



But many of the opponents of the cut felt that expenditures even for the temporary practices are justified in view of the great importance of helping in every way possible with general soil conservation objectives. Actually, the item on agricultural conservation payments applies to both permanent, long-range practices as well as the temporary, recurring outlays. The Secretary of Agricultural, however, had proposed to divide the two and apply soil conservation funds to real, long-range uses such as dams and terracing, elimination of noxious growths where the permanent removal would add to productivity. Landowners are required to match Federal funds in all the prac-

During the present fiscal year, which ends June 30, a total of \$211 million will be spent in these conservation payments to farmers. But of that amount more than half - \$108 million - is for lime, phosphate, and other minerals, together with green manure and cover crops. In other words, the "tail is wagging the dog", with the longrange permanent soil connervation practices being reduced while the outlay for the temporary, year-to-year aid has been gobbling up the major part of $_{
m I}$ funds intended for prevention of erosion and permanent improvement of the soil and its

productivity.
Actually, the fertilizer aid, while very useful to the farmer, is a type of practice that every enterprising farmer would provide himself without the aid of a benevolent — and deficit-financed — government. Proper fertilizing increases yields as much as 100%, and of course the landowner as a matter of good business does not neglect that part of his normal farming



When a hearing is scheduled on a petition for the issuance of road bonds by a road district or political subdivision, notice of the hearing must be published in a newspaper. The law states:

" . . . The clerk of said court shall forthwith issue a notice of such time and place of hearing, which notice shall inform all persons concerned of the time and place of hearing and of their right to appear at such hearing and contend for or protest the ordering of such bond election. Such notice shall state the amount of bonds proposed to be issued, and shall describe such political subdivision or road district by its name or number, and shall describe the boundaries thereof as such boundaries are described and defined in the order of the Commissioners Court establishing such subdivision or district. The clerk shall execute said notice by posting true copies thereof in three public places within such subdivision or road district and one at the courthouse door of the county. Such notice shall be posted for ten days prior to the date of said hearing. Said notice shall also be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the subdivision or district, if a newspaper is published therein, one time, and at least five days prior to such hearing. If no newspaper is published in such subdivision or district, then such notice shall be published in some newspaper in the county, if there be one."

Notice must also be given by publication if after the hearing it is decided to hold the election. Here is the law:

"If the proposed issue of bonds and levy of taxes is for a political subdivision or road district, notice of such election shall be given by publishing in a newspaper in the subdivision or district for three successive weeks, and by posting notices in at least three public places in such subdivision or district and at the courthouse door of the county. If no newspaper is published therein, then such published notice shall be given in some newspaper published in the county, If there be one".

DRAFT LAW AND REGULATIONS

(Editor's note: Following is one of a series of articles concerning the Draft Laws and Regulations of the nation and information to men of draft age.)

On a local draft board is placed the responsibility under applicable laws and regulations, of deciding which men should be deferred because of their civilian activities.

The three categories of men farm workers (2) college or university students, and (3) men in industrial and all other civilian activity.

In the case of students, deferment until end of the school year is ordered by law, if the student is mailed an order to report for induction while he is in school satisfactorialy taking a full-time course of instruction, provided he has never received such a statutory deferment be-

If the student has previously received such a deferment, then further deferment is up to the local board. The board can consider information outside the scholastic as well as scholastic information. The widely-publicized draft test for college students can be ignored by local boards under draft regulations if the board so desires. Score on the draft test and class standing of the student are provided as information for the board. Here are three things the



What Never Fails

Lesson for May 31, 1953

WHAT do you wish for, most of all? What do you pray for, most of all? You wish and pray for many things, and this is right; but what is above all? If you take your New Testament / seriously, there can be no question about that. You will want above all the thing that is worth more than everything else; you will not be content to ask for less than the greatest thing in the world. You will ask God for love.

Better Than Miracles Remember, when St. Paul or Jesus talked about love they were not thinking about the thing you hear about from the jukebox at the corner drugstore. They were not thinking about the sort of thing that comes and goes and leaves headaches and heartaches behind. They were not thinking of the kind

of love that wants to get, but of the Iove that wants to give. They meant the kind of love God has and is: the kind of love that transtorms the persons to whom it is given. The kind

of love that Jesus Mved out there in Galilee, the kind that can be lived on any street in the world. The kind of love the Cross stands for. This kind of love, Paul said, is better than miracles. Indeed, miracles are no account without it. When Paul talks of "speaking with the tongues of men and of angels" he is not meaning eloquence, oratory. He means (as you can see from I Cor. Chap. 12) the miraculous "gift" of tongues which the Corinthian church knew. Some of the members there could speak with tongues, some couldn't. Those that could, despised those that couldn't. That's not the point, Paul means to say. The measure of a Christian is not miracles, but love.

Mightier Than the Mind

Love is also better than something else we all admire and would like to have as much of as possible. It is better and mightier than mental genius. The world around us is full of mysteries. A child can ask questions the wise cannot answer. If I only knew! is a thought that has occurred to every one. Each of us thinks he would be happier if he knew all-the answers. We feel sure we could do more and be more if our minds were even just a little sharper than they are. But Paul reminds us that and wisdom were all answered, even if we had such wisdom that not a single question would be left thing is likely to happen soon!), we should still amount to precisely nothing, if we did not have love. Paul does not say that mental powhe does say is that miracles minus fulfill God's dreams, nor ours.

Nobler Than Martyrdom

The Christian church has always honored her martyrs, the men and women and children too who have died rather than give up their faith. We are inclined to put martyrs up in the highest bracket of the saints, partly because most of us are sadly aware that we are not the stuff of which martyrs are made. But Paul pulls us up short. Even to be burned at the stake for a righteous cause is still nothing at all, if there is no love behind and in the action.

Love Is the Miracle

Two hesitations cloud the mind. Is it not selfish to ask for the greatest thing in the world? Should we not rather be contented with lesser gifts? The answer to this hesitation is that this divine kind of love is precisely Unselfishness itself. To ask for the grace of unselfishness is surely no selfish prayer. Another hesitation is this: Is not this divine thing, this thing that outlives, and outlasts wisdom and miracles and martyrdomsis not this too high for us? Is it not a miracle itself, so rare we should not know what to do with It if we had it? Well, it is rare inthat shone with it from beginning Christian homes and Christian peohave lived in its light. 


