It was a center for professional athletics. Everybody in the place had the idea of getting rich as fast as possible. It was not noted for culture or for religion or morals. Indeed it was so bad that its morals would make a Roman policeman blush. When Paul wrote Roman 1 he was living in Corinth, and the horrible picture he draws is no more than he could see, so to speak, looking but of his window. Now big cities contain much good. Most of them are there, directly or indirectly, because they hope to make money faster than they could back home. What chance has the gospel of love in such a place? A real chance; but it has to fight.

# Half-Religion

Paul stuck to cities for his missionary work because he was, after all, a city man and understood city people. But still it was a fight. Besides the indifference of people who cared for no god but themselves, there was bitter opposition from people who already had a religion, and a right good one. Paul suffered sharper attacks from the Jews than he ever did from downright pagans. People who already have something good are more likely to be fanatical against what is better than are people who have nothing. For instance, nowadays the great new revision of the Bible is getting more bitter opposition from people who have a good but old translation-the King James-than from people who don't have Bible at all.

In Acts 17 there is told at some length what is only hinted at in Acts 18—the kind of trouble Paul had with the Greeks. In dealing with Greeks he was up against the true highbrows of his time, The Jew had a very practical mind; but the Greek mind was always worrying with very difficult questions, to which the answers have not all been given even down to this present day. Paul had to argue with these people - he couldn't just knock them over the head with Bible texts; the Greek mind didn't bash in easily. And Paul won some of them. Indeed he was more successful with them than he was with his own people, somewhat to his own astonishment. But that is one hurdle that Christianity meets everywhere: the opposition of people who want to have all their questions answered before they will consent to believe. There is surely nothing wrong in having a bright mind, and nothing at all wrong in having the best education one can absorb. But any person who insists on God's explaining himself to him before he, the man, will give his heart to God, is demanding the wrong thing, God's grace is for the

# Standard Abstract Co.

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SANTA ANNA

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When residents of a territory petition to be annexed to a water improvement district, the notice of a hearing on the subject must be published in a newspaper.

Here is the law on this point:

"... Such petition shall be presented to the Board of Directors of the water improvement district to which it is proposed to annex such territory, and thereupon it shall be the duty of the Board to pass an order fixing a time and place at which such petition shall be heard, which date shall not be less than thirty (30) days from date of such order. The Secretary of said Board shall issue notice of such time and place of hearing and which notice shall describe the territory menosed by the approval and shall are outs. time and place of hearing and which notice shall describe the territory proposed to be annexed, and shall execute such notice by posting copies thereof in three (3) public places in the district, and in two (2) public places within the territory proposed to be annexed; said notices to be posted for a period of at least fifteen (15) days prior to date of said hearing. Publication of a copy of such notice shall be made in a newspaper of general circulation in the county, one time, and at least fifteen (15) days prior to such hearing."

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



# **New Refrigerator** On Display At Jones Electric In Coleman

Coleman County will soon get its first glimpse of a revoluntionary refrigerator that completely eliminates the need for ice cube trays.

Jones Electric Service in Cole-man announced today that the new 1953 Servel "automatic icemaker" refrigerator will be on public display in its store starting Saturday.

According to Bill Jones, this latest Servel model actually freezes ice cubes without trays stores them in a basket, and automatically replaces them as they are used.

"It's almost unbelievable," Mr. Jones said. "Whether you want a single ice cube or a handful of cubes, you just reach into the basket, and remove as many cubes as you need. They're cold and dry, and do not stick together. When the level of the cubes in the basket falls below a certain mark, the 'automatic ice-maker goes to work and au-tomatically fills up the basket again.'

Even the traditional shape of the pieces of ice has been changed in this new Servel refrigerator, Mr. Jones pointed out. Instead of the usual cubes, Servel now freezes ice in the shape of half-moons — or 'ice-circles."

# Time To Start Fly Control Now

Austin — Early spring is the best time for a community to start a fly control program, declared Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. That is before the fly population has a chance to multiply. It is estimated that to multiply. It is estimated that one pair of flies, under favorable conditions, could have count-

less ancestors before winter.

Every time you kill a fly early in the season, and destroy breeding places, you stop whole colonies of flies before they can start. The most effective way of preventing swarms of flies is to destroy or make inaccessible to flies the organic material which attract flies by their odors, and which are essential to them as

food and breeding places.
Individual householders
should make it their responsibility to clean up their own back yards. Garbage cans should have A Daughter For a tight fitting lid and they should be leak-proof. Inadequate facilities for storage of garbage and refuse usually result in widespread fly breeding. Uncovout of buildings, thereby protecting food from contamination by fly-borne disease organisms.

There is no substitute for good sanitation in fly control. Every spot in town must be cleaned of garbage and trash. If a few clirty places are left, swarms of then will breed. 

CHANCES FOR A BALANCED budget during this session of the Congress were improved last week when the House Appropriations committee whacked one big money bill 61% below what was requested to operate 23 Federal agencies during the next fiscal year, beginning July 1. The Committee approved a cut amounting to \$721 million.

This is but one of a dozen appropriation bills that will be considered. But the committee action does indicate forbodings of things to come. It shows that the committee is economy-minded and is willing to do something about it.

A highlight of the committee action was a decision to eliminate completely the New Dealborn Nation-wide socialized public housing program. This alone will save the taxpayers untold millions of dollars annually if the wise action of the committee is sustained.

The Truman budget called for 75,000 new socialized housing units to begin during the next fiscal year and then President, Eisenhower requested a total of 35,000. Then came the committee action to cut it out entirely. That's a real economy step with some meaning to it, and it is also a blow at what is generally considered to be the most socialistic activity - and most
