affairs that your mind cannot freely reflect and meditate upon the important issues to be tried, call this to the attention of the judge.

Courts try to be reasonable in granting excuses. The judge will consider your situation carefully and thoughtfully, and may determine that your service should be deferred.

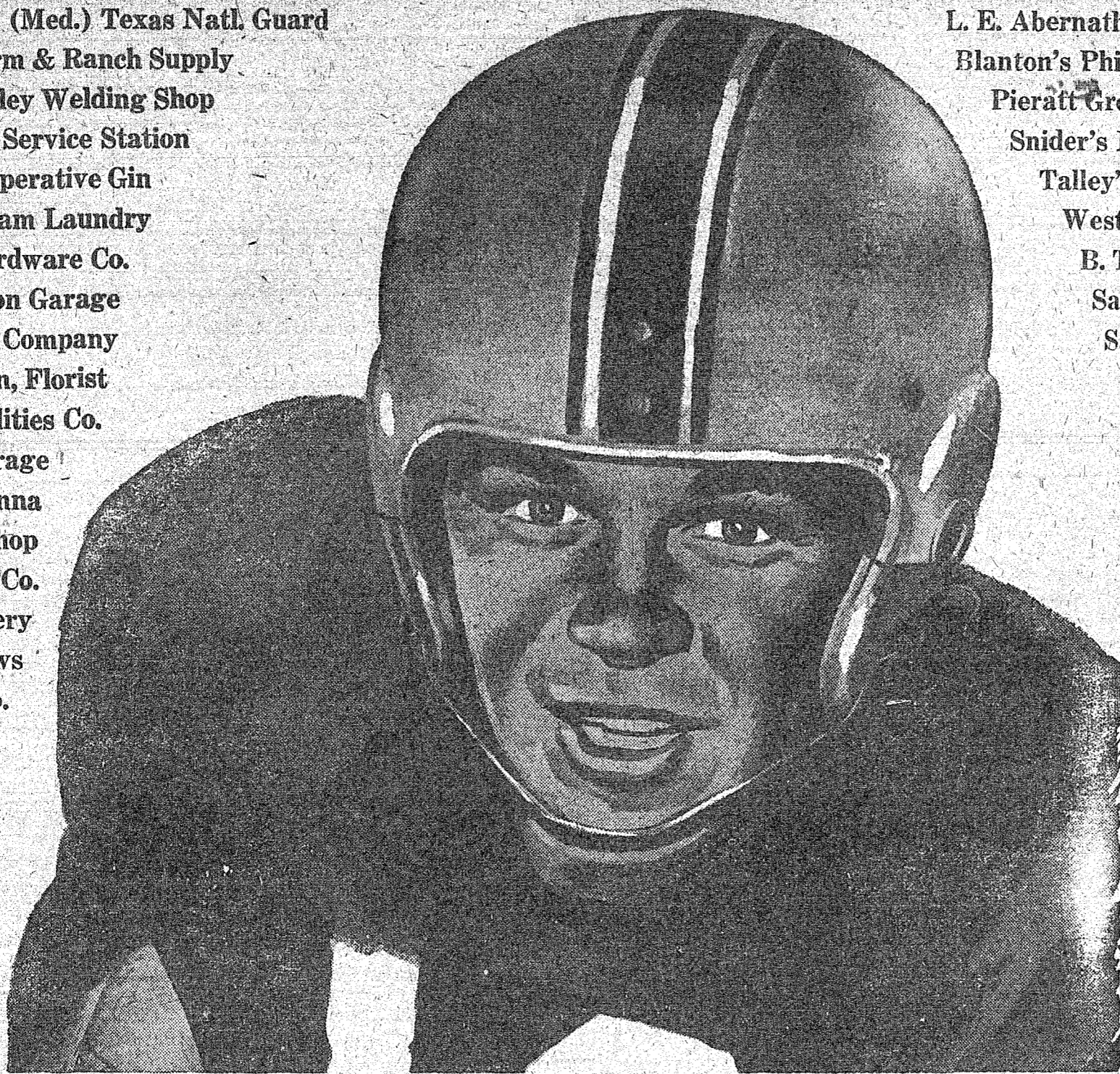

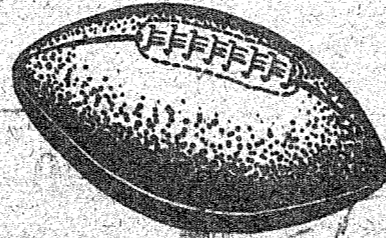

Wylie kicked to Santa Anna to start the second half and on the first play Wylie recovered a Santa Anna fumble on the Santa Anna 30-yard line. Four plays failed to gain the necessary yardage and the ball went over. The Mountaineers took the ball on their own 22-yard line and several ground plays and two passes scored again on a pass from Charles Scarborough to Jay Stewart that covered 22 yards. Pollock's extra point attempt was blocked.

In the fourth period Dean Bass was shifted to the fullback slot and midway in the period broke into the open on the Wylie 14-yard line and went all the way for the final TD. Pollock's extra point try was wide and the score stood Santa Anna 19-Wylie 0. Wylie only penetrated the Mountaineer 20-yard line on the one occasion in the second period. Both teams played a hard game of ball.

Dublin all but cinched the district title Friday night when they barely managed to edge over the DeLeon Bearcats by a

28-26 score. DeLeon scored midway in the first period on a short pass and then again early in the second period when Cosby went 13 yards for a TD. Their extra point man missed both attempts. In the second period Dublin drove 47 yards for their only first-half count, with their extra point man kicking the point. Both teams scored in the third period and in the fourth period DeLeon scored again, making the score 26-14. Then triple threat James Berna for Dublin scored two TDs in rapid order, the first on a three-yard plunge and the other on a 54-yard pass. The final TD came with only 2½ minutes left to play. Dublin has only one game left and that is with Eastland on Friday night. Santa Anna is standing in

third place in season competition this week and in fourth place in district play. Provided Dublin beats Eastland and Santa Anna wins over Cross Plains, it will give the Mountaineers a tie with Eastland for third place in the district. If, however, Eastland were to happen to upset Dublin, this would give them third place and would throw Santa Anna in fourth place. If the Cross Plains Buffaloes can upset Santa Anna, it would throw the two teams in a tie for fourth place.

The Bangs Dragons upset the Eastland eleven last week by a 13-7 score, but it did not effect the standing in district competition of either team. Bangs is still in the cellar and they have completed their season. Wylie also has completed their season and stand next to the cellar in season play and third from bottom in district play. Cross Plains had their biggest night of the season when they blanked the Rising Star Wildcats 26-0, to win two straight games, after losing four in a row. They are primed for the game this week end. Santa Anna is also primed for the week end game by winning over the district champions last year, Wylie, by a 19-0 score.

This week will complete the regular schedule of play for all District 7-A teams. Wylie and Bangs have already completed their schedule and games over the week end will find Santa Anna at Cross Plains, Rising Star at DeLeon, and Eastland at Dublin.
