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If the city or county proposes to hold an election for the cancellation of unsold bonds, notice of the election must be published in a newspaper.

Price Daniel's book of Texas Publication Laws quotes the pertinent statute as follows:

"Any incorporated city or town in this State, including cities incorporated under the Home Rule Provisions of the Constitution and Laws of Texas, which has heretofore or may hereafter vote in favor of or execute bonds which have been or may be unsold for a period of ten (10) or more years after the same have been or may be executed, may revoke and cancel such bonds at an election called by the governing body of such city or town upon its own motion or upon petition of not less than ten per cent (10%) of the qualified. property taxpaying voters voting in the last preceding city election, shall order an election to determine whether or not such bonds shall be revoked or cancelled. None but qualified taxpaying voters may vote at such an election, Such election shall be ordered and held on a date stated in such order not less than twenty (20) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of such order and notice thereof shall be given for fifteen (15) days before such election by publication of the notice thereof in some newspaper pub-Hahed in such city or town and such election shall be held and conducted in the same manner and form as required in elections to authorize the issuance of such bonds . . . "





My Conscience

Lesson for May 24, 1953

** FOLLOW your conscience; but be sure you do not have the conscience of a donkey." This advice is old but still good. It is never right to go against your conscience; but it is very important to have your conscience right in the first place. Conscience is never quite automatic. It is not born in us so much as it is built-in. If it were born in us, that is to say if we were made so that we would never have to have any one explain to us the difference between right and wrong, and would always know by instinct just what is right in every situation, then not only would we all agree (which we don't), but if a child were brought up, say, by wolves, then he would know right from wrong just as unerringly as if he had been brought up in a Bishop's household. What

is born in each of us is the capacity to tell right from wrong, just as we are born with the capacity for speech. We have to learn to talk; likewise we have to learn right from wrong. Conscience is also



Dr. Foreman the capacity for knowing what is right without thinking about it. It is a kind of moral habit, just as walking is a balancing habit.

I Am Not Alone

The best, the most reliable conscience in this world is the Christian conscience. A Christian has certain automatic moral attitudes; or rather these tend to become automatic with practice. Watch a trained first baseman catch balls thrown to him. He will tap the base with his toe without stopping to think or look around. He was not born with that habit; but he can learn it to perfection, and perfection comes with practice. Just as the athlete's habits are in line with the rules of the game, the Christian's moral habits-his con-

science-will be in line with the principles of Christ. One of these principles is laid down by Paul in I Cor. 8:7-13. It is this: I should never act as if I were the only person involved. I must always think how my actions will touch other persons. I am not alone in this world; I depend on others and they on me. Will my action help to make others strong or will it make them weak?

My Body Is a Temple
Another Christian principle is
laid down by St. Paul in I Cor.
6:18-20. It is this: My body is a temple of the Holy Spirit. To put that as boldly as possible: God makes his home in every Christian; that is where God especially lives, in this world. Now the more clearly we can remember that, the more intensely we can believe and appreciate it, the more God-like our lives will be. This does not mean we never have to stop and think. It does not mean we have an automatic conscience. It does not mean that whatever we may take a notion to do will be all right, since we are the children of God. What this does mean, as St. Paul preached and practiced it, is that by "practising the presence of God" we more and more reliably think, "What would Jesus want me to do? The "polite" thing to do is just to do what most others do, or in other words count noses to see what is right. But what is the Christian thing to do? What other persons will be affected by my action, and how will my behavior affect them? Then what about the Holy Spirit within me? What would God have to say? Or again, thinking over his everyday habits-habits of speaking, thinking, acting - the Christian will ask: How many other people are involved in this habit of mine? Does it help them? Or does it get in their way, irritate them, rouse bad feelings in their minds? And what about God? Eyen if no one but God knows what I think, or what I do, what he thinks about it is the most important point of all. If I were God, what would I think of me?

LEGISLATIVE PERMISSION REQUIRED FOR SUIT AGAINST STATE

Included among the measures passed by the current 53rd Texas Legislature are several Concurrent Resolutions permitting various individuals to file suits against the state. Applying to local situations only, they have been attended by very little publicity, and the majority of Texans are probably not even aware its operation and costs. of their passage.

In fact, the average individual vould seldom have occasion to conder the question of whether the State of Texas can be sued or corporation. One of the prepresent day laws is that of im-State of Texas may not be sued without its consent.

Then, if a specific situation arises which is not covered by the general rules, the legislators are authorized to pass a special neasure to permit suit to be

Therefore, any person seeking to enforce a claim against the state through the courts must petition the Legislature for the necessary permission, unless his category or type previously recognized by our lawmakers.

Recently passed legislation will allow suits to be brought cases, ranging from an action for damages for personal injuries suffered in a collision with a truck to a suit for monetary damages alleged to have been incurred in connection with the securing of a right-of-way for a farm-to-market highway.

But, he adds, perhaps the most beneficial act protecting children from bad working conditions is the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act passed by Congress in 1938 and amended in 1949. It applies generally to employees engaged in interstate commerce or in the productions

of goods for commerce. Employers who wish to protect themselves from unintentional violation of child labor laws will require boys and girls to present age certificates before they go

"In fairness to your employer," he tells minors, "don't falsify your age to get a certain job." Such age certificates are de-

sirable for minors under 18 in general employment and by those who are 18 and 19 if they work in hazardous jobs. Minor girls of 18 and 19 will need such certificates if they work for firms doing government contracts, he says.

In Texas such certificates of age are issued, as a public service, by the Texas Employment Commission. Birth certificates, church records, or insurance policies may be needed to establish proof of age.

Further information about legal minimum ages for employ-ment in various jobs may be obtained from the Wage-Hour Division, U.S. Department of Labor, Dallas, Texas.

It stands to reason, Dr. Cox points out, that if these com-pounds will cut through grease and film, and there is no doubt that some of them will — they will also penetrate the natural oils of the skin and cause irritation and discomfort if the condition is neglected.

The health officer's recommendation? Keep some hand lotion within easy reach and apply it liberally after using detergents for household cleaning or laundry.
